COUNTANTS AT GOOD SALARIES GOVERNMENT SEEKS AC-

The Government has some big tasks in accounting and auditing on its hands as a result of the war, and is willing to pay good salaries to men and women who are qualified to perform them.

The Income Tax Unit of the Bureau of Internal Revenue, Treasury Department, is in urgent need of 350 traveling auditors and resident auditors for the higher grade positions, which pay entrance salaries from \$3,000 to \$4,500 a year.

200 to \$2,000 a year.

The Interstate Commerce Commission wants 50 examiners of accounts. These are usually appointed at entrance salaries from \$1,800 to \$2,100 a year, the higher salaried positions, paying from \$2,200 to \$3,000 a year or more, being filled as a rule by promotion.

All of these positions are open to both men and women, except positions of examiner of accounts in the Interstate Commerce Commission, which are open to men only.

The United States Civil Service Commission will receive applications

for these positions at any time until further notice. Full information and application blanks may be obtained by calling upon the secretary of the local board of civil service examiners at the customhouse or postoffice in any important city, or by communicating with the United States Civil Service Commission, Washington.

Applicants will not be assembled for a written examination but will be rated upon their sworn statements in their applications as to education, experience, etc., and upon corroborative evidence adduced by the Civil Service Commission.

This is a humiliating situation to say the least of it.

THERE IS A LIMIT.

One man can't do it all. The Record is still without a printer. We have wired from New York to Jacksonville, Florida; have hired three men but they never get here. In the meantime A. L. Whipkey is doing all the work—linotype, job work, setting ads, and the whole works. The bank statements this week, oil ads, and a run of job work from out of town, causes the paper to fall below its usual standard; but, as said before, one man can't do it all, there's a limit—He has worked 16 hours per day this week there seems to be no relief in sight. The writer furnishes the hot air and planning a spring garden.

WHAT OF OIL?

Each week we think that surely by the next issue of the paper we will be able to announce that a drilling contract has been signed. But at this time it seems more remote than it did last week.

The Seaman oil interests seems to have gone up in gas, as there is no further talk or outlook toward the closing of the contract. Though we understand that the forfeit money is still in the bank at this place, and that negotiations for "certain blocks" of lands are still under way.

What is the matter with the people of Mitchell county? Don't they want a test well? If they do the only way to get it is to get busy and give these people what they ask. It takes lots of money and plenty of nerve to put down an oil well on a gamble, and the people of this county have not the money nor the nerve. Some of them seem sadly lacking in the latter commodity or we would have had the drills pounding away before now. Every county adjoining us, and nearly every one in the Western part of the state have contracts and many of them are drilling. It seems that this is the only county that cannot get together, and agree on a proposition to get the development started.

There is a rumor that a man has been found to take over the Iatan well and push it to completion. Also a rumor that a well is to be put down on the Wulfjen ranch. Also that Mr. W. L. Ellwood has a drilling contract on his ranch south of town. The Cuthbert Oil and Gas Co., say they are sure to get a drilling contract on their 20,000 acres. A Valley View Oil Co. are working on a block of land to offer for a drilling contract.

All of this sounds good, but we are anxious to see "something doing." The wise ones say that some four or five wells will be drilled in Mitchell county before the idea of October, but just at present there seems to be nothing stirring.

The Colorado Record gives its readers some good advice about West Texas, and the recent rains prove that what the Record said is wholesome. It is not often that we gamble, except in occasional flyer in oil of about two six-bits, but we are willing to wager old Speckle that the West produces a fine crop for the year 1919. The facts are, we are "feelin'" good about things in general and West Texas in particular, and believe that the farmers are going to have one of their best years. After all it is to the farm that we must look for real prosperity. Oil wells are mighty good side-shows, but side-shows they are, and there is no getting away from that fact. The past year they came near being the whole show in the West, but time tells on the best well and sooner or later it becomes a non-producer. Not so with the farm. The well cultivated and properly enriched farm grows better with age and from the farm comes the life of the people. We are for oil development first, last and then some, but we would not underestimate the over-topping importance of agriculture.—Abilene Reporter.

