Last week was probably the windiest week this section, and the western states, for that matter has ever known. High winds prevailed the entire week and the entire state of

Texas and surrounding states suffered damages. Towns throughout central Texas reported damage to buildings and loss of property and crop, running into a high figure.

Preparations are being made for the entertainment of the contestants who will participate in the Interscholastic Meet of the 10th District, to be held at Abilene April, 16-17. The athletic part of the meet, with the exception of tennis, has been eliminated this year, due to the fact that accommodations for the large crowds attending these events could not be had. The directors for the meet are as follows: Superintendent R. D. Green of the Abilene Public Schools, Director General; Prof. R. N. Richardson, head of the Department of History in Simmons College, Director of Athletics; D. A. Clark of Sweetwater, Director of Debating. In the intellectual events will be included contests in debating, spelling, junior and senior; declamation, junior and senior. There will also be special rural contests in all events except debating. Several hundred students from the eleven counties in the 10th District are expected to attend the meet.

DISTRICT M. E. CONFERENCE

Convened at Colorado April 2 to 4. Good Session and Much Interest

The Sweetwater District conference of the M. E. Church South met in the Methodist church, Colorado, Texas, 9 a. m. Friday, February the 2nd and adjourned on the evening of February the 4th. Nineteen pastoral charges were represented. Eighteen pastors were present. Quite a number of laymen were in attendance. Some sixty in all present.

A spirit of optimism prevailed throughout the sessions. Both preachers and laymen are expecting great things in the District this year. Already the revival fires are burning, souls are being saved and churches being revived. Many of the preachers reported finances in full for the year.

Rev. W. E. Lyon conference Missionary secretary was present and delivered his lecture on the needs of the "Near East" illustrated on canvas. Rev. J. W. Hunt, pastor of St. Pauls, Abilene, visited the conference and delivered an address in favor of Abilene as being the logical location for an "A" grade Methodist college. The conference voted unanimously in favor of Abilene. This enterprise will take shape by or before the first of January 1921.

Many topics were discussed during the conference, viz. The spiritual state of the church, building churches, paying debts, holding revivals, Sunday schools etc.

The woman's missionary society occupied an hour in the rendition of a very interesting program led by Mrs. Judge Leslie. Prominence was given to religious service. Three sermons per day, were delivered by the brethren all of them spiritual, eloquent and up lifting.

The District is manned by a strong well equipped body of young men, many of them already great preachers.

Every service was "Shot through" with spiritual fervor. All who attended were greatly blessed.

Many places were put in nomination for place of holding the District Conference next year. Snyder was the successful candidate.

DOES THIS CONCERN YOU?

The State Superintendent of School has recently sent out a letter to all schools requesting a report showing the number of textbooks on hand. This report must be in the office at Austin by April 25. The custodian of books is under bond and required to account for all books shipped to each school. These books do not belong to individuals, but are the property of the state and must be returned by the child when he withdraws from school who have not returned their books nor paid for same. In some cases the parents of these children have been notified to return the books, but they too have ignored the request. Now, every one will admit that it is not the teacher's duty to go over the district collecting such books as are still out. The people who have these books are the only ones responsible for them and this method is taken to respectfully request those who have not yet turned in state books to do so at once or pay for same at price marked on cover of book. It is our purpose to treat every one courteously, but these books must be turned in.

POLITICAL GOSSIP

Dallas, Texas.—"I don't believe that the Panhandle will know that Joe Bailey ever was supposed to run," says James McDowell of Farwell, Texas, in a letter to Col. Thomas Ball of the Democratic Administration Executive Committee, under date of March 12.

Mr. McDowell is a prominent stock and ranch man and has a wide acquaintance throughout the plains country. His letter follows:

"Two years ago I stumped the county against Ferguson and urged the voters to support the man for Congress who would support President Wilson. I am very glad to see the candidates, (all but the outlaws) all lined up for the greatest man in the world. Glad to know that the Democrats of this commonwealth are not willing to be drugged by the 'has-beens' or 'would like to be's.'"

"I don't believe that the Panhandle will know that Joe Bailey ever was supposed to run."

"Let us see that we get a solid delegation for San Francisco who will honor the Great State. I assure you that I am willing to put my shoulder to the wheel for the defeat of anything pertaining to Baileyism."

Secretary Collins says similar letters are being received from all over Texas.

The Montgomery, Alabama, Adviser, commenting on the candidacy of Ex-Senator Bailey says: "A conspicuous weakness in his program is that he calls bluntly for a repudiation by Texas Democrats of the Wilson administration. If Texas' forty delegates should stand in a block against the Wilson administration at San Francisco it would mean a split in the party; it would place the party in an impossible position. It would be most unfortunate and unjust for the party to 'repudiate' the administration, and it has no intention of doing that."

