Near Bullecourt was a formidable underground fortification known as the "Tunnel Trench," which the Germans believed to be impregnable. This tunnel connecting the trenches was more than a mile long and was mined for its whole length, lighted with electricity and had entrances at short intervals. It was reinforced by concrete pill-boxes and support trenches. The British captured it in November, 1917.

Over \$100,000 has been freely given by the people of East and Central Texas for this relief. The Texas bankers created a and reluctant feet. Now it is well known to the people who are living in this section, and should be known to the governor, state officals, and bankers of Texas, that when a man has stayed with the stuff for three years, and is in fact a drouth sufferer, he has absolutely no collateral to put up on which to borrow money. The people of this community or of the West do not ask charity, but neither can they put up security on which to borrow money. The only solution that the Record can see for the help of these people is for the county boards of national defense to loan this money to deserving and needy people, taking their personal note, WITHOUT SECURITY. In many instances this is not sufficient, as the worker has to pay his own expenses, and the remainder of his wage is not sufficient to support the family, should it be a large one. Other instances where the family could move to other parts, and get work or rent land, but have not the money to move on. If such an one

could be furnished money enough to put them down at their place of destination with a month's supplies, they could work out their own future and nine out of ten would pay back the

money loaned them.

Of course this bankers' fund could fund that has been donated, was given freely and with the purpose of helping the ones that have no collateral, otherwise it will absolutely fail to accomplish the very purpose for which it was contributed.

Let us loan this money to the needy without interest and without security, leaving it up to their honest conscience about paying it back. And paper should be proud. HERE could be no more appropriate date for President Wilson to set as Liberty Day than October 12th, the 426th anniversary of Columbus' discovery of the New World. The Genoese navigator in that undertaking accomplished for

liberty more than he could have dreamed. The word was scarcely understod in his day. He took possession of his discoveries, their vastness quite unguessed, in the name of monarchs who at that very time were seting an example of ruthless tyranny in forced deportations hardly matched until German Kultur in our own day bettered all precedents of ruthlessness.

It was the fact that the new discoveries were big that made them the hope of freedom. Men could lose themselves in the virgin territories and set up new forms of government with all the advantages of the material development and invention of the Old World. The great example is our own Republic. But it is almost a hundred years since the heavy hand of Spain was lifted from the Continent proper. It is more than fifty since, in the same year, 1867, Canada became a free, federated nation and Mexico was delivered from the fantastic dreamer, Maximillian.

The exact date of Columbus' landing is caomuflaged by the Gregorian Calendar, since adopted. This gives us a chance to put in a few preliminary days, to make sure. But let October 12th be Liberty Day with a long, strong pull on the Loan that shall carry cheer to our troops in France and dismay to despotism in its most evil manifestation.





HOW PRICES ON 1000 STUFFS ARE STABILIZED IN TEXAS



What is a Federal Price Reporter? A man or woman appointed by Ad ministrator Peden to check prices as charged by retail merchants for li ensed commodities of foodstuffs.

What is their duty? To check the stores in their respec ive communities not less than once week on forms sent out by the Price Section of the Federal Food Adminis ration for Texas.

How many are there in Texas? The list for August shows 300 names but it is growing daily. Appointments are based on population and the plan is to have one reporter for each town of 1500 or over; two for each town of 5000 or over; three for each town of 7500 or over; four for each town of 10,000 or over; and so on adding one Price Reporter for each 2500 addition al population.

How are the Price Report blanks Every retail store should be covered by the Price Reporters at least once week, and as near a check made upor the reports are received by the Price Section at State headquarters for the Federal Food Administration for Tex as, the lists are checked against the Price Interpreting Committee fair price lists for the district in which they originate, and where there is evi dence of excess profits the County Administrator is notified of the name of the offender, the date of the of fense, and the person making the check. An adjustment is then up to the County Food Administrator.

How are the Price Reporters co-re ated with the Price Interpreting Committees?

Wherever possible the County Food Administrators should link the Price Reporting Committees with the Price Interpreting Committees. The two de partments should work in close har ing Committees, noting carefully th changes from week to week, and un derstanding the economic factors which enter into these changes. To not so UNDERSTAND is to miss com pletely the viewpoint and to render the work insufficient.

Are Price Reporters volunteers? Yes-just as the Food Administra tion is essentially a volunteer work There is no higher following today than that of Service to the Nation in one field or another, and men and wo men who are designated as Price Re porters should accept their appoint ments in the same spirit as the man entering the army under the Selective Draft reports for duty and remains "on the job" until the war is won

Is the Price Reporter put to any per sonal expense? No. He is supplied with all the nec essary forms and each week a supply of envelopes addressed to the Price Section is mailed out. The supply may be increased or diminished ac cording to the needs of the Price Re-

What has been the result of the work

of the Price Reporters in Texas? The result has been that the work of the Price Interpreting Committees in stabilizing prices on licensed food commodities has been sustained in a large degree and merchants who failed to observe the Fair Price Lists have come to understand that such failure will no longer be countenanced. Furthermore, the plan as working in Texas has been so effectual that it is fast spreading to other States.

NO RE-SALE OF EGGS WITHIN THE TRADE

The United States Food Administra tion recognizes the following classes of dealers in fresh eggs: (1) Original packers and shippers. (2) Commission merchants and wholesalers. (3) Jobbers and suppliers of hotels and institutions. (4) Retailers. All trading in fresh eggs must contribute toward lar attendance. moving the eggs in a direct line to the buckle up their toes and they suffer consumer. Sales between dealers in any one of the classes mentioned are prohibited except as follows:

Sales between wholesalers in different ties will for the present be permitted where necessary to supply the reasonable requirements of the buyer's business provided there is an actual shipment of the goods, and provided the movemen between cities is in the direction of nor-mal crop movement from producer to con-sumer. In addition thereto not more than sumer. In addition trareto not more than two sales of any lot of fresh eggs between dealers in Class 2 may be made without obtaining the consent of the Local Federal Food Administrator if such sales are necessary to supply the reasonable requirements of the buyer's business, but more than two sales between dealers in Class?
