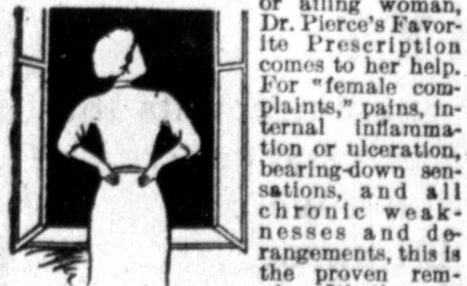

BANKER HELD IN \$40,000 BOND.

Texan Is Charged With Embezzlement of County Funds in Colorado.

Pueblo, Colo., April 1.—W. B. Slaughter, president of the defunct Mercantile National Bank, was arraigned before justice Hart here today, charged with the embezzlement of \$20,000 county funds which were on deposit in the bank. He pleaded not guilty and was held in bonds of \$40,000. Preliminary examination was set for April 18. Slaughter gave out the following statement: "I came here from Dallas, Tex., fully intending to clean up the embarrassing condition of Mercantile National bank. I was told that \$150,000 would do it. I had made arrangements to put as much as \$250,000 into the bank to assist depositors. I brought an attorney, G. G. Wright, Sr., as special representative of my brother, Col. C. C. Slaughter, of Dallas, who is helping me out in this situation, and J. E. Hutchinson, one of the best auditors in Texas. We attempted to hold a conference with bank examiner G. W. Goodell. We asked the privilege of ascertaining from him the condition of the bank and looking over with him the securities. I have not been in the bank for nearly two years and, although nominally president, have drawn no salary. Mr. Goodell absolutely refused to give us any satisfaction whatever. He ordered me not to come into the bank."

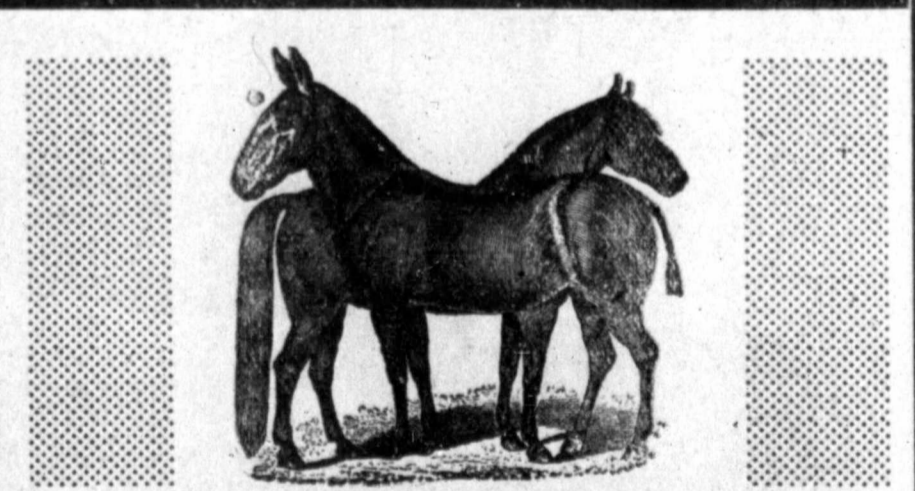

In fact, money is the grand agent in every affair of the world, and almost works miracles. "And how shall we get money?" said Ichabod. Why, dig it out of the ground man, and now is the time to begin.—Old Farmers' Almanac.

If you are thinking of embarking in the hog or poultry business, do not lose time with scrubs. It costs no more beyond the initial investment to produce fine stuff than poor, and one will naturally give closer attention to a well bred animal or fowl than to an inferior one. Besides, the big profits in either business come not from the animal or fowl of itself, but from the purity of its strain.

The American people are a practical people, and they have found out that drinking does not pay and are abandoning the practice. We are outgrowing it as a nation, not because of hostile legislation, but because of the economic waste of the traffic and the bad odor in which the practice of drinking is held.

The jitney car service has bred a new type of public nuisance—the jitney masher. In the restricted quarters of a car and from under the suspicious eye of the policeman, and with less possibility of the resentment of some friend, the masher welcomes the close contact and isolation to practice his nefarious wiles. In some cities the jitney mashers have become so prevalent and offensive to women and girls, that some drastic action is contemplated to protect them from annoyance and indignities from this source. The same methods should be employed in abating the masher that are used in the extermination of vermin. His breed is entitled to no sort of decent or humane consideration.

The Allies evidently found the taking of the Dardanelles more of a man's job than they anticipated. They have decided to draw off and rearrange their plans.