The Roscoe Times asks: "What kind of a 'Democratic' gathering is it that would feel insulted by a shout of approval of the great head of the Democratic Party?" And the Snyder Signal answers: "Just the Joe Bailey Kind."

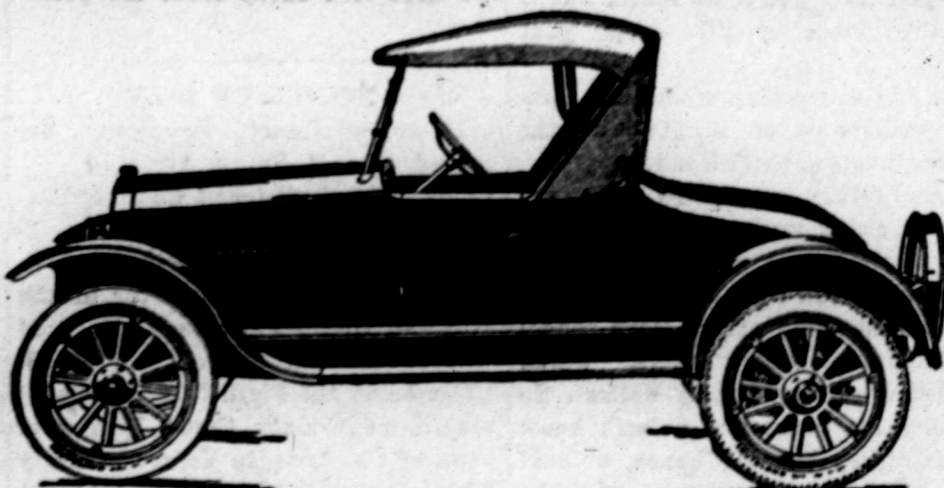

Colorado Represented by Judge C. H. Earnest and J. H. Greene.

Hot Springs, Ark. April 3—After seven weeks of hard work during which time every governor in the United States has been communicated with, high officials in Washington informed of the meeting and invited to attend, delegates named and recorded from over thirty states in the union, Director General Rountree, of the United States Good Roads and Bankhead National Highway Association, which, with the Albert Pike Highway Association, will hold their annual convention here the week of April 12 to 18, informed the Board of Governors of the Business Men's League, under whose auspices the meetings will be held, that "everything is ready for the biggest and most important meeting in the history of our organizations."

Hot Springs regards these conventions as the biggest event of its kind that has ever taken place in the world famous Spa. There is not a feature, from a gaily decorated city to the exemplification of southern hospitality, that will be overlooked.

Prominent Men to Attend.

Some of the most prominent men in the nation will be here. The list is headed by Vice President Thomas R. Marshall, who will arrive Wednesday, April 14. The following day is to be officially known as the convention program as "Marshall Day", and besides addressing the delegates at the convention, the vice-president, to gether with officers of the Bankhead National Highway and Albert Pike Associations, will also assist in the unveiling of a beautiful concrete marker that is being built by Burton D. Hurd, first vice-president of the Four States Branch of the Bankhead National Highway. J. D. Fountleroy, divisional director of the bureau of public roads for the states of Arkansas, Oklahoma and Texas, will also attend the convention and A. G. Batchelder, Washing-

ton, chairman of the executive board of the American Automobile Association, and H. G. Mock, St. Louis, secretary of the chamber of commerce of Automobile Dealers' Association, will also deliver addresses, as will Pyke Johnson, secretary of the chamber of commerce of Automobile Manufacturers of America.

Highway Engineers' Meeting

Arrangements have been made for the highway engineers of Arkansas, Alabama, Arizona, Oklahoma, Mississippi, Louisiana, Delaware, Missouri, North Carolina, Maine, Ohio, and North Dakota to hold a special session during the good roads convention, while the county judges of this and all the other southern states have been invited to meet in special convention that week, having been called here by Judge E. P. Toney, of Lake Villiage, president of the Arkansas County Judges Association.

General Exhibits No. 2: Illinois State Fair, Springfield, August 20-28; Illinois-Indiana Fair, Danville, August 29-September 4; Indiana State Fair Indianapolis, September 6-11; Tennessee State Fair, Nashville, September 20-25; Chattanooga Interstate Fair, Chattanooga, October 2-9; Alabama state Fair, Birmingham, October 11-16; Mississippi State Fair, Jackson, October 18-23; Louisiana State Fair, Shreveport, October 28 to November 7.

