Poll Tax Sales Are Lagging

Sale of poll taxes at all sub-stations is lagging, according to Edgar Altom, tax collector. Deadline for paying these taxes is Jan. 31.

There are only 3 days remaining in which to secure poll taxes, which must be paid in order for citizens to be eligible to vote in the next election.

Here is an important reminder for all persons over 60 years of age before Jan. 1, 1965. You are not required to have an exemption or registration to vote.

County Sheep Will Be Checked For 'Scabies'

The Texas Animal Health Commission in cooperation with the USDA Agricultural Research Service is presently engaged in a statewide "scabies" inspection of all flocks of sheep within the state. Bill McCutchen, the Assistant County Agent, reports that Don Boaz with the Texas Animal Health Commission is in the county and plans to begin inspections in the next few days. Farmers and ranchers will be contacted individually as to the date and time their flocks will be inspected.

The main reason for the inspection is to lessen the restrictions on transporting sheep from Texas to other states. California restrictions require sheep from Texas to be dipped twice from 10-14 days apart before being shipped in. Other states have similar requirements. When

Texas sheep are scabies-free this should greatly facilitate shipment to other states.

The Texas Animal Health Commission intends to inspect all of the flocks of sheep in Eastland County. If the sheep can be seen in the pasture they will not need to be penned as they can be inspected visually in most cases. If scabies are suspected after a visual check, they will need to be examined closely.

Sheep scabies, sometimes called scab or mange, is a contagious skin disease. It is caused by tiny mites that pierce the skin of sheep to feed, scabs, which give the disease its name form on the wounds. Infested sheep rub, bite and scratch themselves to relieve intense itching, and they lose wool from the affected areas. Untreated sheep may die after prolonged infection.

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ELECTRIC CO-OP HAS MADE SECOND REFUND

penses of operation have been met is allocated to the members in proportion to their total bill. This money which is left over is not called a "profit" because it does not belong to the cooperative—it belongs to the members. For this reason, it is called the "margin" and is shown as belonging to the member in the ledger accounts of the Co-op.

This year's refund of \$37,000 was mailed to the members in time for Christmas and gave an added boost to the economy of the entire area. There were over 3,000 individual checks and the amount represented 15 per cent of the total electric bills paid during the period 1944 through 1946.

The Comanche County Electric Cooperative recently made its second refund of Capital Credits to members and former members who received electric service during the years 1944, 1945 and 1946.

Manager W. J. Parks said, "We are very pleased to be able to make these refunds because this fulfills the Cooperative's obligation to truly fur-

nish electric service at cost. It is necessary to retain the margins long enough to maintain a reasonable reserve fund against emergencies and to build a good member's equity in the Cooperative. The Cooperative now does have these necessary funds and the Board of Directors and management are most happy that we can make these refunds."

Lewis Tiner, city manager, Eastland, and Police Chief Ray Laney, Eastland, are making arrangements for the meeting.

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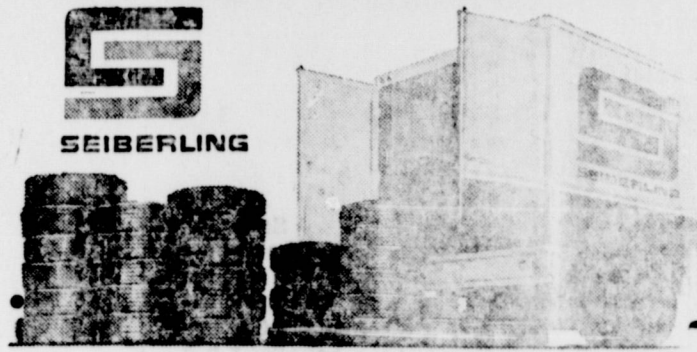

211,548 deer are Shot in Season Ending Dec. 31

AUSTIN — The 1965 Texas big game hunting season just ended produced an estimated 211,548 deer and 12,652 wild turkey for sportsmen, according to preliminary figures based on field reports by Texas Parks and Wildlife Department personnel.

It was emphasized that the totals are not final and serve only to provide "an early estimate of the kill."

The official totals will not be available until the shooting preserve records are compiled later this year.

These are based on the approximately 9,000 reports made by land owners, land

renters and others who operate hunting facilities throughout the state and who charge for hunting privileges.

Under the law, these records are required to be turned over to the department by May 1 each year.

The books, designed for itemizing harvest results, are meticulously kept by conservationists eager to cooperate under the state's game management program, said a Department spokesman.

The records not only cover deer, turkey, antelope, javelina, and exotic species but small game, such as doves and quail, and also waterfowl, primarily ducks and geese.

Wildlife biologists termed the tentative harvest totals "conservative," particularly as applied to deer.

Biologists and game wardens who cooperated in checking out the overall bag a-

greed the season was one of the best in modern times.

But management experts said the harvest made only a small dent in the enormous deer population, estimated to exceed 2,250,000 and added that only the most favorable weather and range conditions would avert a sizeable dieoff in some areas between now and next fall's shoot.

Veterans Due To Begin Receiving Dividend Checks

Nearly 154,000 veterans will receive checks soon as the first payments are made in distribution of a 1966 GI Insurance dividend totaling \$224,200,000.

In reporting this today, William J. Driver, Administrator of Veterans Affairs, said some 4,606,000 veterans are eligible to receive the dividend payments, which will be made throughout the year on the anniversary dates of the individual policies.

Although the amounts due individual veterans will vary considerable depending on the veteran's age, the amount and type of insurance in force and other factors, the amount to be paid in 1966 averages out at \$47.50 for World War I policyholders and at \$73.75 for World War II policyholders.

Of the total dividend, Mr. Driver said, \$209,000,000 will be paid to 4,400,000 veterans of World War II who hold National Service Life Insurance policies, and the remaining \$15,200,000 will be shared by 206,000 World War I veterans who have U. S. Government Life Insurance policies.

Korean Conflict veterans hold low-cost, non-participating type policies that do not provide for payment of regular annual dividends.

The dividends represent primarily a return to the policyholders of part of their premium payments since the death rate of insured veterans continues to be lower than the mortality rate upon which premium payments are based by law.

The Veterans Administration head said the payments would be made automatically on monthly anniversary dates, and that no application is required.
