#### THE RAIN.

A cold norther blew up Monday evening late, and everybody predicted a dry norther, to be followed by heavy frost and perhaps a freeze; It commenced to rain Monday night continuing until Tuesday morning, when the clouds opened and the floods came. The rainfall Tuesday morning amounted to 1.87 inches and it mizzled and drizzled all day, all night, and Wednesday, and is still at it. This last rain is the straw that broke the camels back. All business is at a standstill. Many farmers are about to give up hope of harvesting their crop. They have hoped for sunshine from day to day, but have not seen the sun in so long the bright orb has almost been forgotten.

The rainfall Tuesday morning of 1.87 inches brings the total for October up to 5.28 inches, which is .81 more rain than fell in the whole year of 1917, and brings the total, so far this year up to 35.10, the largest amount of rainfall of any year since 1904, and we have two months to go on yet. Since the 1st of November 1918 to 1st of November 1919 the rainfall has been 40.13. By consulting the rain table in the Record, it will be seen that 1918 had 14.36 inches of rain, but nearly all fell after the crops had or should have been matured. Look at the rain table and then guess when it will stop. Foster says November and December are to be rainy months.

# RED CROSS DRIVE TO OPEN NOV. 2

OFFICIALS LOOK FORWARD TO PLACING DIVISION FIRST "OVER THE TOP."

## WOMEN WORKERS ENROLL

Campaign Managers Say That Present Drive Is One for Membership, Not Funds.

**RED CROSS ROLL CALL FACTS**  
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- \* Begins, Sunday, November 2;
- \* closes, Armistice' Day, Tuesday, November 11.
- \* Objective: 20,000,000 memberships in the United States;
- \* 2,000,000 memberships in the Southwestern Division—the states of Missouri, Kansas, Texas, Oklahoma and Arkansas. Cost of membership, one dollar.
- \* Purpose: To maintain Red Cross at present high state of organization and efficiency as permanent national relief agency.
- \* One million volunteer workers to assist in campaign activities, to be enrolled previous to opening of drive.
- \* Soldiers, sailors and marines to aid by speaking and writing of the work of the Red Cross in the camps and overseas. Fighting men, in some cases, directing campaign.
- \* "Four-minute" men, returned service men, lawyers, newspaper men and others qualified, will speak during drive, in theatres, hotels, moving picture shows, clubs, factories, mills and stores.
- \* National advertising campaign being waged as preliminary to intensive drive. Newspapers, posters, window displays, flags, cutouts, moving picture films, dodgers, advertising slides, all carrying Red Cross messages.
- \*\*\*\*\*

When the Third Red Cross Roll Call of members is completed on Armistice Day, November 11, it is expected that 2,000,000 persons in Missouri, Kansas, Texas, Arkansas and Oklahoma—the states comprising the Southwestern Division of the Red Cross—will have answered "here" and have been enrolled as annual members of the organization.

Inasmuch as this is a decrease of 385,619 members under the record of last year, when 2,385,619 members were obtained during the Christmas Roll Call from a population of approximately 13,928,000, Red Cross officials look forward to putting the Division first "over the top" with comparatively little difficulty. The nation-wide campaign this year is expected to yield more than 20,000,000 members. As in all previous campaigns, the fee for yearly membership is \$1.

**Red Cross Sunday.** The campaign will open formally Sunday, November 2, which has been designated "Red Cross Sunday." On that day the story of the Red Cross will be told from pulpits all over the nation. Special programs will mark morning and evening services.

Vigorous preparations are being made, as evidenced by the rapid enrollment of thousands of women workers who will serve as volunteer canvassers during the campaign. More than 1,000,000 such workers are to be obtained throughout the country, whose aid will determine to an appreciable extent the successful termination of the coming campaign.

Reports reaching the Division office in St. Louis tell also of the co-operation being extended by hundreds of soldiers, sailors and marines, who are able, many of them, to tell "first person" stories of what the Red Cross did for them while the fighting was going on. These chaps are being enrolled as speakers, writers and active workers. In addition, "four-minute" men, lawyers, newspaper men and others qualified are scheduled to address audiences during the campaign on the subject of the Red Cross appeal.

