COLORADO PUBLIC SCHOOLS CLOSE JUNE 4.

The Colorado public schools will close on Friday, June 4, the graduating exercises of the senior class being held at the high school building beginning at 8 o'clock p. m.

On Sunday evening, May 30, Rev. D. R. Hardison will preach the baccalaureate sermon at the Methodist Church. A program of this service will be published next week.

On Thursday evening, June 3, the seventh grade graduating exercises will be held at the high school auditorium.

There are in the senior class of this school this year five boys and ten girls. There were eighteen in the class at the beginning of the session, one withdrew and we lost two of our girls by death.

About thirty-five pupils will receive graduation certificates from the seventh grade into the high school.

The school has been handicapped by being compelled to dismiss for three weeks on account of the "flu," but aside from that the term has been a very successful one. Those who read the Record noticed that the visitor of schools from the States Department of Education gave the school a very flattering report, which was gratifying to every patron.

It is probably pertinent to say here that the 1920-1921 term will open the first Monday in September.

OBEY THE LAW.

Last week Mr. Bert Robertson, while grinding tools at the Travelers Oil well, got some foreign substance in his left eye. He came into town and on advice of a doctor went to Abilene to a specialist. This operation was not successful so he went to Dallas, where he is in the Baptist Sanitarium. A message from his wife who accompanied him says that he is now getting along all right, but will probably lose the sight of his eye.

OIL.

Nothing much to report in oil circles in Mitchell county except to say that six rigs are up and working day and night going down to see what is under us.

The Reed well north of Iatan just over the Mitchell county line has had trouble but resumed drilling on Wednesday and are now going down past 2000 feet, with a good showing for oil. Everybody believes (B) will be an oil well and that pretty soon. The Underwriters well on the Morrison block north of Westbrook has waited 15 days for fuel oil for it came in Wednesday and they are now going down past 1700 feet.

The right is up for the shallow test well just 300 yards from the Underwriters well and the 450 foot sand will be tested by this well.

The Colorado-Texas Production Co., are drilling at a little better than 700 feet.

The Travelers Oil Co., on the Landers ranch southeast of Colorado now have everything running smoothly and are going down. This company has a double shift and are making good time.

The Ranger Western well east of Loraine are busy and say they will soon report a well.

All these wells, are now under way and nothing can be said much until a well is brought in.

A RELATIVE.

One-seventh of the teachers of Wilbarger and Clay counties resigned during the current year, according to reports of County Superintendent Hugh Moore of Clay county and J. N. Fulcher of Wilbarger county, received by the State Teachers' Association. Thirteen of Clay county's ninety teachers quit; ten teachers of lower qualifications were employed in their places, three vacancies persisted till the close of school and one school remained closed to the end of the term. Superintendent Fulcher reports forty-six teachers, more than half, in Wilbarger county have second grade certificates. The average pay of teachers is \$75 per month for assistants; carpenters receive \$200 to \$240 per month and common laborers get \$125 to \$150 in the same county.

