PRECINCT AND COUNTY DEMOCRATIC CONVENTIONS

Saturday last was precinct convention day. Conventions were held in all the precincts of the county and Wilson delegates sent to the county convention.

Pursuant to the call of the County Chairman, the Democratic voters of Precinct One, Mitchell county, assembled at the court house in Colorado, for the purpose of electing delegates to the County Convention, to be held on May 4th.

The meeting was called to order by J. A. Buchanan, the County Chairman, at 2:30 p. m., who stated the purposes of the convention. He then called for nominations for temporary chairman, and Judge R. H. Looney was nominated and seconded, and unanimously elected. Judge Looney then took charge of the meeting.

The chairman then called on all persons present, over 21 years of age who had paid their poll tax, or were exempt, by reason of age or otherwise, to show by rising that they were democrats, and pledged themselves to support the nominees of the democratic party from constable to president. This was done, and the chairman announced that all taking the pledge were entitled to participate in the convention.

Nominations for Secretary were called for and Thomas R. Smith was nominated as Secretary and unanimously elected.

It was moved that a nominating committee be appointed to select the delegates to the county convention. After this motion was carried the chairman appointed Judge Leslie, F. M. Burns and M. Carter on the nominating committee. The committee then withdrew to prepare their report.

It was then moved and seconded, and unanimously carried that a committee on resolutions be appointed to draft resolutions declaring the feeling of the convention with regard to the National Administration. The chairman appointed Dr. Coleman, L. W. Sandusky and Judge Coe as the members of this committee, who then withdrew to prepare their report.

The nominating committee then submitted their report, submitting the following names for election as delegates to the county convention and recommended that the unit rule be adopted:

It was moved and seconded that the report of the nominating committee be adopted and the delegates nominated by them be declared elected. The motion carried with one dissenting vote.

The committee on resolutions then submitted their report, as follows:

"We, the loyal democrats of precinct 1, of Mitchell county, Texas, beg to submit the following resolutions:

"We would swear our allegiance to the time honored principles of our party and pledge our support both to the nominees of State and National Conventions.

"We point with pride to the great achievements of our party, when in control of our government, especially during the late World War. We recognize in Woodrow Wilson the great patriot, and wise statesman, and heartily endorse his administration.

"We believe our Government was true to his country, and to his state. We endorse his administration, and we believe in the future of our country, and we believe in the future of our party.

It was moved and seconded that the report of the committee on resolutions be adopted as read. The motion was then carried, and the delegates from the precincts were declared elected by L. W. Sandusky, and by T. A. Merritt, against its adoption. The resolutions were adopted, with one dissenting vote.

The convention then adjourned.

COUNTY CONVENTION

Pursuant to the call of the Hon. J. A. Buchanan, Chairman of the Democratic Executive Committee for Mitchell County, the delegates from the various precincts in said county met on Tuesday, May 4th, 1920, at the court house in said county, and the following proceedings were had:

The meeting was called to order at 2:00 p. m. by J. A. Buchanan, who then called for nominations for temporary chairman. W. J. Coon, of Lorraine, was nominated and unanimously elected as temporary chairman, and took the chair. The chairman then called for nominations for temporary secretary. Thomas R. Smith, of Colorado, was nominated and unanimously elected as secretary.

It was then moved and unanimously carried that the chair appoint a

committee of three on credentials. The chairman then appointed Dr. P. C. Coleman, C. M. Jackson and L. W. Sandusky as the committee on credentials. The committee then called for and received the credentials of the various precinct delegations and retired to prepare their report.

A motion to go into permanent organization was made and seconded, but was tabled on a point of order to await the report of the credentials committee. The committee then reported following delegates as present from the various precincts, and entitled to vote as follows:

Colorado, six votes. Delegates: P. C. Coleman, R. H. Looney (not present) Mrs. H. B. Broadbudd, L. W. Sandusky, M. Dorn (not present) Mrs. J. G. Merritt, C. M. Adams, Mrs. Thomas R. Smith.

Buford, one vote. Delegate: Sam H. Bedford.

