LETTER FROM FRANCE.

The following letter from Cullen Powell, a Mitchell county boy, who is in the supply train 117, 42nd Division, and left Colorado with a number of our boys who volunteered as truck drivers:

Longwy, France, 12-8-18.
Dear Parents:—This few lines leaves us well and feeling fine.

I understand that we can write anything we want to now.

We sure have been moving around since we left the States. We boys were counting up the different places we have moved our kitchen to, and we counted forty towns, and are still moving. The first place we arrived at in France last winter was Monigny, and believe me it sure was lonely.

A lot of us boys caught the mumps and some contracted pneumonia. I was in the hospital last Christmas with pneumonia, but don't think I'll go there this Christmas, for we are in better health.

I wish I could tell you all of our experiences in this letter, since we

have been over here but that would take a volume and much time.

We were at Chateau Thierry last August. The Rainbow Division had more men killed and wounded on that front, than any other front they have fought. The Red Cross got a detail of men out of the Supply Train to handle the wounded. They put fifteen thousand wounded men on a train a day. It sure was awful to see so many men suffering at one time. But thank God it is over with now.

We have been in several exciting places since coming over. We have been to the front with supplies, when the Huns would throw shells over our heads. We could hear them going through the air and you couldn't tell where they would land. The Germans would fly over every moonlight night and drop bombs. You sure ought to have seen us hunting the bombing cellars. I never did run any myself, but passed several who were running.

We drove through a small portion of Belgium. The first town was Virton. The Belgians sure did treat us nice while we were there. They had all of the buildings decorated with the allied flags, artificial flowers, and everything lit up.

You ought to see some of the teams the French people drive oxen and horses, also they work their milk cows. It seemed funny to us when we first got here, but we are getting used to it now. They sometimes work two cows and a horse, or two horses and one ox.

COLORADO PIONEER DEAD.

William Wilbur Marshall died at El Cajon, California, Dec. 23, 1918.

FARM LOAN ASSOCIATION

The annual meeting of the Farm Loan Association of Mitchell County was held at the office of the Secretary on Tuesday January 14. The Secretary reported that the membership is now 93 loans closed representing about \$200,000; loans pending for about \$15,000. The Federal Land Bank of Houston has a surplus of \$67,000 and will pay a dividend on stock held by members about February 1st. A resolution was passed asking the legislature to submit an amendment to the constitution making it possible for farmers to borrow on their homesteads.

but it was evident that we were very welcome.

I forgot to mention that all round the table were benches for seats, no chairs were in sight, there was hardly room for us to stand in the small standing space, so we slid into a bench and sat down at the table.

As you know I understand a little French, having studied it in S. C. College. Sgt. Rockford can talk it a little too. Added to that, the fact that they could speak a little English having learned it from the soldiers we got along nicely. They told us a great many things about the French customs, etc., and seemed as anxious to hear about the Americans. Soor though, one of the girls began to wipe wine glasses and set before us and took from the shelf suspended from the ceiling over the table, a pone of French bread, which was very good, and a cake of the best butter I nearly ever ate. She poured our glasses full of wine and the father proposed a toast to our good luck. Well, I knew it was a French custom and I did not know enough French to make them understand that I did not want to drink it, without just flatly refusing and they wouldn't understand my motive, so I drank it, and it proved to be only good, sweet grape juice. We kept talking and presently she began to fill our glasses again, so this time I turned my glass upside down and refused the second glass, even though it was only grape juice. They couldn't understand evidently the soldiers that have visited them have not been that temperate. They seemed to think I did not like the wine and were going to get another bottle, but I tried to tell them how fine it was, etc. They still could not understand, so finally Sgt. Rockford came to my rescue telling them that I was a priest. Well, we never could guess what happened. First they began to explain that the wine would not make me "zizz-zizz" that is what they say for getting drunk. But I refused the second glass, so then they wanted to confess to me. Think of it. They wanted me to hold a Catholic confessional. After that they called me "Monsieur Le Cure," which carries with it the meaning of a shepherd or pastor. I told them I was not a Catholic but a Baptist. They could not understand that either but I finally made them understand that I was a protestant. Then I had

to explain that in America, protestants do not confess to a priest, but to God. Anyway, finally, they let me off, for which I was very thankful. But I enjoyed the little visit and think I will visit them again if I have an opportunity.

When we started to leave one of the girls put on her wooden shoes and went with us to town. They slip felt house slippers inside the wooden shoes. She was carrying milk and butter to market, so we carried her produce for her and did not get to Brest till 11:30, but considered it a morning well spent.

