MAIZE ENTERS MARKET.

Wheat receipts in Abilene for the past week had a considerable decline over the preceding week. There were only twelve cars bought.

The rain, which was general over the district was given as the chief cause of decline. A good portion of the wheat has been threshed, according to buyers, and there are very few graineries storing wheat on the farms.

The marketing of maize and fetterita opened up fairly well during the week, there being several cars of hard maize bought. The price Saturday was \$22.50 per ton for the grain in the head.

Some speculation is being made as to whether the price for maize is going to decline or rise. Buyers were predicting a decline while many farmers are stoutly declaring that a much higher price than the present market quotations must be paid before they can afford to turn loose. A number were in Friday and Saturday getting material to prepare for storing their maize for higher prices.

"I haven't forgotten what I had to pay for maize to feed just a few months ago," said one farmer Saturday and who has considerable acreage in row feed crops. "I'll not take less than \$40 a ton for mine. The big crop raised in Taylor county this year is not going to feed the entire world and it has cost too much to produce to give it away."—Abilene Reporter.

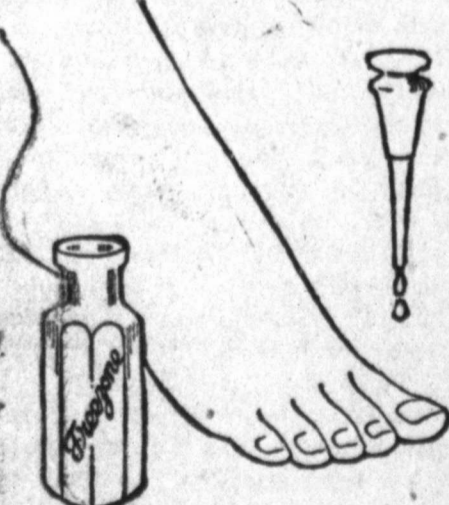

Headquarters of the 90th Division Association have been opened in the Southwestern Life Building, Dallas, Texas. CONTROL METHODS FOR COTTON BOLL WORMS.

The boll weevil infestation which bids fair to be so disastrous to the Texas cotton crop this year has faded into the background in most sections of the State, and the cotton boll worms are now doing great damage to the bolls and squares.

This insect has appeared in large numbers in almost every section of the State. Infestations vary from 25 per cent to 90 per cent of the bolls. This heavy infestation is probably due to favorable climatic conditions during the spring and to the abundance of corn planted this year.

Paris Green is recommended at the rate of three pounds to the acre applied in dust form either diluted with lime or flour. This poison has a

tendency to burn the plants and should not be used where arsenate of lead can be obtained. Powdered arsenate of lead is the most satisfactory poison and should be dusted on the plants at the rate of from four to six pounds to the acre, according to the size of the plants. This poison remains effective for a period of from 10 to 16 days, depending upon the weather. Two applications should be sufficient. The first should be applied when the eggs are hatching, and the second from ten days to two weeks afterwards. Dust poisons will not be very effective against worms already established in the bolls. Either of the above poisons may be applied by the old pole and bag method, or one of the dusting machines that are now on the market. This work should be done early in the mornings while the plants are still wet with dew. London purple and white arsenic should never be used as a substitute for arsenate of lead for poisoning cotton, as these poisons will burn the plants and cause a reduction in yield.