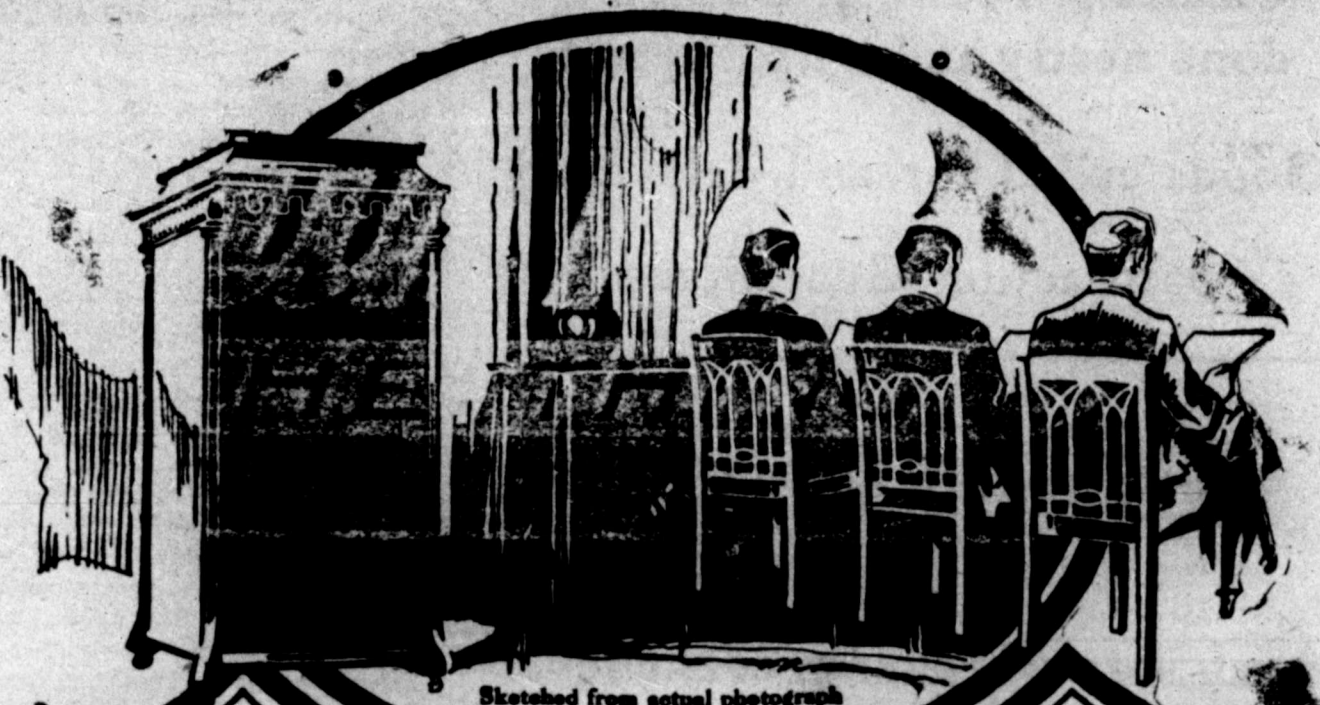

WILL PASS THROUGH COLORADO

The War Department has granted authority for the dispatching of a Motor Convoy from Washington, D. C., to Los Angeles, California, over the Bankhead National Highway—starting June 14th and September 17th as approximate dates on which the convoy will reach its destination—requiring 83 days to make the trip, of which the preliminary survey indicates the distance of 3,000 miles.

The War Department has appointed Mr. J. A. Rountree, Birmingham, Alabama, director general Bankhead National Highway Association, as field director of motor transport corps, who will have charge of arranging all receptions, public meetings, and details for the convoy.

Lieut. Col. John Franklin will be the expeditionary commander of the convoy across the continent, which will be composed of thirty-two officers, one hundred and sixty men, and twenty distinguished guests. The convoy will consist of fifty odd trucks and automobiles, making a

war procession of over two miles.

Appropriate ceremonies will be held on the ellipsis, near the White House, Washington, D. C., at 10 a. m., June 14th, before the convoy departs from the National Capital. Speeches will be made by Secretary of War, Newton D. Baker; Secretary of the Navy, Josephus Daniels; Gen. Charles B. Drake, Chief of the motor transport corps; Senator Oscar Underwood, of Alabama; Hon. W. P. G. Harding, governor of the Federal Reserve board, and representative of various departments of the government.

President Wilson has been invited to review the convoy as it passes through the White House grounds.

Director General Rountree left Washington today, en route to Birmingham, Ala., headquarters of the Bankhead National Highway, where he will direct arrangements of the convoy until June 10th, when he will return to Washington to accompany the convoy across the continent.

BAPTISTS OF TEXAS LEAD OTHER STATES.