**Advertising Campaign.** Enthusiasm in the campaign is being stimulated by the appearance of thousands of posters, window displays, Red Cross flags and other adjuncts of the country-wide advertising campaign now being carried on. Newspapers are carrying page, half-page and smaller advertisements bearing the Red Cross message, while periodicals, magazines and billboards, as well as street cars, trains, mercantile establishments and department store windows, all carry their quota of Red Cross advertising. Moving picture shows are exhibiting Red Cross films in a gigantic motion picture campaign that has for its object the education of the American people to the present-day needs of the American Red Cross.

Red Cross campaign officials have announced that the present drive is one for membership, not funds. In view of the large amount of work still to be completed abroad and the renewed activity incident to the inception in America of the Red Cross peace program along the lines of First Aid, Junior Membership, Nursing and Home Service, those in touch with the drive situation say the prospects are favorable for increasing Red Cross membership to a figure well over that obtained last year.

### VOTE FOR THIS AMENDMENT

The Galveston amendment ought to carry, as it effects no one but the Galveston people. Election Nov. 4.

Congressman Hudspeth sends us the following letter:

This proposed amendment to the Texas constitution authorizes the City and county of Galveston to vote for the issuance of additional seawall, breakwater and grade raising bonds, in a sum not to exceed five million dollars, without expense to or obligation upon the State, or any part of it, other than the City or County of Galveston. It is a local proposition affecting only Galveston or Galveston county, and not imposing any liability whatever for the bonds upon any community or anybody else than the people of that city or county. I feel sure everyone will be in sympathy with the efforts to allow Galveston, if she chooses to do so, an opportunity to adopt any additional protective measures against the elements that she may deem necessary or expedient. Supplying as this port does, an indispensable need to the commerce of both Texas and the nation, the necessity for the adoption of the amendment is of vital importance to the whole State; the permission which the amendment gives going no further than to enable Galveston to erect and construct additional safeguards and protection against the sea—entirely at her own expense.

"It is desired that the purpose and scope of the amendment be fully understood, so that the people of the State will not vote against the amendment through a lack of information concerning it. Being in sympathy with it myself, I feel sure that the people of Galveston will appreciate anything that you may be able to do to see that the proposed amendment is generally understood by as many as possible.

In connection with the organization, the annual meeting of the Bankhead Highway, which is promoting a National Highway from Washington to San Diego, California, and a number of good roads organizations will hold meetings during the Good Roads Week in April.

One of the most attractive features of the Convention will be a display of Road Machinery, road material, trucks, tractors and automobiles.

United States Senator John H. Bankhead, who is president of the United States Good Roads Association, and author of the Bankhead Federal Aid Bill of eighty-five million dollars annually for the building of good roads throughout the country, is quite enthusiastic about this meeting and gives assurance that the Governors will send heads of various departments to the meeting. It is proposed to have a Government exhibit of good roads machinery and models at the coming convention. Director General Roundtree left headquarters to carry an enthusiastic message to the people of Hot Springs, Ark., about the coming convention.