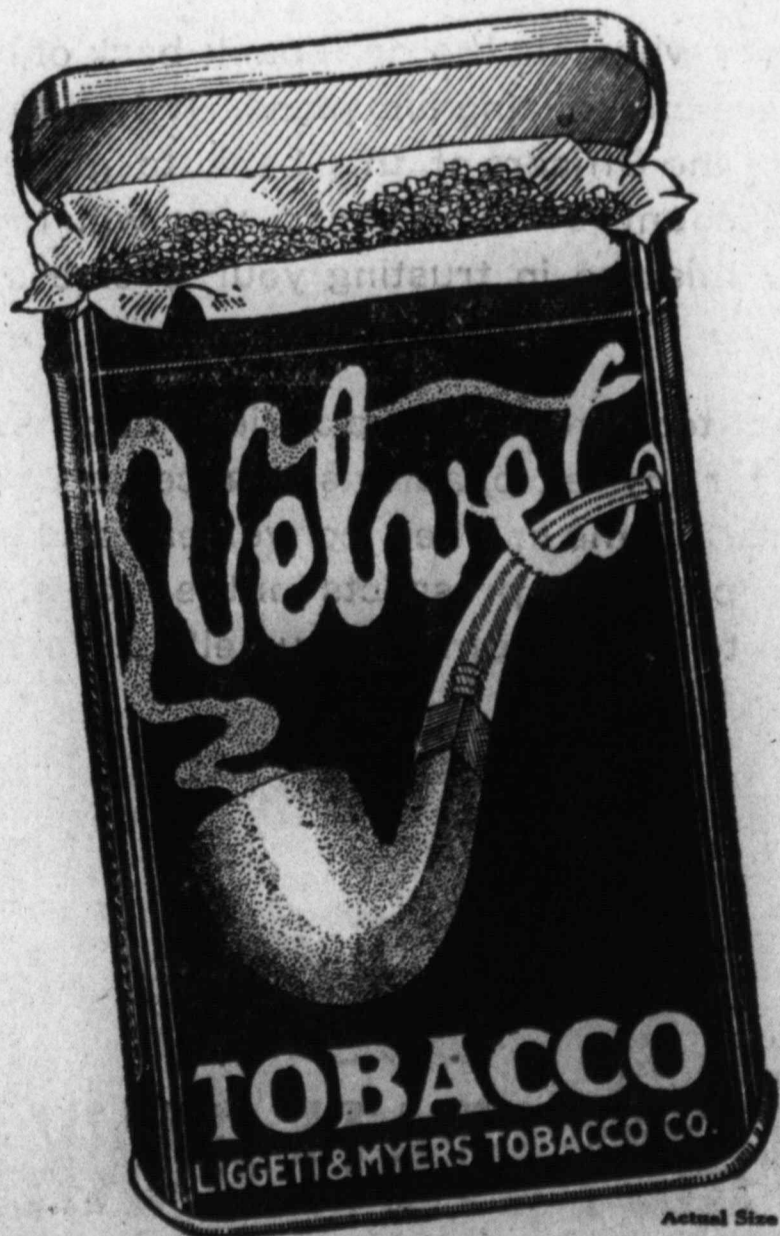

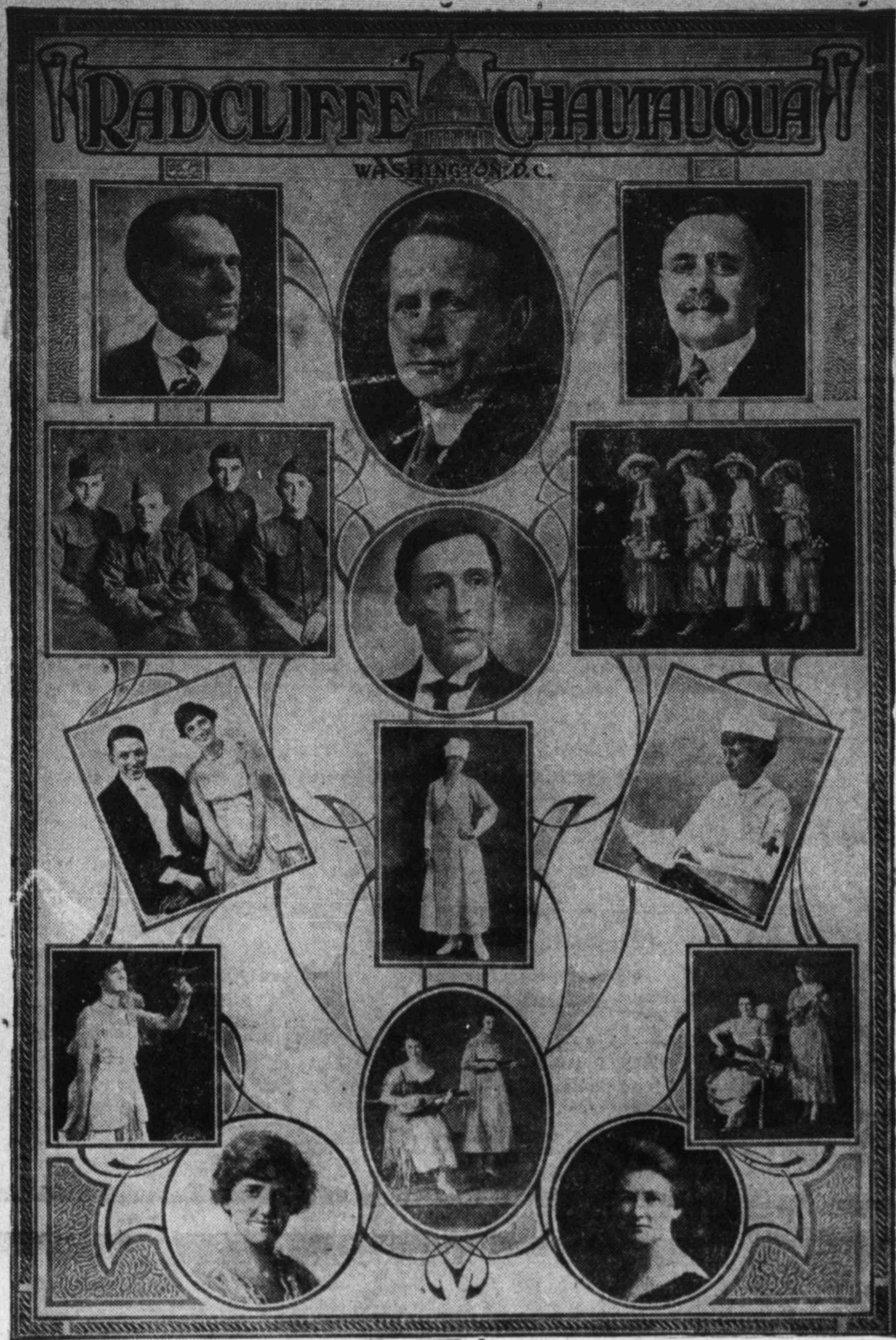

The man who owns a good farm and home in Van Zandt county is foolish to sell out and try to better his condition by moving to some other section of the state. This editor is fairly well posted on conditions as far west as Tom Green and Foard counties, and on the plains as far away as Plainview, and you can take it from us that one year with another East Texas county lay that section in the shade too far to justify comparison. The diversity of crops that can be grown most successfully here insure food for the family and feed for the stock, and the nearness to markets are considerations that should be weighed in the selection of a home. Van Zandt county is just beginning to show something of her wonderful resources, which are only starting on an era of development, that is attracting notice from all sections of the country. If you sell now and move away land will increase in value to such an extent that when you become dissatisfied elsewhere and return to the old stamping ground to seek a home, you will find you have lost by going away. To render such a reverse impossible, stay right where you are and join in the movement to put Van Zandt right

at the top as the best agricultural and stock-farming county in the state. Potatoes, persimmons and the 'possums will be abundant in the fall. Come to Van Zandt county and get a taste of the life of Auld Lang Syne. Pumpkins and perturnips should be added to the list, and these make life grand and glorious in old Van Zandt.—Wills Point Chronicle.

It is just such windy articles as the above that makes our West Texas Van Zanders dissatisfied. Need not talk about big crops, fat cattle, etc., but just mention 'possum and 'simmons, (both of which are spontaneous in the jungles of Van Zandt) and you've got 'em figuring on goin' back.

The writers "familiarity" with this country is called into question by the fact that Foard county is as far distant from Tom Green as Van Zandt is from Mitchell; and Plainview is just the beginning of the plains. Most East Texas fellows are very dense when it comes to the geography of the great empire of West Texas.

We have some Van Zanders in this county and they have already made more crop this year than they ever made before in five. Many farmers in this county this year will harvest a crop sufficient to fully pay for the land on which it grows. But it's no

RURAL SCHOOLS VS. CITY HIGH SCHOOL.

Here is a timely article by Phebe K. Warner and is published because it is worth reading and considering:

Don Campbell and Benson Eubank traveled six miles a day for ten years to complete the rural school course of Texas. This means those two farm boys walked, rode on horseback, or drove 10,800 miles to complete the rural school course of Texas. To do this they faced all kinds of weather; sunshine and rain, wind, snow, hail, blizzards, mud and dust. Some of you may not know what it means to attend a rural school in Western Texas. These boys studied the same books and learned the same lessons prescribed by the laws of Texas that the boys of Fort Worth, Dallas or Houston learned. Once in a while they had the advantage of a trained teacher, or a teacher of experience. More often they suffered the misfortune of training the teacher themselves for some better school, as most teachers who apply for positions in rural schools are teaching to educate themselves rather than the children in the school. The motive of most of our teachers is to teach a few months or years in the country to get broke in because the affiliated school will not allow them to practice on the children who are in a position to have good teachers all the time. It seems that one of the laws of nature is that the greater the difficulties are for a farm boy to get an education the poorer his teachers are sure to be. That's natural. No girl wants to drive four miles through the mud to school and build her own fires in the winter if she can get a town position and board a block or two from the schoolhouse, with a concrete walk from her room to her schoolroom and get more pay for the easier work. And the time has just about come when no man will do it. No, sir. If a man cannot have the highest position and the best paying position in the best town schools, he throws up the job and leaves the education of our future men on the farm to the mercies of our inexperienced but ambitious girls who are struggling to educate themselves. And the world pats such men on the head and says, "Good old boy. Don't blame you. Wouldn't waste my time and brains on a rural school either. Let the

girls teach the rural school. It is too hard work for men and too poor pay.

And while the world wags on the farmer and his wife, the parents of all these farm boys, are working away day and night, winter and summer, through seed time and harvest, to feed the cities and to develop a rich, raw, new country into a food producing, wealthy, taxpaying State to support the public school system and the Government, and build our State Colleges and universities. There are no more loyal taxpayers than the farmer and his wife.

When Don Campbell and Benson Eubank finished the rural school they drove twelve miles a day to attend the nearest high school for a year to complete the high school course. They did this in order to board at home, save expenses and help with the chores. They are grown up boys now. They have faced the weather for three miles every morning for ten years to go to school—surely they can stand it to ride six miles each school morning for one year in order to graduate. Their parents are just as proud of them as any other parents ever were proud of a boy and they want to prepare them for college and give them an equal chance with the other boys of their day. But here the rub comes. After the parents have done all they can for their boys, after the boys have driven half way around the world going to a rural or small town school, they take their record to the president of the State Normal College or University to enter the State school which their parents' hard work, economy and self-sacrifice have made possible. The president looks their record over and shakes his head. "You can't enter here. Your grades don't amount to a straw in this school. We do not accept any students in this school unless they are graduates of an affiliated high school. There is only one way for you to get in here and that is to take the examinations over your whole high school course." It is doubtful if the average college professor could pass a creditable grade on all that a high school course includes for four years after he began on it.

Is this democracy? Is it fair to the farmer's boy to refuse his grades because he lives beyond the reach of an affiliated school? Is he to blame?

Has he not done his part? Why should he not be accepted on trial the same as the city boy?

HUMBLE IS SPENDING 2,000,000 ON BIG PLANT NEAR CISCO.

Cisco—Realizing the advantages offered by this city in the matter of railroad transportation, water, and accessibility to their enormous oil lease holdings the Humble Oil Company is now at work with an army of men constructing various buildings in the city limits at a cost of \$2,000,000 to be used as their headquarters.

Included in those will be a machine shop, a garage, a ten-ton daily capacity ice plant, electric light and power house, a pipe shop used entirely for threading pipe, a storage garage, a warehouse, a commissary; all of which will be heated by a central steam heating plant, all of which are now in course of construction.

A platform storage, a half mile pipe rack for pipe storage and a one mile lumber rack for the storage of the company's lumber indicates the magnitude of this company's future operation: There will be three bunk houses constructed for the use of single men, furnishing each man with individual room, electrically lighted, steam heated and accessible to bath.

The administration building proper will contain 10,000 square feet of floor space. The company's own private water works system will furnish fresh supply of water at all times. The warehouse and cold storage will be used for the enormous supplies of meats, vegetables and other eatables which will be furnished to employees at Breckenridge, Sipe Springs, Ranger, Oden, Caddo and Albany oil fields and all camps where workmen are employed by the company within a radius of 75 miles of this city at cost plus 10 per cent. For employees at general headquarters here with families 31 residences are now in course of construction, containing 5, 6 and 7 rooms each, all with concrete foundations, double floors, hard wood trim and built in features of every character, reducing the necessity of purchasing large quantities of furniture.

AMERICAN COTTON ASSOCIATION MEETING.