The position of Texas as a leader among the states in the Southern Baptist Convention at Washington is reflected in the statistical report placed before the organization, compiled as of May 1. With 149 associations, the number of churches is 3,735 and the total membership 404,995. The number of baptisms during 1919 was 16,481. There are 2,119 Sunday schools with a total enrollment of 227,614. The value of the church property aggregates \$10,149,571.

Texas Baptists contributed during the year, exclusive of the gifts to the so-called \$75,000,000 fund, a total of \$3,515,617. Of this amount \$2,183,230 went for home purposes, \$719,177 to budget benevolence and \$613,209 to other benevolences.

The Dallas Missionary Association with contributions aggregating \$501,859, was the largest in the state. It has 40 churches, with nearly 12,000 members, 41 Sunday schools with an enrollment of 12,436.

In the Southern convention there has been an increase during the year of 452 churches, and nearly 74,000 increase in the membership in the churches, and nearly 77,000 in the Sunday school enrollments.

In the 140 educational institutions maintained by Southern Baptists a healthy growth along all lines was reported by Dr. J. E. Dillard, acting secretary of the education board, in the first annual report of that body to the convention today. The physical property of these institutions is valued at \$25,000,000 and approximately 20,000 students are enrolled in them.

The resolution presented by the Rev. A. J. Barton of Alexander, La., formerly of Dallas, and adopted by the convention, indorsing the national prohibition amendment and petitioning the political parties to nominate no man for President who is not in full accord with prohibition enforcement laws and that we also petition said parties not to nominate any man for presidency who is not known to be committed to this policy of law and order.

President Wilson, in a letter to the Baptist convention, declared that America now was facing the question of aiding Christian people in other parts of the world to realize their ideals of justice and orderly peace.

Recommendations that Chattanooga, Tenn., be chosen as the meeting place for the seventy-sixth annual Southern Baptist convention, next year were made

Baptists ministers of the South were insured against want in their declining years, when they have outlived their usefulness to the church,

by the Southern Baptist convention with the adoption of the recommendations of its relief and annuity board, presented by Dr. William Lunsford of Dallas, providing an annuity for preachers when they reach the age of 68 years.

Declaring that the faith and hope of the world rested in a League of Nations that would forever banish wars, Dr. George W. Truett of Dallas was loudly cheered by a throng estimated at 10,000 people gathered at the east entrance of the Capitol Sunday. The eminent Baptist divine quoted at length from the poet Tennyson, and then declared that Tennyson had believed in a League of Nations.

"And if it does not come today it will come tomorrow, as sure as God is upon his throne," continued Dr. Truett, "and standing in the shadow of the state chamber I declare that the moral forces of the country, without regard to political party, regard the delay a national and world-wide tragedy."

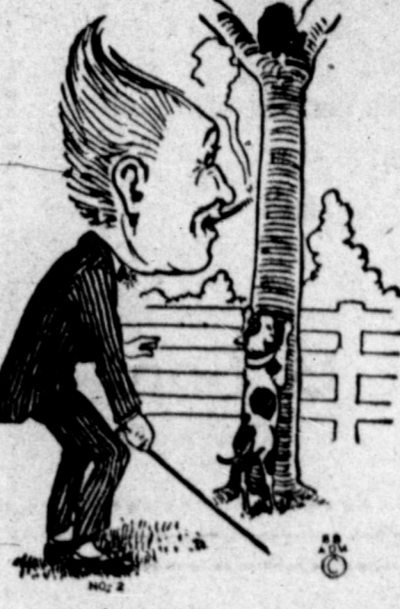

THAT BAILEY MEETING.

Last Saturday at Dallas was the big Bailey Rally day. A Big campaign was put on for a crowd and the papers reported about 300 present.

Bailey was not present but wrote a letter, considered by many as very weak. After appointing several committees and passing several resolutions the meeting went into speech-making and the Dallas News gives this report:

Houston Man Chairman.
R. C. Duff of Houston was elected chairman of the meeting, with Luke Bell of Karnes City secretary.