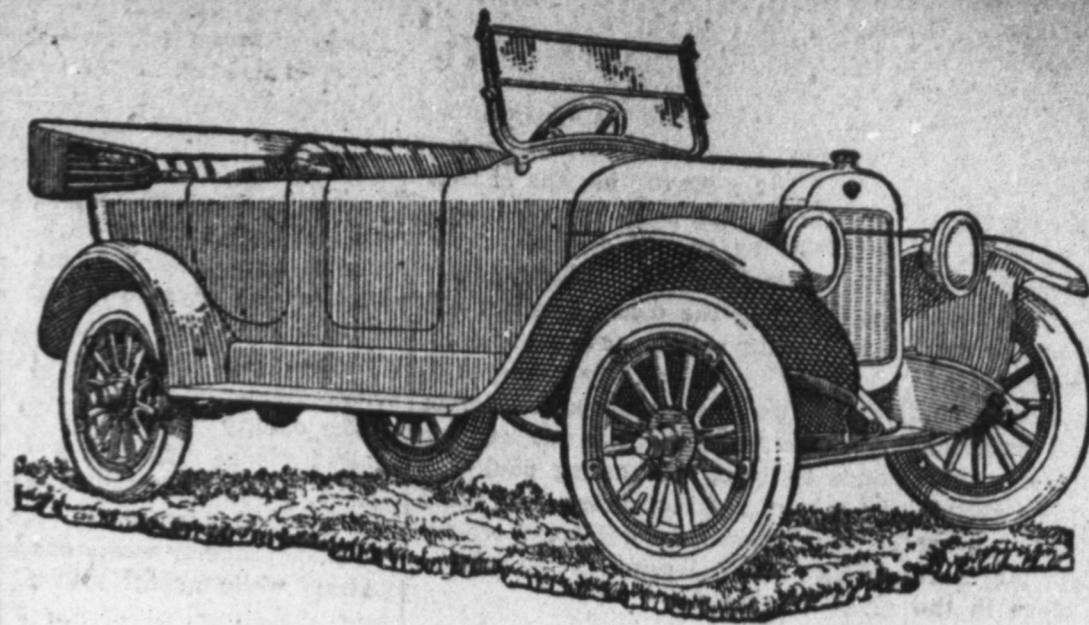

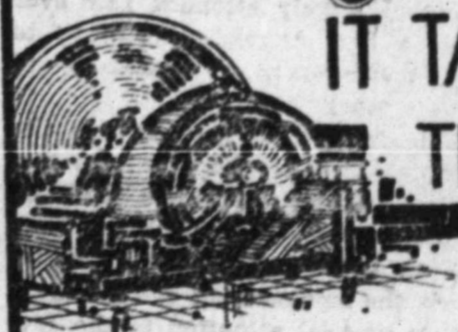

The Mitchell county boom is on the way—in fact it is already here.

Interesting oil news will be ready in a short time. Oil is reported in two of the test wells in Howard county.

Anyway we are going to have a good bottom season for next year's crops. It has been many years since old West Texas has had such a soaking as it has received the past month.

Our people are too busy to talk oil, but the oil boom is coming to Mitchell County. Things are now about shaped up and in a few weeks there will be something doing.

Between the constitutional amendments, Red Cross drive and the Salvation Army, Y. M. C. A., and Baptist 75 million campaign, the Record has but little space left. If we were to publish all the free "propaganda" stuff sent us, we could get out a daily as large as the Record and not write a line of copy.

People who come in by cars from the east say that they pass on the way tourists' wagons in untold numbers and in groups, not headed eastward as during the drought, but all headed for the West. The rains, the oil and the natural advantages of the West, coupled with the consequent advertisement our country is now receiving are fast pulling us on the hill-top, and while the values of land everywhere are soaring, Mitchell county lands are held at reasonable prices. Real estate men report that it is hard to get good farms listed for sale.

It is estimated by cotton buyers and others interested in the cotton crop that at least 40 per cent of the Mitchell county crop has been lost by the excessive rains and continued gloomy weather. Hundreds of acres of the late June planting will now not open; lots of the older cotton has bolls rotting on the stalk, and the sample and grade has all been badly damaged. It was first estimated that this county would get 30,000 bales; a fair estimate now is 20,000 bales. Hundreds of tons of feed has been lost in the fields and much of the late planted feed will not now mature. Foster predicts continued rains all through November and December, and the end of the devastation of the crops is not yet in sight.

BOUQUETS OF ROSES.

The Christoval Observer says: "The Colorado Record, one of the best newspapers in the Lone Star State, in appealing to its subscribers to pay up, says: (Here he reproduces our article last week and concludes) "If any newspaper in West Texas deserves the unqualified support of its subscribers and advertisers it is the Record, for it has always boosted its section whether it was wet or dry—and besides it's a paper of which any town should feel proud.

If the Record can secure a writer and do some other things we have in mind we will probably get out a holiday edition of the paper early in December. If we undertake it the edition will be gotten out with a view of mailing them east for advertising purposes.

The new time suits us alright. When we get up in the morning at 6 o'clock and not seven, when we go to church at 11 o'clock it's sure enough 11 o'clock and not twelve. A child in the office this week asked if changing the time back one hour would make Christmas any longer coming.

The Record force is now reduced to family force assisted by "Farmer" Simpson. It is impossible to get labor. We have offered \$35 per week for 8 hour men and can not get them. We will do all we can by working overtime and will wait on the crying public just as fast as possible.