For the purpose of discussing the high cost of living, the general economic conditions affecting cotton producers, and to recommend a minimum price for cotton, a great mass meeting will be held in New Orleans, La., September 8th and 9th, having been called by Southern Governors and the American Cotton Association through its president, J. Skottow Wannamaker, St. Matthews, S. C. The call has just been issued from the Atlanta membership campaign headquarters of the organization. The proclamation follows:

"Whereas, The President of the United States in his address to the Congress of the United States on August 8, 1919, has called attention to grave conditions of distress confronting large numbers of our people by reason of constantly rising living costs, due to the perversion of the ordinary laws of supply and demand and to the activities of speculators and profiteers in the necessities of life;

"Therefore; We, as Governors of the states of Alabama, Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, Louisiana, Mississippi, Missouri, North Carolina, Oklahoma, South Carolina, Tennessee and Texas, in association with the President of the American Cotton Association, do hereby summon representative farmers, merchants, bankers, business and professional men, from our several states hereinbefore named, to confer together in the City of New Orleans, La., on the eighth and ninth of September, and to study on behalf of the people of the south, ways and means of dealing with such prices as they relate to the life and comfort of our people."

JOHN KIRBY WILL DIRECT CAMPAIGN OF S. A. IN TEXAS

Wealthy Lumberman to Select
Executive Committee Soon
For State.

MILLION IS ASKED FOR RELIEF WORK

Money Raised in Drive to Be
Used in Building Where
Donated

John Kirby, 'millionaire' lumberman of Houston has accepted the post of chairman of the Salvation Army home service drive in Texas, which will begin in Oklahoma, Texas, Arkansas and Louisiana September 25 for \$1,000,000.

Mr. Kirby will be associated in the drive with Governor J. B. A. Robertson who is heading the drive from Oklahoma City, and Governor R. G. Pleasant of Louisiana. Governor Hobby of Texas is acting in an honorary capacity on the Texas committee.

"Mr. Kirby was selected to head the state committee because of his popularity with the citizens of Texas," Lieutenant Commander George Wood of the Dallas Salvation Army post declared yesterday. "His long association with the financial interests of the state make virtually certain the success of the home service campaign."

General in Scope

The home service campaign will be general throughout the United States. The money asked of the nation is \$12,000,000. The share of the southwestern group of states directed from Dallas is set at \$1,000,000. On an estimated population of 5,000,000 for Texas, Oklahoma and the sections of Arkansas and Louisiana included in the territory the amount required will reach 20 cents per capita.

The Salvation Army funds raised in the great cities of the southwest will be spent in the cities from which it is donated. The money will be spent entirely for the betterment of home conditions.

"The question has been asked by a former as to what his interest is in the city development of the Salvation Army is," Lieutenant Colonel Woods of the Dallas office said yesterday. "The interest is strong. It affects him directly. It strikes at his family."

City Life Protected

"The welfare of the Salvation Army is the welfare of his son or daughter who visits the great cities of the nation in search of work."

"The boy who comes to the city is given wholesome surroundings. He is given a clean bed. He is offered a place for healthy recreation. He is taught to avoid the pitfalls of city life into which he might fall were he permitted to go his way without guidance."

"The daughter of the farmer or of the man from a small town is given a clean lodging place in the girls' hotel with board at a low cost. Many girls would not be able to successfully combat the economic conditions of which they are ignorant when they come to the cities without the aid of the Salvation Army."

Thousands to Cities

"Thousands of such young people flock into the cities each year. They are employed in clothing stores, five and ten cent shops and telephone offices. In many cases the wage paid is insufficient for their needs."

"The Salvation Army steps into the breach at such times and extends a helping hand."

The Salvation Army owns in Texas two rescue, two maternity and two children's homes. In addition the organization has four workmen's hotels and two industrial stores. The rescue, maternity and children's homes are at San Antonio and El Paso.

Eighty-five working girls and 215 children have been admitted to the homes in the past year. The new state fund asked in the Salvation Army campaign will go in part for the enlargement of the San Antonio home. New buildings and institutions are planned for Oklahoma and Louisiana.

Twenty-Five in Girls' Hotel.

The girls' hotel at Dallas maintained by the Salvation Army now accommodates 25 girls, according to Lieutenant Colonel George Wood in his report for the year ending March 31, 1919. These girls, Mr. Wood declares, are given clean rooms and wholesome meals much below the cost for the poorest kind of board and room obtainable in Dallas. The home is at 1728 Corsicana street.

Many Get S. A. Groceries.

