### 50 DEAD AS RESULT OF EXPLOSION

Thirty-One Bodies Are Recovered and About Twenty More Are Sought In Ruins.

Ardmore, Okla., Sept. 27.—Thirty-one bodies recovered and probably twenty more dead and a property loss in excess of half a million dollars, is the toll exacted by a terrific explosion of 250 barrels of gasoline on a car in the Santa Fe yards this afternoon. Two city blocks in the heart of the business district are in ruins and more than two hundred people are more or less dangerously injured.

With a deafening roar described by those on the scene like that of an earthquake and volcano combined, sheets of flame shot from the tank car with lightning rapidity following the explosion and the entire city was thrown into a panic.

A spark from a workman's hammer ignited the tank car, it was stated tonight, following an investigation by authorities in the freight yards where the explosion occurred. Railroad officials and others in charge of the rescue work believe that fifty lives will be the total death list before the work of rescue has been completed.

A Red Cross train from Denver is on the way here to assist in the work. Workers tonight centered their rescue efforts on the freight yards and the department store of Maddin & Co., where it was feared the bodies of many girls and women employees would be found.

A score of fires caused by the flaming gasoline which was thrown for blocks were practically all extinguished by midnight after a desperate fight by the small local fire department, assisted by practically every able-bodied man in the city.

The sum of \$500,000 is being expended on roads in the districts of McKinney, Colina, Princeton and Farmersville. When these are completed there will be a continuous piked road from the Hunt county line to the Denton county line.

### MORGAN TO GET \$10,000,000 FOR FLOATING LOAN.

Syndicate Will Sell Bonds to Bankers At 96 And Public Must Pay 98.

Chicago, Sept. 28.—The finishing touches were applied to the Anglo-French \$500,000,000 loan in a series of automobile conferences on Chicago boulevards this afternoon.

While four members of the financial commission sent to the United States to negotiate the loan were being whisked through the parks in automobiles they had their final negotiations with Chicago and Middle Western bankers.

The terms of the loan—the biggest in the history of the United States—are declared to be substantially as previously published.

They were outlined as follows:

Amount \$500,000,000.

Collateral none.

Rate of interest, 5 per cent.

Terms, five years. At the end of this period they may be redeemed in cash or exchanged for 15 to 20 year bonds bearing interest at 4 1/2 per cent.

An interesting phase of the loan is the fact that the syndicate that engineered it, headed by J. P. Morgan, will make a matter of \$10,000,000 commission through their efforts. The bonds will be sold to the bankers at 96 and to the public at 98, leaving a margin of 2 per cent of the entire amount involved to the syndicate.

Surprise was expressed by many of the bankers gathered at the Blackstone when it was seen from Lord Reade's statement that no restrictions made as to the proceeds of the loan being used to pay for arms and munitions of war made in the United States and exported to the allied nations.

### TORTURE BEFALLS FORLORN PEOPLE.

London, Eng., Sept. 25.—"Distracted Armenians, witnessing the extermination of their whole people by the Turks, are throwing their children into the Euphrates to drown rather than to suffer and die," says the Dadaeghatch correspondent of the Times.

The Turks send from each Armenian village day by day as many persons as a train can carry. When they arrive at the Euphrates they are turned out and an escort supplied over the Taurus mountains.

Once on the other side they are supplied with enough food for a few days and told to continue their journey to the neighborhood of Mosul, as they will be in perfect safety. But the region is nothing but a desert and before many hours maddening bands of Kurds or Bedouins rob and pillage these helpless men, women and children so that those who are not actually slain die of hunger or thirst. Not one ever reaches the intended destination for should any one

try to escape in another direction Turkish shepherds have orders to shoot them at sight.

Sees 15,000 Awaiting Death.  
A widely known American missionary, who arrived at Constantinople the first week in September, declared he saw as many as 15,000 Armenians collected around one station waiting to be sent on this journey from which none would ever return. American missionaries scattered about Asia Minor and particularly in the Armenian districts, gradually are leaving upon the advice of their ambassadors. The attacks upon the Armenians are said to be excused upon the ground that they assisted the Russians in the occupation of the town of Van.

The Chronicle prints what it declares to be accounts of eye witnesses of Armenian massacres, asserting that besides many thousands killed, half a million have been deported in a systematic manner by local authorities, while thousands of others have been imprisoned. The charge is made that after the men were massacred the women and children are sent into slavery to be converted to Islamism.

### BULGARIA TO START WAR ON SERBIA SOON.

Plans Being Drawn by Bulgarian General Staff With Assistance of German Generals.

Paris, Sept. 29.—An Athens dispatch says that it is now expected that Bulgaria will begin an attack on Serbia within fifteen days.

Plans are now being drawn by the Bulgarian general staff with the assistance of German officials. They will not attack Greece, according to the report which reached here today.

### 300,000 Going to Serbian Front.

An Athens dispatch says that 300,000 Austro-German troops have begun an advance on the Serbian front toward Orsova. It is believed that a great battle will take place there within a short time.

### FORMIDABLE BREACH MADE IN GERMAN LINES.

Upward of 20,000 Prisoners and Thirty Guns Captured—Russians Gaining on the Eastern Front.

