BILL TO AMEND ELECTION LAW IS TO BE OFFERED

F HOBBY SUBMITS MATTER BILL AIMED AT JAMES E. FERGUSON WILL COME UP

WOMAN SUFFRAGE NEXT

Statutory Prohibition Bill and Other Pending Matters Expected to Be Passed By Tuesday.

Austin, March 11 .- By next Tuesday the legislature will not only have carried out the entire war measure but will also have disposed of the statutory prohibition bill, consequently the bulk of next week is to be devoted to other measures which have been submitted for consideration and others to be presented by the governor.

It is practically certain now the free conference committee on the ten mile zone bill will decide on April 15 as the date on which this act shall become effective and the house will agree to the extension rather than endanger the measure.

The plan in the senate is to take up and pass on Monday the statutory prohibition bill with probably an amendment submitted by the druggists of the state which will permit them to use alcohol. After disposing of this bill the senate is expected to take up certain of the recommendations made by the governor, probably the bill providing for the creation of ing voting in primary elections only and sold \$30,000 worth of these

Austin, March 11 .- The bill proiding for creation of ten-mile prohibition zones around camps of military instructions was finally disposed of by both houses today when the date on which it will become effective was fixed at April 15. The bill now goes to the governor for his signa-

The zone bill includes cities having shipbuilding plants working on government contracts.

The senate committee on criminal jurisprudence reported out favorably the house statutory prohibition bill.

The senate bill prohibiting the licensing of liquor dealers except in incorporated cities or villages designed to prevent the opening of saloons outside the ten mile zone was finally passed by the house today.



What the West Texas farmer needs for waiting a few weeks longer. is rain. The seed, feed, merchant and bank situation is practically all taken care of. What we need now is rain. That Sabotage deal down at Austin is kind of aid and if we did even the Jack Rabbitts in the West would all be starved to death before all the red tape was unwound at Austin.

The hardest task imposed upon merchants and bankers of Texas is in the well grounded fear that they may not be able to put reasonable limitations upon the number of acres that the Texas farmer shall plant to cotton. If cotton were selling at sacrificial prices it would be easy, or comparatively easy, notwithstanding our old-time faith in cotton, which is more than ever in our day the uncrowned king of the South, to produce that staple to the capacity of the farm or at least to the neglect of other crops now more essential. And yet, by concert of effort between merchant, banker and farmer, in which it shall be pointed out in positive terms not alone the money value of feed crops but the imperative necessity under which the nation labors now to produce them, we have no doubt but that the propaganda of setting every possible acre on Texas farms, as well as throughout the South, to feed crops will win emphatically. If this propaganda does win, as we believe it will since thoughtful men are addressing their best thoughts and energies to its unequivocal support, the South, as well as the farmer everywhere, will come out of this war with the wisest lesson, as well as the most profitable, For all his wealth has passed away. that has ever been taught them, for Oh, Scurry land, sweet Scurry land, diversification is the magic key with which to unlock the treasures of the farm.