The entrance of Bulgaria into the war in behalf of the Germans will almost certainly bring Italy, Greece and Roumania into the conflict. Spain seems to be the only nation not menaced in this row. However, the fortunes of war and the wiles of diplomacy may yet force her hand on the side of England. Little Portugal already stands committed to England's help when called upon. Norway, Denmark and Sweden have maintained a state of armed and prepared neutrality since the war began.

Why would it not be a good idea and publicity move, to have an automobile convention here during the meeting of the Woodmen Log Rolling Association next August? The different automobile agencies here might hang up some kind of prize for some feature of their business—say, the car making the best record as to consumption of gas and oil per mile, or any other test record—and arrange for an auto parade on one of the days of the association. It would be a good opportunity for a little effective advertising. It would be an inspiring spectacle to have every car in Mitchell county here at one time and moving in line. Think of this suggestion, ye, auto agents.

It required grim-visaged war to drive home the truth about alcohol and human efficiency. Russia, the most inebriate of nations saw the light and swept liquor out with the stroke of a pen. France and Germany followed Russia's lead and prohibited the sale of intoxicants during the period of the war. England and Canada were not slow to see that liquor was the greatest handicap in their preparations for war, and now comes even that old renegade robber, Pancho Villa, and declares that liquor is the greatest curse of the poor and stands champion for national prohibition on the restoration of peace.

With the beginning of spring and warmer weather greater activity will be shown by the belligerents in the European war. Russia has begun an offensive movement all along the German and Austrian frontier. Some kind of decisive struggle will take place soon which may make for peace. The forcing of the Dardanelles and entrance of Italy into the struggle would change the entire aspect of things. The planting of crops wherewith to feed the contending hosts is the greatest problem the warring nations have now to face. In Austria, all school children over 12 years of age are being impressed for work on the farms. All the necessaries of life are soaring in price and until another harvest can be gathered, much suffering from hunger will be experienced among the people of Austro-Hungary, as well as of Serbia.

Turkey is now willing to give Bulgaria nearly all the latter country sought by the recent war, if it will not join the Allies. It is an alluring bait, but if Bulgaria keeps hands off in this war and Turkey should lose out, as it probably will, Bulgaria will have no share in the spoils.

NINE MONTHS SCHOOL AND AFFILIATION.

The question of whether Colorado enjoys a public school term of nine or eight months is not so important in itself, as the fact that any term less than full nine months jeopardizes the affiliation of the school with the state university. It is the policy and desire of the University to affiliate only with schools running nine full months, and any school enjoying affiliation already that runs for less time than nine months, hangs by a thread in its affiliation advantages. Affiliation with the state university in the points that cover the usual curriculum of a classic education, means much to a graded school and no chances should be taken in having this advantage revoked by the university. The quality of work required for affiliation usually requires a full nine months term, and any abridgement of this time must be at the expense of the quality and scope of work done.

It is of course, unfortunate, that the available school fund does not justify a full nine months' term. But this emergency should be met by the civic pride of the town and patrons who are receiving the direct benefit. As the Record understands the situation, \$699 would be ample to run the school through the full nine months term. It would be a sad commentary upon the culture of this community, if this sum could not be raised to protect our public schools in their affiliation advantages, when a like amount can be raised in the space of one day for the promotion of base ball.

The Record believes this amount of money could be easily raised by anything like a concerted effort. This writer heard one of the teachers in the school express a willingness to solicit subscriptions and intimated a like disposition on the part of the other teachers. There remains plenty of time to raise this amount of money, and the Record believes that unless the school is run for nine months, the chances are in favor of the school's losing its affiliation next year. This matter is being more closely looked into by the university than formerly; inspectors are more searching and compliance with requirements are being more rigidly demanded. The fact that the school has retained its affiliation on frequent eight months terms is no sort of guarantee that it can continue such delinquency and retain its affiliation. And to lose this advantage, once secured, would be infinitely a worse blow to the school than to have failed to obtain it. Colorado could well afford to strain a point or two in having the public schools run the full nine months. The advantage of affiliation and the character it gives our school can not be weighed in the balance against a few hundred dollars.

BETTER THAN PREACHMENTS

When Nations are brought to the confession that the drink habit menaces their welfare no less than do the armies they are confronting, then its evils are set forth in a way that must impress the dullest imagination. That drinking impairs individual efficiency both for manual and intellectual tasks is no modern discovery, no new lesson. No one has been ignorant of this truth. But if it is an old lesson, it is given a new illustration and an unprecedented emphasis by the circumstances which are moving these belligerent nations. The war has made more converts to the cause of temperance, and even to the cause of prohibition, than all the preachments that have been hurled at the evil in ten years.—Dallas News.