Meals and groceries have been supplied 22,104 needy citizens of the southwest by the Salvation Army in the past year, according to Lieutenant Commander George Wood of the Dallas office. 1945 were given lodgings, employment was found for 360, medical aid was given 1148. The total number of suffering people relieved by the Salvation Army in the year is 30,669. The cost of giving the relief amounted to \$17,268.48.

URGE FARMERS TO HOLD COTTON FOR BETTER PRICE ton to the bottom. 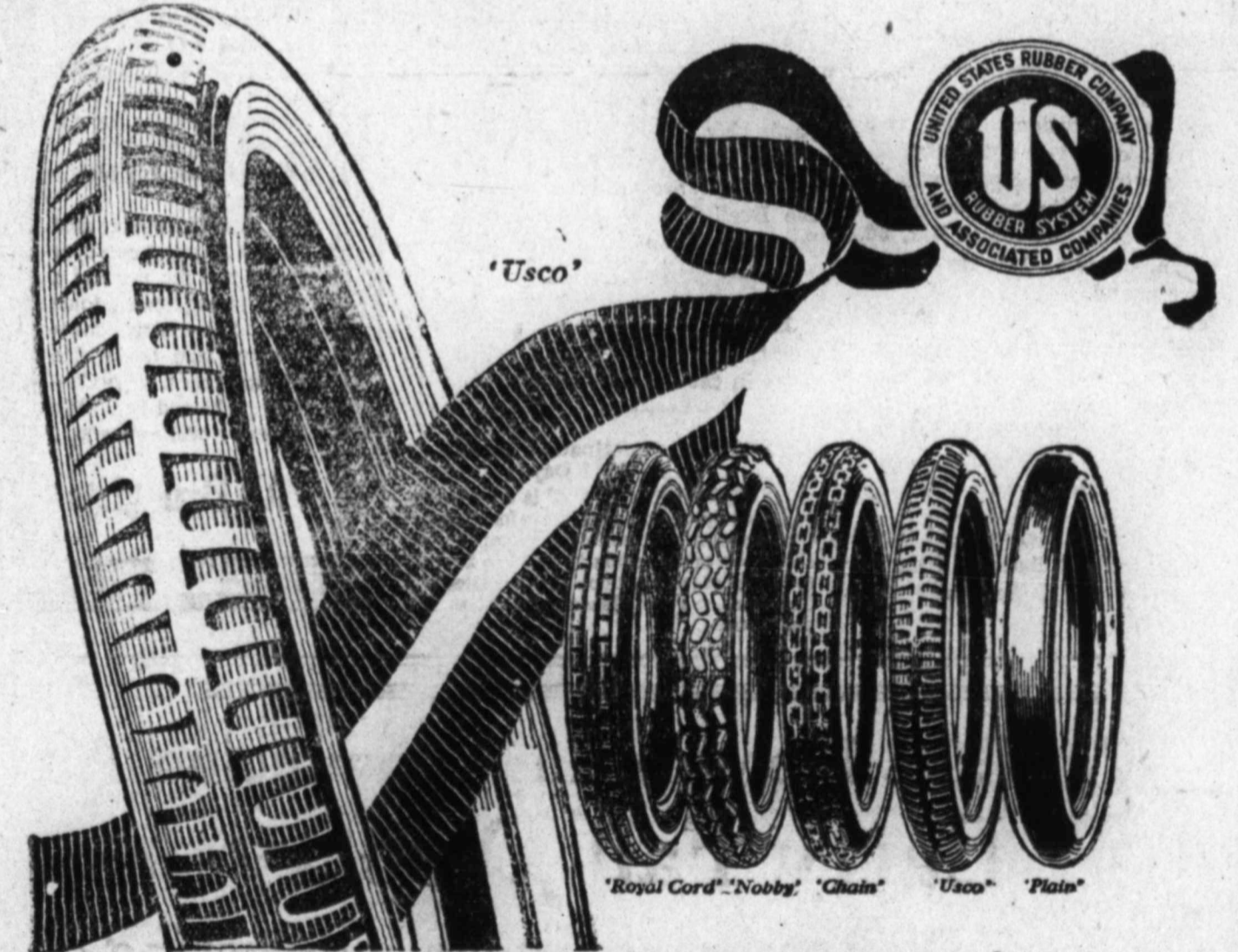
