PRESIDENT AND PEACE

By Hon. Champ Clark, Speaker of the House of Representatives.

Perhaps—who knows?—when President Wilson has finished his course as Chief Magistrate of this mighty Republic, and when historians come to assign his place in the pantheon of fame, they will pass over the great domestic measures of his administration, such as tariff revision, currency legislation, and so forth, and declare that his successful efforts to keep the United States out of war constitute his clearest title to the gratitude of his country.

In his famous first inaugural address, which has become a classic, and which every boy and girl should commit to memory as a literary exercise, Thomas Jefferson stated our ideal relations with foreign nations in these words: "Peace, commerce, and honest friendship with all nations; entangling alliances with none."—a wise, statesmanlike, and therefore, "the apple of gold in pictures of silver."

That is the aim and substance of our international policy, to which we have adhered without the shadow of turning. A wise and beneficent tradition ever had.

It is an experience second in the terse, luminous, emphatic, appealing simplicity of President Woodrow Wilson's proclamation which all good and sensible citizens, of whatever persuasion, political or religious, uphold and applaud.

Americans are a peace-loving people. We believe in John Milton's saying: "Peace hath her victories no less renowned than war." President Wilson expressed with great delicacy and felicity the sentiment of all true Americans when he tendered his kindly adieu to the belligerent powers in order to stop the titanic struggle across the sea. Fortunate in his coin of vantage, happy in the confidence of a powerful people, let us hope that he will succeed in his philanthropic endeavors, and that upon him will rest the blessing vouchsafed to the peacemakers in the Sermon on the Mount.

When a boy back in the hill country of Kentucky I attended an election for the first time and saw four men shot during the day. One man fired six bullets at another man, and, missing his intended victim, wounded an innocent bystander in the leg. In this astounding Old World conflict America is the severely injured innocent bystander, and from a natural desire not to be injured any more, as well as from motives of friendship and humanity, we wish to see a speedy end to hostilities.

The first reason why we desire peace in trans-Atlantic countries is that we are all akin to somebody over there, and our hearts go out to our kindred in their sore distress. This applies to us all, whether our ancestors came over 300 years ago, as mine did, or at a later time. It applies with peculiar force to our 10,000,000 citizens who were born in the countries now in battle array.

Another reason why we want peace is that the war has disturbed almost every business in which any of our people are engaged, entailing sorrow, suffering and want on millions of Americans who had no hand whatsoever in precipitating the awful situation.

Who started it no man seems to know. What it is about appears equally obscure. In his celebrated poem, "Blenheim," they caused old Casper to give his grandson, Peterkin, a glowing account of the battle, whereupon the boy propounded the pertinent and far-resounding question, "What good came of it at last?"—a question which has not been answered to this day. So, perhaps, it will be with this war—the bloodiest in all the hoary register of time.

No matter who got it up, no matter what it is about, we fondly hope and fervently pray for its early conclusion, not only for the sake of humanity and civilization, but for the sake of our own prosperity and happiness. We take both an altruistic and a selfish view of it.

In 1823, when the Greeks rebelled against the Turks, Daniel Webster, in a memorable speech, appealed to "the moral sentiment of the world," which has never been appealed to in vain.

The noblest words that ever fell from martial lips were General Grant's—"Let us have peace!"

GERMANS WIN BIG NAVAL BATTLE OVER BRITISH—GERMAN OFFICER REPORTS TERRIBLE LOSS OF LIFE

BRITISH GUNS ARE EASILY OUT-RANGED AND ARE DISABLED BY GERMANS BEFORE THEY CAN FIRE—GERMANS LOSE ONLY ONE MAN IN FIGHT.

NINETEEN RUSSIAN TRANSPORTS ARE SENT TO BOTTOM

Vessels Carrying 1,700 Mines Sent to Bottom by Turks—Russian Battleship Sunk by the Turks—Three Turkish Ministers as Result of Dissentions in Cabinet—Japs Capture Tsing Tau Forts—German Fleet Gathers.

