### TEXANS GREET WILSON: SAY THEY'RE FOR HIM.

Washington, D. C., Dec. 7.—One hundred Texas Democrats who hope to secure the next Democratic National Convention for Dallas, shook hands Monday with President Wilson and told him that they wanted him for another term in the White House.

Mayor Lindsley, of Dallas, and Cato Sells, Democratic national committee man from Texas, were spokesmen. Mayor Lindsley told the President that Texas was for him in 1916.

"Texas is bedrock," was the President's reply.

Governor Ferguson, of Texas, will call on the President tomorrow to discuss the Mexican situation.

### GOVERNOR AND PRESIDENT TALK OF BORDER.

Washington, Dec. 7.—Governor Ferguson today gave President Wilson an optimistic view of the conditions on the Mexican border.

Governor Ferguson said Texas has been "Belgium of the Southwest" for a long time, but the recognition of Carranza has gone far toward establishing order.

### MOVE TO DESTROY PESTS IS STARTED.

Meeting to be Held at Sweetwater December 10-11 to Take Some Action.

Destroy the rats, ravens, rabbits, prairie dogs, English sparrows, etc. The State Department of Agriculture is waging a war of extermination on the rats, ravens, rabbits and other pests and J. W. Nell, Director of Institutes is here arranging with Col. H. L. Bentley for a campaign preparatory for a meeting at Sweetwater Dec. 10-11, at which place a plan will be submitted and a time agreed upon to do the work.

As this requires the co-operation of everyone, the Hon. Fred K. Davis, Commissioner of Agriculture will call a meeting of county judges, commissioners, farmers and business men at Sweetwater December 10-11. Mr. Nell says the plans as outlined by the department will, if properly carried out, give relief against the pests.

These pests are causing a loss from \$25,000 to \$50,000 in some counties. The rats now infest almost every home, barn and poultry yard, and destroying young chicks, stored grain and are now supposed to carry many different diseases, including diphtheria and hog cholera and when these diseases are planted, they may be had for a long time. The raven is a carrier of hog cholera, anthrax (cholera) and black leg, and a destroyer of grain and peanut crops. The rabbit destroys cotton, grain and other crops and like the prairie dog, destroys an immense amount of grass. Mr. Nell says the pests must be destroyed, that if they increase in the next few years as they have in the last few the country will be overrun with them and appeals to every one in city and country to at once get behind the move for it must be done in a co-operative way.

He appeals to the press to advertise the meeting. The work of destroying the pests is now a big job and getting bigger all the time. He appeals to farmers institutes to send delegates to their meeting. It is a problem that must not be postponed as the people must pay the penalty if we keep the pests or pay the price to destroy them. Who will take the lead? or who will block the way? Everyone agrees that every other one should do their part and that this work should be done in the winter. So come to the meeting, get ready to do your part, talk to your neighbor and get him in line. Let the battle cry be "exterminate the rats, rabbits, ravens, prairie dogs, coyotes, ground squirrels, gophers and English sparrows." Do not forget the time, Sweetwater, December 10-11.

### MEXICAN SHOT NEAR WESTBROOK.

The sheriff's office was notified last Tuesday morning that a Mexican had been shot on the place of Mrs. Mary Lewis, near Westbrook. Squire M. C. Ratlin and Sheriff Cooksey immediately went out to investigate. It developed that the Mexican, who had made a crop on Mrs. Lewis' place, had gone to the latter's house to borrow a saddle horse with which to pen his own work stock, and on repairing to the horse lot to get the horse, he was accosted by John Diggs, a hired man on the Lewis farm, who informed the Mexican that he, Diggs, was going to kill him, whereupon Diggs shot the Mexican five times with a .41 calibre Colt.

This is the version of the shooting as developed at the inquiry. The wounded man is Martin V. Garcia, who has lived in this county several years and bore the general reputation of being a quiet, industrious and dependable citizen. He was brought to Colorado Tuesday night and is yet alive, though scant hope is entertained for his recovery. The man Diggs claims to have come from Arizona but a short time ago, and so far as can be learned had experienced no trouble with the Mexican prior to the time of the shooting. He is now lodged in the county jail, while Mrs. Lewis was also arrested as an accomplice before the act, but was released on bail in the sum of \$1,500.

