Many Societies to Fight Alcohol Organized Early in Nation's History.

### **WOMEN ACTIVE AS LEADERS**

John B. Gough, Reformed Drunkard, First Crusader to Win Fame by Success at Home and Abroad.

When the movement which has now brought about prohibition began in the United States it was called the "temperance movement" and the phrase "temperance question" embraced all the problems in connection with the use and abuse of alcoholic drink. Temperance, of course, primarily means moderation, while prohibition, as used in this connection, means a form of sumptuary legislation abolishing the manufacture and sale of alcoholic liquors. In the early days "temperance" was loosely used; sometimes it meant noderation and sometimes total abstinence. Many of the first crusades were against "spirits"-distilled liquors as distinguished from wines and beer, ance campaigns in England. This temperance movement, which shows signs of bringing about prohibition in many parts of the world, began in the United States. The temperance pledge was in existence before 1800. Possibly the first temperance society was organized by the farmers of Litchfield county, Connecticut, in 1779. In 1808 a society was formed in Saratoga county, New York; the 43 members were pledged not to drink rum, gin, whisky, wine or distilled pirits except by a physician's advice, illness or at public dinners, under penalty of 25 cents.

The Massachusetts Society for the Suppression of Intemperance was organized in 1813. The American Temperance society was founded in 1829. Thereafter organizations of various kinds came thick and fast, many of them securing large memberships. Among them were the Sons of Temper ance of New York (1842), Order of Rechabites (1835), Society of the Washingtonians (1840) and Good Tem-

# \$60 BONUS FOR SOLDIERS

\$60.00 BONUS TO BE PAID TO SOLDIERS DISCHARGED SINCE APRIL 6, 15.7.

Section 1406 of the Revenue Act approved February 24, 1919, authorizes the payment of a bonus of \$60.00 to officers, soldiers, field clerks and nurses of the army upon honorable separation from active service by discharge, resignation or otherwise. This bonus is not payable to the heirs or representatives of any deceased soldier.

Those who are discharged hereafter will receive this bonus on the same roll or voucher upon which they are paid their final pay.

CIVIL SERVICE JOBS FOR SOLDIERS AND SAILORS

The United States Civil Service Commission is perfecting arrangements whereby men who are about to be discharged from the Army or Navy may receive first-hand information concerning opportunities for employment in the Federal civil service. The Commission has received authority from the Secretary of War and the Secretary of the Navy to appoint its representatives at all establishments where enlisted men are assembled in considerable numbers. These representatives are now being appointed. They will be prepared to inform the n.en fully concerning positions which are open, to supply them with application blanks, to assist them, if necessary, with the execution of their applications and to advise them relative to civil-service matters generally. It is the plan of the Civil Service Commission to entrust this work to educational directors of welfare organizations already operating at the camps, cantonments, etc. The representatives of the Commission who are appointed from the personnel of these welfare organiations will have the benefit of the advice and assistance of the Commission's local boards of examiners at nearby cities, in addition to the instructions received from the Commission.







A. gave chocolate, cigarettes, etc., to the men on the extreme front lines and sold them elsewhere. Writing paper, pens, ink, moving pictures, concerts, etc., were always free to the men. Because of the very heavy expense incident to shipping all kinds of supplies overseas and then hauling them to the front, the Y. M. C. A., ordered by the war department to charge cost plus transportation, was in some cases forced to charge the soldiers more than the same goods would have cost them in the United States, with the result that the organization has been severely criticized. In view of this criticism, the army officials finally came to the Y. M. C. A.'s rescue, with the result that the boys overseas are now buying canteen supplies in many cases much cheaper than they can be bought in the United

#### "GOODIES" FOR ITALY'S FIGHTERS



The above picture was taken in Italy and shows a Y. M. C. A. camion loaded with good things for the soldiers. The driver has just taken his seat and is receiving final instructions before starting out on his tour of distribution. The transportation problem was one of the greatest with which the "Y" had to deal. At one time, for instance, the organization sent a shipment of an even hundred autotrucks to France, but on their arrival eighty-five of them were commandeered by the army. Men, food and munitions were more important to Uncle Sam then than cigarettes, chocolate and chewing gum, and as a result many a "doughboy" was deprived of his "makin's." Those were the days when most anybody, especially if that somebody happened to be a "Yank" at the froat, would admit that Sherman was absolutely right.

The cry seems to be reduction of cotton acreage at least two-thirds of last year's crop. Of course if the embargo is not soon raised on cotton we will have more cotton on hand liberty to work in good earnest. than the market demands. In fact we are already oversupplied for ourselves. But millions on the other side are anxiously waiting for the cotton of the Southern planter. But under all probability reduction is the wise thing to do at this time. If we can't get as much for two bales of cotton by reducing the acreage, as otherwise we could get for three. Then why not raise feed on the extra land and market it by the livestock method, that is if feed falls low in price.. Of course the conditions of this country at the present time demands a money crop; but if by cutting our acreage and thus controlling the price of cotton, then the extra land can become a profit; for we not only save the crop fifty acres, and can get as much out of the 100 acres as otherwise he would get from the 150, then he has fifty acres for feed purposes, with which he can raise feed enough to fatten a car of hogs.
