To describe the system briefly: Title to a given piece of land is examined and found to lie in a certain person. It is then registered in that person's name and a certificate of owership issued. When that person wishes to transfer the land all he need do is to surrender his certificate, and a new certificate is then issued to the purchaser.

There is no going back of the certificate. No re-examination of records is who claims to have been a widow of a grantor; persons who claim to have been heirs, and so on. These claims may be valid at law. To provide control. 

MOVE OF HORDES OF MEXICANS INTO JIMINEZ A BLIND.

American Military Officials Assert Massing of Troops is Not For Chasing Bandits.

Columbus, N. M., May 28.-American military officials here are watching the movement of Gen. Jacinto Trevino's forces into the Jiminez and Hacienda Mimrera county of lower Chihuahua with undisguised suspicion The idea that the Carranza authorities have located Villa is scouted.

It is labeled as a blanket cover for the massing of Mexican troops close to Parral and near the railroad for a heavy move north toward General Pershing's southernmost base.

American scouts have located the retreat of Villa into country other than that near the Hacienda Memrera Information reaching here several days ago indicate that Villa, if still alive, was either at San Andres, or many scores of miles west of Parral and within reach of the Durango bor-

The suggestion of a conference beween Gen. Gabriel Gavira of Juarez and General Pershing is receiving marked attention here. It is pointed out that if a threatening Mexican move from the south were to be made against the Pershing column, under the guise of swarming Mexican troops after Villa into the Chihuahua country immediately below the punitive expedition lines, the absence of General Pershing from the front would prove an unusual advantage to his enemies.

Tentative arrangements were completed Sunday afternoon through columbus for the coming conference between General Gavira and General Pershing, Telegrams passed from Namiquipa and back, setting the time and place subject to chance at the will of General Pershing or General Gavira in the event of unforseen circumstances.

Advices during the early evening indicated that the suggested telegraphic conference would not prove accept-



UNIVERSITY SUMMER SCHOOL TO OFFER ADDED FEATURES.

County School Superintendents' Institute Will be Held July 24 to 28.

Austin, May 22 .- "There were 1,265 individual students registered in the university summer school last summer," said Dean W. S. Sutton this morning, "and we have no reason to expect a less number coming this summer. Austin has always appealed to a large number of students desiring summer work on account of the splendid facilities offered by the university, and the general attractiveness of the surroundings."

A feature of the summer school this session will be the county superintendents' institute which is being organized by Statae Superintendent of Public Instruction, W. F. Doughty. The date of the beginning of this institute has been set for July 24, and to increase the effectiveness of county superintendents in handling the many problems that confront them in the administration especially of the rural schools. J. C. Muerman, a specialist in rural education from the United Ssates bureau of education will deliver illustrated lectures to the institute in the evenings, and J. L. McBrien, school extension agent for the same bureau will lecture in the day sessions. These two men of national reputation will, according to Dean Sutton and Superintendent Doughty, have a message well worth while for the county



J. J. HILL IS DEAD.

St. Paul, Minn., May 29.-James J. Hill, railroad builder, capitalist and west, died at his Summit avenue resi-

basket of the world" in the great northwest; he led in its development from a wilderness into what now comprises six wealthy states dotted with 400,000 farms; and he blazed the trail for transportation which reached eventually from Buffalo to Asia, with a total mileage of rail and steamship

Near Guelph, in Ontario, where June 5th. James J. Hill was born in 1838, the son of an Irish-Canadian farmer who died when the boy was 15, there stands a tree stump labeled: "The last tree chopped by James J. Hill."

It marked the lad's resolution to go to the United States. He had been prompted by an odd incident. According to the story that is told, a strange traveler had stopped at the Hill farm to take dinner, and left his horse at the gate. Young Hill saw the animal was tired and he carried it a pail of water. The stranger was pleased with the lad's thoughtfulness, and as he drove off he tossed him a newspaper from the United States, and called out gravely:

"Go there, young man. That country needs youngsters of your spirit." Hill read the paper carefully. It contained glowing accounts of oppor-
