Jail Idle Only 20 Hours During Entire 1965

Some 405 prisoners were held in the Eastland County Jail during the past year, 1965, according to Jailer John Shook and his wife.

A total of 9,125 meals were served. Meals consisted of vegetables and desserts; also meat was served twice a week, stated Mrs. Shook, who has always served three meals a day to prisoners.

Only 20 hours out of the entire year was the jail not occupied. The most prisoners held at one time was 15.

Within the year, two unsuccessful jail - break attempts were made, Mr. Shook said.

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Gorman Farmer Is Honored For Success In Peanut Irrigation

Wayne Eaves, young Gorman farmer, was named that area's outstanding producer of irrigated peanuts for 1965 at a banquet Thursday night in Gorman. Some 175 persons attended the event, which was sponsored by the Gorman Businessmen's Club and the Woman's Study Club of Gorman.

Mr. Eaves, 37, was selected for the honor from a group of 26 farmers who produced irrigated peanuts in the Gorman community last year.

B. C. Langley, superintendent of the West Cross Timbers Experiment Station in Stephenville, was presented the Gold Peanut Research Award by the sponsors for his achievements in developing the Starr variety of Spanish peanuts. The variety was named for W. B. Starr, veteran Cisco area agriculture leader.

Peanut Grower Eaves graduated from Carbon High School in 1945 and following that he assisted his father on the Eaves farm in the Kokomo Community north of here where peanuts were the major cash crop. He also attended Cisco Junior College during the same period.

In 1950 and 1951 he went to farming on his own but like so many other farmers, both young and old, the severe drought which began about this time forced him to seek other sources of income. He was employed by Phillips Chemical Co. at Goldsmith, 1951 through 1953.

Wayne, who says he had rather farm than do anything else, returned to the Kokomo Community in 1959 to resume his farming. He has continued to operate a 220-acre farm since that time.

He had an opportunity to observe first-hand an irrigated peanut operation in Caddo County, Okla., where he was a part-time employee of Gorman Peanut Co. during the 1959-64

buying seasons. He stated that he continually observed the quality and increased yields of peanuts produced under irrigation in that county and after the 1963 marketing season he became fully determined to irrigate part of his Eastland County peanut acreage.

In selecting equipment and determining his procedures for irrigating peanuts, he followed as nearly as possible the pattern he had observed in Caddo County, Okla. In 1964 he irrigated 24 acres of peanuts and they averaged 73 bushels, 2,340 pounds, to the acre. He watered the crop five times, putting down three inches of moisture each watering. On about half of the 24 acres he planted "Foundation" seed and the average yield was 103 bushels, or 3,150 pounds to the acre.

Last year Eaves increased his irrigated peanut crop to 38 acres and the average was 83 bushels, 2,490 pounds, to the acre. Again on 12 acres where Foundation seeds were planted the yield went to 115 bushels, 3,450 pounds, to the acre which gave him a return of \$448 to the acre.

On 47 acres of dryland peanuts on the same farm last year, his yield was 18 bushels, 540 pounds, to the acre. He plans to irrigate an additional 42 acres on his homestead this year and hopefully 20 acres more on a farm he recently purchased. This would give him a total of 100 acres of irrigated peanuts this year.

He has made an initial investment of \$5,000 in drilling water wells and purchasing irrigation equipment, which he considers the best investment he can make.

He is married to the former Mary Jo Wheeler of Gorman. They have two sons, Bobby, 11, and Johnny, 13. The family belongs to the Kokomo Baptist Church. Both parents are active in Gorman Community affairs.

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T&P Being Sued For \$66,000 in 2 Cases

The Texas & Pacific Railway Co. has been named defendant in two damage suits filed in 91st District Court, one resulting from a personal injury and the other from slaughter of livestock.

In a petition filed by John J. Watts of Odessa for Jerry Don Hamilton, \$65,000 in damages is asked. Hamilton alleges that on May 17, 1963, while in the employ of the Feather-Lite Corp. of Ranger, he received injuries as the result of a switch engine's movement.

H. L. King of Eastland has also brought suits against the railroad claiming that on June 21, 1965, a train killed 54 head of goats, one cow, one calf and injured several calves. He is asking \$1,185 in damages and \$500 attorney fees. Bill B. Mart represents Mr. King.

Damages asked in the two suits amount to some \$66,000.

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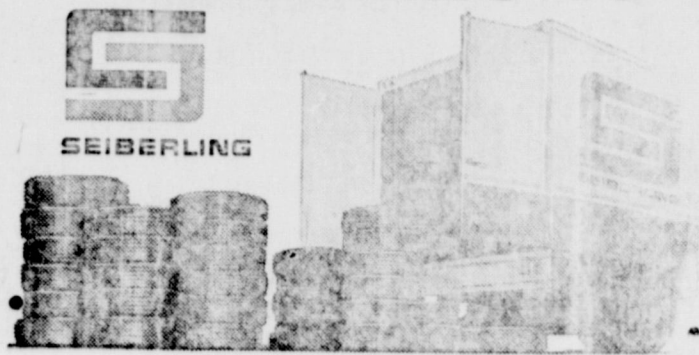

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Dun, Bradstreet Lists County Businesses

Mr. A. J. Hemphill, district manager of the Fort Worth office of Dun & Bradstreet, requests were mailed to 362 business in Eastland County. He said figures were obtained from a physical count of the Dun & Bradstreet Reference Book for January, 1966.

Mr. Hemphill noted that each January business concerns in all parts of the United States are asked by Dun & Bradstreet for copies of their financial statements. This year requests are being sent to nearly three million business concerns — to the corner grocery store, worth a

few thousand dollars, as well as to businesses worth millions.

The Dun & Bradstreet Reference Book lists those manufacturers, wholesalers, and retailers who seek or grant commercial credit, but it does not include some of the service and professional businesses, such as beauty and barber shops, security dealers and real estate brokers. Therefore, the figures for total business in the United States would be higher than the three million quoted above.

During the past year, Hemphill added 38 changes made in the Dun & Bradstreet Reference Book listings of Eastland County businesses, including 11 names added, 13 names deleted, and 14 changes in the ratings of continuing business. The changes occurring in Eastland County are higher than the rest of the country where a change of business significance is counted every five seconds.
