The Army activities are as varied as the problems of poverty. They include shelter for homeless men and women, homes for working girls, children's homes, rescue homes for unfortunate girls, meteralty hospitals, slum work, day nurseries, cheap food depots, cheap glothing and serond-hand stores, employment bureau, work among the prisoners, medical relief and visiting nurse work, sitta mer outing for the poor, Christmas and Thankrgiving dinner baskets, missing friends and inquiry depart

orger period of time. Until recent tivities to the larger cities of the world where the need was greatest but it is now extending its work to the smaller places. There are twenty-four Corps in this Division and the Army plans to double this work in the next few years.

nity hospitals and rescue homes in San Antonio and El Paso and it is planned to establish similar institutions in Oklahoma and Louisiana 25 soon as funds for the necessary buildings can be secured.

The Army now operates hotels for transient working men, and homeless men in Dallas, Galverren, Beaumont and Ft. Worth and will extend this work according to its ability in other cities. The Army plans to establish in this territory institutions similar to those in other large cities of the United States, such as orphanases, hospitals, homes for the aged, etc.

Community Centers

Few of the Army Corps in this territory own the buildings they occupy and it is planned to erect suitable buildings for Army work in every city and town where a Corps is now established and is later established. It is planned to make these buildings community centers which will be memorials for the soldiers who have fallen in France. In these buildings there will be auditoriums for services and meetings. There will be rooms for recreation and games, correspondence, reading, study and meetings of small groups. There will be rest rooms for women and a nursery for children. Every facility for comfort and convenience will be provided and the building will serve the purpose of a family club house.

Such a building will be of great convenience to the country people who visit the town in which it is located and they can make it their headquarters during the time they are in town free of all charge. Such a building will be a distinct asset to the community in which it is lo cated and it will bring the country people to town, giving the city or town which has an Army building a distinct trading advantage over the towns wheh have not. The building will be open all day and in the evenings and will be in charge of a Salvation Army officer, the Army being responsible for its operation and maintenance. The boys who have been in France and who claim the Salvation Army but as their ciub house and home while abroad will naturally turn to the Salvation Army building in their town and it will serve as their club house here.

Any town or city desiring to secure such a building with the facilities which it will furnish the community may do so by a ding the Army to raise the necessary funds for ! its construction.





If every man, woman and child in the state of Texas, plus the entire population of New Orleans, La., were to unite in going to church on one Sunday the mobilization would still be less than the attendance at religious meetings in the Army Y. M. C. A. buildings in the Southern department from May, 1917, to December 31, 1918. The total attendance at 24,700 such meetings in the "Y" huts was 4,523,343, according to figures compiled by the religious work department of the Army Y. M. C. A. at Sen Antonio, Tex. -

At these meetings 74,457 soldiers requested prayers-a number greater than the population of Oklahoma City. The number of Christian decisions made by these soldiers was 69,929more than the number of people in El Paso, Tex. Christian purpose renewed by soldiers at such meetings reached the big total of 66,581.

The number of personal Christian interviews which the "Y" secretaries were able to have with the men as they visited the buildings was 318,246, or equal to the combined populations of Dallas, Fort Worth and Houston. profanity, 9,342; personal purity, 19,-509; antigambling, 6,925.

Records from November 1, 1917, to December 31, 1918, show that 1,880 Bible classes were organized with a total enrollment of 43,012 men. These classes held 15,995 sessions and had an attendance of \$45,598. It was not until Every lady in town is asked to call May 1, 1918, that records were made of the number of teachers used at these classes, but from that time to-December 31 there were 1,446 soldier teachers and 1,333 civilian teachers engaged in conducting the classes.

Copies of the Scriptures distributed to soldiers reached 539,683, or one each for every person in the states of New Mexico and Arizona. Religious literature given out from June 1, 1918, to December 31 numbered 569,249

Visiting sick soldiers was a part of the duty of religious work secretaries, and for the period for which records were kept the number of such visits made was 996,192, almost equal to the population of Colorado with most of the people in Kansas City, Mo., thrown in to balance the measure.



Lieutenant I. Berry of Carizozo, New Mexico, was in action last October. When his company commander had been killed and the second in command wounded, Lieutenant Berry "carried on." Wounded, he was ordered to the field hospital and the evacuation tag was tied on his uniform. This meant that he was out of the fight. Berry tore off the tag and returned to his company. For twenty-four hours he commanded their defense, guided them back out of the trenches after relief had come---and died.