The Attorney General contends with a show of justness, that if the railroads of Texas would quit playing politics in the generous distribution of passes, they would have a better standing before the railroad commission in their efforts to have their rates increased. The fact that every eighth passenger rides free is an explanation of their deficit in revenue.

Senator Morris Sheppard enjoys the equivocal distinction of having introduced more bills upon a greater variety of subjects during the session of the 63rd congress, than any other member of the upper branch. In addition to the large number of resolutions presented by him, he ranks as a topnotcher in the matter of petitions and memorials, as he was recognized as the leading exponent in the senate of nationwide prohibition and women suffrage. He is seeing to it that his name shall go down, writ many times upon the scroll of fame.

Many people who now skip blithely about in automobiles would have regarded the purchase of such an accessory to their convenience and pleasure, a few years ago, as not only wholly beyond their means, but as an utter extravagance, befitting only the rich.

one who could and did extend him, and like all niggers, he couldn't stand the gaff.

The printing of an extensive law brief this week by the job department of the Record so monopolized the time of our linotype that reading matter for the paper is somewhat curtailed.

Don't forget to clean up before the advent of hot weather, and don't forget that the cleaning should be general to be efficacious. It will do but little good from a sanitary point for two or three citizens to thoroughly clean up their premises while others in the same locality do not. The unsanitary condition of your own premises is as great menace to the health of your next door neighbor as to your own family. The town should clean up, thoroughly and wholly.

