STRAIN RAILROADS FROM ISSUING PASSES.

All Passenger Carrying Roads.

Holding that the railroad companies operating in Texas were violating the provisions of both the Federal and State Constitutions in discrimination through the issuance of free passes, brought suit in the Twenty-sixth District Court to enjoin the companies from issuing such passes to any person or persons other than the employes agents or officers of the companies when they are traveling on official business.

This suit, which is by far the most important action undertaken by the department since the Katy case, is predicated upon the grounds that the Legislature has passed laws authorizing the discrimination and extortion of rates when the Constitution expressly specifies that the Legislature must tion and extortion

Other grounds upon which the State bases its action are that the amended anti-pass laws are class legislation inasmuch as they exempt certain individuals from the provisions of the antipass statutes allowing them to ride free while other less favored individ-

The Attorney General's Department in instituting this suit contends that the companies have for many years been violating their contracts and misusing and abusing their franchises by unjustly discriminating between those members of the public desiring to use the railroads for transportation under similar conditions.