Lorraine, three votes. Delegates: W. J. Coon, J. L. Pratt, J. W. Fairbairn, C. B. Reeder, J. M. Bruce, C. M. Jackson, S. E. Brown, J. C. Pratt, S. W. Hamilton, H. H. Lyndler, Mrs. A. C. Pratt, E. J. Dunlap, J. E. Porter, T. J. Newton, T. J. Coffey, R. Bennett.

Westbrook, one vote. Delegate: A. F. Bledsoe.

Spade, one vote. Delegates: E. Barber, R. A. Hood.

Cuthbert, one vote. Delegates: W. R. Womack, D. T. Bozeman, C. E. Jenkins.

Car, McKenzie and Iatan not represented.

It was moved and seconded that the report of the credentials committee be adopted, which carried unanimously, and the above delegates were declared seated and eligible to a vote in the convention.

It was then moved and seconded that the temporary organization be made permanent, which motion was unanimously carried.

It was then moved and seconded that a committee of three be appointed to draft a set of resolutions for the convention. The chairman appointed J. W. Fairbairn of Lorraine and Dr. P. C. Coleman and L. W. Sandusky of Colorado as the committee, who retired to prepare their report.

It was then moved that a committee of three be appointed to nominate delegates to the State Convention on May 25th. The motion was carried unanimously and the chairman appointed L. W. Sandusky of Colorado, D. T. Bozeman of Cuthbert and C. M. Jackson of Lorraine, on the nominating committee who withdrew to prepare their report.

The committee on resolutions then reported as follows:

"We, the democrats of Mitchell County, in convention assembled, unite our brains and hearts with the rest of the members of the party in Texas in celebrating the great victory of last Saturday.

"We feel confident that this victory has assigned to political oblivion one J. W. Bailey, formerly a Senator from Texas and for years past a citizen of the District of Columbia.

"For twenty years he was honored by the people of Texas as but few others have been, and in return he sets himself as the chief and head of slanderers and traducers of the party, and according to his own statements, during the great World War, was not a supporter or in sympathy with the efforts of our party at the time in this war, and save us from the domination of Germany, whose intention was to destroy the civil and religious liberty of the world.

"We believe that, during the late World War the administration of our government, headed by Woodrow Wilson, was characterized by wisdom, patriotism, and honor as it was possible to do so, with the expenditure of as little money as possible, in support of this statement we find that the fact that the Republic of Mexico at present in control of both the Senate and the House of Representatives, is a perfect example of the result of anything to the contrary, and that it was used in her own and patriotic way.

"We endorse the administration of our government, headed by Woodrow Wilson, and declare him to be the greatest patriot, and wise statesman, and heartily endorse his administration.

"The Hon. Thos. R. Smith of Dallas, Texas, has been a member of the National Democratic Executive Committee and we endorse him for re-election.

It was moved and seconded that the report of the nominating committee be adopted and that the delegates named above be declared elected to represent Mitchell County at the

State Convention. The motion carried unanimously and they were declared elected.

Convention then adjourned.