Lieutenant Berry finished his job. He saw it through. He scorned an evacuation tag.

Membership Campaign Each Christ mas Will Be Means of Calling Americans Together to Show Spirit of Love.

Henry P. Davison, Chairman of the War Council of the Red Cross, has issued to the 3,854 chapters and the 22,000,000 members of the American Red Cross the following statement outlining the future policy of the American Red Cross:

"The whole American people will be invited in the week preceding Christmas to enroll as members of the Red Cross. It is confidently believed there will be no further campaigns for Red Cross funds, but instead the annual roll call will constitute the foundation of the Red Cross. The people should therefore know as definitely as possible the plans of this their national humanitarian society.

"Since the armistice was signed I have had an opportunity to confer in Paris with the heads of all American Red Cross commissions in Europe, and later, in Washington, with the President of the United States, the War Council of the Red Cross, the managers of the 14 Red Cross divisions, of the United States and with the heads of our departments at national head-

"Since America's entry into war the purpose of our Red Cross has been primarily to aid our army and navy in the care of our own men under arms, and, secondly, to extend relief to the soldiers, sailors and civilians of those des along with their own. With the funds which have been so generously contributed by the American people this war work of the Red Cross will continue and be complete with all possible sympathy and energy.

"Wherever our soldiers and sailors them until they are demobilized. Nothing which we may do will be left undone, either. For the men in the war zone, for those returning, for those in the camps and hospitals, or for their families at home the Red Cross will continue its ministrations. In this latter effort 50,000 trained Red Cross workers are now engaged at 2,500 different places throughout the land.

"The problems of reconstruction, involving feeding and caring for the distressed civilian population of Europe, are of such magnitude that necessarily they must be met very largely by the governments of our allies, with whom our own government will co-operate.

"The great task of fighting tuberculosis, promoting child welfare and caring for refugees, with which the American Red Cross has concerned itself so effectively in France, Italy and Belgium, will at an early date be assumed by the governments, the Red Cross organizations and the relief societies of those countries, which, now that they are released from the terrific burden of waging war, naturally desire to take care, as far as they can, of their own

"The war program of the American Red Cross will thus steadily and rapidly merge itself into a peace program. The wake of war will, however, reveal the prevalence of disease and give rise to epidemics and emergencies which in all parts of the world will call for unlimited voluntary effort, the cutting of red tape and the manifestation of those qualities of human sympathy which government action cannot dis-

"Here will be the opportunity for the American Red Cross. But even our Red Cross must not and cannot act most effectively alone; we must labor in co-operation with the National Red Cross and relief societies of other na tions, to the end that not alone the heart of America but the heart of all mankind may be mobilized on behalf dizziness, the urinary disorders of suffering humanity.

ANSWER TO CHARGE THAT Y.M.C.A.MEN AVPIDED DANGER

General Dickman, Hero of Chateau Thierry, Issues Order on Conduct-Free Supplies.

Spread upon the records of the Third division, A. E. F., and just brought to the attention of the National War Work Council of the Y. M. C. A., is a general order issued by command of Major General Dickman, which "Y" officials have haifed as an emphatic answer to charges that Red Triangle workers had avoided the danger zones in France and had wrung exorbitant prices from the soldiers for the comforts which the association had sent overseas. General Dickman directed that a copy of the order be sent to every one of the thirty-four men and six women who went with the division through the fighting at Chateau Thierry and along the Marne, to St. Mihiel, and later into action north of Verdun and along the Meuse. The Y. M. C. A. has made public General Dickman's order along with a communication from Col. J. C. Rhea of another division which was in the St. Mihiel fighting. 





PAINT AS AN ASSET.

Bankers Say They Lend More Money on Property When Buildings Are Well Painted.

AN INDICATION OF THRIFT.

One Concern Advances 25 Per Cent. More if Repainting Is Done Every Five Years.

Does it pay to paint carefully farm buildings? Does it add to the selling value of a farm when buildings are ed? A careful inquiry of a number of take and mild and gentle in effect. leading bankers in the Mississippi valley, including such states as Iowa, Illinois, Michigan, Ohio, Indiana and Missouri, reveals the fact that in nearly every case the bankers did not hesitate to say that they would lend all the way from 5 to 50 per cent, more on land where farm buildings were well bankers shows that the increased loan value because of painted buildings is around 22 per cent.

