Some superintendents report that they are obliged to use more pleinexperienced teachers than ever before in order to fill vacancies at all.

We ask, in all seriousness, what is to become of the children of Texas if one-third of the men and from 20 to 30 per cent of the women leave the schools, either by transfer to other schools or by getting out of the profession, in one year-especially when three-fourths of these are among the better teachers.

While the property has been properly maintained, it is not the same property which the Government took over on August 1, 1918 It is not as adequate for its job, or as well manned as it was; that it is not, is in no way the fault of Federal control which was eminently fair. It is due to causes of which neither the Government nor the companies are to blame.

A year ago today we were at war. Labor and material needed for both telephone operation and construction were turned over to military uses. Some materials were so vital to the carrying on of the war that even the work of providing telephone facilities for the Government was retarded and no part of them could be spared for commercial telephone purposes.

No less vital was the Government need for those skilled to create, maintain and operate the vast intercommunication systems necessary in modern warfare in the conduct of the vastly increased Government service.

Thousands of telephone men were already at the battle front. Thousands more were under arms, and still telephone experts and skilled operators went into the srevice of the Government and contributory industries by tens of thousands.

The reserves of plant and equipment were drawn upon until they were entirely used up and the experienced staff was gradually depleted. To find others to take the places of those who had gone was difficult, to train them takes time.

During the year came Victory and the armistice; and instantly the business world sprang into intense activity. The demands for telephone service passed all former records.

To repace the exhausted reserves, which had been carried for just such purposes. and to replace the skilled forces to meet this unprecedented emergency, there began a rush for construction. For readjustment, for high pressure repairs, for feverish extensions. All these must be continued with increasing effort.

The return of the property comes in the very midst of this race between an overpowering demand and an upbuilding of a system whose growth was held and whose forces were scattered by the vital needs of war.

Much progress has been made in the upbuilding of this system, but far more is still required to meet the swift growth of business; and also to give first aid to every other business and every other service struggling against an unprecedented demand.

The prosperity which creates this emergency in service creates also a scarcity of those desiring employment in the service.

Under such conditions telephone service generally has not been and could not be up to the pre-war standard. It is beyond human power to immediately overcome the handicap which the situation imposes.

There are no peope in pubic or private endeavor who are working more tirelessly or strenuously for the common good than those of the Telephone Companies. Service has always been given. More of it must be given and it must be improved. That improvement in some cases will take months. Eventually service must win the race with demand.







UNCOLLECTED FUNDS VITALLY NECESSARY

New York .- (Special.) The Nationd War Work Council of the Young Men's Christian association, through its finance committee has made public a detailed statement of its receipts and expenditures for war work in this country and abroad in the period between April 26, 1917, and March 31 1919. In a supplementary announcement the war work council explained that this is not a final report. Its war service, having reached its maximum in March of this year, is being continued in the United States and foreign countries.

The council received in the period \$125,282,859. Of this amount \$123,-254,052 was contributed by the people of the United States in the three campaigns conducted to finance Y. M. C. A.

A statement of Y. M. C. A. expenditures for work in the home camps shows 950 buildings constructed in the eting these buildings the Y. M. C. A.

Concerts, vaudeville and other entertainment provided the men on this side cost the Y. M. C. A. \$1,166,767. Motion picture shows in the home camps \$2,326,271. It provided athletic supplies and physical directors to carry out its athletic program at an expense of \$1,503,179. It expended \$923, 629 for writing materials and for financing camp newspapers and pub

done at an expense of \$2,105,816. Educational literature, lectures, French instruction and library service cost \$1.192,737; sex hygiene education and literature cost \$73,704. Other items include \$260,634 for war work in the canal zone, Porto Rico, the Philippines and other territories, \$192,386 for work among the employees of munitions plants and other war industries, and \$442,061 for work with the Students Aimy Training corps.

The Y. M. C. A.'s wor' overseas with the A. E. F., from its inception to the end of last March, also is statin detail. In this period it is shown \$4,801.271 was spent for huts and field units. The Y. M. C. A. further spent, for motor transport and mismotor transport devoted exclusively tor transport, \$1,170,761.

Supplies worth \$1,794,771 were distributed free to the doughboys. Y. M. C. A. Christmas gifts and entertainments represented an expenditure of newspapers, etc., to overseas men, to the value of \$2,296,808. In operating leave areas in France, the Y. M. C. A. spent \$831,601; in managing a chain of hotels for the men on leave in the larger cities, \$477,956.

On overseas religious work the Y M. C. A. spent \$467,584; on education and library work, \$991,932. Concerts entertainments were given at a cost of \$850,969, and motion picture shows at a cost of \$1,066,757. Over-

seas athletics cost \$1,957,301. Through the international commit tee of the Y. M. C. A. \$16.042,695 was expended in work with the allied armies, and \$1,058,591 in work with prisopers of war. Of the sum of these two items the war work council contributed \$14,409,175.

Expenditures with the allied armies included \$6,738,744 for France; \$497,-369 for Great Britain; \$3,139,951 for Italy; \$4,805,935 for Russia, and \$860,-

694 for other allied countries. For the prisoners of war in Germany the Y. M. C. A. spent \$117.988; in Denmark, \$99,087; in Austria-Hungary, \$146,812; In Switzerland, \$247, 950; in Turkey, \$56,206, and in other

ccuntries \$390,545. The grand total of expenditures was \$97,817,005. This left, on March 31. 1919, a balance of \$27,465,854, which, with the payment of pledges to the United War Work campaign still remaining unpaid, is expected to be sufficient to support the work from April

1, 1919, to December 31, 1919. In accounting for this balance the statement lists assets of the war work council on March 31, 1919, of \$43.333, 166. These included \$8,835.881 in cash on hand, and assets overseas amount ing to \$18,761,676. The Y. M. C. A. also had on that date canteen supplies on hand and in transit to the value of \$5,992,591, and outstanding ac

counts totaling \$9,735,366. On the same date its current liabilities and reserves amounted to \$15, 837,312 including \$2,792,964 in bills and salaries due in the United States and \$6.594.720 due overseas. There was charged against it \$1,627,285 rep resenting remittances received from the men of the A. E. F. for transfer to the United States, It owed the British French and United States govern ments, for transportation and sup plies, \$3,022,538.

"Farm" That Raises Jewels: The island of the Holy Ghost, Lower

California, has the only farm in the world which sows and reaps a crop of jewels. Through artificial propagation and care pearls are actually raised there in the San Gabriel cove. In their natural condition the pearl beds are scattered and the oysters are prey to many submarine foes, but on this farm they are protected by a substantial masonry dike which walls off a portion of the bays, reaching above high-watermark. Openings admit the free passage of the sea water, but are guarded by heavy screens. The boxtom of this segregated area was cleared of all growth and paved with rock brought from the mainland and laid by divers. Here the pearl oysters are cultivated just as edible oysters