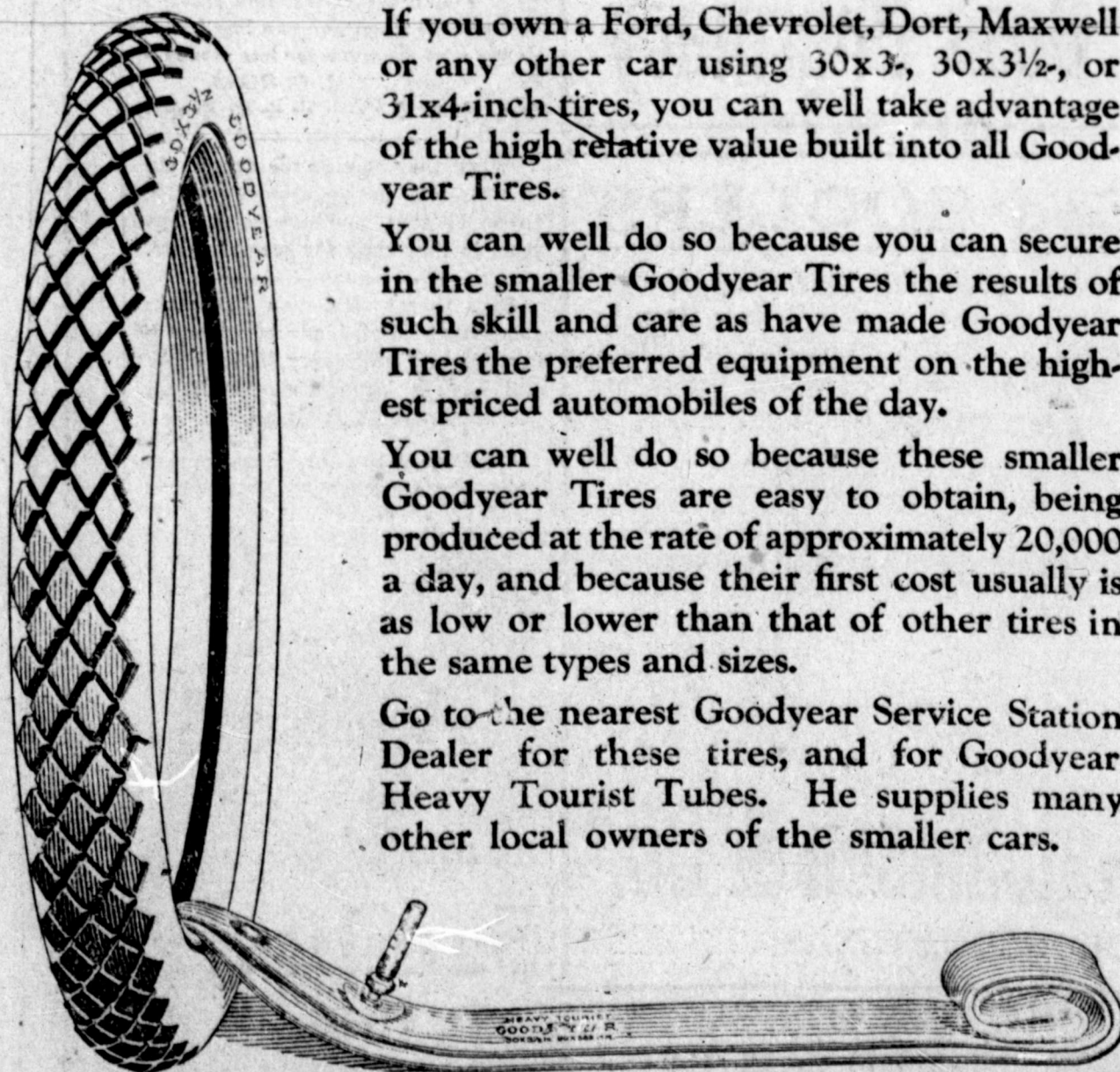

Washington politicians see a healthy lift for the McAdoo boom reflected in the victory of the administration forces in Texas last Saturday, and the almost unanimous control of the administration forces in the State convention to follow later in the month. While no preference was expressed for presidential candidates, the personnel of the Texas forty to San Francisco to be selected undoubtedly will be backers of the former Secretary of the Treasury, according to the estimate made of the Texas results by politicians about Washington, and that the moral effect will be reflected in other Southern states. The Washington Star (Ind.) commenting on the Texas situation says in part:

"The fight waged by Mr. Bailey was against the League of Nations, the President and the administration generally. It was for control of the delegation to the San Francisco convention and there is no doubt that the forty votes of Texas will be cast for the President in every move the administration makes in the convention. Politicians figure that the spectacle of the Texas forty standing first last and all the time for McAdoo is bound to have tremendous influence among the uninstructed delegates, besides the actual numerical value on roll calls."

All events, reports and Democratic deliberations of the last fortnight serve to bear out the statement that the McAdoo presidential boom was making rapid and persistent headway in influential Democratic circles, underneath the surface as well as in open demonstration, and that he is in fact the leading candidate for the nomination. This, too, in the face of the fact that Mr. McAdoo has consistently declined to assent to his name being placed on the ballots as an avowed candidate for the nomination. The growth of the movement in his behalf has appeared to be psychological rather than openly promoted. The support of Texas to the President's stand on the League of Nations, lends renewed assurance to the accepted belief that the administration will make its fight at San Francisco for platform endorsement of the original covenant as presented in the peace treaty submitted to the Senate by the President.

