Have you had your fishing trip this summer? Better take it now while there is a little water remaining within a day's ride of Colorado.

Picnics? Shure, man; there ain't any nigs to pic in West Texas this dry year. It certainly would have been a hard year for office hunting.

Attorney General Looney will be in the race for Governor in 1918. There'll be about one dozen of them. We are waiting for Dr. Brooks to shy his castor into the ring.

Some owners of motor vehicles are of the opinion that if the car is not used, no tax will be collected. This is a mistake. Ownership or control of such vehicle constitutes liability to the tax, whether the car is run a minute or not. Storing your car in a garage will not dodge the tax.

A trip over the country south of town, particularly over the flat lands, will reveal the most disastrous effect of the past two years' drouth. There is not a green thing in sight, except the mesquite leaves, and even they are turning a sickly yellow. Yes, indeed neighbors, it has been dry—mighty dry.

The people over the county are selling their chickens solely for lack of something on which to feed them. With an absence of all kinds of green stuff and depending only on feed purchased from the grain dealers, the upkeep of a flock of chickens or turkeys becomes a matter of no small expense, and a hen must be a good and regular layer to justify her keep; while the roosters are a sheer burden.

The few detonations of thunder that reverberated to the south of town Monday afternoon, revived hope in the possibilities of actual rain. There has been less thunder the past year than the oldest and most recollecting old timer can recall. We haven't much confidence in rain without the concomitant of plenty of thunder and lightning—the kind that splits the firmament asunder and shakes the windows when the vacuum is filled—the real "blitzdonnerwetter."

No one, who is at all conversant with the moods and vagaries of West Texas, doubts for a moment but that the country will come back as strong and abundantly as it ever did, but that does not save the present conditions from being pinching and distressingly dry. Still, there are some farmers, who have kept busy stirring the soil and doing their full share toward making the best of a discouraging condition. With any kind of rainfall, this class of farmers will have something as a reward for their labors and perseverance.

The Record hopes to be moved under its own roof by the first of August, if no hitch occurs in present plans and nothing goes awry. Mov-

ing a printing office the size of the Record, is a man-size job in itself. Only part of the machinery can be taken down and moved one week, and finished the next week. It's a big job, but when the paper is settled in its own permanent home and crop conditions resume their wanted prosperous aspect, the Record will be found just a few jumps ahead in the procession of prosperity. In the meantime, drop in and tell us the news in your neck of the woods.

AMERICA MUST WIN THIS WAR.

If peace should be effected today and the status quo re-established, Germany would be the victor, in that she holds much of the enemy country, and would be in position to dictate largely the terms of the cessation of hostilities. This would mean that Germany would be the only First Class Power in the world, and the United States, England, France, and Russia, would occupy secondary positions of importance. It would likewise leave Germany in position to dictate and enforce any policy she might favor after the war. The man power of both England and France has been reduced to the point that it can only hope to hold Germany at bay. Germany has suffered just as greatly until the war now has come to a practical standoff between the nations. Neither can, of themselves, expect to achieve a decisive victory.

It is clearly up to the United States to win the war, if won at all, for the Allies. There is no hope outside this nation. And unless the United States gains a decided victory over Germany the war will be brought to our own side of the Atlantic soon enough. America must win this war for the Allies as well as in protection of itself. England and France have been largely exhausted. The steadfastness of Russia is problematical as yet. If she stays aggressively in the fight, the task will be easier and shorter. The developments of the next few months will largely determine the issue.

Mayor Lawther of Dallas, expresses a very sensible view against any local option campaign at this time for Dallas. The exigencies of war have brought about a victory for prohibition that its most ardent advocates dared not hope for one year ago. A wonderful advance step has been taken by the nation and the serpent has been scotched if not wholly killed. There was a temptation to go too far at one step—to enact a measure so suddenly drastic that its ends were endangered. President Wilson clearly saw this danger and succeeded in steering congress clear of it. It is hardly the part of wisdom to stir up strife over a matter that the federal government, after so many years, has now laid its hand to. All indications point to the suppression of the liquor traffic by the national government, at one fell blow. There is no need of nibbling and trimming around the edges. Issues of more pressing importance, and with which prohibition is more or less involved, are demanding the best thought and efforts of our people. To inject purely local prohibition issues just now, might tend to weaken public enthusiasm in the more vital matters. This war is the greatest opportunity the world ever had of showing up old John Barleycorn as the greatest slacker of them all, and when Uncle Sam fully realizes this he will treat the old sot just as he treats deserters, traitors and cowards. After the government has tried out the various features of the food control bill, and found its restrictions as to liquor salutary, it may go a step further and give the nation absolute freedom from the manufacture and sale of all intoxicants. An encouraging start has been made.

