POULTRY DEPARTMENT

By J. W. Burkhardt

In every hatch of young chicks there are always a few individuals that grow off and leave the others. These should be carefully marked and saved for breeders another year. Early maturity is one of the desirable characteristics to work for in every flock and the quickest way to secure it—the only way in fact—is to breed from the early maturing birds. The old-time gardener never failed to pull the earliest roasting ears in order to beat his neighbor having a mess of new corn, when these early ears should have been prized as seed for the next season. If all poultrymen would regularly adhere to the practice of breeding only from the early maturing birds it would mean a great saving in feed bills and two pound chickens in 8 weeks would come to be the rule rather than the exception.

Good quality chicken feed is now quoted in Dallas at \$4.75 to \$5.00 per hundred f. o. b. The end does not yet appear. But enough of this soaring in price appears to justify us in making a few conclusions. First, one cannot pay 5c per pound for feed and sell eggs for 25c per dozen without going in debt for his feed. Therefore it is the part of common sense to retain only enough hens to eat your waste feed. If these do not furnish you with eggs, buy them, they are cheaper than feed. Again, as there is little prospect at present of feed declining in price through another year it is incumbent upon every one who can, to raise his chicken feed this season. It is preposterous for us to be shipping our feed 250 miles and then ship our eggs and chickens right back over the same road. Forced to pay freight both ways we are yet made to compete with producers who pay no freight. It is not difficult to see our handicap under such conditions.

Again, with grains of all kinds as high as they are, we must utilize whatever cheap feed is about us. Unquestionably, at the forefront of these is water. Many flocks of hens would immediately show a decided increase in egg production if supplied with an abundance of fresh water at all times. Too much emphasis cannot be placed here. It is safe to say that not more than one flock of chickens in ten, the country over, is receiving an adequate water supply. The matter of drinking vessels is important. For chicks up to one month old, perhaps the most satisfactory device is the small fountain made to screw on glass fruit jars. These keep the chicks out of the water, are cleanly, and quite easily washed. They should be cleaned daily and filled at least twice daily, more often if needed. For larger chicks and even adult fowls, take a small box such as canned fruits are shipped in, set on end with open side to the north in summer and to the south in winter; set in this box a pan with capacity of two to six quarts of water; now nail a slat four or five inches wide across the box just above the pan, leaving only enough room to admit the fowl's head nicely. You will find this keeps the water relatively cool in summer, warm in winter and prevents the birds from getting dirt in the vessel. This vessel should be thoroughly rinsed each morning and refilled. On hot days the birds will greatly appreciate fresh water at the noon hour.

One of the common forms of spreading disease is through the drinking water. All vessels should be scalded at least once a week. After the family wash is finished, gather up the drinking vessels and put them in the boiling suds and let them boil a few minutes. This will kill any lurking germs and sweeten the vessels for fresh water. It is needless to say that all sick fowls should be quarantined as soon as noticed to prevent contamination of drinking water and wash boxes.

At the institute last Saturday it was demonstrated that our farmers are interested in poultry. Many questions were asked and the discussions were interesting and lively. Let some of your questions come through this column and thus share the benefit with a larger circle of interested friends.

