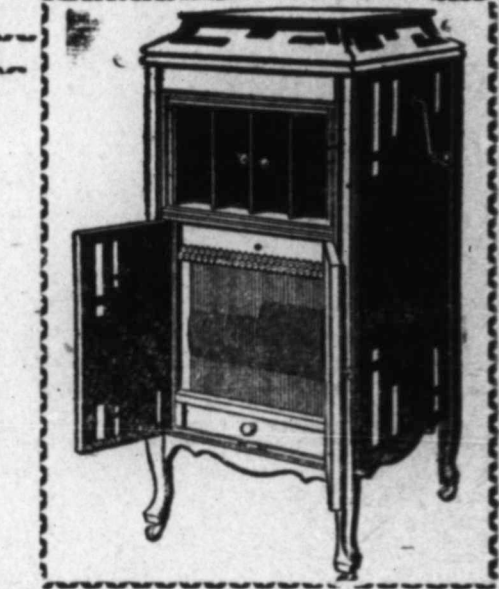

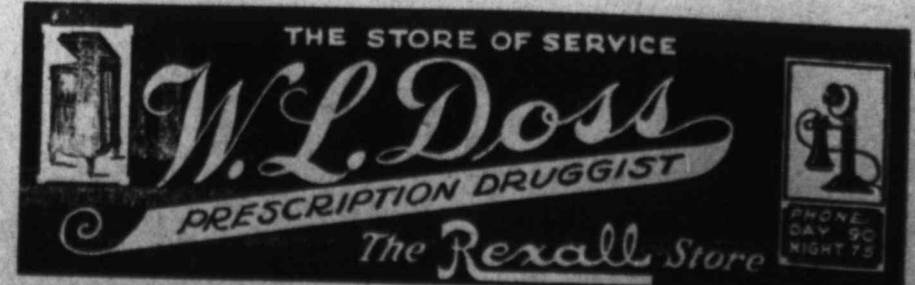

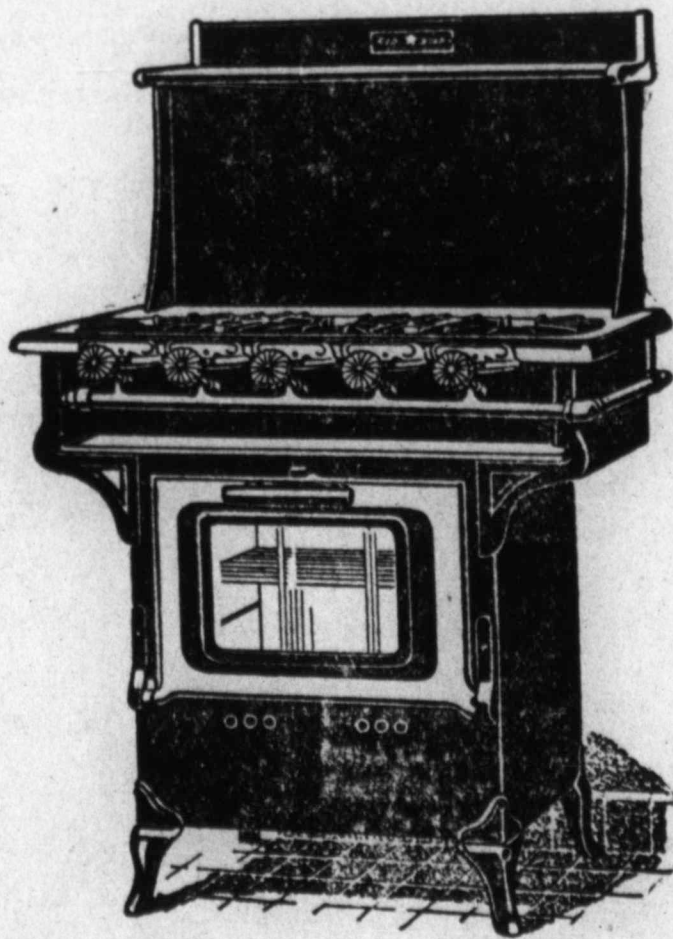

BANK DEPOSITS SHOW WEALTH OF COUNTY

The bank statements are usually indicative of the condition of the country in which they are located and are a very good criterion by which to go. There was never a time in the history of Colorado and Mitchell County when her people were in better condition financially as a whole nor when money was more plentiful and the people more generous in giving or more lavish in spending. Since they have the coin they feel that they can spend it.

An inspection into the financial condition of the three banks of Colorado at the close of business December 31 disclose the fact that our people have money to burn.