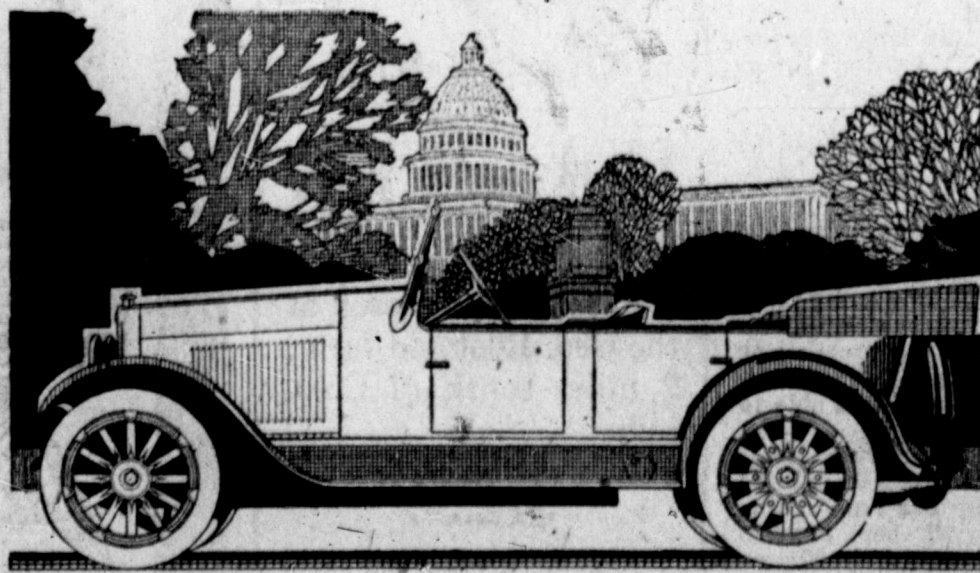

PUBLISHERS STATEMENT.

The country newspapers have been worrying for some time about the shortage of print paper and the high price asked when it could be secured. Now the big dailies like the Dallas News have been forced to limit the size of their papers, consequently refusing thousands of dollars worth of advertising. The Record has just received a month's supply of paper and the price is one and one-half cents per pound above the price paid one month ago, when it was three times as high as the highest price ever paid for print paper before the world war. The Record is up against it. If we accept all advertising tendered us (and this our greatest source of revenue) without increasing the size of the paper, we will not have room for the amount of reading matter we should have. If we increase the size of the paper, or even hold it to the 16 pages the subscription price and the increased advertising will not pay the additional expense of the paper with print paper and salaries of printers as high as they are now. We will simply do the best we can to adjust our business to present conditions, and if you are not satisfied with the paper as you find it, bear in mind that it is not altogether our fault.

If conditions do not change soon, we will be forced to increase our subscription rates and also make an adjustment in our advertising rates to conform with the increased costs we are forced to meet in publishing the paper. The margin of profits for the publisher was always small enough, but it has now reached the "vanishing" point.

The Record has been printing 16 pages per week for the past three of four months, but the time has come when we are having to economize on paper, so this week we are going to print only twelve pages, which we will try for awhile, and perhaps later may have to reduce it to ten or even eight. Of course it makes the paper have the appearance of being full of advertising, but when we cut off the advertising we cut off our revenue, so we are going to ask our readers to be lenient with us, until the paper situation improves.

The matter of getting paper (at any price) is getting to be serious and if it goes to 20c a pound, which many predict it will be prohibitive.

This week we sent out an order to the Graham Paper Company of St. Louis, one of the largest and most reliable jobbers in the United States and here is what they say:

"Unfortunately, our supply of news print in the above size and weight, is entirely depleted and under present conditions, we are not in a position to say definitely just when our supply will be replenished, but we fear it will be at least three or four months."

We then wired the Louisville Paper Co., another prominent dealer, at Louisville, Ky., and here is what they say:

"We regret very much indeed to advise that we will be unable to make shipment of this order at the present time, as we are entirely out of news print, and have been for the past several weeks. Furthermore, the situation at the present time is far more serious than we have ever known it, and we can not make any promises as to when our new supply will reach us, nor at what price we will be able to bill same to you."