After the meeting organized a committee of resolutions was appointed, and while that committee retired various men were called to speak from the crowd. The first one was T. A. Morrison of Mitchell county. Mr. Morrison said he had always been a democrat and that most of the present politicians know no more about Democracy than a jackass does about heaven. Several times during his talk he used oaths and quaint mannerisms, these being received with guffaws by his hearers.

"If there ever was a Texas Governor Hobby is one," he shouted. There was some applause. In a few moments he repeated the term he applied to Governor Hobby, nor did he smile, as "the Virginian" insisted should be done in such usage, "Pinkie" Francis, former Sergeant at Arms in the Texas Houses of Representatives and a Bailey worker in this campaign, ran to the stage and asked the speaker to "quit cussin'."

When Mr. Morrison left the stage—the morning meeting being at the Jefferson Theatre and the afternoon gathering in the Adolphus ballroom—Chairman Duff said he could not allow the occasion to pass without expressing the belief that the words applied to Governor Hobby had been thoughtlessly used, "intended as a joke and not to be taken seriously," and that he did not believe what had said represented the sentiments of this meeting or of the Democrats of Texas.

Dallas Man Resents Words.
John W. Pope of Dallas, who seated on the stage, said that he would not participate in a meeting of Democrats in Texas that would call the Governor of Texas a —

"I want to say to you that Governor Hobby is not what he has just been called," he said.

Thomas B. Ridgell moved that the meeting "do not approve" such remarks about the Governor or any other official of the state of Texas. He said "the gentleman ought to apologize" and that this meeting should repudiate "criticisms that would demean the Governor."

Bob Barker announced from the audience that Mr. Morrison wanted to withdraw what he had said, and said he had no intention of reflecting upon Governor Hobby's family.

"Let's dispose of this. Let's dispose of this," said Chairman Duff. "A rising vote," demanded Mr. Ridgell.

Unanimously and by a rising vote the meeting repudiated the language that had been applied to the Governor.