Mr. Stoneroad cashier at the city Bank says it is certain there has not been as much money on deposit in his bank at any one time in the past ten years as at this time. At this bank there were on deposit \$724,195.80.

Mr. Joe Smoot cashier of the Colorado National bank says the same will apply to this bank as there was on deposit \$679,584.03.

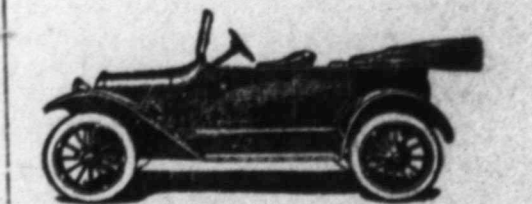

Washington records could be seen, some of the best men and women in San Antonio had also been shadowed. He protested against the establishment of a veritable system of espionage in this country. This condition, however with heavy taxation and other complaints, the business men must remedy by going to the polls and primary conventions and expressing his vote.

He criticized the attitude of the coal strikers and their leaders and of the Government's method of adjusting the strike. The poor people principally will pay the bill for the increased wages of the miners. "I think said Bailey, "that every American citizen has a right to quit work when he does it is the right of any other American citizen to take his job."

In ten or fifteen years, he predicted, the radical labor and Socialist element will control Texas absolutely through the cities of Dallas, Fort Worth, Houston and San Antonio unless the business men and farmers assert themselves politically.

"I can understand a college professor being a socialist," said Bailey, after quoting a professor's book on Socialism, "because he can't understand how some men can make a million dollars without knowing Latin and Greek, whereas the professor knows Latin and Greek and works for \$3,000 a year. He places too much value on education and not enough on common sense and he thinks a government under which common sense achieves more than education is wrong."

