## THE RAINS.

The Record contended all the while that it would rain in April as it had always done so for the past 20 years, but this year it failed us. The sky became as brass, the people became blue and discouraged so we set about to see when it would rain. As the moon was to be in a total eclipse on the 1st of May and for the benefit of the New Easterners and tender foot we set May 10th for the big rain. This seemed to satisfy most of our readers but a good many wanted rain sooner than May 10th, so influences were brought to bear and on Wednesday, May 5th, we had .89 inches of rain. This was not to interfere however with the big rain to come on the 10th, but here came Gentry Brothers' big Dog and Pony show for that day and so it would not do for a rain on that day so the same methods were employed and on Sunday evening we again had a full 2 inch rain and in the night old Jupiter Pluvius in backing his sprinkling cards to get away from here turned it over and that night poured out another 1 inch rain. All this was not to interfere with the Record's May 10th rain. So Monday night after the circus was over we again received a .66 inch rain. Making in all since May 5th 4.55 inch rain. The rains came just right with the splendid under season already and this 5 inch rain makes old Mitchell county in bully shape. Our experience is that we usually have two good crop years together. 1899 and 1900 were good—1907-08 good, 1914-15 also good and 1919-20 was and will be the best ever.

The next rain is due sometime between the 20th and 25th of this month and we are promised a good rain in June. And the outlook this year is most promising. Lots of the farmers have their crops all planted and all the rest are planting as rapidly as possible.

## BRYAN AT SAN FRANCISCO.

Nebraska democrats sent Bryan and Senator Gilbert M. Hitchcock to the national convention. They refused to strike down either Bryan or Hitchcock on account of the petty jealousies or the small rivalries of two men who have won for themselves prominent position in the national councils of the Democratic party and are noted for their brilliant gifts or accomplishments as leaders of men—Fort Worth Record.

In selecting both Bryan and Hitchcock, the democrats of Nebraska have only accentuated factional differences and made more difficult the work of the San Francisco convention.—Waco Times-Herald.

Woodrow Wilson is the President of the United States. He is the titular elder of the Democratic party. If Mr. Bryan thinks that President Wilson or the democrats of America will agree to "an unconditional surrender" the Lodges and the Penroses, then Mr. Bryan will be as dense as it is possible for a democratic delegate to the San Francisco convention to find himself. Texas democrats believe that the rejection of the treaty was the crime of the century. They will tell it to Mr. Bryan when they meet him in the Golden Gate city late in the month of June.—Fort Worth Record.

It now looks as though Bryan and McAdoo would unite their forces to insure a crushing defeat for the followers of Governor Edwards of New Jersey. That means, of course, that Bryan will abate his opposition to the League Covenant. As matters now look, Ned Edwards of New Jersey will be the chief sufferer of events at the San Francisco convention.

## A DIVIDED REPUBLICAN PARTY.

The outstanding fact of the recent primaries is that Hiram Johnson has invaded the East and invaded it successfully. The moral victory in the New Jersey primaries is with him. For months the Wood managers have been organizing their campaign in the state. They had unlimited money; they had the support of the manufacturing interests that believe in the settlement of strikes by military force and they had the assistance of a strong political machine. There was no opposition in New Jersey to Wood except Johnson, who had neither money nor organization, and no Republican leader of distinction or state-wide influence publicly championed Johnson's candidacy. Nevertheless, Johnson fought the Wood forces and the Wood barrel to a standstill.

Hiram Johnson is one of the three Senators with whom Henry Cabot Lodge packed the Senate Committee on Foreign Relations in order to obtain an adverse report against the Treaty of Versailles and the covenant of the League of Nations. Johnson, however, took the Lodge programme seriously and proceeded to carry it to its logical conclusion. In making his uncompromising fight against the treaty of peace, he perceived also the political advantage of capitalizing all the discontent created by the Republican managers in their attacks on the administration. That is the issue on which he is making his campaign.

Johnson is against everything that is, and he is reaping the benefits of opposition. He has no constructive policy, but he needs none in his pursuit of delegates. It is enough for him to be able to make a convincing appeal to every element of unrest, and that is what he is doing.