The concrete bridge across Lone Wolf on Second street is progressing nicely, but it will be some time yet before it will be opened to traffic. There is a big job of filling in to be done on both sides, which will take some time, after the concrete work is done. The East half of the concrete work is finished, and the forms removed. The west half will be poured next week. While we are not construction experts, it looks to us like a mighty good job. This work was badly needed, and when completed will add greatly not only to the highway but to Colorado, and the county. The Record began the agitation of this improvement two years ago, and we are glad to see the work nearing completion.

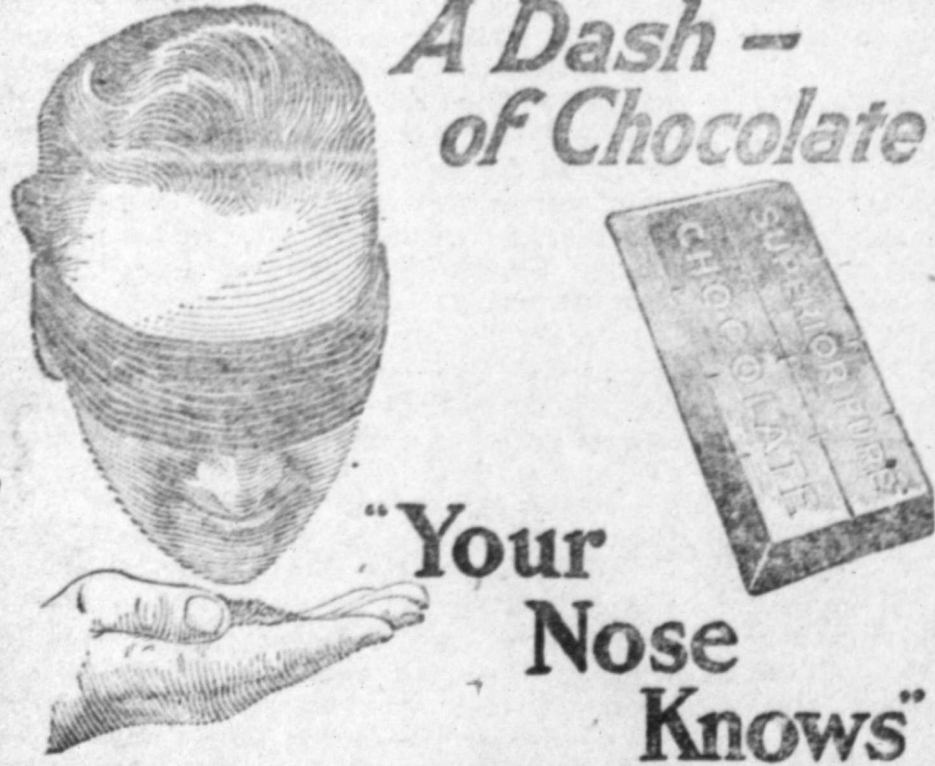

UNITED STATES WILL NOW TRY EXPERIMENT OF PROHIBITION

Astonishing Action of an Individualistic People With a Strong Sense of Personal Liberty Is Brought About by Lessons of the Great War—Additional Legislation Planned to Enforce New Law—Will "Wets" Contest?—Ratification Details.

The United States of America has entered upon the tremendous social experiment of national prohibition of the manufacture, sale and use of alcoholic drinks.

ident of the United States and president of the senate. I certify that this joint resolution originated in the senate.

JAMES M. BAKER, secretary. The amendment was passed by the senate on August 1, 1917, and passed by the house on December 17 of the same year.

Ratification by the States. The next step was ratification of this amendment by the states through their legislatures. This called for affirmative action by thirty-six states within seven years.

- List of states that have ratified the amendment: Maryland, Montana, Texas, Delaware, South Dakota, Massachusetts, Arizona, Georgia, Louisiana, Florida, Michigan, Ohio, Oklahoma, Idaho, Tennessee, Maine, West Virginia, California, Washington, Indiana, Arkansas, Illinois, North Carolina, Kansas, Alabama, Iowa, Colorado, Oregon, New Hampshire, Utah, Nebraska.

