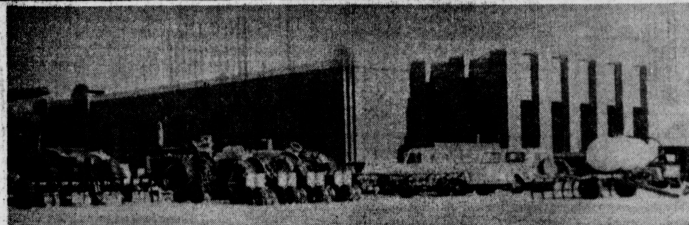

200 Attend Farm Workshop; Hear Talks by Experts

Two hundred area farmers, many of them young men who are eager to learn the new in farming operations, attended the annual area farm workshop here Thursday and heard talks by some of the southwest's most outstanding farm experts. The program was sponsored by the Young Farmers Association of this area, and by the Bailey County Electric Cooperative. The latter organization provided lunch for the visitors.

Area equipment and seed dealers also joined in the sponsorship of the program which included a display on the high school lawn of latest equipment. Speakers included: Dr. Robert W. Berry, area extension plant pathologist; Lubbock; Harvey Walker, agronomist, South Plains Research; Lubbock; Dr. Arthur Goehle, senior soil scientist and assistant director, Big A Plains Research Foundation, Halfway; Dr. Anderson, a Crosbyton farmer; Dr. John Seiert, area extension farm management specialist, Lubbock; Dr. John Shanklin, agricultural engineer, USDA, Albuquerque, N. M.; and Joe Harbin, education director, Bailey County Electric Cooperative.

Four Seek School Board Jobs, 3 in Council Race As Filing Period Ends

When voters here trek to the polls next month, they will have a choice of four candidates seeking school board posts, but only one city council member faces opposition. This means only three names will appear on the city council ballot, Matt Dudley, incumbent, being unopposed for his council seat.

Incumbent Rudolph Wiedebusch will face Royce Garth, who for a number of years was a city employee.

Vic Benedict, an insurance man here, tossed his hat into the school board race only 24 hours before the filing deadline to bring to four the total seeking posts. The school board candidates, unlike city council seekers, run "at large." Councilmen are selected by "positions."

Earlier in the race, E. A. Bradley, a Fry & Cox employee, entered the school board race. Also seeking election are the incumbents whose terms expire this year, John Smith and Ralph Douglas.

Filing deadline for city posts was reached at noon Saturday—30 days ahead of the election date. School board election is slated for Saturday, April 3, and the city council election is to take place the following Tuesday—April 6.

Meantime, absentee voting periods have been announced for both elections. Absentee voting for the school board places starts Monday, March 15, and will end Tuesday, March 30.

Absentee voting for city candidates will start Wednesday, March 17 and will end Friday, April 2, officials have announced.

Incumbent voting for council posts will be done at the city hall, while absentee voting for school board posts will be handled at the county district clerk's office.

In order to be eligible to vote in either election, a voter must have paid his 1964 poll tax before Feb. 1 this year, or else hold an exemption certificate.

For the entire county, 1355 persons paid poll taxes in this county before the deadline, and 13 exemptions were issued.

However, this was for the entire county; thus fewer than 1000 persons will be eligible to vote in the school election and probably around 800 in the city election. The school district, of course, covers a much wider area than does the city.

A decorations committee will start work early tomorrow decorating the hall for the dinner with the Muleshoe Study Club in charge. Aiding in the decorations work will be Girl Scout Troop 39, Cub Scout Pack 629, Den 1, Boy Scout Troop 620, and the Busy Bee 4-H club.

Certificates of merit have been printed and will be given by Mrs. White to persons and individuals who had a prominent part in making the 1964 campaign such a great success.

Mrs. White has announced that the meeting tomorrow night will be an open session. "We hope everyone who had a part in the 1964 campaign or would like to know the workings of the organization will be present," she said. "I hope employees will ask all their employees to be present. This is the biggest area-wide activity in which we participate as a community. It involves every citizen."

Tickets will be on sale at the Chamber of Commerce office tomorrow and all who plan to attend are asked to call in reservations by 10 a.m. Monday.

Eddy is recognized as one of the outstanding speakers in Texas and the Muleshoe Area Fund officials say they "are extremely pleased that he could attend the meeting. He is in great demand as a speaker." (See BANQUET Page 6)

Missionary Speaks

The Woman's Society of Christian Service of the First Methodist Church met March 2, in the Youth Chapel of the church.

Mrs. J. A. Nickles was in charge of the program, an introduction of Rev. and Mrs. N. Saenz of Lubbock, Texas. Rev. Saenz is the District Superintendent of the Central Rio Grande Conference. Rev. Saenz spoke to the Women's Society of his experiences in the Mission field working with unchurched Spanish speaking Americans.

He was born in Texas and until he was 18 had never seen a Bible or heard the gospel. He became a Methodist Minister after giving his life to Christ when he was 23 years old. He has spent the last 25 years spreading God's Word to his people. One particularly interesting experience he told was about the mission he succeeded in establishing in the slums of West Dallas. He was asked to do this job by the University Park Church in Dallas. Some opposition was met, but Rev. Saenz said he felt that if there could be a beer joint on every corner of the slum area, there could surely be a church. He succeeded in building a \$35,000 building with a membership of about 250. He gave Spanish Bibles to those families who were receptive and through this manner won many families to Christ and the church.

Mrs. Saenz is studying, now, to become a licensed lay-leader speaker. She was born in Mexico and attended a Methodist college there. She came across the border into Texas to live with relatives and later became a naturalized citizen of the U. S. She, too has worked faithfully with their people and has helped win many to Christ.

This year, Girl Scouts are paying special attention to the "bridges" which give continuity to their program. The program adapts activities related to the arts, the home, and the out-of-doors, to the changing interests and needs of girls ages 7-17, thus "bridging" the four age levels: Brownie Girl Scouts (ages 7 and 8) and Senior Girl Scouts (ages 13 through 17).

Special days are earmarked throughout Girl Scout Week to illustrate the various aspects of the Girl Scout program. They are: Girl Scout Sunday; Monday Homemaking; Tuesday, Citizenship; Wednesday, Health and Safety; Thursday, International Friendship; Friday, Arts; Saturday, Out-of-doors.

In observance of Girl Scout Sunday March 7, thousands of Girl Scouts are expected to attend religious services in uniform. Jewish girls celebrated their Girl Scout Sabbath on Friday evening, March 5.

Many schools throughout the West Texas area, will join in the celebration of Girl Scout Week.

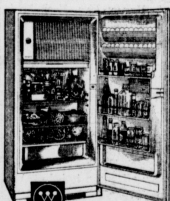
Most of the Girl Scouts will not attend church in groups, however, they plan to wear their uniforms as they attend the church of their choice on Girl Scout Sunday, March 7.