London, Sept. 27.—In the past two days the British and French have gained greater results than in the preceding twelve months, since the battle of the Marne, according to the announcement issued here today.

Upwards of 20,000 prisoners are in their hands, together with thirty big guns, and a formidable breach has been made in the German line.

The Allies have apparently started their long-expected offensive movement against the Teutons, and the campaign is evidently well under way. On the eastern front, substantial gains have been made by the Russians, and the reports reaching here say that they have succeeded in winning back some of the territory that has been lost to the Teutons during the fighting of the past several weeks.

The Belgians are also taking a prominent part in the new offensive, and have captured a German post on the right bank of the Yser. They took 1,000 prisoners in this fighting.

The reports reaching here indicate that the Allies have started against the Teutonic armies in the greatest campaign of the war. It has been rumored for some time that the Allies have been awaiting an opportune time to strike at their enemy, and apparently this is the time that they have decided the blow should be made. The reports here are that the Allies have been heavily reinforced and that a large amount of new ammunition has been secured.

### French Win Out in 20 Minutes.

Paris, Sept. 27.—Reports from the battle front today say that only twenty minutes were required by the French infantry to complete a victory, prepared for by sixty hours' violent shelling, and overrun the first line of the German trenches in Sunday's battle.

The moment for the attack was set for dawn and the charge was so impetuous that the unwounded Germans in the battered works seemed dazed. Bayonet work was largely responsible for the victory.

Paris received the news of the victory soberly. Bulletins were read from the theatre stages, while the orchestras played the Marseillaise.

The losses on both sides were appalling, but the assault ended with the French occupying the German first line positions on nearly the entire front of the attack.

**GUNS AND INFANTRY COMING TO EL PASO.**

Regiment of Artillery And One of Infantry Ordered From Galveston.

Washington, D. C., Sept. 21.—A regiment of infantry and a regiment of field artillery have been ordered from Galveston to El Paso, according to an announcement from the war department late today.

Maj. Gen. J. Franklin Bell at Texas City, was given orders this afternoon to send the Seventh infantry and Fourth Field artillery from Texas City, adjoining Galveston, to El Paso for field service. The troops leave Wednesday.

The order for more troops to be sent to El Paso follows requests made several days ago by peace officers of El Paso upon the military for more troops. It is understood that Gen. John J. Pershing recommended the sending of more troops here, particularly artillery, making his recommendation through regular military channels and receiving the approval of Gen. Frederick Funston, commanding the southern department, with headquarters at San Antonio.

There are four guns to a battery and six batteries to a regiment. This means that there are 24 field guns in the regiment coming here. Already there are four guns stationed here. This will give El Paso a total of 28 guns.

**EXTRA SESSION NOW PROBABILITY.**

Believed Governor Will Be Forced to Take Action in Near Future.

Austin, Tex., Sept. 23.—Signs as to the probability of a special session have undergone a distinct change within the past fortnight, for appearances now lead political observers to believe that Governor Ferguson surely will call a special session before the fall and winter have passed. They base their belief on the fact that special elections have been called to fill vacancies in both houses of the legislature, whereas if there was to be no special session they feel that no special elections would be called to elect officers who might never see service.

Elections have been called in two representative and one senatorial district. Senator T. H. McGregor's place must be filled and Representative D. M. Biggers, of Lubbock, resigned and the late Bernard Schwegmann, of San Antonio, have left vacancies to be filled.

It is generally believed that should the special session be called the Gibson insurance bill will be resubmitted and this memorable fight renewed. The bill failed of passage at the regular session by the close margin of one vote.

**GREECE SOUNDS THE CALL TO ARMS AGAINST HER NEIGHBOR.**

Paris, Sept. 24.—An official decree mobilizing the Greek army was issued in Athens today, says a Havas dispatch. Parliament will probably be summoned tomorrow.

The issuance of the mobilization decree came after a conference between King Constantine and the premier. The premier said mobilization was the only possible reply to the Bulgarians move. The king agreed but only as a defense measure. Twenty classes are now called to arms.

**THE HOME AND THE SCHOOL.**

Once more the children have slicked up their hair, donned their better clothing and set out on a nine months' journey along the path of knowledge. Perhaps the children's heads are too full of the things that are to be done at school to contain any advice as to what their course should be, but a word to the parents may be not amiss, and such a word comes from Home and Farm.

"Co-operation between the home and school, between parents and teacher," says that publication, "is one of the essential matters in the successful education of children. We heard a great deal in politics lately about 'team work.' Nowhere can team-work be more successfully carried on than in connection with the moral and mental and physical training of our children—the teacher in her place, the parents in theirs, the child whose welfare and development is the object of both acting as the center of interest.

