#### LEMBERG HAS FALLEN. GERMANS AND AUSTRIANS IN POSSES-SION OF IT.

Lemberg has fallen before triumphant sweep of the combined Austro-German armies. The Galician capital, occupied by the Russians since Setp. 3, 1014, is now free of Russians. The Slavs fell back in a northeasterly direction toward Brody.

Capture of Lemberg deprives the Russians of their last military base in Galicia. Several railways center from before the city fell.

The moral effect of the recapture of the city overshadows the military victory. The capital of a great Austrian province has been reclaimed from the enemy. The Russian grip on Galicia has been loosened, if not entirely shaken, and the people of Austria have been raised to a high pitch of enthusiasm over the Austro-German suc-



Texas owes it to herself to build warehouses so the cotton can be stored and safeguarded, so the banks can advance money on it, as they are anxious to do, enabling the farmer to hold the crop for good prices. Eventually the cotton will sell for a good price, but that won't do Texas any good if the farmer sells low and a middleman somewhere makes all the profit. We can't lend money on cotton lying around a farmer's back yard. But my bank and others in New York are anxious to lend money on cotton and grain and other Texas crops if warehoused and we can deal with responsible people."


#### MORE RAIN.

#### FORTY-TWO PAIRS OF TWINS NATIVE POPULATION OF TEXAS ADDED TO LARGELY.

During May twenty-five homicides and wenty-eight suicides occured in Texas, according to the monthly report issued by Dr. W. A. Davis, state registrar of vital statistics. The births numbered 3.782, including forty-two sets of twins, and there mere 2,559 deaths. An unusually large number of deaths of children was recorded, there being 504 under one year and 242 from one to five years. Oldest person to die was a negro, 117 years old, in Tarrant county.

Tuberculosis of lungs caused the greatest number of deaths, 306. Smallpox claimed seven victims out of 153 cases reported. Seventy-nine died from pellagra and thirty-nine accidental drownings were recorted.

#### STATUTES OF TEXAS LAWS NOW EFFECTIVE

Eighty-two general acts of the Thiry-fourth legislature in regular session become laws of Texas and effective as statutes this month. These are the acts of general importance that because of the failure to pass both houses by a two-thirds vote were carried for ninety days after adjournment. Aside from these general acts, there are nineteen of local importance that also became effective, making a total of 101 acts of the entire number of 156 acts passed at that session.

Although the compulsory attendance law becomes effective, there is a provision in the law itself stipulating Sept. 1, 1916. Other educational measures require the teaching of agriculture in summer normal schools and in farmers' institutes; providing for the printing of text books for schools in Texas; increasing the scholastic age from 6-16 to 6-17 years, inclusive; providing that common and independent school districts may provide free textbooks for public schools.

One law that becomes effective prohibits betting on elections in the state under a penalty of fine upon conviction of from \$100 to \$1.000, and confinement of from twenty to sixty days in the county jail, or both fine and imprisonment. Another law that is of importance allows corporations to contribute to Chambers of Commerce, bona fide Commercial Clubs and associations.

A bill becomes effective which makes it compulsory for restaurants, boarding houses, hotels, etc., to setrilize their dishes, utensils, etc., in boiling water.

Other laws which became effective ane:

Requiring fire escapes on all buildings over two stories in height used as schools, dormitory, lodging houses, manufactory, wholesale or retail department store or in any place where five or more persons may be assembled. Residences exempted. Penalty \$50 to \$200 fine.

Preventing railroads from changing location of roundhouses, general offices, machine shops, without the consent of the railroad commission.

Defining loan brokers, providing they shall give bond, record all transactions, pay annual tax of \$50, etc. Providing for the incorporation of