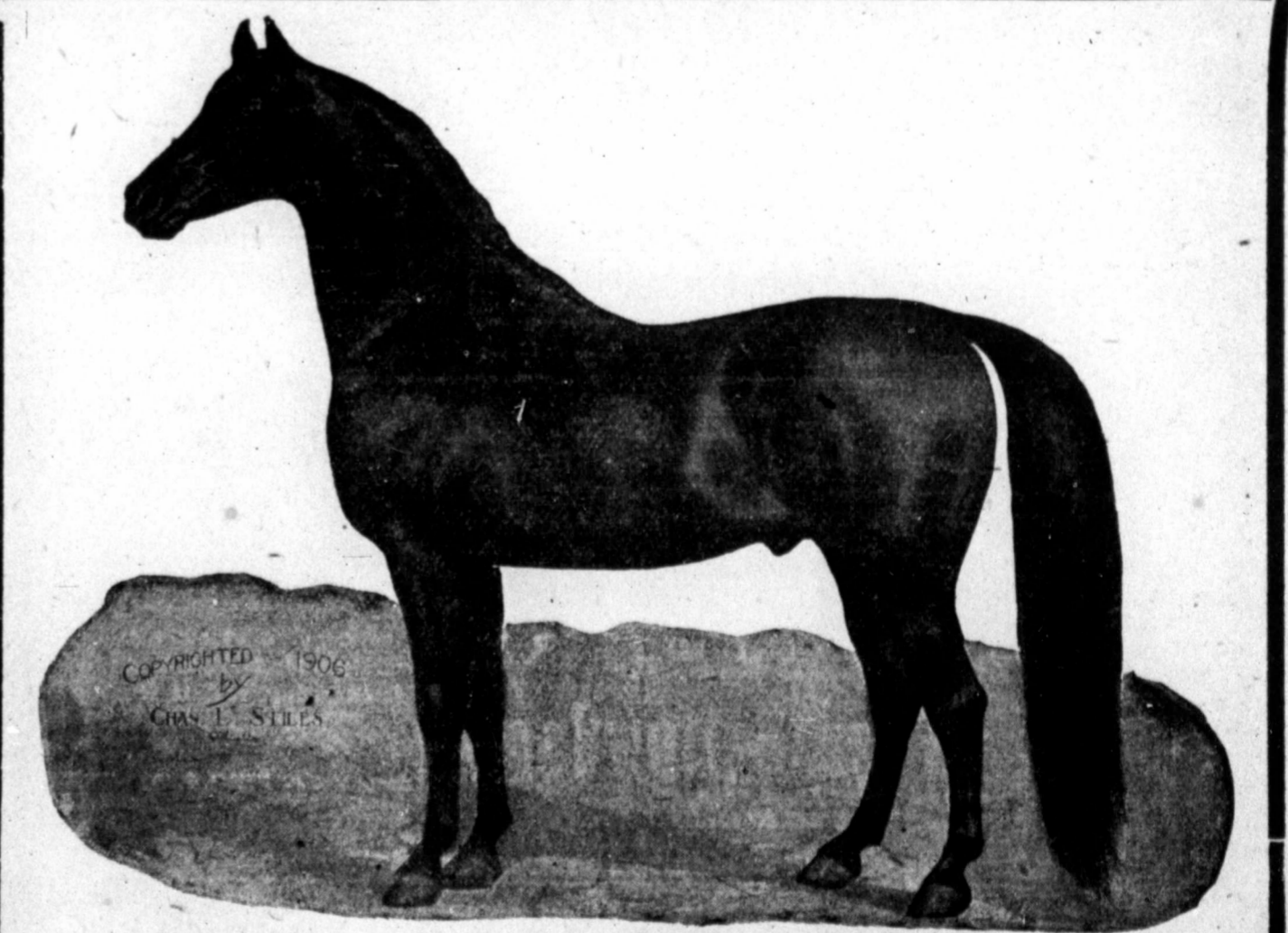

CATTLEMAN SAYS TO BUY CATTALO Urges Texas to Purchase the Famous Goodnight Ranch Herds.

Texas now has a chance of taking over the 100,000 acre farm of Charles Goodnight, near Amarillo, together with 150 head of pure bred buffaloes, 150 head of "cattalo" and other stock with which Mr. Goodnight has been carrying on experiments for the past 15 years, according to W. S. Roberts, a member of the Amarillo delegation, who was at the El Paso convention.

"Mr. Goodnight has offered his big ranch to the state and I, together with all other stockmen who have followed Mr. Goodnight's experiments, believe that it would be a wise move to accept," declared Mr. Roberts. "Mr. Goodnight has now developed the cattalo—a cross breed of the buffalo bull and black Poland cow—to a point

where the new animal may have a serious effect upon the stock business of the Southwest.

"Mr. Goodnight tried experiments with various breeds of cattle but the best results have been with the black Poland cows. The result is a fine, large animal weighing about 1600 pounds, muleys, with long, black silky hair. The hair is longer and more evenly distributed than it is on the buffalo. The cattalo has the usual buffalo hump.

"Several of the Amarillo markets have sold some of the meat, Mr. Goodnight being anxious to get the opinion of the public on it. I tried it and found it excellent. The meat much resembles buffalo meat, has a slight game flavor but is very palatable.

"The state now has a chance to take over this big estate. Mr. Goodnight is getting to be an old man and wants to be relieved of his responsibility. His experiments have proved of great value and were the state to take it over as a state park and carry on these experiments, I believe that great value would be obtained."—El Paso Herald.

HIGH COST OF FOOD FOR MAN AND BEAST.

It is seed time in the cotton belt and much depends on what southern farmers are now doing. They know that a surplus of 4,000,000 bales or more of last year's bountiful cotton crop must be carried over and that a crop of 10,000,000 bales this year will be sufficient to meet the estimated requirements of the world's cotton trade. This means that the acreage planted in cotton should be reduced by one-third in order to secure a fair price for the new crop as well as for the surplus old cotton that will be added to it.

Cotton growers have fared better than seemed possible last October and

many of them have been able to sell their cotton for about what it cost to produce it because the picking season was unusually favorable, labor conditions were good and wages were not forced up by the desperate necessity for saving the crop. With cotton selling for less than 7 cents a pound last October the planters could not and did not pay pickers whatever they asked. This did not help business at the time, but it saved the planters from bankruptcy. At the same time the current price of cotton and the quotations for new crop futures are not high enough to yield a fair profit, and the high price of potash salts makes fertilizing expensive.

What distresses the agricultural population of the southern states today is the high cost of food for man and beast. The South does not feed itself though it can do so easily. It did feed itself at one time and the proof that it can do so is that the Confederate states were self-supporting during the civil war in spite of all handicaps. When the South was struggling to its feet forty years ago Henry W. Grady saw things clearly and told the farmers that it was not good business to borrow money with which to buy bread and meat, of which he said, "When every farmer in the south eats bread from his own field, meat from his own pasture, vegetables from his own garden, fruit from his own orchard and butter and milk from his own dairy; caring for his crops in his own wisdom and growing them in independence; making cotton a surplus crop and selling it in his chosen market in his own time for cash and not for a receipted mortgage—then the South will begin to realize the fullness of her opportunities."

Nothing can be added to those prophetic words. They are as true today as they were in the days that followed the reconstruction period. Owing to the dislocation of the cotton trade by the war the need for diversified farming is more urgent than ever before because it means not only independence but good profits instead of losses. The south needlessly spends at least a billion dollars a year for foodstuffs. In Texas careful estimates have been made and they show that its people are sending more than \$200,000,000 a year to outside markets for food for man and beast, and Texas comes nearer to being self-supporting than several other cotton states. If the South stopped this drain on its resources it would help the rest of this country because a prosperous people would then buy more general merchandise. It hurts any community or any country to have part of its population in a state of poverty. That is why northern manufacturers and merchants are so anxious to see better farming methods adopted in the South.—New York Commercial.