Even in Ohio, where he refused to enter the primaries and made no campaign, thousands of Republicans wrote his name on their ballots. In that state the contest was between Harding and Wood. The other candidates kept out, and the Wood managers succeeded in destroying Harding's prestige in his own state without gaining any worth-while advantages for Wood, who has in turn discredited by Johnson's vote in New Jersey. It is plain enough even in Ohio that if Johnson had had half of the money that was behind Wood, both Wood and Harding might have been eliminated at one stroke.

Of the avowed Republican aspirants for the Presidency, Johnson has demonstrated that he is the only one who has a popular following. What is still more important, the elements that are behind Johnson are as bitterly opposed to Old Guard Republicanism as they are of Wilson Democracy. They are as strongly arrayed against the conservative leadership of the Republican Party as they are against the liberal leadership of the Democratic party, and for the most part would be willing to follow Hiram Johnson into a new party if he failed to obtain the nomination at Chicago.

The Republican leaders profess to have a written guarantee from Johnson that he will not bolt, but such guarantees mean nothing. Roosevelt did not wish to bolt in 1912, but he had aroused forces that he could not control and was compelled reluctantly to go with them. It is by no means impossible that Johnson will succeed in creating a similar situation by the time the Chicago Convention meets, and that the Republican Party will again find itself hopelessly divided between its conservatives and its radicals. The Republicans who are following Johnson have nothing in common with the Republicans who are following Wood and Harding and Lowden, and no method of conciliation exists except by finding a compromise candidate.

Hiram Johnson is the whirlwind from the sowing of the Republican leaders in Congress since the armistice was signed, and the Republican Party will be lucky indeed if the whirlwind does not develop into a cyclone at Chicago in June.

## FURTHER ADVANCES IN PAPER PRICES ON JULY 1.

Washington, May 12.—Further advances in print paper prices are to be made by the International Paper company on July 1, said a telegram from Chester W. Lyman, vice-president of the company, which was presented today to the senate committee investigating the paper shortage. The message, addressed to Joseph Pulitzer, Jr., publisher of the St. Louis Post-Dispatch, said:

"Alarming rise in prices for pulp wood, other raw materials and mill supplies, together with inevitable increase in transportation charges, will necessitate higher selling price last two quarters. Increase in cost likely to continue to turning point reached

in general industrial, social and financial conditions.

"Only remedy for present trouble is rigid economy by publishers in their use of news print. It would be height of folly for government to attempt to regulate or lower spot market, onerous as it may appear, as it would result in diversion of many specialty mills now making news print to their normal product."

In presenting the telegram, Chas. G. Ross, Washington correspondent of the Post-Dispatch, said that paper was "strongly opposed to government control of the paper industry in any form whatsoever on the ground that it would effect the government control of the press."

**THE CAR.**

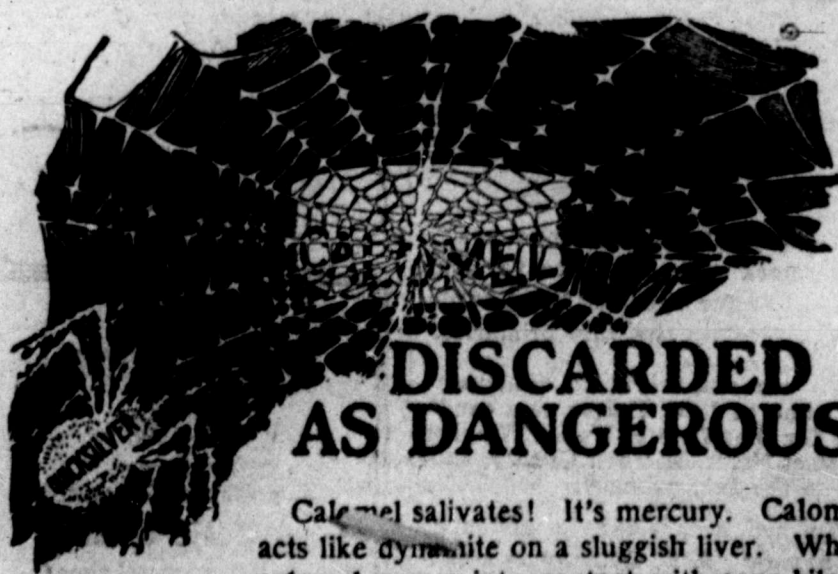

**THREE SUBJECTS IN CALL FOR LEGISLATURE.**

Austin, Texas, May 12.—Proclamation was issued by Governor Hobby late today calling a special session of the Thirty-Fourth Legislature to convene on Thursday, May 26, at 10 o'clock.