Mitchell County and Colorado are coming into their own. With all the gins running full time; two grain threshers going full blast; oil mill and compress running over time; ice and coal wagons on the job; unloading of cars of merchandise daily; two pens of hogs and three yards of horses on the market, to say nothing of blooded dairy stock and fancy chickens shipped in; banks and merchants busy; town full of oil prospectors; farmers bringing in 38 cent cotton and \$20 feed; garages overcrowded; hotels and rooming houses full—all these things are making things hum and the little fellow hide out. All this too, with the rain falling in torrents almost every day, and the sun very seldom visible.

That East Texas fellow who wrote about West Texa bseing a place where "farmers are scarce and prickly pears and mesquite beans being the chief products," is getting sore. Nearly every West Texas paper has given him a rap. This week the Lockney Beacon says:

"The East Texas writer is just a common liar, and that's 'nuff said. A liar is a liar, wherever you find him, whether he lies for money or to injure the character or reputation of some individual or locality. The man that wrote the above (referring to the article quoted from) hasn't enough brains to pound sand into a rat hole, and take him out of the pine woods of East Texas and he would starve to death in a land of plenty. Some of these hill billies have got more gall and malaria than brains, and the stunts like the above mentioned paragraph is rather amusing."

FOSTER SAYS:

I expect a severe cold wave in the middle Northwest during the week centering on October 25. Preceding this cold wave dangerous storms are expected in the great central valleys. But if a hurricane appears in the Caribbean sea the central valley storms will be weakened or broken up and in their place the cold wave much increased. This great storm is expected largely to increase rainfall. If the hurricane organizes the increased rain will be in the great central valleys of the middle Southwest. West of Rockies' crest rainfall will not increase as much as it usually does in the fall season. Frosts are expected to touch the northern border of the cotton belt following these severe storms. In a general way crop weather will be favorable to winter grain but some parts of the Southern states will probably get more rain than will be good for the top growth and cotton picking.

**AGAINST THE ROAD AMENDMENT**

Voters and taxpayers please bear in mind that in a few days five amendments to the constitution are to be voted on. I have read in the daily papers that if all these are adopted it will be possible to raise our taxes to \$5 or \$6 on the hundred. Some years ago they were only about four cents on the hundred. You hear a good deal these days about the high cost of living, but I want to say to you that the high cost of governments is an easy winner in the race against the high cost of living. The H. C. of G. has far outstripped the H. C. of L. All our officials run wild? Is it not an evidence of greed and stupidity? We have on hand too much wild-catting, graft and incompetency.

But I wish to speak only of the proposed State Highway amendment, though I have some doubt as to the wisdom of adopting any of them.

I am opposed to bonding the state for \$75,000,000 for state highways. Before the debt could be paid it would amount to over one hundred and fifty million. Think of that! It is only a small thing to those "boosers." This proposition was not demanded or even suggested by the people—those who pay the bulk of the taxes, but by a lot of road boosters, the road commission board, (Hancock, his bunch, etc.) a set of political appointees and incompetents who want more money to hand out at their own sweet will. Notice now what they have done with the money we have already entrusted to them:

When the State Commission re-

dered a report, seventeen months after it sprang into existence, it had collected from the people who own automobiles \$3,721,961.45. Of this amount it had paid out \$163,693.37 on the roads of Texas, and spent for their own salaries and office expense \$347,809.86. Over two dollars for themselves for every dollar paid out for all the roads for all the people.

Now don't that dumbfound and befuddle you? How kind and gullible the people are to stand it. Now if you feel like taxing yourself \$75,000,000 to turn over to that wad of squanderers and boosters you go ahead and vote for the amendment. If not you go with me and vote against it. No wonder they had a frousy fuss among themselves. Too much money poured out before a bunch who hitherto had never been able to flag a bread wagon.

We have laws enough on the subject now. Each county, as the people see proper, vote bonds and do their own road improving. Better continue to do the work locally as we have begun. It would be unjust for the state to set in now and tax the counties that have already voted road bonds as much as those that have not. Besides the counties remote from the state highways would have to pay as much as those through which the highways run. That would not be reasonable or just. Vote this proposition down by all means and thus keep your money at home instead of turning it over to this wild board of jaunters and boosters.

The other propositions are to permit Galveston county to vote upon itself a large bonded debt to build a sea wall, to separate the A. & M. College from the University of Texas to have a constitutional convention to rewrite our state constitution, and another to increase the pay of the old Confederate soldiers. You look over these propositions and take your choice. But don't forget that road monster proposition and black its eye good and hard.