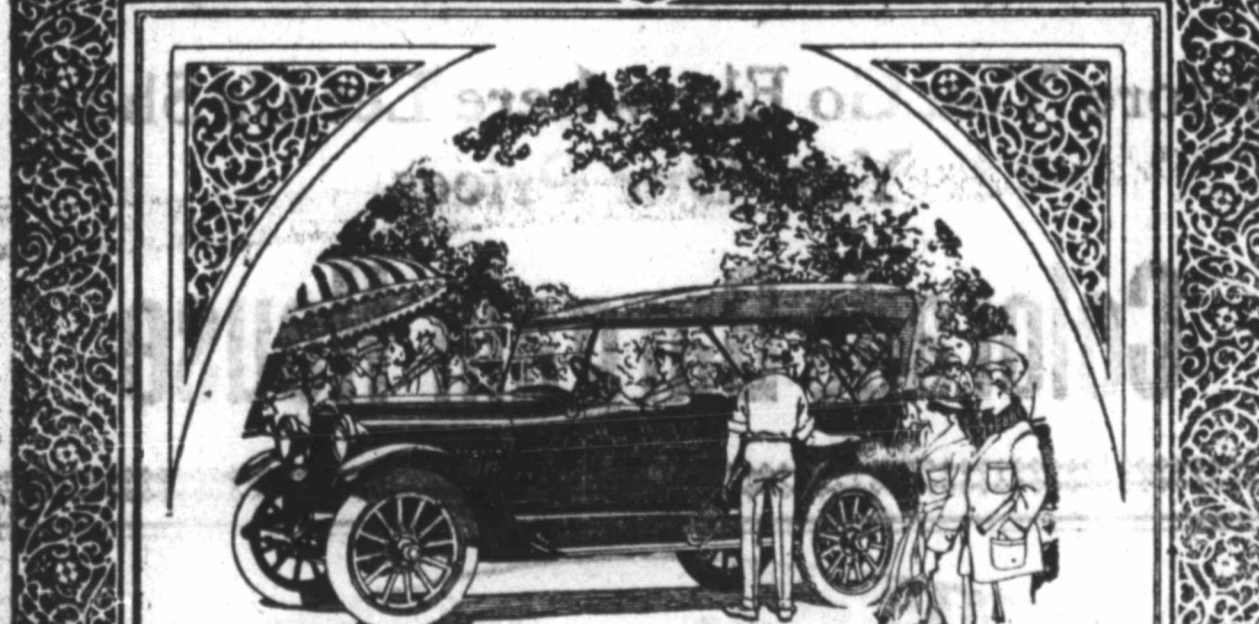

T. R. SAYS HE IS "DEE-LIGHTED"

Oyster Bay, N. Y. May 12.—Theodore Roosevelt made no secret tonight of his delight at the action of the House, but he refused to discuss at length his plan for putting a military force in the field until his authorization to do so becomes official.

"I am deeply grateful at what the House has done," Col. Roosevelt said. "I feel they have taken a step which is eminently wise and patriotic toward enabling us to utilize an element in the country we would not otherwise use at all. KEEP BUSINESS GOING FOR COUNTRY'S SAKE

Our Country prosperous can pay our war costs, as they come, and have enough left over to aid our Allies.

Our country unprosperous, with thru fear or false economy, will be hard pressed to keep food on the table and clothing on the back.

Keep Business Going is a patriotic slogan. Keep money in circulation. Keep employment for everybody. Keep wages good. Keep on making money that we may have money to spend for war sacrifices.

The worst thing that could happen to the world these days would be a business depression in our United States.

War in itself does not cause business depression.

The billions of dollars of money to be expended in war preparations will put into circulation in our own country, and this in itself will create new wealth for use in the world-struggle for humanity.

The one thing that might halt business now is an unpatriotic psychological feeling of panic and a false idea of patriotic economy.

Patriotic economy means the elimination of waste and extravagance. It means the conservation of our food products, our natural wealth, our health, our energies, our labor, our very lives. It means putting more efficiency in everything we do so that each unit of money, energy and intelligence may accomplish the utmost. It does not mean the lowering of America's standard of living, which would make us less efficient physically and mentally and individually and would kill the spirit and the will to do the truly self-sacrificing things to be done.

Cities and communities must go on with their civic improvements. Road building and public works must proceed. Railroads must renew their equipment. Factories must be kept going to their full capacity. Labor must be employed. Homes must be kept up. Merchandise must be produced, distributed and used.

War duties and war expenditures must be in addition to peace duties and peace expenditures. The more we do the more we can do. The more money we spend the more we will have in our pockets to spend. Money creates money.

In a word: The natural sane life of the country must proceed as though we were not at war, in order that we may have the necessary prosperity to promote the war to a quick and successful conclusion.

President Wilson sounds the keynote in this sentence: "It is evident to every thinking man that our industries, on the farm, in the shipyards, in the mines, in the factories, must be made more prolific and more efficient."

