TEXAS PRESIDENTIAL PRIMARY RULING UP TO SUPREME COURT.

Galveston, March 2.—The First Court of Civil Appeals today certified the preferential primary mandamus to the supreme court. The case reached the court of appeals yesterday on appeal by the State Democratic Executive Committee from the decision of the district court which had granted a mandamus compelling the state committee to hold a presidential primary in Texas on May 23.

It is expected the case will be advanced on the calendar of the supreme court because of its importance and short time remaining before the date for the election.

PRESIDENT SECURES ANOTHER TOUCHDOWN.

Washington, March 3.—By a vote of 64 to 14 far a greater majority than was expected, the administration forces in the Senate tabled the Gore resolution warning Americans from armed ships of belligerent nations, thereby finally quelling the agitation which had embarrassed President Wilson in his submarine negotiations with Germany. The resolution substituted by Senator McCumber, Republican, and an attempt by Senator Gore to strengthen the original proposal was defeated at one time on roll call. The fight has been transferred to the lower house.

It is said that the result in the senate is highly satisfactory to the president. McCumber later introduced substantially the same resolution offered as a substitute for the Gore resolution. It also will go on the calendar Gore himself voted to table the resolution. Senators Chamberlain and Gor-

REICHSTAG MEMBER HOPES U. S. WILL STAY OUT OF WAR.

Copenhagen, March 4.—Herr Naumann, member of the Reichstag, contributes an article entitled, "Will America Join the Allies?" to the Schleswig newspaper, Heindal, organ of the Schleswig Baines, in which he says:

"Our wish that the United States preserve its neutrality is easily comprehended. It is a great delusion to think, as some profess to do, that one more enemy can make any difference. A declaration of war against the United States would result in a fleet numbering (in 1913) 169 units with 1,531 guns, placing itself on the side of Great Britain and thereby increasing the possibility of a complete blockade.

"Our ships in American harbors and the hourly increasing financial power of the United States would mean an incalculable prolongation of the war."

Lieutenant Colonel Jovito Orozco, the federal officer who captured President Francisco Madero and Vice-President Pino Suarez, was tried by a court-martial recently at Mexico City. He was unanimously sentenced to death. He will probably be shot.

HOME DEMONSTRATION WORK.

The following letter to County Farm Demonstrator, Dulin, explains itself: "Dear Sir:—

"I have the promise of Mr. and Mrs. Garren to assist us in holding a one day, each, movable school on March 13th, 14th, and 15th, at some rural school districts in your county. I am sorry that this work has been delayed, but this seems to be the best arrangement that could be made.

"I would like for you to select the places that these three days shall be spent and invite all the farmers and their wives out to spend the day, and we hope to make this a great educational agricultural rally day for the several communities. Home demonstration work, with modern conveniences for the kitchen and demonstration in bread making will be handled by Mrs. Garren; Mr. G. M. Garren will take soil fertility and how to maintain it, and we will discuss balanced rations to pigs and other live stock. We would be glad for you to arrange for the county superintendent to attend these meetings and participate in the program; he might discuss the relation of education to agriculture in Mitchell county. THE SECOND MONDAY.

Next Monday, the 13th, will be the regular Trade Day of the month for Colorado. An earnest and persistent effort will be made to make the second Monday in each month a trade day for the entire county. Our neighboring town, Loraine, has a special day in each month set apart as a Trade Day, and the first one to be observed in that progressive little city, was an unqualified success.

There is no reason on earth why such a day should not be made a success and in a short time become one of the institutions of the county. In other counties First Mondays are always looked forward to as the one occasion of the month for bargains of all kinds. As much business is done usually on such days as on a big circus day. Colorado can easily have just as profitable a day, by a little cooperation. The success of such an occasion rests almost wholly with the town. If the people of the town of Colorado will meet those of the country half way—and we should be willing to go farther than half way, as the balance of the benefits resultant are with us—the Second Monday Trade Days would soon become the mecca toward which everyone with something to sell, buy, trade, barter or give away, would look with fond expectations of profit or riddance.

Whether justly or otherwise, the town of Colorado has too long suffered from the imputation of the spirit of "the dog in the manger," not only among towns of this section of the State, but within its own corporate limits, and in the attitude of some of its citizenship toward the general good and welfare. There can be no better time than the present, to refute such imputation. Th very "inards" of the matter was expressed by a visitor recently, who was here looking out a probable location for his business. After meeting with nothing but cold water and discouraging talk, he returned to his home with a feeling that he had barely escaped some kind of deadly pestilence. In speaking of the feeling with which he was met here he said: "There are some people in your town who would cheerfully forego making a dollar just to keep an honest competitor from making a dime."

ARMY OF 700,000 IS PLAN.

Washington, March 2.—Final agreement was reached by the house military committee late today on its bill for the increase of the army and it will be reported unanimously to the house early next week.

In round figures the measure would authorize the formation of an army composed of regulars, national guardsmen and federal volunteers with a total peace strength of approximately 700,000 men.

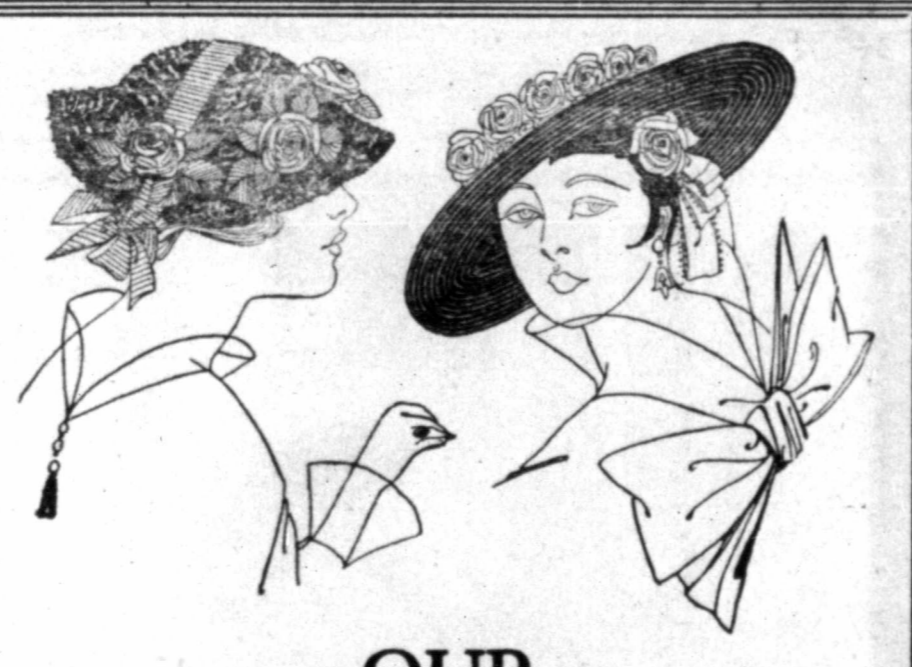