Election November 4th, you'll have to hurry.

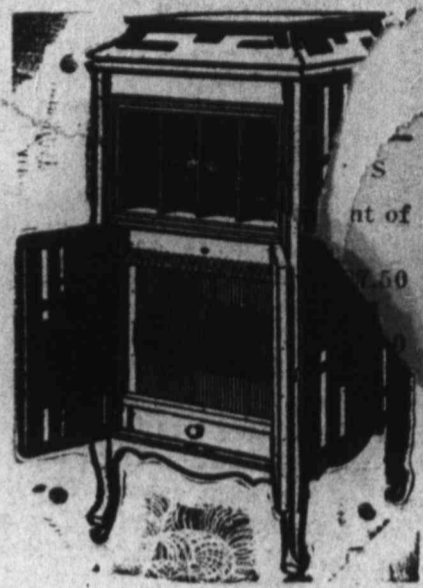

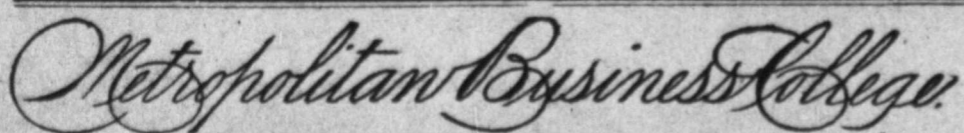

#### HOLD YOUR COTTON FOR 45c—YOU WILL GET IT

To Farmers Institutes:

I again appeal to you to urge your people to stand by your Department of Agriculture and the State Farmers' Institute, who are trying to get a profitable price for your produce.

W. C. Langford, Congressman from Georgia, on Sept. 6th said in Congress, "We sell cotton at 30 cts per pound and buy it back manufactured at \$3.00 a pound, and oftentimes at \$10 to \$15.00 a pound. Farmers ought to get 75 cents per pound for cotton." Congressional Record, Sept. 6, p. 5266.

English spinners at the New Orleans conference admitted that on last year's cotton crop they made clear 50 cents a pound or \$225.00 a bale. Mr. Nasmith, a great English spinner says "England can take all the American cotton and pay cash for it." What more is necessary to convince you that you ought to hold for 45 cents?

In 1917 Mr. Davis asked you to hold for 30 cents, and told you that it was worth it, and that you would get it if you would hold, although the speculators had fixed the price at from 9 to 15 cents. Later, cotton passed the 30 cent mark. In 1918 he told you to hold for 35 cents, that conditions more than justified the price. He was hooted at by a certain gang, but cotton soon passed the 35 cent mark. This was the crop that the spinners made such tremendous profit on. All now admit the truth of the Commissioners prophecies.

Every sensible, well informed person predicts that cotton will go to 50 cents before January 1st and none predict lower prices. The world is short 5,000,000 bales or more, and must have your cotton. Hold at all hazards. Put it in a warehouse and call for negotiable receipt if necessary, and save your white and unstained cotton as it will bring a premium in a short time.

#### ELECTION NOT FOR BONDS.

You may have noticed in the papers some discussion that the adoption of this amendment meant that the state would immediately issue seventy-five million dollars of bonds. It means nothing of the kind! and its adoption does not actually require the issuance of a single bond. A careful reading of the amendment will show that it is in the nature of an enabling act to the legislature to authorize by the passage of a law the issuance of bonds by the Governor, the money to be expended in the construction of a state system of hard surfaced highways. This simply means that the state is given the authority to provide funds for aiding in completing the system of roads that the present law declares is a public necessity and directs the State Highway Department to establish. If the amendment is adopted the procedure should be that the State Highway department would submit to the legislature programs covering construction actually demanded for the completion of the system of state roads, supplementing the money now being spent by the different counties in building these roads, and that this state money would be available for doing construction work in coordinating the parts of state roads in the different counties for which county funds are not available under the constitution, and for which there is no way now open to the Highway Department to secure money with which to complete the connecting links between county systems of the state highway system, and to secure which the law now declares the necessity for doing in the establishment of a state system of permanent highways reaching all parts of the state and increasing the value of the investment in good roads of every county in the state.