### CROWDED GALLERIES HEAR PRESIDENT WILSON'S MESSAGE READ TO CONGRESS.

Washington, Dec. 7.—The Diplomatic gallery was unusually well filled and the other reserved places were crowded by officials and their wives to hear President Wilson read his annual message to Congress.

Mrs. Galt was present in the executive gallery. Everybody rose, cheering enthusiastically when the President arrived.

He began reading the message shortly after twelve o'clock.

The message bore most strongly upon the National Defense policy urged by President Wilson. A large part of the document was devoted to his doctrine of National Preparedness.

The President was frequently applauded when he alluded to the United States aid and not coercion of Mexico and his reference to the American continent standing on a footing of genuine equality. His reference to national defense came last and was listened to with special attention, especially that part that referred to the army and navy program passed without applause.

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### BRITISH HOUSE

#### RIDICULES FORD.

Undersecretary for Foreign Affairs Considers Peace Party "Unimportant."

London, Eng., Dec. 7.—A request was made in the house of commons

Monday afternoon by Sir Edward A. Cornwall, Liberal, that an intimation be sent to Henry Ford and William Jennings Bryan that their proposed mission to this country would be irritating and unwelcome at the present time.

Lord Robert Cecil, parliamentary under secretary for foreign affairs, replied that since the passports of the members of the peace mission were issued only for neutral countries the contingency contemplated by Sir Edward did not arise.

A rapid bombardment of questions immediately came from different parts of the house. Members declared that as "these left America amid a storm of ridicule," the under secretary should convey to them, in whatever neutral country they find themselves, the intimation that they are not wanted here at any time. Lord Robert Cecil parried the question, saying,

"Speaking for myself I think it

would be in the highest degree undignified for the government of this country to send any intimation to a lot of

ladies and gentlemen, who, whatever

their merits may be, are of no particular importance."

Discussion of the subject closed in

laughter aroused by Will Crooks,

labor member for Woolwich, who asked:

"If they have the right of asylum

here, can we certify them to be in-

sane?"

The line is made up of "has beens" and "never was-ers." They float aimlessly around that great city, dependent on stray jobs, and charity. They have no ambition, no hope, no self-respect.

What put these men so low down? If you ask them you will get a variety of answers. Idleness, drink, gambling, lack of training in boyhood or young

manhood. Some are inherently bad, most of them are just weak.

Get all of their answers together and boil them down and you will find that in the last analysis nine-tenths of them are in the "Bread Line" because of thriftlessness; the failure to make use of their opportunities; failure to save in their youth and middle age.

Less than a mile from the "Bread Line's" place is another block where in daytime there is another kind of line. It's in the banking section of New York, and there is a long line of clear-eyed prosperous, well-dressed men and women waiting their turn to deposit their savings in the bank. We may well call this the "Bank Line," although there is no banker in it.

Ask these ones in the "Bank Line" what put them there, and the answer is good habits, economy, hard work, careful planning, honesty, integrity and thrift. Their future is one of comfort, peace and contentment, while the "Bread Line" man winds up in a pine box in the "Potter's Field."

In the "Bread Line" may be found the sons of wealth, college graduates, doctors, and professional men of all kinds, while thousands in the "Bank Line" come from the ranks of common labor.

What makes the difference between "Bank Line" and "Bread Line?" Just one thing. One planned, worked and saved the other wasted time and money, with the inevitable result.

There is a "Bread Line" in Texas as well as in every other cotton growing State. It's not exactly the same kind of a "Bread Line" as the one in New York City, but it spells poverty just the same, and no man, white or black, either in New York City or on the cotton farms of the South who trains in the "Bread Line" regularly can ever get ahead.

This Cotton States "Bread Line" is made up of that class of farmers who regularly have to be "carried" or the acres into cotton or some other so-called "cash crop," and just as regularly have to be "carried" or "staked" by supply merchants for their bread and meat.

