



From one-six acre tract of corn he received \$65 per acre, and then followed with late cotton to the tune of \$75 per acre. He did even better in 1913. "I am sure I always received on the average of \$500 per acre from okra," said the Jap, "and \$200 per acre on cantaloupes."