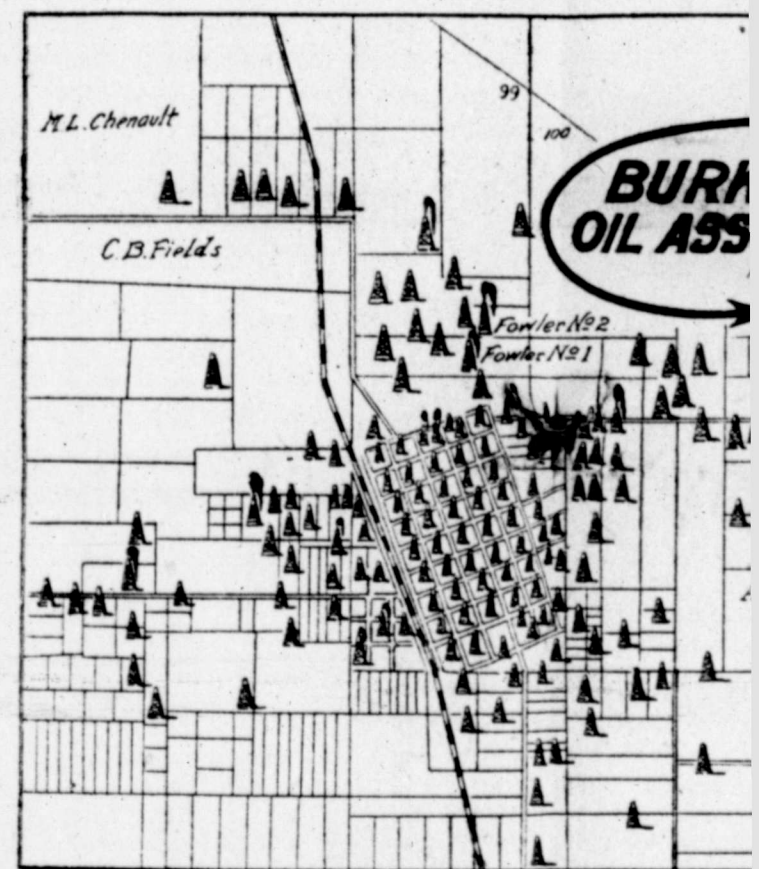

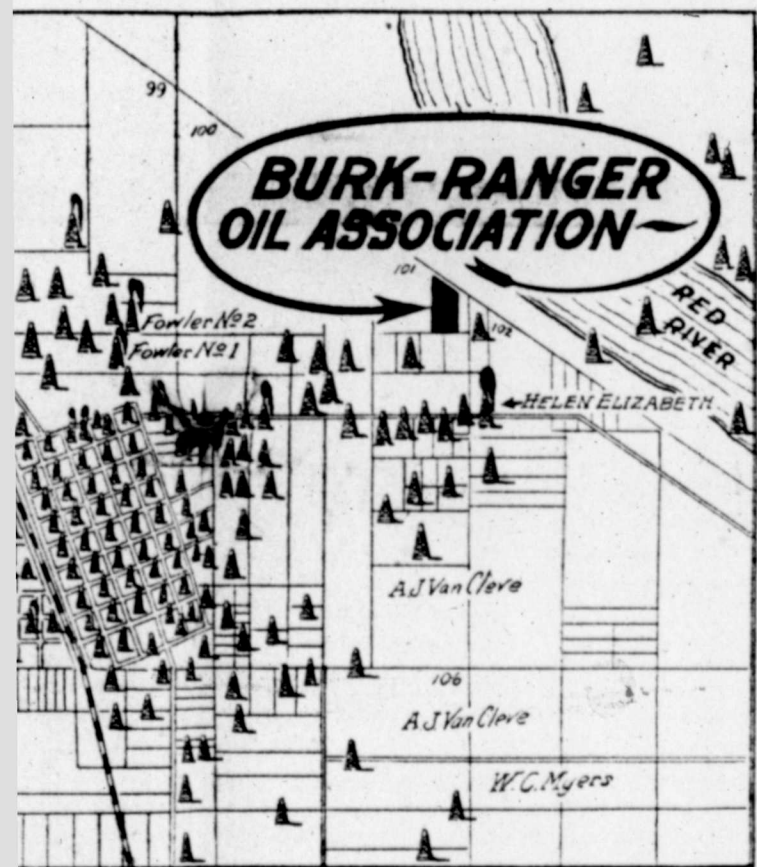

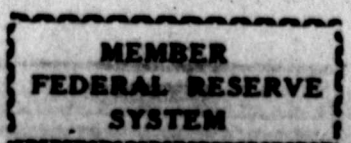

OLD LANDMARK DEMOLISHED.