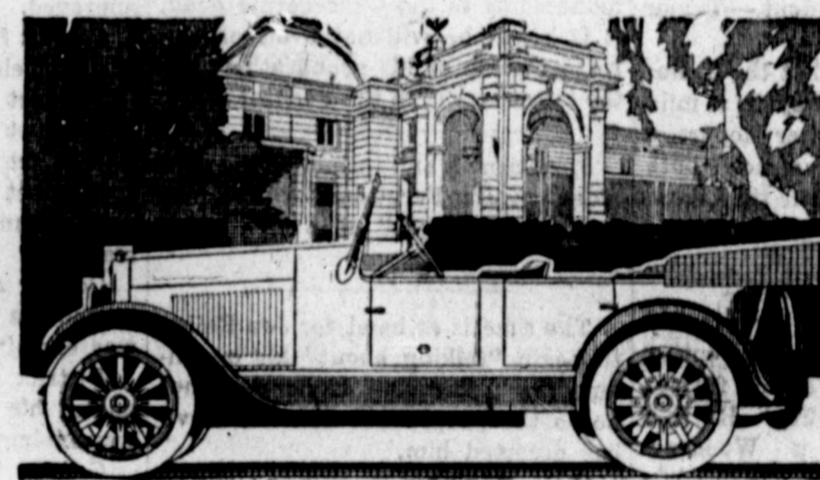

### TRINITY RIVER IS AT HIGHEST POINT.

Rains of the last night promised further to swell the stream today. Service on the Dallas-Fort Worth interurban has been partially resumed.

### FIRST TEXAS CENSUS SHOWS BUT 212,592 IN 23 TOWNS.

The first government enumeration in the state of Texas, taken after the republic was admitted as a State in 1845, gave a total population of 212,592, or more than one square mile for each person enumerated. The 1920 census report will probably show a population of more than 5,600,000 in the same territory, which will probably give it fourth place among the States. It now ranks fifth.

The first census was not exceptionally accurate as the country was thinly settled and the government facilities of seventy years ago were hardly as complete or as carefully employed today. Only twenty-three cities were listed in the first census, several of which were practically as large then as they are now. They were Austin, with 629, Bonham, 211, Castorville 366, Comaltown 288, Corpus Christi 533, Crockett 150, Galveston, 4,177, Hortontown, 130, Houston, 2,396, Indianola, 379, Lavaca, 353, Marshall, 1,139, McKinney 193, Nacogdoches 468, New Braunfels 1,289, Palestine 212, Richmond 223, Rusk 355, San Antonio 3,488, Victoria 806, and Zodiac 160. Only eleven counties were listed, Harrison being the largest with 11,822 persons, 6,213 of which were slaves.

Of the 212,592 persons, which the census gave the state, only 154,034 were whites, and there were but 397 free negroes, with 59,161 slaves. Galveston contained the largest number of slaves, having 678. Of the white population throughout the state, 84,869 were males and 69,165 were females. Of the inhabitants, 17,620 were of foreign birth, of which the majority were Mexicans. The greatest portion of the native population came to Texas from Tennessee, Virginia, Georgia, North Carolina, Alabama, Mississippi and Kentucky.

The state, at that time had only two members in congress. The Northern or First District, embraced all the territory north of a line from a short distance above the southwestern corner of Oklahoma in a semi-circle, including Tarrant and Dallas counties, and down the Trinity to the coast some distance west of Galveston. The Second District reached from the upper Panhandle to Brownsville and included everything west to El Paso. The first members were David S. Kaufman of Sabine Town and Timothy Pillsbury of Brazoria. Kaufman died in 1851 and was succeeded by Richardson Scurry of Clarksville. Pillsbury was succeeded by Volney Howard of San Antonio.