Some of these bankers make inter says that, while not especially prepared to advise definitely in response to this inquiry, the officers would loan more money on farms where buildings were painted than where they were not so treated. This bank also finds that where houses, barns and fences are well taken care of the farm is a profitable proposition, and bankers in general consider the farmer a good Another Michigan bank says "farm buildings out of repair and needing paint indicate that the owner is slow pay." Such farms are rated at about one-third of the assessed value for loans, Where the farm buildings are in good shape the rating is onehalf. The president of a middle western bank says that when real estate loans are considered, painted buildings are always taken into consideration in pearance of the property surrounding the house and barn and also the fields and fences would be carefully observed. He further says that he has no

hesitancy in saying that he would absolutely refuse a lown on farms where the buildings were not kept up and well painted. In his judgment, unpainted farm buildings would reduce the loan value at least 25 per cent. A Minnesota banker says that he is much more willing to loan money

where the buildings are well painted. In his particular case he believes that he would loan 20 per cent, more than inken care of. A farmer who will keep his buildings painted takes a much deeper interest in his work than one who does not. Another Minnesofa bank says that well painted buildings have resulted in securing from its little bowels without griping, and cent. more money than where the buildings are not painted. An Ohio concern says that it will loan 25 per cent, more money on a well kept farm where buildings are painted at least once every five years. A southern Illinois bank says that it has no fixed rule about this, but it does make a decided difference when owners of farm lands apply for loans. If the buildings are well painted and thus well preserved the loan rave would not only be cheaper, but the amount of money borrowed would be larger. A northern Illinois bank does not hesitate to say that it would loan fully 50 per cent. more on a farm where buildings were well painted and in good order than where they were not. The vice president, who answers the inquiry, goes on to say: "There probably are many farmers good financially and morally who permit their buildings to remain unpainted, but as a rule the most substantial people who live in the country keep their buildings well painted."



PAINT AS AN ASSET.

Bankers Say They Lend More Money on Property When Buildings Are Well Painted.

AN INDICATION OF THRIFT.

One Concern Advances 25 Per Cent More if Repainting Is Done Every Five Years.

Does it pay to paint carefully farm buildings? Does it add to the selling value of a farm when buildings are properly kept up and regularly painted? A careful inquiry of a number of take and mild and gentle in effect. leading bankers in the Mississippi valley, including such states as Iowa, Illinois, Michigan, Ohio, Indiana and Missouri, reveals the fact that in nearly every case the bankers did not hesitate to say that they would lend all the way from 5 to 50 per cent, more on land where farm buildings were well painted and kept in good condition. They maintain that well kept-up and well painted buildings and fences are an indication of thrift and that the average of the returns from these value because of painted buildings is around 22 per cent.

Some of these bankers make inter esting comment. A Michigan concern says that, while not especially prepared to advise definitely in response to this inquiry, the officers would loan more money on farms where buildings were painted than where they were not so treated. This bank also finds that where houses, barns and fences are well taken care of the farm is a profitable proposition, and bankers in general consider the farmer a good client. Another Michigan bank says "farm buildings out of repair and needing paint indicate that the owner about one-third of the assessed value for loans, Where the farm buildings are in good shape the rating is onehalf. The president of a middle western bank says that when real estate loans are considered, painted buildings are always taken into consideration in making an estimate. The general appearance of the property surrounding the house and barn and also the fields and fences would be carefully observed. He further says that he has no hesitancy in saying that he would absolutely refuse a logn on farms where the buildings were not kept up and well painted. In his judgment, unpainted farm buildings would reduce the loan value at least 25 per cent.

A Minnesota banker says that he to

much more willing to loan money where the buildings are well painted. In his particular case he believes that he would loan 20 per cent, more than if the buildings were not properly taken care of. A farmer who will keep his buildings painted takes a much deeper interest .n his work than one who does not. Another Minneings have resulted in securing from cent, more money than where the hulldings are not painted. An Ohio concern says that it will loan 25 per cent, more money on a well kept farm where buildings are painted at least once every five years. A southern Illirule about this, but it does make a decided difference when owners of farm lands apply for loans. If the buildings are well painted and thus well preserved the loan rate would not only be cheaper, but the amount of money borrowed would be larger. A northern Illinois bank does not hesitate to say that it would loan fully 50 per cent. more on a farm where buildings were well painted and in good order than where they were not.