While the amendment under its provisions does not become effective until one year from the date of its ratification, it seems likely that the country will become permanently dry July 1 next.

STATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 13.

A resolution to amend Section 5 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas, as follows: Strike out the words "Four Thousands," found in the third line of Section 5, and insert in lieu thereof the words "Ten Thousand," and adding after the word "furniture" the words, "and this clause shall be self-acting," and making an appropriation to pay necessary expenses hereof.

Be it Resolved, by the Legislature of the State of Texas: Section 1.—That Section No. 5 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended as hereafter to read as follows:

Section 5.—Article IV.—Governor's Salary and Mansion.—He shall at stated times receive as compensation for his services an annual salary of ten thousand dollars, and no more, and shall have the use and occupation of the Governor's Mansion, fixtures and furniture, and this clause shall be self-acting.

Sec. 2.—The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors for members of the Legislature at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the fourth Saturday in May, A. D. 1919, same being the twenty-fourth day of May, A. D. 1919, and the Governor of this State is hereby directed to make the necessary proclamation for said election and to have the same duly published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

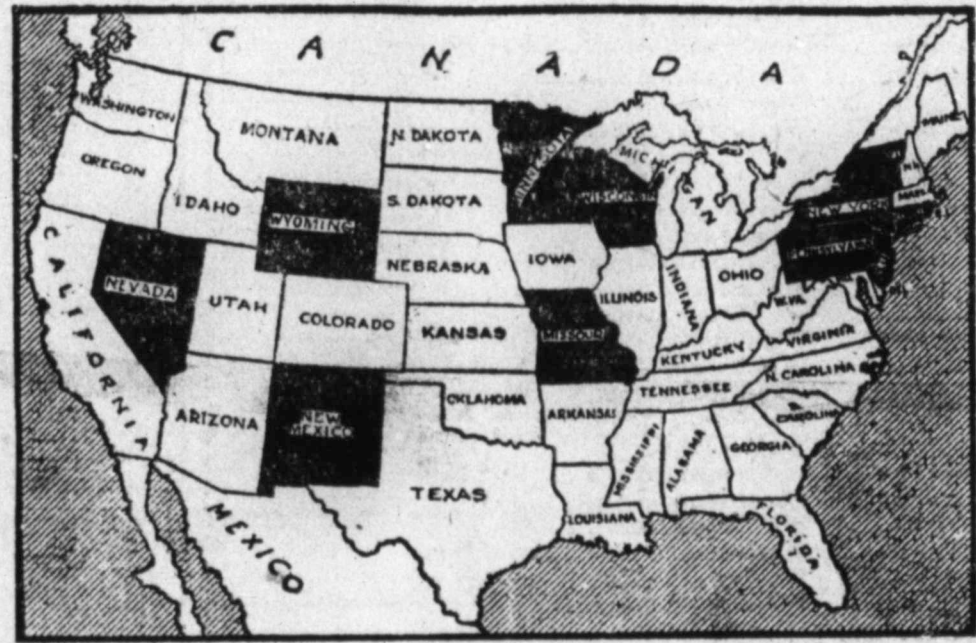

war. We saw what the enforced sobriety of military service did physically, mentally and morally for young men who had indulged in liquor in peace times.

Some of our allies got into the war in a hurry because they had to—Belgium and France to save their lives, Great Britain to save its national honor. America took its time—a long time—and gradually worked itself up to the determination to fight.

Text of Amendment. Following is the full text of the prohibition amendment on which state legislatures are voting:

JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES.

Resolved by the senate and house of representatives of the United States of America, in congress assembled, two-thirds of each house concurring therein, that the following amendment to the Constitution be, and hereby is, proposed to the states to become valid as a part of the Constitution when ratified by the legislatures of the several states as provided by the Constitution:

Section 1.—After one year from the ratification of this article the manufacture, sale or transportation of intoxicating liquors within, the importation thereof into, or the exportation thereof from the United States and all territory subject to the jurisdiction thereof for beverage purposes is hereby prohibited.

