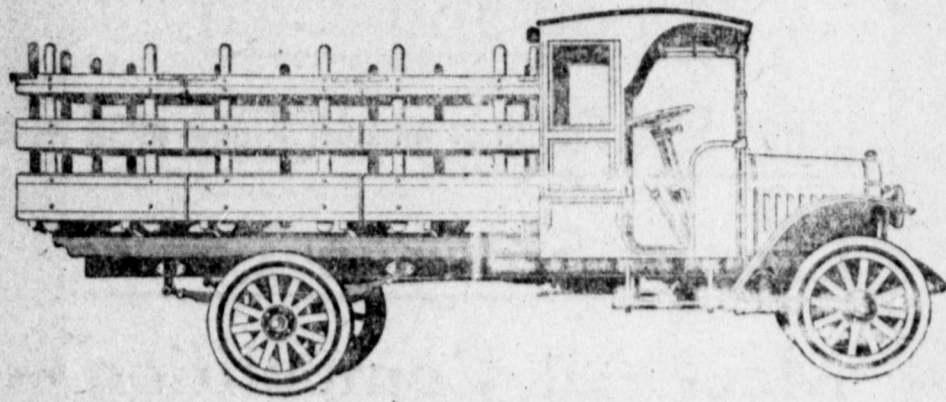

CAMP ITEMS OF PUBLIC INTEREST AND PERSONAL ITEMS ABOUT THE BOYS.

For the benefit of those who have relatives and friends in Camp Travis and who would be glad to hear from them, I will try to give an idea as to how they are getting along and how they enjoy being in the service of Uncle Sam.

Corporal R. H. Bennett has just gotten out of bed after a little mix-up with the mumps. He enjoyed having them because he did not have to drill and had a chance to catch up with his sleep.

First Class Private John W. McGuire has all the other boys backed off the map when it comes to luck. Mac has his wife here with him and can eat home baked biscuits once in a while.

The boys here hope that all the farmers will have a bumper crop this year because we figure on eating with most of them when we get out of the Army.

How does it feel to be picked up out of a grocery store or a bank cashier's cage and be dropped into an army camp as a soldier? What is the spirit of the selective draft men, recently arrived at Camp Travis?

"One good thing is we have everything sanitary. No uncleanness allowed and we are well fed; have pies nearly every day. Tell all the boys not to worry. It may be hard for a few days but gets better as we become accustomed to the change.

"Army life seems to agree with the men, and from a physical standpoint, it is wonderful. The boys are all satisfied which is due largely to an efficient staff of officers, and few if any would return to civil life now were the opportunity offered."

"Everything is in the line with the Government's policy of giving the soldier the advantages offered by clean competitive sport which develop individual initiative as well as offering a diversion."

"Army life at Camp Travis is not what most of the people at home think it is. We are treated the very best. The Y. M. C. A. furnishes the boys with good music, good picture shows church and other pleasures that are possible. We have plenty to eat and a good bed to sleep in, also plenty of clothing to wear. Our barracks are electrically lighted. There are plenty of stoves and lots of coal to make heat."

"We send our greetings to the folks at home and ask them not to worry. For our greatest worry is thinking that the home folks are bothered, when the fact of the matter is that we are having a better time than they can imagine."

"If any individual had a privilege for which to be thankful for your brother, husband or sweetheart has, if they are connected with the National Army and you are at home should be thankful that your family is represented in this gigantic task, the upbuilding of humanity."

"Let them write to their boys cheerful, hopeful letters, not letters filled with gloom. The boys here are a brave lot and it is for their friends in America to keep them so."

Don't make the boys homesick. Don't make them unhappy in the idea that you are unhappy. Be brave and bear it, if your feelings are such but don't jeopardize your own men's lives by lowering their moral.

If you have any books in your home libraries that are not being used, send them to the soldier boys. There is a need of books, thousands of them, to fill the demand of the boys in the service for something to read.

The American Library Association is making a campaign to secure books for the soldiers at Camp Travis and elsewhere. Books may be turned in to the library in your town or city.