The situation grows worse from day to day and all we can do is to do the best we can by our readers and our advertisers, until there is some change. We have been advised by all paper dealers to cut down the size of our paper to the minimum, or that even our meager supply would be cut off entirely. We have no choice in the matter.

**PRO-ADMINISTRATION FORCES
CONTROL 1,300 VOTES.**

DALLAS, May 5.—Delegations favorable to the national administration will control the Texas Democratic convention May 25 as a result of Democratic county conventions held Tuesday.

Tabulations at a late hour last night, supplemented this morning by belated returns, show that the vote in the State convention favorable to the administration will approximate 1,300. There are 1,400 votes in the State convention.

Late tabulations Tuesday night indicated that the faction led by former Senator Joseph W. Bailey, which sought repudiation of the national administration under Woodrow Wilson, might have 50 votes in the State convention. This presumption, however, concedes two doubtful counties. A concession of additional votes to the Bailey forces, it appears, which would include returns not yet received, which might show Bailey strength, could bring the anti-administration totals in the State convention to 75. This, however, was an estimate made by observers on the face of empty columns awaiting final complete figures.

The returns which dwindled in early this morning only served to add strength to the administration forces and did not in a single instance add to the Bailey forces.

County conventions yesterday had their fabled features.

In at least four strong endorsements were expressed for William G. McAdoo as a Democratic presidential preference. In Hill county where the convention went solid for the Wilson forces Major T. E. Nickels, father of Luther Nickels, who has managed the Bailey campaign in Texas, was named to head the Wilson delegation to the State convention. Many of the counties reported instructions to delegates for Governor W. P. Hobby as delegate at large to the San Francisco convention. In Fayette and Lavaca counties Bailey, himself, was selected a delegate to the State convention. Postmaster General Burleson came in for his share of prominence when Lee, Travis and several other counties endorsed him for delegate at large.