The old frame building just north of the old Alamo Hotel, belonging to C. H. Lasky is being torn down and moved to his ranch to do further service as sheds, etc.

This was one of the first business houses erected in Colorado. It was built by Capt. Jeffress in 1881; and rented to Silas Nance for a grocery store. At that time Colorado had a ore mule street car line leading to East Colorado. Oak street at that time was the center of activities, but Mr. Nance was induced to move down on Second street, about where the Colorado Mercantile Co., is now and to buy a home in East Colorado so he could ride on the one mule street car. C. H. Lasky moved into the building in 1883 and did business there with his bakery and grocery store for twenty years. After Mr. Lasky bought the brick block and moved his store into it, he used the old building for a ware house and feed store. Mr. Nance is now penniless in the old soldier's home at San Antonio, while Mr. Lasky, to say the least, is fairly well fixed. Captain Jeffress says it is because Mr. Nance moved at the wrong time.

Mr. Lasky says he has baked enough bread in this old building to fill every house in Colorado today. It has stood doing service for 38 years and the lumber will yet serve its purposes on the ranch.

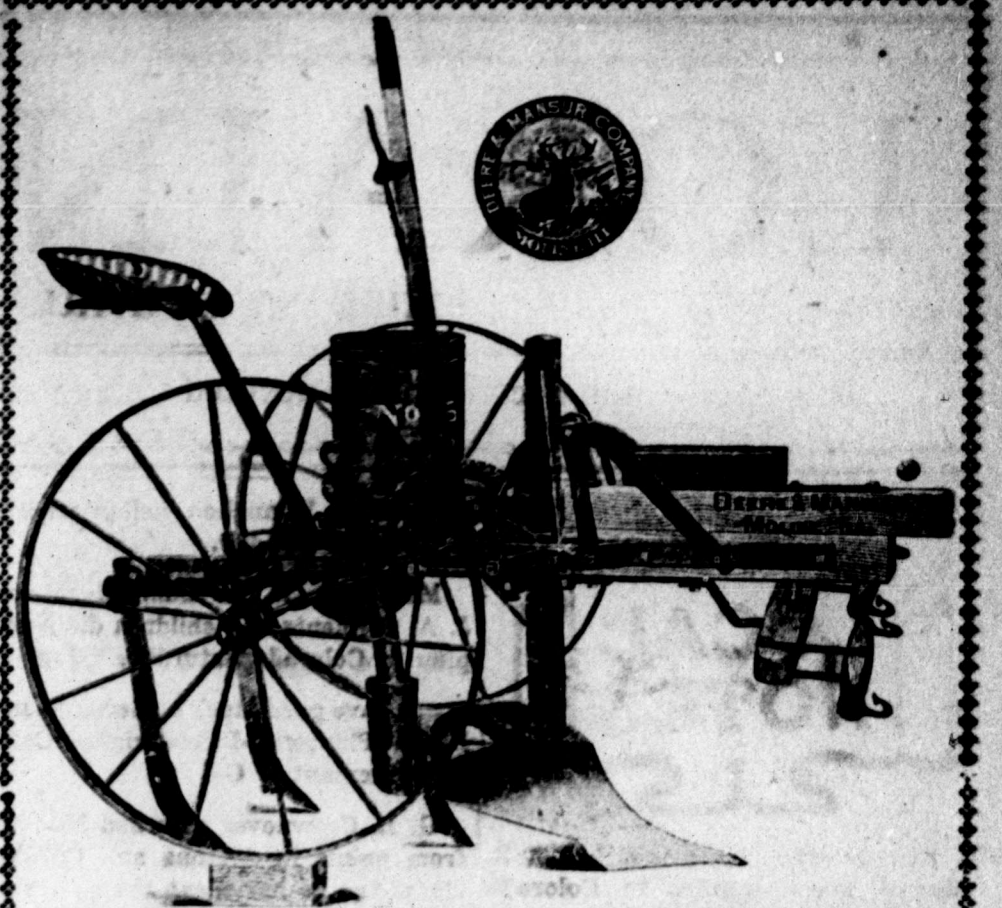