DRAFT CALL OF 95,000 TO BE GIVEN ON MARCH 29TH

Washington, March 12.—Provost Marshal General Crowder today ordered the movement of 95,000 drafted men to begin March 29 and continue five days.

Men remaining from the first draft and those liable on the second draft will make up the personnel of the 95,000.

Just how many in the second draft are affected is not stated. It is understood the movement will virtually complete the first draft and it is a part of the plan to call registrants in small groups as fast as they can be accommodated.

The number Texas will furnish in this call is 3,943.

SECOND DRAFT WILL COMPRISE 800,000 MEN

Washington, March 12.—General Crowder in a statement today said that 800,000 men will comprise the second draft.

However, he said, no such large number would be called at any one time.

The second draft will be called just to compute the basis of apportionment among the states on the number of registrants in class one instead of on population.

Men in deferred classifications, the provost marshal announced, would be called in small numbers as well as men in class one for the purpose of changing special technical qualifications or sending them to schools to acquire special training.

W. G. CLARK MAKES BOND; STILL HELD

Although his bond was approved Friday in the case against him in Abilene charging injury of a railroad track, W. G. Clark, the state's star witness against Felix R. Jones in the latter's trial at El Paso, was still being held Saturday by the local sheriff on advices from the sheriff of Cottle county, who wired Sheriff Dodson that he held alias capias for murder against Clark.

JONES WITNESS INDICTED

El Paso, March 16.—Minor Goode, who was a witness for the defense during the Felix Jones trial, was indicted by the grand jury here. The testimony given by him at this trial is alleged to figure in the present charge against him.

ABILENE SELLS \$200,000 WORTH OF WATER BONDS.

CHICAGO FIRM BUYS MAJOR PORTION OF BOND ISSUE AT 95c ON THE DOLLAR

WORK TO START JUNE 1

Sale of \$200,000 of the \$230,000 Elm Creek water bond issue has been consummated and actual construction work on the big dam is expected to start not later than June 1 and possibly sooner.

The bonds were sold through the Citizens National and Farmers & Merchants National Banks of Abilene. The purchasers were Halsey, Stuart & Company of Chicago. Sanders R. Fuller of Austin, who personally represented the purchaser, stated Thursday that Abilene was fortunate in selling the bonds at the rate they were sold—95 cents on the dollar. This was the highest bid received, and considering conditions in the bond and money market is regarded as an excellent figure, much above the average offers being made for bonds in similar cases.

FARMERS BORROW OVER \$50,000,000 FROM FARM LOAN BANK

During the month of January \$11,787,517 were paid out to farmers of the United States by the Federal land banks on long-time first-mortgage loans, according to a statement by the Federal Farm Loan Board.

On February 1 the total amount of money paid out to farmers since the establishment of the Federal land banks was \$50,782,432, covering 24,020 loans closed. The total amount of loans applied for up to February 1 was \$200,556,981, representing 112,146 applications.

The gift places the University of Texas among the world's great libraries of English literature.

AN ORDINANCE

An Ordinance to amend an Ordinance passed and approved on the 17 day of June, A. D. 1913. Regulating the use of and fixing the price of City Water, and recorded in Vol. 1, Pages No's. 242-243-244 and 245 of the minutes of the City Council of the City of Colorado, Texas.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Colorado, Texas. That, that part of Section No. 11 of said ordinance fixing the prices and regulating the use of water shall be amended so as to read as follows: The City shall charge (\$2.00) two dollars per month payable at the water office of the City. This charge based upon a Maximum consumption of (3000) three thousand gallons meter reading per month, this shall be the regular charge of the City for water.

Meter Rates, shall be as follows: Minimum amount to (3000) three thousand gallons (\$2.00) two dollars. Excess above (3000) three thousand gallons (25c) twenty-five cents per (1000) thousand gallons.

All service may be meter service at the option of the City. All water rent shall be paid monthly at the office of the City Secretary before the 5th day of the month and if for any cause default is made in payment of same, after the 5th day of the month the water will be turned off without notice, and until all amounts due the City with an additional penalty of (\$1.00) one dollar shall be paid before the water is turned on again.