Paris, Nov. 2.—An official announcement this afternoon says that the German attacks between Dixmude and Lys continue to show great violence, but that the Allies have made some progress, except at the village of Messines, part of which they have lost.

An important German attack on Arras failed, although it was one of great violence and stubbornness.

The French have made progress at several points along the Aisne, and repulsed night attacks in these regions, and are declared to have gained decided advantages here.

The German heavy artillery has resumed its activity about Rheims. In the Vosges, the French drove off the German artillery, which was bombarding St. Die.

TURKEY TO PROCLAIM A HOLY WAR, IS REPORT.

London, Nov. 2.—Evidence continues to accumulate to the effect that Turkey intends to proclaim a Holy War, which would mean virtually a World War, including all nations.

The Khedive of Egypt is reported to be on the point of demanding an explanation from England of the British attitude toward Turkey. The Turkish gunboats are at the entrance of the Gulf of Suez.

CRUISER GOEBEN DRIVEN OFF FROM SEBASTOPOL.

Petrograd, Nov. 2.—The cruiser Goeben has been driven off from the bombardment of Sebastopol. The Goeben was damaged, according to the reports reaching here.

Paris, Nov. 3.—An official announcement issued this afternoon says that the Germans seem to have completely abandoned the left bank of the Yser below Dixmude and the Allies have re-occupied points in that section without great difficulty. North of Lys, the Allies made gains against strong opposition.

The Germans failed to recapture Suburba Arras from Allies. The French advanced several points in the Aisne region and the Meuse. They also made one retreat.

ARABIAN TOWN OCCUPIED BY BRITISH.

London, Nov. 3.—The British cruiser Minerva has shelled and occupied the fortified town of Akabah in Arabia on an arm of the Red Sea, about 150 miles east of Suez.

A number of troops defending the forts were killed, but there were no British casualties.

At Akabah, most of the soldiers were natives. The British warship took care of the European soldiers there to be a German officer. The warship destroyed the forts.

RUSSIAN ORDERED TO ATTACK TURKS.

London, Nov. 3.—A Reuter's Petrograd dispatch says that the Russian foreign minister Sazonov, in replying to the Turkish demand for an apology for the Black Sea fighting, says that it is too late to enter into any kind of negotiations with Turkey now.

A Reuter's Tiflis dispatch says that Czar Nicholas has ordered the Caucasian army to cross the frontier and attack the Turks.

TURKISH TROOPS NEAR BORDER OF EGYPT.

Cairo, Egypt, Nov. 3.—Turkish troops are reported to be near the border of Egypt, but they have not crossed it yet.

The public in Egypt is calm, and are not aware of the Turkish trouble.

Valparaiso, Chile, Nov. 4.—How five German cruisers managed to sink or disable Sir Christopher Craddock's fleet of three cruisers and one transport with the loss of only one German wounded, is told by German officers who arrived here today.

The German cruisers, Scharnhorst and Gneisenau, out-ranged with their guns anything that the British had. They opened fire at six miles while the British had to steam within four miles before beginning fire and by that time the British were too badly injured to do the Germans any harm. The German admiral says that when darkness fell, "The Good Hope, the British Flagship, was so badly damaged she was unable to escape except for the protection of darkness. The Monmouth under identical conditions tried to escape but was followed by a small cruiser and sunk with a few shots.

"Owing to a hurricane no boats were lowered and there was a terrible loss of life."

The cruiser Glasgow and transport Otranto escaped through its speed and with the aid of darkness. The Germans say that the British fought heroically.

WASHINGTON ADVISED OF BATTLE.

Washington, Nov. 4.—State Department reports today from Chile are to the effect that the British flagship, Good Hope, escaped with the Glasgow and Otranto in the naval battle which is believed to have occurred near there. The place of the battle is not given.

19 RUSSIAN TRANSPORTS ARE SUNK BY TURKS.

Berlin, Nov. 4.—An official report says that the Turks have sunk nineteen Russian transports, carrying seventeen hundred mines destined for blocking Turkish waters. No details of the engagement are given out.