"Many a pupil is handicapped at the outset by being sent to school in an unfit condition. He may have had trouble with his eyes or his stomach and suffer with frequent headaches. He may be struggling with a series of entirely preventable colds. He may rush off at the last moment after a hasty, half-eaten breakfast—or no breakfast at all—and after making his way over the long road that separates home from school reach his destination so fatigued that he is in no fit condition for the day's work. It is unreasonable to expect the best of teachers to do much with such material. School children must be well fed before leaving home and provided with an ample lunch for the noon hour. They must be well clothed, must be prepared with rubber coat and overshoes to face the storm, and have dresses or suits that are simple, clean and fitted for their work—no cast off finery or dressy garments that have seen better days.

"With neatly brushed hair, clean hands, fingernails, face and teeth, polished shoes and stockings without holes, a plain calico shirt or gingham dress carries with it an air almost of distinction; if fresh and well nourished the child is ready for a good day's work."

The poplars glow with clear vivid yellow; the maple leaves, beginning with their outer edges, slowly change from yellow to golden, then to orange, and lastly to crimson. Many of the oaks are more staid in their coloring,—only the richest shades of brown will do for them; but the beautiful starred leaves of the sweet-gum tree begin to tint themselves a liquid yellow on the side toward the sun, and, passing around to the shaded side of the tree, a wave of orange follows it. Creeping after this comes crimson, which, in turn, gives way to mahogany in a richness of blended color.—Phil. Farm Journal.

It has frequently occurred to us that if it were made mandatory upon the county clerk and sheriff, at least to keep a complete file of the local newspapers in their respective offices, it would save much time, doubt and annoyance. **BAILEY TO RUN FOR THE SENATE.**  
Will Attempt to Defeat Senator Sheppard, He Says; Culberson Not Out.

Former senator J. W. Bailey succeeded in stirring up the democratic political managerie of Texas again on the occasion of his recent speech-making tour of the State. Mr. Bailey's enemies say he never comes down from Washington without causing trouble in the party, and his late visit was no exception to that rule. This time his attack was on Senator Morris Sheppard, now visiting El Paso.

Mr. Bailey now plans to make the race for the senate against Mr. Sheppard in 1918. The original announcement of his intention in this respect was made by W. A. Hanger, of Fort Worth, a close political friend. It immediately brought forth a reply from Senator Sheppard that he would "welcome Mr. Bailey into the race." Mr. Bailey did not like it a little bit when he read Senator Sheppard's reply. He said that Sheppard would be such easy pickings for him that he was hardly worth considering, or words to that effect. This made Sheppard's friends mad and the old Bailey and anti-Bailey row is again raging.

**Bailey in the Race.**

In an address in South Texas, a few nights ago, Mr. Bailey said: "If some other democrat of our unbounded confidence does not offer himself as a candidate against Senator Sheppard I shall afford him the opportunity to welcome the Hon. Joseph Weldon Bailey in the race."

Senator Sheppard, when he read Mr. Bailey's declaration, had this to say: "I feel that I can congratulate myself. A year ago at the El Paso state convention Bailey said that he would not run against me because the task would be too easy. Now he is solemnly announcing all over the state that he has decided to put me out of business, consequently I can see myself growing, and hence the congratulations."

**The Present Race.**

The senatorial contest that is now on in this state is as yet exciting very little interest. Senator Culberson is still in the race for the once that he now holds, which fact is a disappointment to his opponents who were predicting a few months ago that he would withdraw his candidacy for reelection. Former governor O. B. Colquitt published his platform of issues upon which he is making the race for the senate recently. The document contained no surprises. One of the promised developments in the situation is the candidacy of Louis J. Wortman, of Fort Worth. Mr. Wortman is being urged by many leading democrats of the state to make the race and it is reported that he has about decided to do so. Congressman R. L. Henry and Dr. S. P. Brooks, both of Waco, and George W. Riddle, of Dallas, are all busy laying their plans for an active canvas of the state in the

interest of their respective candidacies for the senatorial office.—El Paso Herald.

**THE ABILENE FAIR.**

Race horses from Midland, Amarillo, Temple, Hillsboro and Oklahoma City and many other places where fairs have been held have been booked for the Central West Texas Fair to be held here October 12th to 16th.

Upward of fifty head of racing stock are already at Fair Park in training, and the total number which will compete for more than \$3,000 in prizes will be over 300.

Several car loads of fat cattle, coming as far away as Louisiana and Oklahoma, have been booked. There will be 750 head here for the fair.

Five thousand electric lights, not counting those used by concessionaires, will make Fair Park as light as day.

A monster parade, nearly two miles long, will feature opening day, October 12. There will be three bands in the parade, which will mass at Fair Park later and give a massed band concert band of sixty pieces.

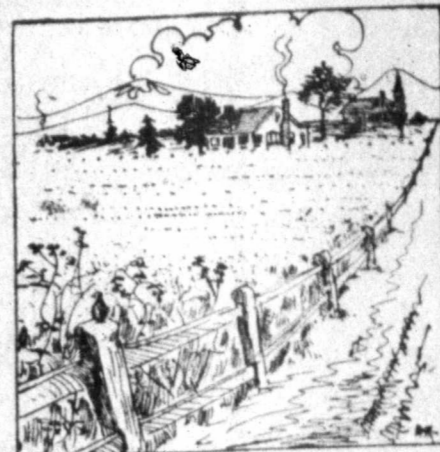
