

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I have just come from the Roof Garden of Texas; in other words, I have beeen out in the Davis mountains in the western part of the Commonwealth, about 600 miles from Dallas. Tall Peaks, giant boulders, grotesquely-shaped crags, immense canyons, beautiful valleys, hundreds of springs of living water, sparkling shallow streams that often become raging torrents, the grandest apples grown on the continent, alfalfa farms that rival any to be found any where else, the largest stock ranches that are left in the State, wild game and docile burros -these are some of the native staples of the Roof Garden of Texas, located in the heart of the Davis mountains. And, then, the health and hospitality -these can not be properly described; they are as near perfect as Nature and human effort can make them.
