Col. House, who recently returned from a trip abroad as the special representative of President Wilson, did not discuss peace proposals alone, it was declared here, despite denials. On the contrary, he is confidently believed to have made inquiry of leading statesmen of Great Britain, France, Germany and Spain and other nations as to what their attitude would be in case the United States made such an offer.

While leading men here say it will be extremely difficult to approximate a price equitable to such an enormous purchase, the tentative figure mentioned for the basic effort will be about \$300,000,000.

## EFFORT OF CARRANZA TO STOP **EXPEDITION AFTER VILLA FAILS**

GENERAL PERSHING CALLED TO EL PASO FOR CONFERENCE WITH GENERAL GUITERREZ IS URGED TO WAIT TWO WEEKS FOR CONSTITUTIONALIST ARMY TO TAKE BANDIT, BUT ANSWERS

### "I HAVE ORDERS TO CATCH VILLA," HE SAID.

HASTENS BACK TO COLUMBUS AND WITH TROOPERS IS EXPECT-ED TO MOVE TOWARD PALOMAS EARLY WEDNESDAY-SNIPERS AGAIN FIRE ON SOUTHERN PACIFIC TRAIN NEAR FORT HAN-

El Paso, Texas, March 14.—General John J. Pershing, at the head of the cavalry division which will start the hunt for Francisco Villa, has completed plans to cross the border Wednesday morning.

The rush with which the final arrangements for the expedition were closed Tuesday night is conceded to be an answer to a demand made by Carranza representatives for a further delay.

General Pershing returned to El Paso Tuesday morning from Columbus at the request of the Mexican authorities for a conference with Luis Guiterrez, commander-in-chief of the Carranza forces in Chihuahua. Guiterrez urged in the name of Venustiano Carranza that the American troops keep out of Mexico for two weeks longer.

He declared five converging columns of Carranza soldiers within the time stated will have trapped Villa and eliminated the necessity of the punitive expedition of American troops,

"My orders have been to catch Villa and I cannot delay execution of my instructions," General Pershing replied,

"But we have five columns of troops, 1,200 men in each column and they are closing in on Villa from as many directions. He cannot escape," said the Carranza general.

"It is too late," said General Pershing. "It will cause much ill-feeling on the part of the Mexican people,"

"The only suggestion I can make is that your diplomatic service take the matter up with Washington," said General Pershing.

Villa is Moving Slowly. Villa, according to General Guiterrez' dispatches, is forced to move slowly because he is carrying a large number of wounded. Ninety-eight of his men, according to this same source of information, are mounted on United States cavalry horses taken at the Columbus (N. M.) raid and two machine guns from the Columbus camp are in the Villa train.

The report that General Obregon, Carranza's new minister of war on the way to Juarez, was officially denied by Consul Garcia tonight.

Fourteen Mexicans Captured. Railroad Detective Charles Bulger sighted fourteen Mexicans armed with 20-30 riffer and carrying cartridge belts brisding with shells in an adobe hut on the Santa Fe tracks two miles from El Paso. He notified Lieutenant Shellenbarger at Fort Bliss and two squads of the Eighth Cavalry went to the hut. They surprised the Mexicans and captured them without a shot. Each prisoner had 200 rounds of ammunition in addition to his rifle and a majority of them carried one or more pistols. All were lodged in the El Paso jail.

Alarm At Naco, Arizona.

Naco, Arizona, according to dispatches here, spent a sleepless night with women and children sleeping in the schoolhouses under guard and armed citizens and Texas Rangers patrolling the town.

Il Paso is practically under martial law. Members of the provost guard walk the streets with rifles over their shoulders instead of the 'slumber sticks" they have carried heretofore. In the Mexican quarters every Mexican house is searched every day for arms and ammunition. In one house on South El Paso Street two dozen Mauser rifles and 100 rounds of ammunition for each gun were found. The guns were confiscated and the house owner, Pablo Orto, put in jail.

Clerks in every store in the city have been armed by their employers against possible raids and, though no trouble has yet occurred beyond a few scattered fights between civilians and Mexicans, a majority of the men are carrying pistols under their coats.

Censorship Of News Strict.

A strict censorship of all news has been established at Columbus, where General Pershing and the troops now are, and it is reported that the censorship will be extended to El Paso and other border towns with the arrival of Brigadier General Bell, Jr., who will assume charge of the soldiers at Fort Bliss and other points in the Fort Bliss district some

# To the People of Texas!

In the Annual Report of the Texas Railroad Commission for 1900, then presided over by that grand old commoner, John H. Reagan, after noticing the great increase in the amount that the Railroads of Texas had to pay in satisfaction of Jury verdicts and Court Judgments for personal injuries, the report says:

While we have no official information showing the cause of this great increase, we understand, in a general way, that it probably results in a large degree from the activities of regularly organized personal injury bureaus. The only direct interest which this Commission has in this question grows out of the fact that, as the amount of these payments are increased, the available revenues of the railroad companies are reduced thus necessarily operating, to that extent, to prevent the reduction of freight rates, or, it might be, to cause an increase of them."

What Judge Reagan and his associates foresaw and warned against has actually happened. The Railroad Commission of Texas has increased freight rates. Not much yet; but it is hoped the increases will be sufficiently liberal to relieve the roads of their distressing necessities.

The Commission, after the most exhaustive, patient, laborious and painstaking investigation ever before undertaken by a state rate-making

body, in which hearing the Commission was assisted by able attorneys and experts, in no way connected with the railroads; and with the single purpose of learning the truth and doing their duty as sworn officials of your choosing, the Commissioners have found that the railroads are entitled to earn more revenue to enable them to pay their operating expenses and a fair return upon the value of the property devoted to public use.

It would not be fair to charge the entire increase to personal injury payments. Such payments had, however, a considerable influense in the way of increased expenses; but there are many other ways of unnecessarily increasing the expenses of the railroads. The legislature can, and in the past has done so. And every expense imposed or forced on the railroads by the legislature must be considered in fixing freight rates paid by the people, and mostly by the producers of the wealth of the state.

The last legislature was importuned, by selfish interests, to pass wholly unnecessary and expensive laws, such as the so-called "full crew bill" and others, that would, had they been enacted, have increased the expenses of the railroads of the state about four million dollars per year. The legislature, however, refused to place

this enormous expense on the shippers and producers of this state, and you justly owe your lawmakers a vote of thanks for thus protecting you. For if the legislature had passed these laws, the increased expense would have had to be taken into consideration by the Railroad Commission in fixing the advances allowed, or to be hereafter allowed.

The action of the legislature has saved the shippers and producers of this state a vast amount of money.

The financial conditions of the railroads forced us to ask an increase in freight rates. We would have been glad, had the condition of the roads been such, that we would not have had to ask for such increase.

The way to protect yourselves in the amount of freight rates is to assist the railroads in reducing expenses and in preventing their operating expenses from being further increased. Will you thus help yourselves, your neighbors and your friends?

Your state and county officials publish statements of their public acts for the information of the people; while railroads are privately owned, they are operated for the benefit of the public, and the people are entitler to know how they are effected by railroad legislation and regula-

The temperature, at first elevated, tends to become lower as stupor and coma progress. The bowels may become torpid or completely paralyzed, and fails to expel its contents. Action of either bowels or bladder, or both. is always a favorable symptom.

The torpor of the digestive organs nearly always causes grave disorders; the paunch becomes the seat of fermentation, producing gas and excessive bloating. There are frequent belchings of gas or food, which ,reaching the paralyzed throat, pass in part into the windpipe, causing inflammation of the air passages and lungs, which condition often becomes the immediate cause of death.