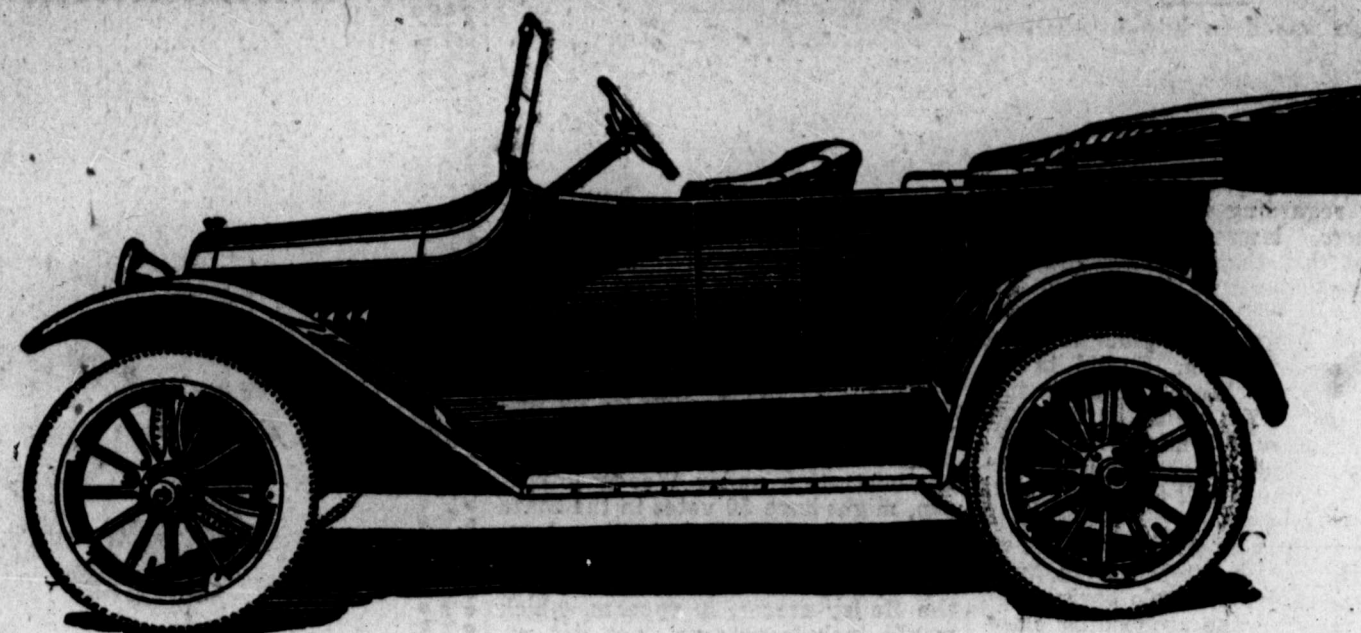

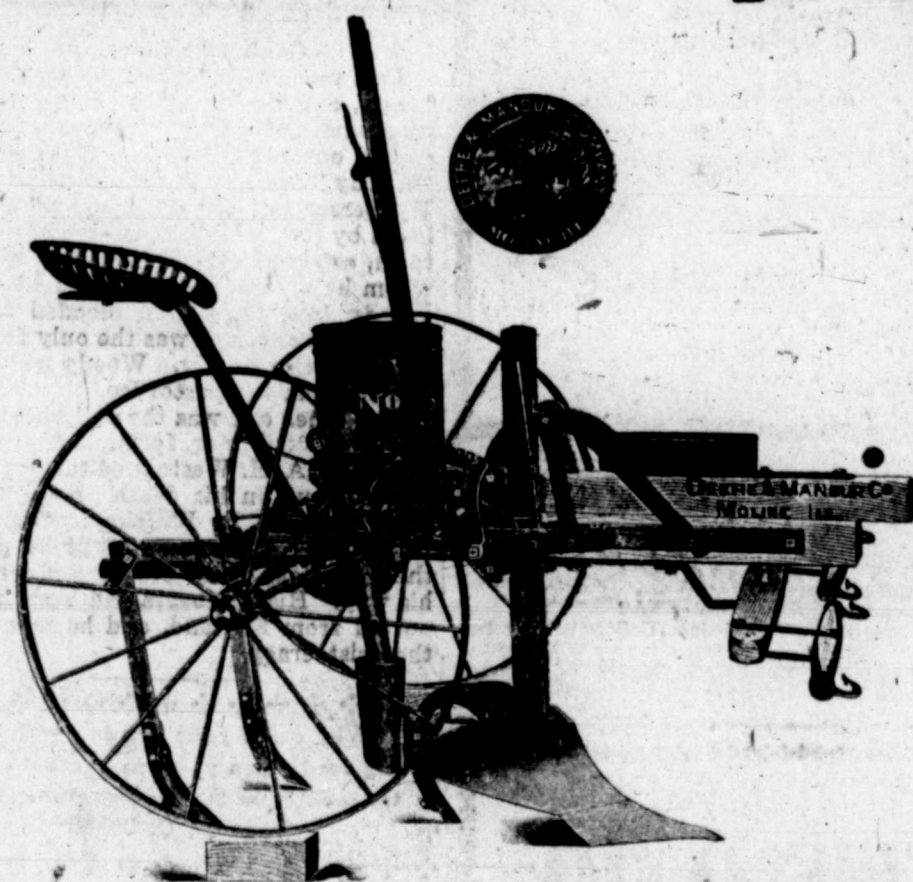

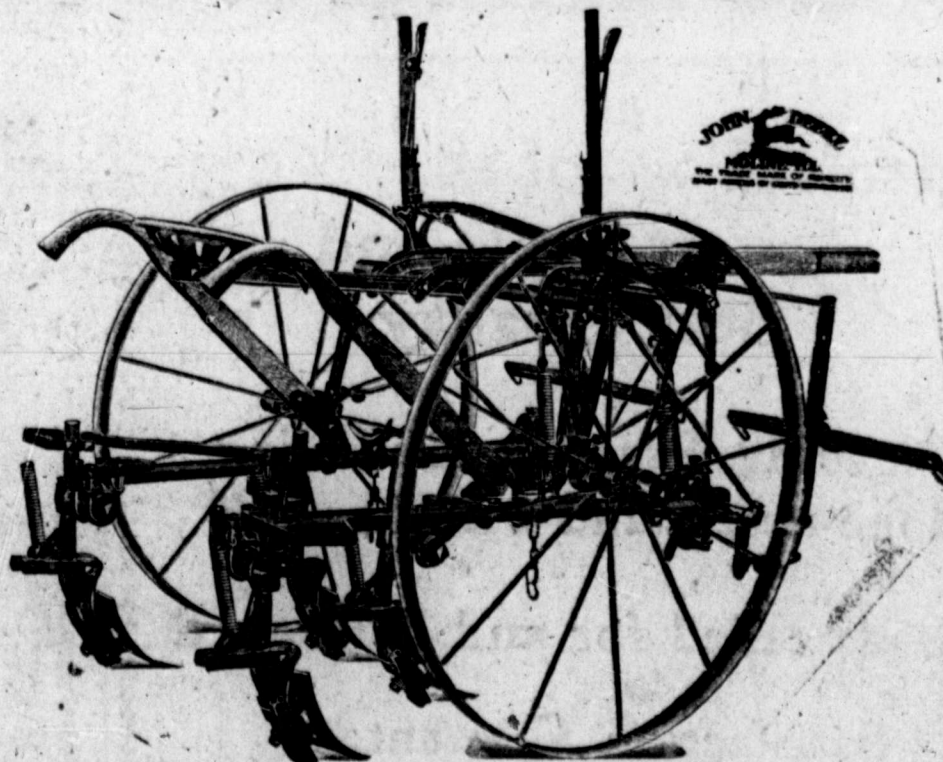

COLORADO HIGH SCHOOL
E. Frank King, Superintendent
Visited April 15th, 1920 by H. J. Popplewell.

The Colorado school plant consists of two buildings, which are thoroughly adequate for the size of the school. It is planned, however, to increase the convenience of the high school for next year by opening up the basement. It is also hoped that shades can be furnished for each of the rooms, which will add greatly to their appearance. The stoves have been jacketed this year.

The general equipment for the school is very satisfactory, with the exception of the number of shades. Only one room is completely equipped with shades, and these, the pupils worked for and donated that they might make their laboratory work more efficient. Such a spirit is very commendable. The library has been considerably improved since last year by a number of source and reference works in history. Book-cases and a library table have also been purchased, the former for the grades as well as for the high school. \$100 is still out for books, which the companies have not yet been able to supply. Considerable equipment has been added to the laboratories, particularly for physiology. An expensive microscope, a large and complete manikin a number of slides and a microscopic attachment for the stereopticon are the most valuable of these additions.

The most outstanding features of the organization of this school, which seems good throughout, are the few classes per teacher and the teaching of sewing from the fifth grade through the high school without having a domestic art teacher. The school is the proud possessor of three sewing machines, and the different teachers oversee the sewing at different periods. Some beautiful specimens were on exhibition. The supervisor was impressed with the excellence of some of the sewing done by children in the fifth and sixth grades. It would be the natural move for the patrons to see that domestic economy be installed and a teacher provided so that more may be accomplished in this work.