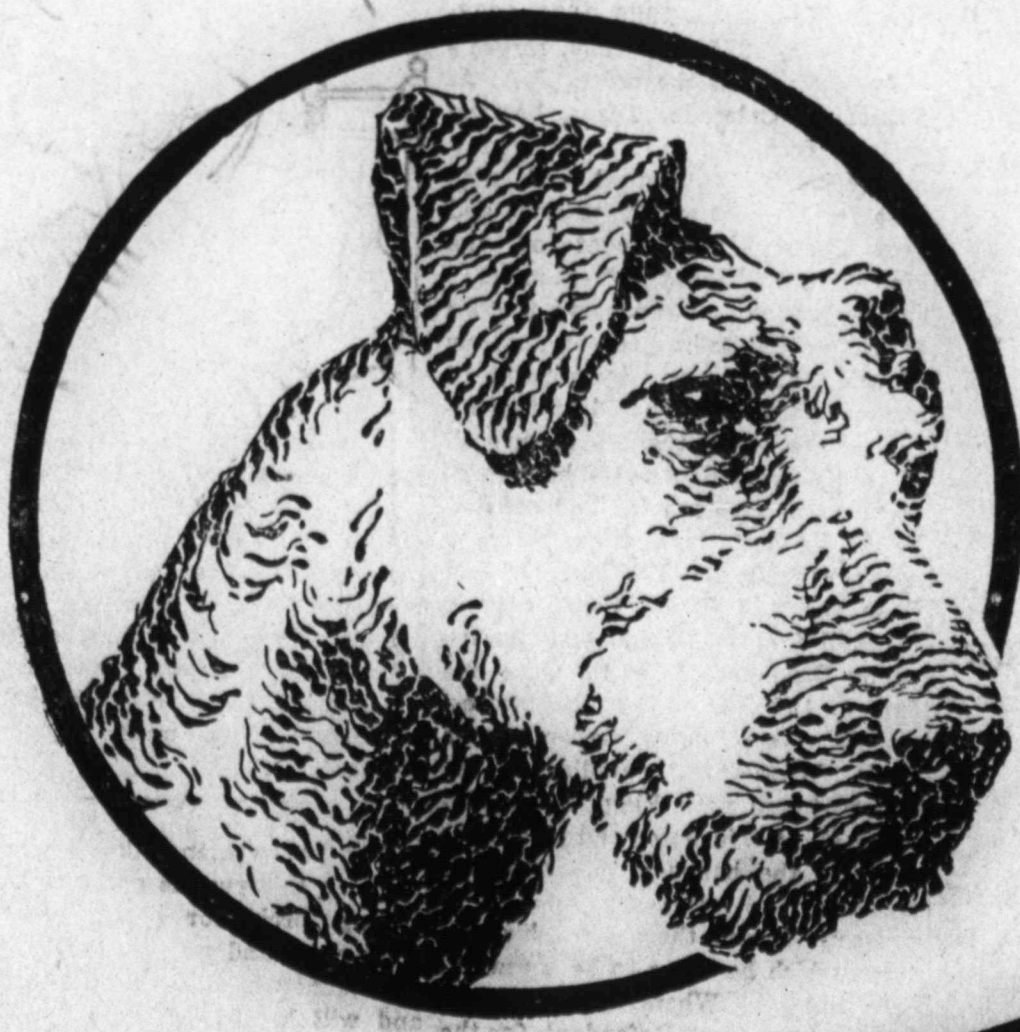

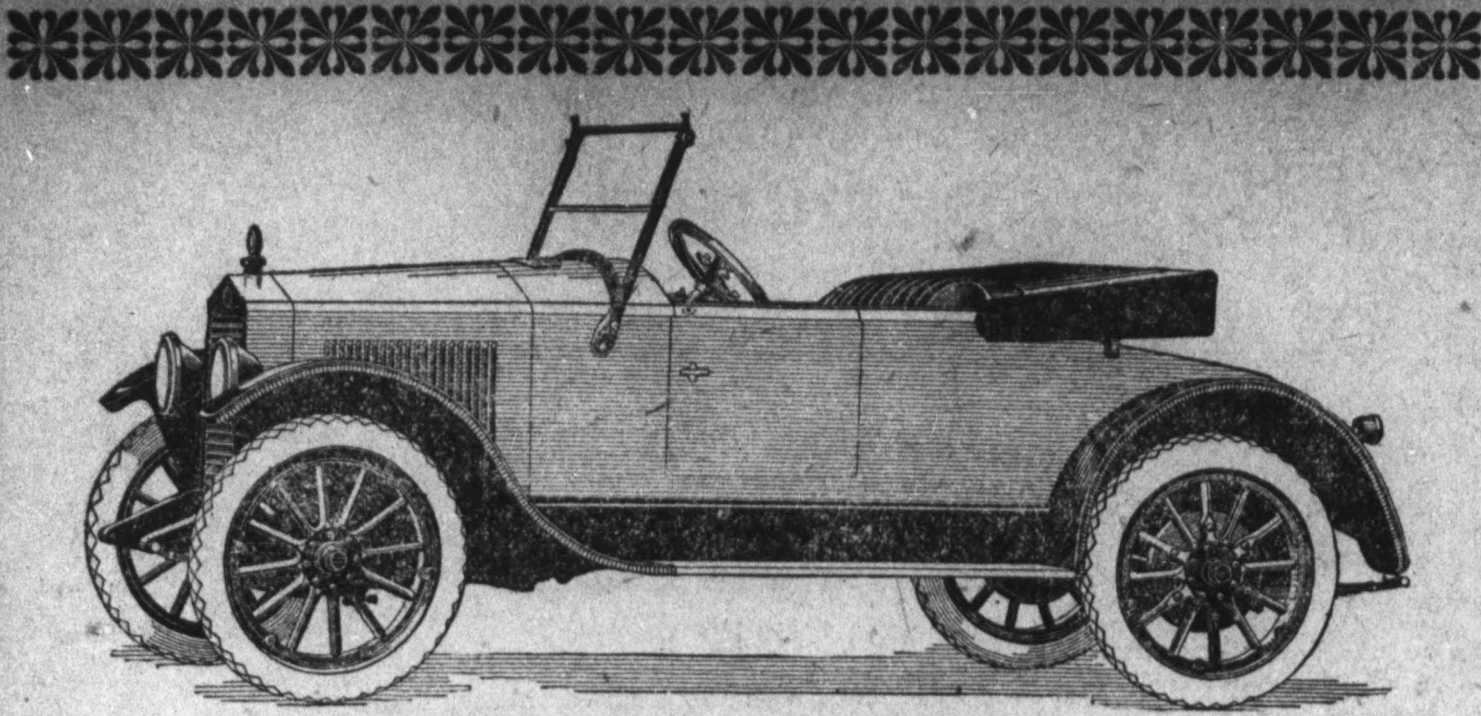

UNCLE SAM AND THE FARMER

The year through which we have just passed has been a prosperous one for the stockman and the farmer but especially for the cotton farmer. A bountiful yield and the high prices received for cotton and other products of the farm will no doubt more than double the number of Income Tax Payers among the farmers for the year 1919. It should be borne in mind by those who have never made an Income Tax report, but who will be due a tax for 1919, that it is not necessary for the Government to notify you of your liability. The law places the duty squarely on you and you should inform yourself as to the requirements and comply with them. Ample time is allowed in which your Income Tax return may be legally filed—failure to file it on time renders you liable to severe penalties.

The Filing Date

Returns (or reports) for the calendar year 1919 may be filed at any time after Jan. 1st, 1920, but not later than March 15th, 1920.