It's a "Bread Line" deadly to all farm prosperity, deadly to any chance for comfort and right living for farmer and his family. It's deadly to thrift to farm planning, to land building through proper rotation of crops. Why? Because the Texas "Bread Line" is the slave of supply merchants

who demand the full acreage in cotton.

We don't know of a single cotton growing county in the South that is not capable of growing every dollar's worth of foodstuffs and grain needed to feed that county. We don't know of a single county where cotton is the main cash crop that is feeding itself. Yes, that's true, in spite of boll weevil and years of low cotton prices.

The cotton growing South is poor compared with other farming sections less favored with soil, crops and climate. It's our own everlasting hanging to that "Bread Line" leading up to supply merchants door that keeps the cotton grower poor.—Southland Farmer.

### BOLL ROT OF COTTON.

We are receiving so many reports from all sections of the damage done the cotton crop by the dreaded boll-rot that we feel we ought to issue this word of warning to the farmers of the South; if you have any two-year old cotton seed to be sure to save them for planting, as there will be scarcely a bushel of this year's seed fit for planting. Also, now is the time to arrange your crop so as to have your cotton on stubble, corn-stalk land or new ground.

We have made a rather close study of this disease and judging from our information the outlook is really alarming. It started some years ago on the Atlantic coast and this year it has spread over the entire cotton belt. There is no remedy so far as known, except to plant two-year-old seed on land infected. Unless these precautions are used and the disease checked without longer delay we fear that it will prove a worse menace to the Southern cotton grower than the boll weevil.

In many sections more than half the bolls are affected. Much of the damage thought to have been done by the boll weevil is the result of this disease. By examining your field you will find it, though you may not now suspect its presence. It is just what its name implies—boll-rot. It starts, usually as a dark green spot on small or large bolls and later turns to a dry rot. It not only spoils the seed for planting, but lowers the quality as well as the quantity of both lint and seed.

A careful farmer can pull his planting seed from good bolls, yet the disease is in the "blood" and will probably show up much worse next year, especially if it proves to be a wet season.

We repeat the warning to save all your two-year-old seed and plant them on land not infected. Now is the time to stamp out this fearful disease that threatens the prosperity of the South.—V. O. Porter, in Southland Farmer.







### CONDITIONS AND CROPS MUST BE CONSIDERED.

Some curious phases of soil handling come to light as the "scientific fellers" obtrude their investigating noses into the subject.

For instance a farmer does not need to be so very scientific to observe that the supply of phosphate is heavily drawn upon by the "general run" of field farming carried on throughout the country, and especially in the South.

Experiments in certain sections of Massachusetts however, have determined, it is claimed, that the crops mainly grown and sold off the land there, such as hay, vegetables, fruit and milk, draw but lightly upon the phosphorus content of the soil, and that the heavy application of lot manure made, return a good deal of that taken out.

And thereby hang some lessons, one of which is that local conditions and prevailing crops should be largely taken into consideration when estimating demands of the soil upon certain elements of plant food.

In Massachusetts, for instance, the soil demands heavy applications of potash, because it is shy of that element, and because the principal crops grown, make heavy draft upon it.

In East Texas, on the other hand, except possibly in cases of a few crops, such as potatoes, cabbage, etc., there seems to be sufficient potash in the soil to serve the demands of most crops.

Another lesson and a most important one is that the more lot manure worked into the soil, the less phosphorus need be applied, and the less nitrogen also.

The informant stated that Diaz is said to have the active backing of the old Clerical and Catholic parties and it is believed in Mexico that a great counter-revolution to Carranza has been started.

The Huerta faction in Mexico is strong in support of the new movement, says the foreigner, and a revolution is expected immediately to assume great proportions.

If you order seed from other sections be absolutely certain that you thoroughly disinfect them with bi-sulphide of carbon (high life) as soon as the seed are received. The danger of the presence of the boll weevil is great enough from its travels westward, without inviting and speeding its presence in imported cotton seed.