The Colorado School Board seems alive to the necessity of retaining their good teachers and consequently have raised the salaries of the elementary teachers from \$80 and \$85 to \$100 and \$110 and the high school teachers from \$110 to \$140. This is certainly a move in the right direction. At present, only one teacher with less than a permanent certificate is employed in the high school. A special effort will be made to place well-qualified teachers throughout the school next year.

Classes in the following subjects were visited: English, Latin, Spanish physiology and solid geometry. The pupils in all the classes showed a commendable spirit of interest and co-operation. A special effort seemed to be made to secure thought on the part of the pupils. This was particularly true in the Solid geometry class. The work of several days prior to the assignment was used as a test for principles. Accuracy of statement and definiteness of reasoning were required. The results seemed satisfactory.

Three Latin classes were observed. All were alert and responsive. In the first year class, good drill in parsing and word-order was given. Special attention was also given to pronunciation. The third year class was reciting a lesson in prose composition. They showed good application and interest, and fairly accurate results were obtained. The senior class translated and scanned very well. Their ability was displayed most decidedly in sight translation.

The third year Spanish class received good drill on the assigned lesson, but scarcely enough supplementary conversation was practiced. Not (Continued on Page 10)

all the classes participated equally in the recitation. The notebooks were interestingly and carefully prepared with a view to increasing vocabulary and were very attractive. A review of the general aspects of physiology and a description of the different "systems" in the body to the place of the regularly assigned lesson. The pupils had attained a good deal of efficiency in this kind of work.