### School Few.

In the enumeration there were two schools listed as colleges with seven teachers and 105 pupils. The public schools numbered 349 with 360 teachers and 7,946 pupils. The annual income of the schools was \$44,088. There were ninety-seven academies and "other schools," having 137 teachers and 3,389 students. There were 10,583 persons who could not read and write.

Under the classification of professions, 701 persons were listed as "blacksmiths and whitesmiths," 1,261 carpenters, 25,054 farmers, 107 boatmen, 8 fishermen, 44 hat and cap manufacturers, 152 inn keepers, 151 rangers and 11 sailmakers.

The enumeration showed 341 churches, of which 82 were Baptist, 5 Christian, 5 Episcopal, 7 free churches, 176 Methodist, 45 Presbyterian, 2 Union, 6 minor sects and 13 Catholic. The Roman Catholic Church was the richest in the state, with a property value of \$79,700.

The land embraced in farms was reported as being 639,117 acres improved and 10,758,220 acres unimproved. The farms were rated at an aggregate value of \$16,289,747, and the improvements at \$2,133,821. The value of the livestock was given at \$10,267,710.

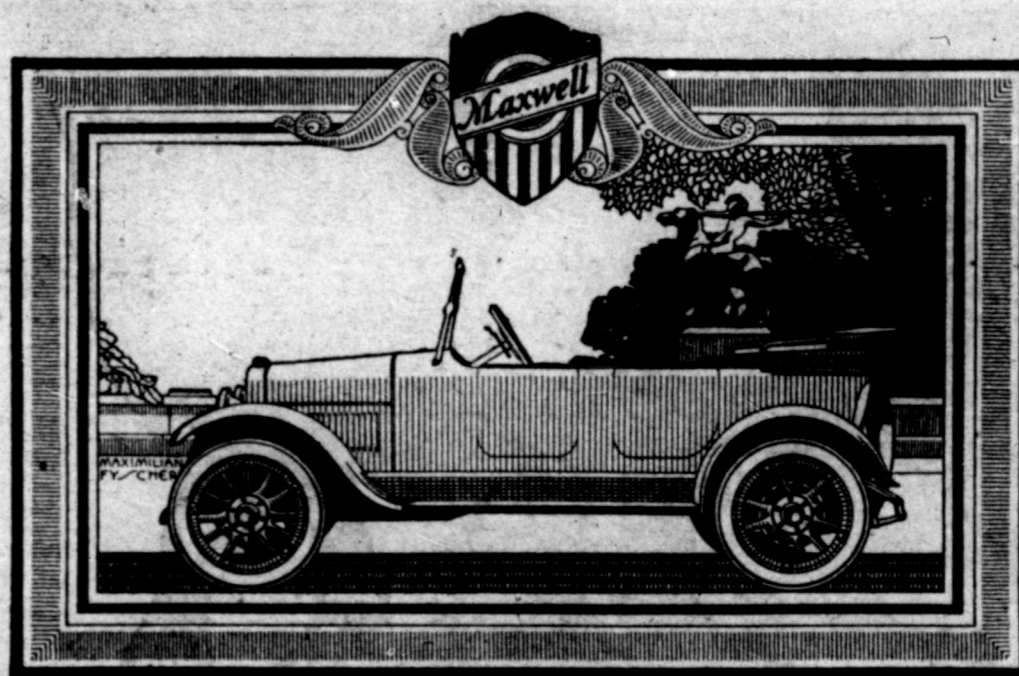

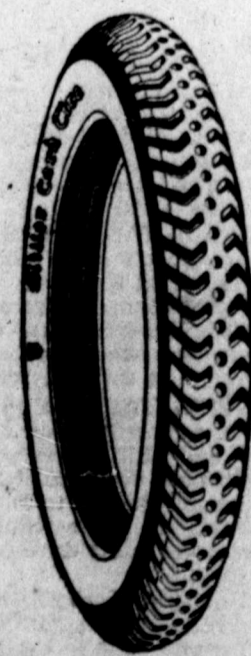
