Fort Worth Man Is A Candidate For Senate Post

Walter E. Steimel, Fort Worth lawyer who once held one of the nation's highest security clearance today announced he would be a Democratic candidate for the Texas Senate from District 22.

Steimel, 42, said a major plank of his platform would be a pledge to fight any movement to tax groceries.

"The present senator from this district wrote, sponsored and pushed passage in the Senate last year of a tax on food, farm machinery and fertilizer—all of which would raise the price of groceries," he said.

District 22 Incumbent Tom Creighton of Mineral Wells has announced for re-election. The district covers southern Tarrant County and eight other counties, Clay, Eastland, Jack, Montague, Palo Pinto, Parker, Stephens and Wise.

Steimel said he also would press for an in-depth tax study for the purpose of preventing special tax sessions of the legislature like the one held last year.

Steimel, a Navy lieutenant in the Korean War, was an atomic bomb assembly officer in the combat zone. The duty required him to hold a "Q" or atomic clearance, never granted to more than a relatively few military personnel.

He is a native of Wichita Falls and was top man in his Peacock Military Academy graduating class. Later he earned his bachelor of science degree in physics from Trinity University and a law degree from University of Texas.

He is a former governor of the North Texas chapter of the Arthritis Foundation, belongs to county, state and national bar associations and is licensed to practice before the U.S. Supreme Court.

Steimel and his wife, Margaret, live at 4212 South Drive in Westcliff with their two children, Walter Jr., 13, and Stacy Elizabeth, 10.

A total of 40 nuts of any variety will constitute an entry in the show. The pecans entered must have been grown in 1970 and be entered by the person who produced the pecans. They are judged on the basis of size, per cent kernel, thinness of shell, quality of kernel and attractiveness of the pecan. Eastland Countians made a big dent in helping get the Lene Star-donated building moved when they sat down to a fish dinner Saturday evening in Eastland.

A total of 520 people went through the fresh fish line at the Cattlemen's Restaurant and in so doing put \$650 in the fund to move the building. Additional donations amounted to \$34.30 given, and a cake was auctioned and brought \$75. Buyer was H. T. Wilson.

Mr. and Mrs. Highsmith, operators of the restaurant, contributed all proceeds from the feed to the fund, and reported that they were certainly nappy with the results, as were members of the Eastland County Livestock Raisers Association, the Farm Bureau and the Sheriff's Posse. These three groups were given title to the building, and their members have assumed

the responsibility of moving and re-erecting it at the Livestock Show Grounds northwest of Eastland. Work is now underway.

It Has Been

Editor's Note: The following item is taken from The Rising Star, a column written by Vada Arnold and titled "It Has Been."

In the age of penny post cards, two cent stamps, women's hat pins and five-cent cigars, men wore mustaches; beards and sideburns, celluloid collars, collar buttons and

stiff bosomed shirts with starched cuffs and cravats. They wore spats of light gray or tan, peg-top pants, pointed vests and rather long coats with short, narrow lapels. Vests had watch pockets in which men wore large gold watches with long heavy chains that were draped from the pocket to a button near the V neck of the vest and hung in a festoon across the front of the wearer.

Hats were in evidence for all occasions; high top hats,

stetsons and just plain felt hats for winter dress up wear and straws for summer. A bare headed man, other than indoors, would have been a disgrace to society.

Very few men went to a barber shop for a shave. They had their own long blade razor, a shaving mug with a round cake of soap in the bottom. And a shaving brush.

The kids enjoyed watching Papa sharpen his razor on a razor strap, and with the shaving brush daub his entire face with beautiful foamy leather made by swobbing a wet brush over the sweet smelling shaving soap. And then came the most dramatic part of the scene, when with much flourish, Papa picked up the shiny razor and started the actual shave. With quick,

even strokes he shaved beard, lather and all, after each move he wiped off the razor on a piece of paper and proceeded in like manner until his face was finished.

Then mama was called in to shave the back of his neck. After that Papa bathed his face and applied a bit of glycerine (shaving creams and lotions were unheard of except for rich people). He emerged a smooth, clean-faced Papa to be awarded with a kiss from

each kid who had watched him shave.

Hair cuts were usually home made. Some women were quite expert in the art, and turned out sons and husbands looking neat and trim; Others not so adept turned a bowl over the heads of male members of the family and turned her men out with hair that resembled a stake and rider fence, in terms of crookedness. Nevertheless every body loved each other and overlooked hair cuts that hung in jagged points around the head.

Men carried good sized purses referred to as "pocket books," in their pants pockets. These purses had three or more compartments and closed with a snap fastener.

Women came in for their share of beautification too.

What was the need for a beauty shop? When there were "Kid Curlers" to roll the front hair and bangs on and left over night to produce lovely frizzed hair when combed out. Also there were curling irons to be heated in coals of the fireplace or hung in the chimney on a lighted kerosene oil lamp for heat. This process was much quicker than kid curlers and looked much more beautiful.

Cosmetics were no problem. Prepared chalk applied with a small piece of outing flannel or a Chamois skin was a wonderful "whitening."

Several applications of buttermilk applied to the face at bed time and allowed to dry before retiring acted as a skin freshener and bleach.

Glycerine bought at the drug store (if there was money to buy with) and a little rose water was wonderful for the complexion.

An egg well-beaten made the best shampoo, ever, when used with rain water, caught in a rain barrel or tub from a recent rain.

During summer months one of the best facials could be had by cutting a large cucumber in half and rubbing the cut side over all the face and neck. Some fastidious ladies made a thick paste of home ground corn meal, egg and buttermilk and plastered their faces well, after this had dried thoroughly, Mi-Lady tied a mask made of a piece of flour sack with holes cut for eyes, nose and mouth securely over her face and went to bed to dream of the tomorrow and her miraculously beautiful face, for the next day.

So on and on through all the years that have passed and the years to come women have pursued and will pursue the ritual of personal beautification.