Our industries can be made prolific only if the people buy and use the merchandise produced by our industries. Manufacturing slackens when business slackens. Manufacturing grows in a prolific way when business grows. And business can grow and remain healthful only when the people buy and keep money in circulation.

Business is going—in the East, the West, the North, the South. The country is prosperous. Last month's increase in business was very large. Banks may wait in their operations until the government bonds are assimilated. People may pause temporarily in their outfitting to arrange to meet the new conditions. But the unloosing of billions of dollars will unloose a flow of prosperity absolutely necessary to sustain the world's burden.

Governments set the pace in their expenditures. Individuals must not lag behind. Seven billions of dollars to pay is only \$70 per capita in the United States. Yet seven billion dollars, put into work at 6 per cent—a fair estimate of the producing power of money—will create 420 millions of new wealth.

The income tax we pay will not be a tax on prosperity. Every dollar the individual pays out will come back to him with interest in the general prosperity of the people.

Keep business going—for our country's sake. War cannot be waged and won without the sinews of war.

To President Wilson, Washington, D. C.

Dear Sir:—We, as a religious body, of people known as the Church of Christ, honor and respect the flag of our country and are truly thankful for the liberty we have had under it in being permitted to worship God in the way we believe to be right, but we would respectfully represent to you that we cannot conscientiously take up arms to kill our fellow man without violating the most sacred tenets of our holy religion.

The New Testament contains our creed and rules of discipline. The Great Teacher says, "All things whatsoever ye would that men should do to you, do ye even so to them." "But I say unto you, love your enemies, bless them that curse you, do good to them that hate you, and pray for them which despitefully use you, and persecute you; that ye may be the children of your Father which is in heaven." Again, the Great Apostle to the Gentiles admonishes, "Dearly beloved, avenge not yourselves, but rather give place unto wrath: for it is written, vengeance is mine; I will repay, saith the Lord. Therefore if thine enemy hunger, feed him; if he thirst, give him drink: for in so doing thou shalt heap coals of fire on his head. Be not overcome of evil, but overcome evil with good." While we are commanded to "fight the good fight of faith," we are expressly told that "the weapons of our warfare are not carnal."

To these principles taught by Christ and His apostles, we are heartily committed. Taking our Saviour as an example, who though having the power to destroy his enemies, harmed them not, we strive to do good unto all men. We, therefore, most earnestly petition and pray that every member of the Church of Christ at Colorado, Texas, be exempted from compulsory military service in the army or navy of the United States and that we be permitted to continue to worship God in the way that we believe to be right.

OUR SOLDIERS TO FRANCE

There can be no doubt that the French desire for an American expedition to France has a strong appeal to American common sense, for the effect of an American fighting force in France would be inspiring to the other soldiers.

Mr. Roosevelt wants to raise a division for service over the seas and wants this division to be made up of men who would not see service under the provisions of the selective draft. If an American army goes to France it should be a real American army, disciplined, equipped and ready to the last eyelash. Mr. Roosevelt's plan is not practical and should not be considered.

But we could fill up the ranks of our regular army, or that part of it to be sent to France, with high class recruits, who would enlist quickly if they knew they were soon to be in the thick of the war, and get a division or two ready for service within a few weeks. With intensive training high class recruits sprinkled not too freely among highly trained soldiers, can be made into soldiers in three months. If we sent an expedition to France it would be necessary to add new increments steadily.

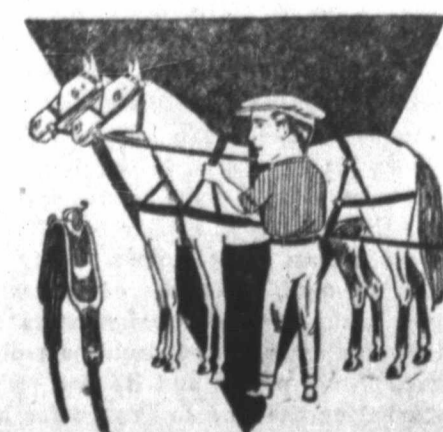