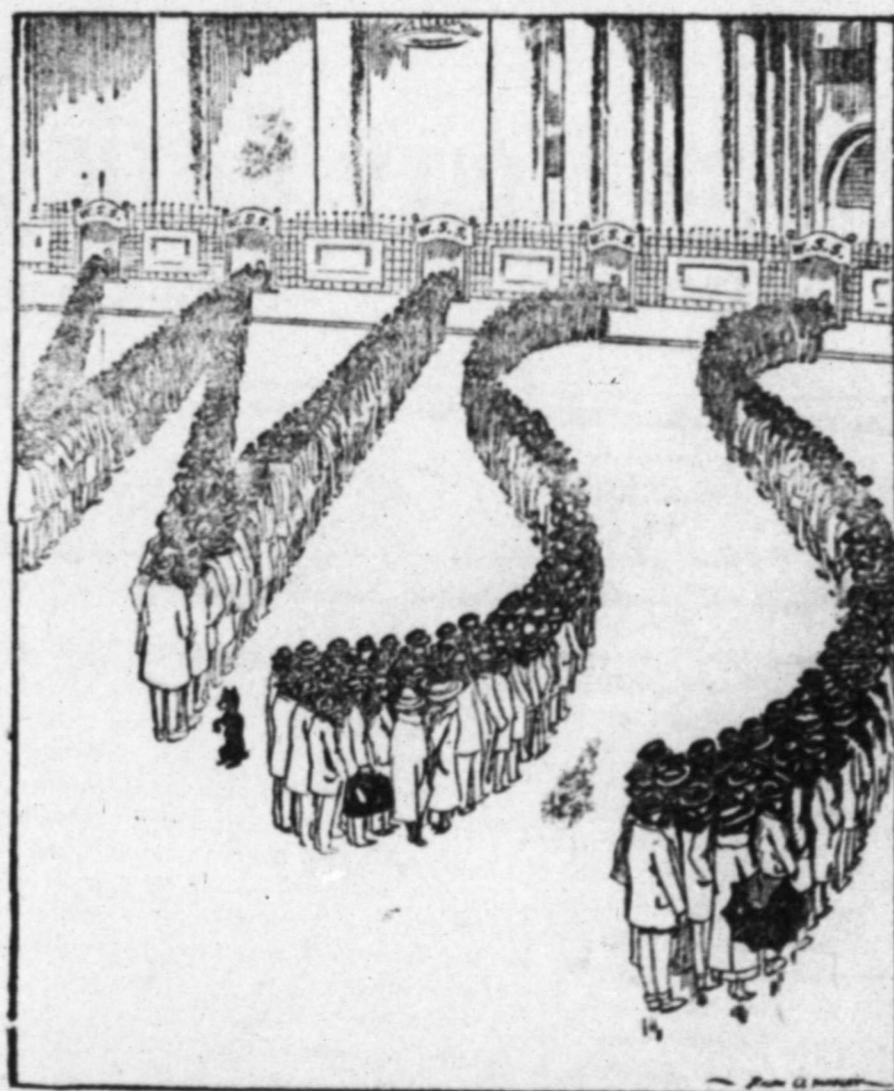

RED CROSS WOMEN WILL WEAR UNIFORMS IN DRIVE.

"Once a Red Cross Worker, Always a Red Cross Worker," Will Be Slogan Adopted.

Red Cross workers will be interested in a recent announcement of Alfred Fairbank, manager of the Southwestern Division, American Red Cross, of St. Louis, that 1,000,000 volunteer workers, most of whom will be women, will be needed for the Third Red Cross Roll Call, November 3 to 11.

A house-to-house canvass of every city, town and county in the nation will be one of the features of the Roll Call, and it is expected that the wearing of the uniform will have much to do with bringing back the former war-time spirit of loyalty and devotion.

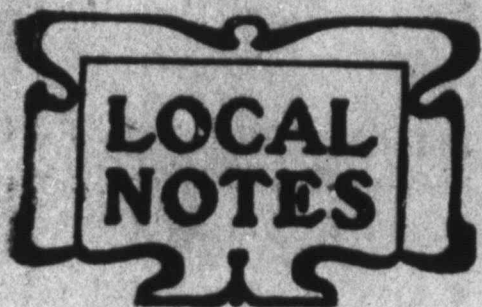