The senior class in English was studying "The Raven" analytically as well as from the standpoint of appreciation. A thorough treatment of the subject from both standpoints revealed both application and understanding. Some excellent supplementary notebooks were examined. There were studies of the different selections read and were illustrated by drawing or magazine pictures with a view to securing a more complete visualization of the works.

Recommendations.
1. That material be submitted for affiliation in solid geometry and the fourth unit in Latin.

The above report from the State School Inspector is quite flattering and a compliment to our high school, of which all Colorado should be, and no doubt is, proud. Especially do we note the recommendation for affiliation in the fourth unit in Latin. Not so very many schools in towns like Colorado have even the third unit, and for the Colorado high school to get the fourth unit recommendation is indeed a compliment to the Superintendent and faculty of the high school.

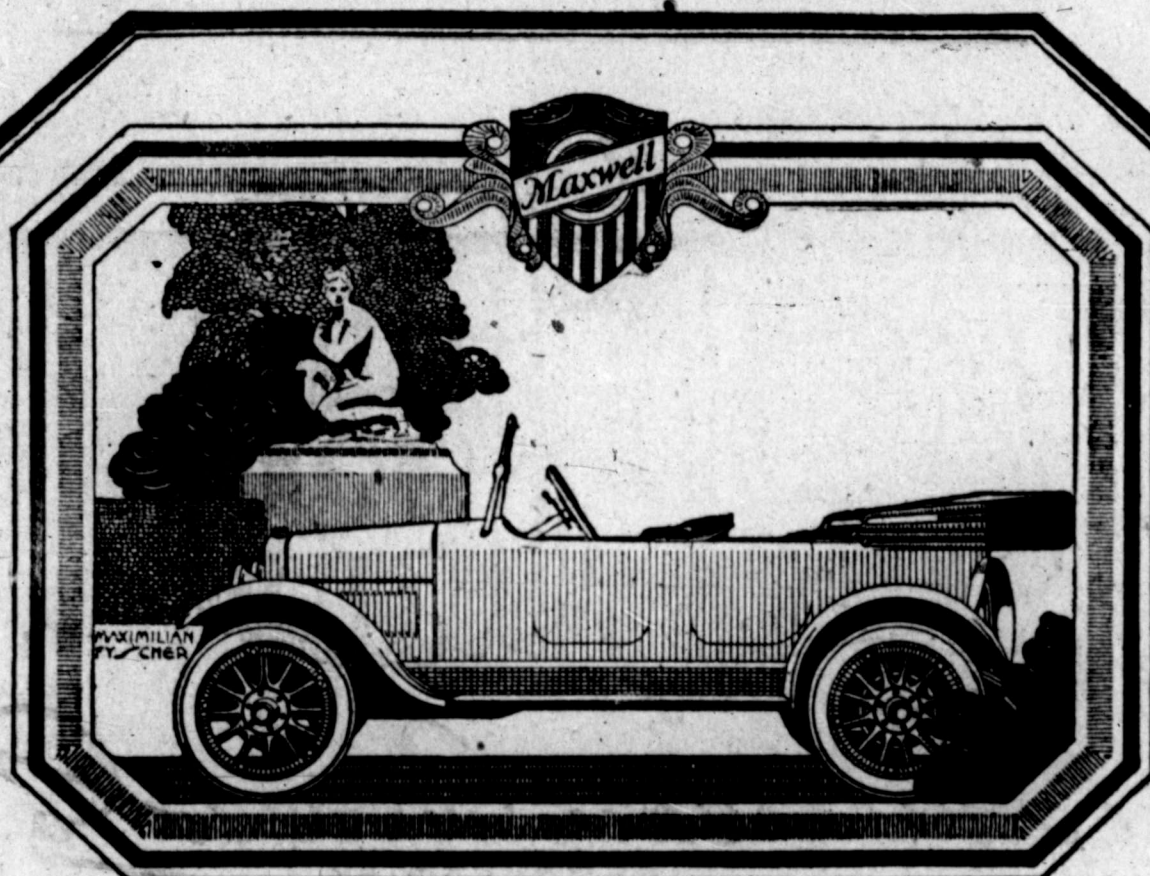