**NOTEWORTHY ARTICLE  
IN LONDON NEWS.**

Mr. Arnold Bennett, wit, scholar, fine writer and true blue Briton, is one of the few men of letters on either side of the Atlantic who have been able to keep their heads cool and their judgment reasonably fair during this war.

In a long leader in the London Daily News, which is well known to be the semi-official mouthpiece of Premier Asquith, Mr. Bennett has told a few dispassionate truths which England and Europe ought to heed.

Mr. Bennett says bluntly that neither Germany nor the allies can accomplish the impossible, by which we take it he means that neither can win a decisive military triumph on all the fronts.

Mr. Bennett also says bluntly that all the powers, including England, are at the end of their financial endurance.

Mr. Bennett then formulates what he believes to be reasonable terms of peace—the evacuation of Belgium and the restoration to France of Alsace-Lorraine.

It is natural to infer that these are the views of Premier Asquith. It is natural, too, to think that the premier has in mind some concessions to be granted to Germany elsewhere.

These are terms of peace to which Germany, of course, after her military triumphs, might not listen. But the significance of them is that they disclose a leaning toward peace negotiations of some kind on the part of the British writers and statesmen. That Germany is also ready to talk peace seems certain.

We think we perceive a rift, at least, in the war-cloud. Heaven send that it may widen until the glad sunlight of peace does flood war-weary and wretched Europe.

ON BILLY SUNDAY.**

With his usual accuracy of aim, the veteran editor of the Louisville Courier-Journal takes the following shot at Billy Sunday and his methods:

"Shall no line be drawn between the sacred and the profane? Mr. Sunday has made a vaudeville entertainment of a hotch-potch which he calls Christianity. He has nigger-minstrelized the service of God and set it to the music of the concert hall. He has turned the church into a cabaret and reduced the Lord's Prayer to a kind of song and dance, converting the whole scheme of the religion into a tango. Whilst the people of burnt cork and the lyric drama grow poor he grows rich; and from ocean to ocean the demand for him is so great that cities have to take their turn. Truly nothing succeeds like success. But that which appears to command success in greatest measure is the grotesque. As the Courier-Journal conceives the Christian religion—for the matter of that as it conceives any religion laid in sincere belief and aimed toward the regeneration of man—its essential parts are its spiritual force and celestial power. They, and not any external agencies, constitute its vitality. It is from the soul outward, not from the skin inward. Efforts to compel it—to confuse it with worldly trappings—to dramatize it, or legislate it—are and must always be impious and futile. Christ was the Spirit of God. Christianity is the exaltation of the Spirit of Christ. Satan makes many diversions. Behold the star engagement he is playing across the seas. Shall religion in America gibber and chatter and amuse itself whilst the King of Death holds high the cup and drinks to Woe and Wrath? In these awful times, amid these frightful scenes, where does Billy Sunday, and such as he, come in and how may we enjoy his caps and bells? They jingle out of tune and harsh as we read the daily record of massacre and realize the terror of it."



**AN URGENT CALL.**

The Texas Department of Agriculture, realizing the enormous damage done to crops, pastures and trees by destructive rodents, birds and other animals, is endeavoring to launch a campaign by which to stop the great losses sustained.

Knowing the necessity of concerted action in the subjection of such animals, I hereby issue this call to county Judges, county commissioners, county demonstration agents, farmers, stockmen, merchants and other business men to meet at Sweetwater, Texas, on Friday, December 10th, at 10 a.m., for the purpose of formulating such plans by which ravens, prairie dogs, rats, rabbits and other animals can be controlled most economically and to the best advantage.

The area now known to be most seriously infested by these noxious animals extends from Eastland county west to the Pecos river, and from Tom Green county to Lubbock county. It is estimated that the damage done in this area ranges from twenty to sixty thousand dollars per annum.

Your county being in the infested area and probably suffering from the devastation of one or more of these pests makes it necessary for us to have your co-operation in this work.

Prompt action should be taken by all concerned and I therefore respectfully urge your attendance at this meeting. Bring as many farmers and other interested men with you as you can get to come and let us work out a co-operative plan by which we can greatly reduce these pests over a large area at one time. 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