Where Filed

They may be mailed to "A. S. Walker, Collector, Austin, Texas," or filed with a Deputy Collector if one is near you.

Income Tax Forms

Ask your banker for one—if he can't supply you, write to A. S. Walker, Collector, Austin, Texas, and ask for form 1040—A if you made less than \$5000 in 1919 and for Form 1040 if your income exceeded this sum.

Single Persons

Every single man and every single woman whose net income for 1919 was \$1000 or more must file a report. Remember that your board, lodging and other personal expenses are not deducted in figuring your net income.

Married Persons

Every married man whose income,

including that of his wife, amounted to \$2000 or more must file a report. Don't forget that \$2000 net income will require you to file a report—the fact that you may have dependent children entitling you to an additional exemption does not relieve you of making the report.

Widows and Widowers

Single persons, including widows and widowers, are required to file income tax reports if their net income for the year amounts to as much as \$1000. You may have dependents that will give you an additional exemption but the law says you must file report if your income equals or exceeds \$1000.

Do It Now

Go through your bank book, cancelled checks, cotton tickets, store accounts and bills, and other records and figure the amount of cotton and other produce sold and other income received. Make a detailed list of the expenses you paid from January 1st 1919 to Dec. 31, 1919. Then present your figures to the Deputy Collector nearest you—he is an employee of the Government and will assist you in making up your return without charge—that's his business.

HIGHER PRICES PERMANENT

Dallas, Texas, January.—The public should recognize that there is nothing in the agricultural situation as it exists today to indicate materially cheaper prices for food-stuffs.

The country's acreage of fall wheat is fully twenty-five percent less than last year; there is less poultry and livestock on the farms today than a year ago; in Texas this is especially true of hogs and cattle.

In 1919 agricultural production was less in quantity than in 1918 chiefly because of the scarcity of farm labor, although the value of the products was greater.

Farm labor will be even scarcer this year than last. The tremendous demand in the towns and cities is attracting men from the country daily and there is now but fifty percent of the population engaged in the production of what it and the remaining fifty percent require for food; a few years ago sixty-five percent of the population was on the farms.

All of these things indicate that food prices will not be lessened; that the home garden is a vital necessity for many people this year; that efforts to increase the poultry and livestock on the farms are necessary, and that a full acreage of corn, peanuts and the grain sorghums for feeding purposes should be planted in Texas this spring.

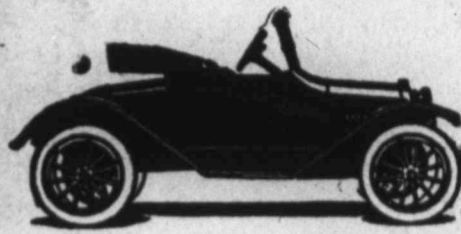

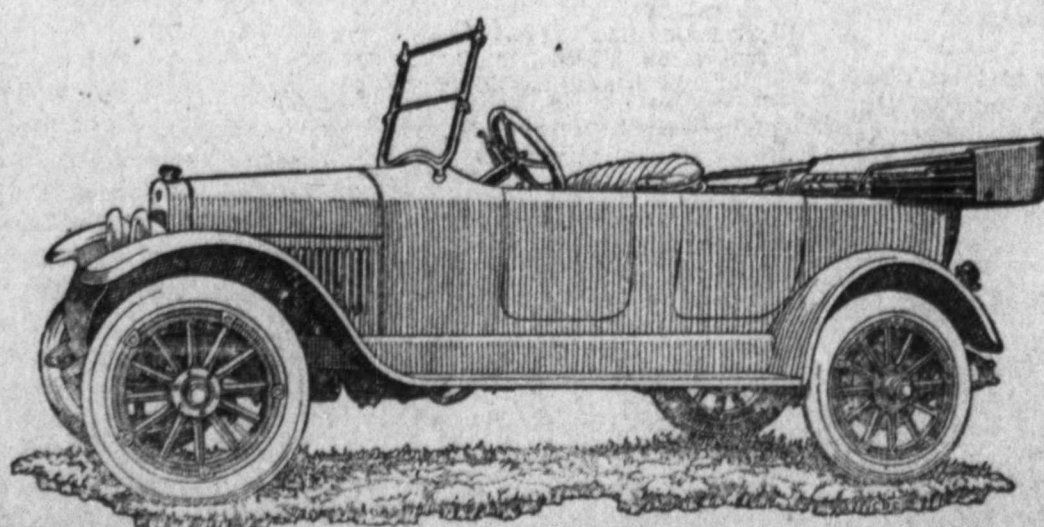