Section 2.—The congress and the several states have concurrent power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

Section 3.—This article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment to the Constitution by the legislatures of the several states as provided in the Constitution within seven years from the date of the submission hereof to the states by the congress.

idential war-time prohibition recently enacted by congress goes into effect. That law prevents the manufacture and sale of intoxicants for beverage purposes and remains in force until the demobilization of the nation's war armies is completed.

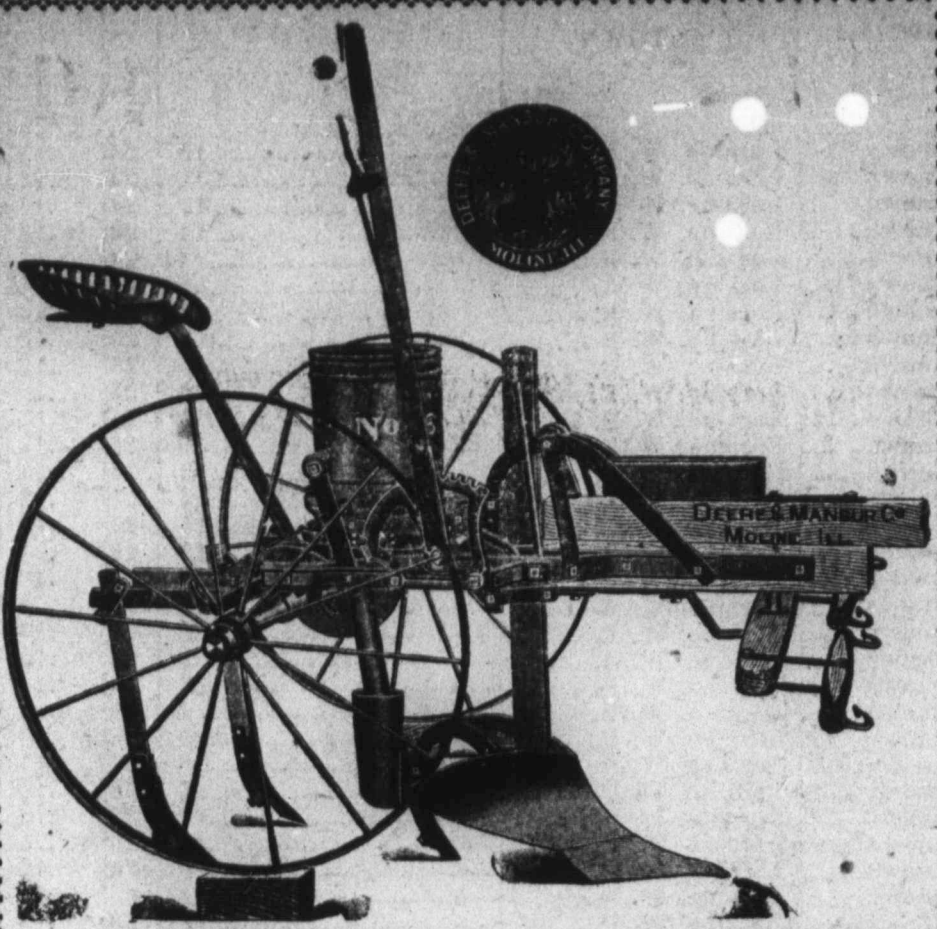
Additional Dry Legislation. During the year following ratification congress and the several states will be called upon to pass legislation to enforce the amendment and to provide penalties for violations.

It is likely this additional legislation will be pushed through as fast as the days can push it. In some parts of the country at least they propose to take full advantage of their victory.

For example, in Illinois a forecast of the Anti-Saloon league is this: In addition to the "search and seizure act" an act rigidly restricting the handling of liquor for medicinal, manufacturing, sacramental and scientific purposes; legislation covering doctors' prescriptions, which must be issued by a bona fide physician in writing, dated, diagnosing the illness and the purpose of its use; all railroad records of liquor shipments must be kept; drastic legislation regulating sale by druggists, with heavy penalty for violation.

The dries presumably will not confine their efforts to enforcing the law. They will doubtless take the question into politics of all kinds and make it an issue. They announce, for instance, in Chicago that they will ask all candidates for mayor to declare themselves on the strict enforcement of dry legislation.