RUSSIAN BATTLESHIP SUNK BY TURKISH WARSHIP.

Amsterdam, Nov. 4.—The German papers report that Turkish warships sank the Russian battleship Sinop. The place where the battleship was sunk, and the details of the battle are not given.

TURKISH MINISTERS HAVE RESIGNED.

London, Nov. 4.—Dissentions in the Turkish cabinet over the war are indicated by a Berlin report. The Turkish ministers of public works, marine and commerce have resigned.

JAPS CAPTURE THE TSING TAU FORTS.

Tokio, Nov. 4.—The Japs destroyed twenty-six German guns, capturing 800 prisoners and the Tsing Tau forts and now are attacking the German trenches and the wire entanglements with their artillery.

WILSON MAY HURRY MORE SOLDIERS TO REINFORCE FUNSTON

War Department Discovers New Crisis in Mexico. Leaders of Villa and Carranza Forces Fighting for Supremacy in Peace Convention Are Insisting United States Troops Be Withdrawn From Vera Cruz—Neither Side Will Assure Protection to American Citizens—Attack upon Funston Expected Any Day.

Washington, Nov. 4.—The War Department finds itself facing a new crisis in Mexico. Word conveyed to this department within the last twenty-four hours reveals an acute situation that may demand an immediate reinforcement of troops under the command of General Funston at Vera Cruz.

The leaders of the Villa and Carranza forces who are fighting for supremacy in the Aguas Calientes convention are insisting that the United States soldiers be withdrawn from Mexico. They are getting irritated over the stern supervision of Mexican affairs undertaken by this Government.

An official of the War Department admitted secretly to the International News Service tonight that neither Villa nor Carranza is willing to assure the United States that its citizens will be protected—and the Aguas Calientes convention ignoring the matter—a juncture has arisen that may lead to serious trouble.

SWEEPING GAINS MADE BY THE REPUBLICANS THROUGHOUT COUNTRY

DISTRICT ATTORNEY WHITMAN ELECTED GOVERNOR OF NEW YORK OVER GOV. GLYNN, DEMOCRAT, AND WADSWORTH WILL SUCCEED ROOT IN SENATE.

THE DEMOCRATS RETAIN CONTROL OF CONGRESS

New York, Nov. 4.—Sweeping Republican gains throughout the country reached their climax in this State by the overwhelming victory of Charles W. Whitman for Governor and James W. Wadsworth to succeed Elihu Root in the United States Senate.

PROGRESSIVE VOTE FALLS OFF. There was a heavy falling-off of the Progressive vote in many States. The return to Congress of former-Speaker of the House Joseph G. Cannon, decisive Republican gains in Illinois and New York in the House membership, and the overwhelming defeat of Representative A. Mitchell Palmer by Senator Bois Penrose in Pennsylvania, were features.

RETAIN CONTROL OF CONGRESS. Democratic leaders, however, were pleased with the triumph in Massachusetts, where former-Representative Samuel L. McCall was defeated for the Governorship by Governor Walsh.

The returns indicated that the Democrats would retain control of Congress, with approximately no change in the Senate majority, but a decidedly reduced majority in the House.

ELECTION OF STATE OFFICERS. The election of State officers resulted in a few turn-overs in New York Governor Glynn the Democratic candidate for reelection, was defeated decisively by District Attorney Whitman, Republican. Frederick M. Davenport, the Progressive nominee, in support of whose candidacy ex-President Roosevelt devoted most of the campaign, will be left far in the rear, his vote being exceeded by that of William Sulzer.

In Tennessee change of party control took place, Gov. Ben. W. Hooper, Republican, incumbent, being defeated by Thomas G. Rye, Democrat.

In Oklahoma, Senator Gore was overwhelmingly re-elected. Robert Williams, Democrat, was elected Governor.