Citizens of the county who have had occasion to visit other sections of West and Southern Texas, say we are not alone in the grip of the drouth. With the exception of the strip of country from Abilene north to Chillicothe and eastward to Wichita Falls, practically the whole domain of West Texas is suffering. The northern four or five tiers of counties from the Arkansas state line to the 100 meridian of longitude, seem to be the only section of the state blessed with good and varied crops. The Panhandle has done fairly well on grain crops, but that section is nothing like up to its usual crop yield.

At the beginning of the war German spies lurked everywhere in England and France. They are being discovered in every nook in the United States just now, but they will be gradually weeded out just as they have been in England and France. A two-year old calf can not be made in one minute, any more than a nation can thoroughly prepare itself for

war within a few weeks. Its a big job and req' res time and money to accomplish. But your Uncle Samuel will do the job thoroughly before he gets done with it. He may be a trifle cautious as well as patient; but when he sees his duty, he performs it in a workmanlike manner.

A HELPFUL SHOWER OF RAIN

After much bluster, lightening and some thunder, rain began to fall Wednesday morning, about 3 o'clock. It came down slowly, continuing for some time, giving the impression that more rain was falling than really fell. The government gauge recorded a precipitation of .65 of an inch. The indications were that a heavier fall occurred to the north of us. Reports of rain the day before came from that section.

In as much as weather conditions are by no means settled, we have not abandoned hope that the long expected ample rain will come before the final clearing up. What we did receive did good, as any amount of rainfall will now do. It cooled the atmosphere, washed off the face of Nature and helped the grass, which is making a brave struggle to simply keep alive.

The fact that alfalfa hay, half of which is alleged to be inedible weeds, is selling in the local market for \$1.25 the bale of about 70 to 75 pounds, is some evidence of the scarcity and high price of feed stuff for cattle. But a very short time ago, the growers of this same hay thought themselves fortunate if they received the price of 75c per bale. If it costs any more today to produce that same bale of hay than it did five years ago, the producer has not published the cause of his increased expense. It may be that the increased price of alfalfa hay is explainable on the same ground that the consumers of flour in Texas pay at the rate of \$15.00 the barrel for flour for which the English consumer is charged only \$8.50. The reason lies in the fact that the American speculator reaps the difference. This extortion is the very thing the government is trying to prevent by the food control bill now before congress.

As a confirmed landlubber we can not understand just how and to what extent, blame can be attached to the military arm of England for the recent raids by airships from Germany. Its only a short distance across the English channel from Belgium occupied by Germany to England and London. How any department of the military service of England could provide against a flight of airplanes from the Belgian coast across the channel and over London, is more than we can comprehend. Given a rate of speed of 100 miles the hour, it would be no feat for one of the largest German airplanes to leave the coast of Belgium, fly over London several times and return to its base by the average breakfast hour in that country. But everything that happens these days must be rigidly investigated by the government. In our humble opinion, if the time wasted in "investigations" were applied to preventive measures, much trouble would be saved, as well as life and property.

A good feed crop in Mitchell county would go a long way toward the prosperity of next year.

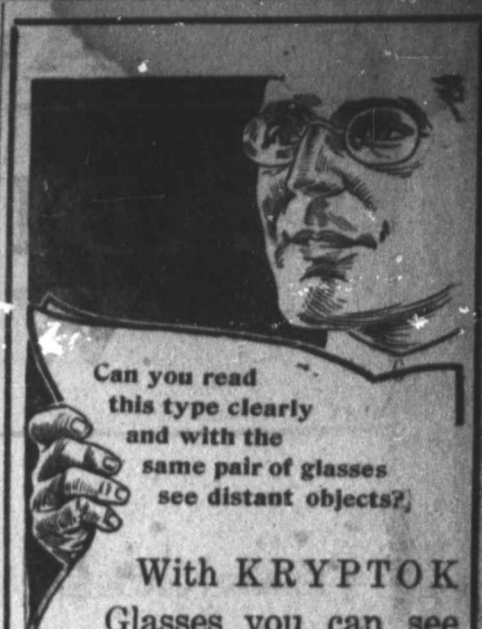

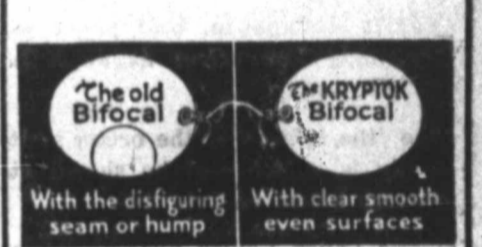
