



The last year in which seven eclipses came was early in the last century, and the next will be in 1935.

On January 8th there will be a total eclipse of the moon by the earth's shadow, visible throughout the United States, beginning at 12:50 a. m. and ending at 4:39 a.m., eastern standard time. Beginning 2 and 3:29 a.m. eastern time, the eclipse will be total.