CONGRESSIONAL ELECTIONS

The election on November 3 will result in the election of 435 members of the House of Representatives, and 32 of the 96 United States Senators. The Democrats now have a 2 to 1 majority in the House, and before the European war, it was expected that the Democratic majority would be cut to about 50 or 75, which, however, is a better working majority than the huge one we now have. But it is believed that the Democrats will retain practically the same majority as they now have as the American people believe in "standing by the President" when he is bearing such extraordinary burdens for them, as have been thrust upon him by the terrible European war. The Democrats have a majority of 10 in the Senate and it is believed this will be increased to 18 to 20 as Kansas, Wisconsin, Ohio, Illinois, New York and some others, are quite likely to return Democrats in the place of republicans who were chosen in 1908 when the country went republican for the last time.

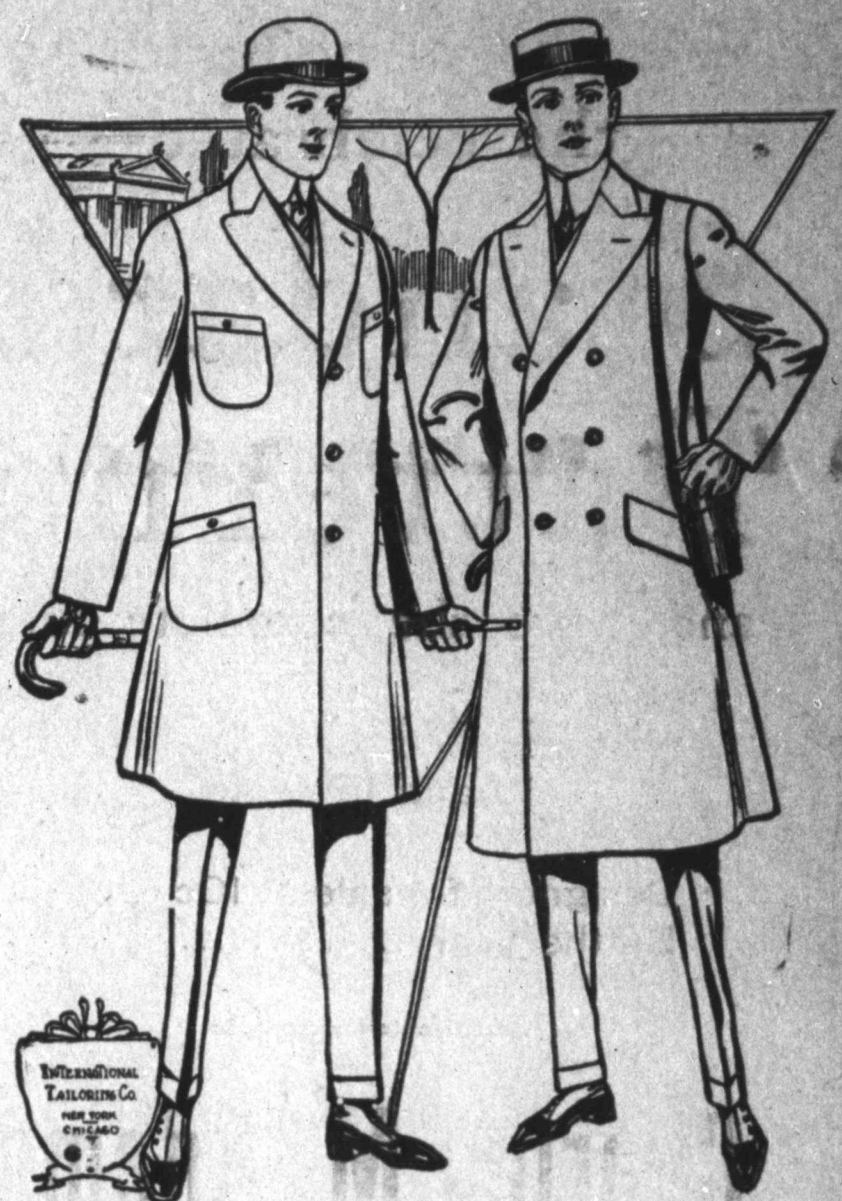
