



### NEW CHARTER FOR SCHOOL DISTRICT.

Refering to the present indebtedness and income from various sources of the Colorado Independent School District, and for the information of the public, the Board of Trustees, wish to make the following statement:

The present bonded indebtedness of this district now is the sum of \$17,500, the original issue of bonds for buildings, was for the sum of \$25,000. The first issue being for the sum of \$15,000, which was used in the construction of the building that unfortunately burned a few years after completion. On this building insurance was carried for the sum of \$10,000, and in order that a suitable building be erected in its stead, it was necessary for another issue of bonds for the sum of \$10,000 and with the insurance money and with this issue of bonds, the present building was erected.

The Board paid off \$7,500 of the bonds of the first issue a few years back, but the remaining \$7,500 of this issue will not mature until 1926. and the second issue of \$10,000 will be due in 1930.

With only a 50 cents tax levy, being the limit allowed for school purposes in this district, and out of this amount it is necessary that provision be made for a sinking fund, and payment of interest accruing on the bonds. After this deduction, the remaining amount is for maintenance, which is wholly inadequate to operate the school successfully, under the old charter, and we had no recourse, there being many disadvantages hampering the Board in conducting the school.

In order that the situation might be relieved the Board had prepared a new charter, and on the convening of the legislature in Austin, in January, asked for its enactment, with an emergency clause. This bill was passed early in the session, and the privileges embodied in this new charter, granting the Board authority to fix the rendition of the property in this district in order that funds may be raised to meet the demands of the school for operating purposes, with the 50 cents tax levy. This gives the Board the appointment of its own tax assessor and collector of taxes, and the Board has full power as exercised by the Conuty, and in future we hope for vast improvement in the operation of our school ..

CRANFILL'S CHRONICLE.

J. B. Cranfill Discusses the Oil Business, Giving His Views Concerning Oil Speculations and Investments.

I was one of the pioneers in the Ranger oil field. Late last February I went to Ranger. At that time there were only two oil wells there-the McCleskey and the Walker. I did not know how big the oil field there was. nor do I know now, but I at once became convinced that Ranger was to be a big town and that tremendous profits were in store for investors and speculators who would intelligently enter and occupy this field. One of the investments I made was the purchase of the lot 25x140 feet on which the Mecca Cafe now stands. I paid \$3,500 for this lot, and soon thereafter leased it to K. T. Scott at \$100 a month with the understanding that at the end of the lease the building was to revert to me. This is the cafe, featured in a recent article in the Dallas News. Scott sold his lease the other day for \$12,000 profit, and if I had not up to this time leased the property I could get \$300 a month for it, but I am no hog. I am perfectly well satisfied with my lease because the returns are paying out the property, and at the end of the term I will have a good building, and will then be able to secure for the lease a price commensurate with its increased valuation. To do Have your last year's suit dyed and so requires only that those who have Practically the only way of spreading infection is through the sputum. therefore if the sputum of consumptives was carefully collected and destroyed, one of the main sources would have been controlled. Those consumptives who fall to protect the public in this way should be placed in special institutions just as are lunatics or criminals. Other com mon ways of infecting others are: through kissing, and coughing and sneezing without covering the face. Where children are exposed to infection in the home the consumptive should be isolated from them as much as possible. Separate utensils should be provided-or at any rate all dishes used by the consumptive should be boiled after use.