These exhibits do not include those which will be shown at the state and district fairs of Texas. Every West Texas county will be solicited to assemble the best of its products and its resources. Special literature and magazines on West Texas and its resources will be distributed free. According to Manager Porter A. Whaley it will be the greatest comprehensive

exhibit ever sent from the Southwest. Exhibits Manager J. C. Wells began his work of assembling and campaigning for these exhibits today. Many Panhandle and plains counties have already signified their intention to be fully represented. One of the special features of each exhibit will be chests of specimens of West Texas grown pecans and other edible nuts which are now becoming famous the nation over.

At the annual convention of the organization held at Abilene January 22 this year resolutions were adopted authorizing immediate steps to be taken to recover for the West an agricultural and mechanical college whose services would more nearly adapt themselves to the western portion of the state. Realizing that the state institutions already maintained are limited in finances, the organization will proceed to outline a plan whereby the funds of the state may be increased sufficiently to make possible the operation of two A. and M. Colleges. The West is united and back of the organization in its plans to secure the college.

The organization has received the co-operation of newspapers which heretofore have opposed the establishment of a West Texas A. & M. College in the West. One of the strongest opponents, in the shape of a newspaper has come out strongly for it. The organization will also try to suggest a way to make the location among towns so that it will be above board and fair without causing confusion and disgust as was the case a few years ago.

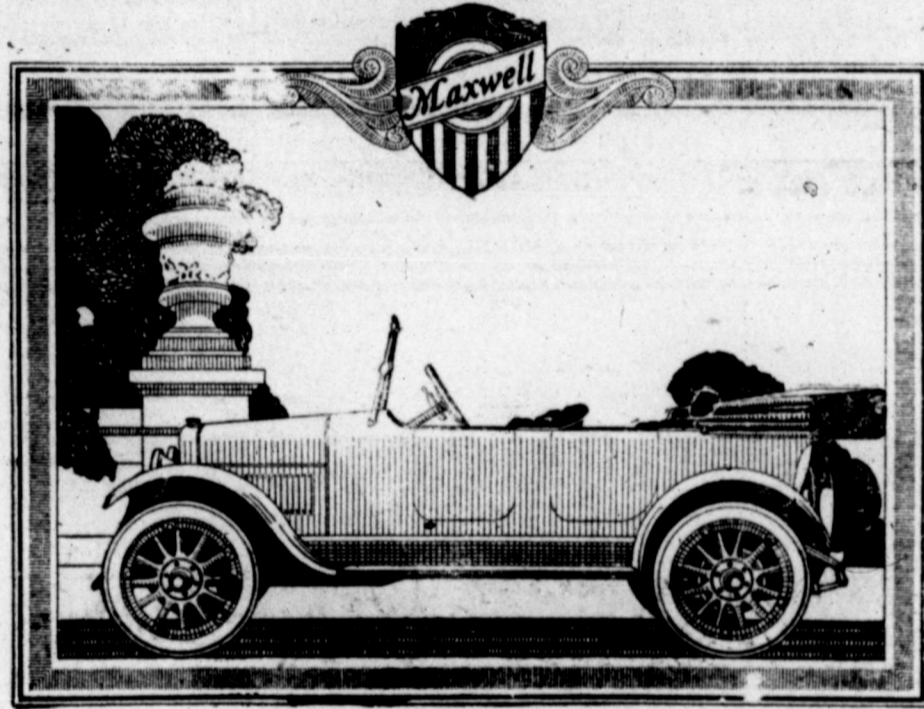

TEXAS & PACIFIC PLANS EXTENSION

90-Pound Rails and All-Steel Coaches For West Texas Divisions.

El Paso.—Sending a period of unprecedented prosperity and passenger and freight traffic on the Texas and Pacific railroad company is preparing to undertake a reconstruction campaign which will make that road the best in the Southwest, according to J. A. Somerville, general manager. The entire road will be relaid with 90-pound steel rails and only steel coaches will be operated on the West Texas divisions, he stated here a few days ago. The company has already ordered 69 steel coaches and acquired 70 oil burner engines. Mr. Somerville declares that the bulk of traffic continental traffic which has passed over other cross-continent lines will hereafter move over this line. The newly discovered oil field at Pecos and Toyah are helping to make the territory traversed by this line the most populous in the Southwest.

BIG REFINERY WILL BE SOLD TO BRITISH COMPANY IS REPORT

Fort Worth, Texas, One of the largest deals in the history of the North Central Texas oil fields is about to be closed here in the sale of the Home Oil and Refining Company of Fort Worth to the Anglo-American Oil Co., the British subsidiary of the Standard Oil Company., for thirty million dollars. Terms of the sale have been agreed upon, it is declared but it has not been fully closed.

Another big well is reported from Eastland county. It is the Jennings number 2 of the Sun company which came in for around 3000 barrels daily and continues to make around 100 barrels an hour.