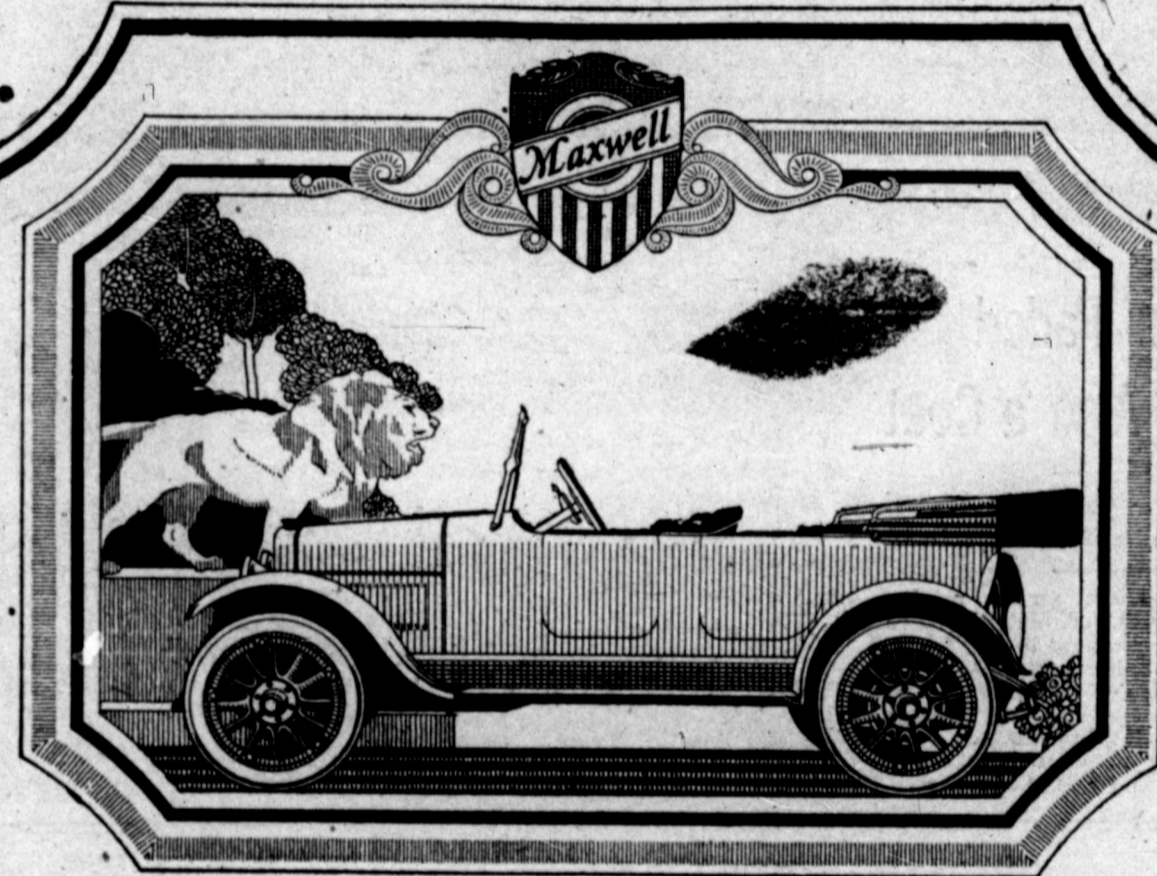

"The campaign for governorship will really begin in earnest after the precinct conventions of Saturday. There are five candidates in the field, but up to date only two of them, Pat Neff of Waco, and former Senator Bailey of Gainesville, have made any considerable progress with the voters. Looney, Thomason and Lewelling, the remaining three candidates, have climbed upon the administration band wagon, but there is reason to believe they are generally regarded as excess baggage and may be invited to step down and out to make way for the man who will have a chance to defeat Senator Bailey.

CLYDE'S FARM PRODUCTS.

Aubrey Ashley, secretary of the Clyde Chamber of Commerce recently secured data on the value of farm products marketed at Clyde during 1919.

He found that farm products of all kinds sold on the Clyde market totaled \$1,174,688.50. There were hundreds of loads of fruits, berries, sweet potatoes, etc., of which no figures are available. The item of butter and eggs is of special interest. The records shows that \$42,970 worth of butter and eggs were sold in Clyde last year, nearly half as much as all fruits, vegetables and sweet potatoes. The value of fruits, vegetables and sweet potatoes was slightly above \$100,000. There was \$4,301 worth of cream sold here last year. Clyde is the market for more than \$1,000,000 of farm products annually.

—of the Policy in—

The E. K. Local Progressive Mutual Life and Accident Insurance Association Of Snyder, Texas.

TOTAL PERMANENT DISABILITY OR DEATH.

As herein provided this policy is made payable in the sum of ONE THOUSAND DOLLARS, but in case of death or total disability of the insured herein, at any time before said membership shall reach 1000 members in good standing the Association will pay to the assured or beneficiary only \$1.00 per member then in good standing. However, when the actual membership shall exceed 1900 in numbers, this policy shall be payable to the assured or beneficiary in case of permanent disability or death of the assured, in the sum of TWO THOUSAND DOLLARS respectively, and shall so remain, until the membership shall, from some calamity or other reason, be reduced to a number below 1400, in which event said policy shall drop back to and become payable in the sum of One Thousand Dollars, under the same conditions as above stated.

After said membership shall exceed 1900 all assessments for death or permanent disability shall be \$1.50 per member, and shall so remain until the membership shall be reduced below the said 1400, when it shall again drop back to the \$1.00 assessment, and be payable as above stated.

The loss of the use of both hands, or both feet or one hand and one foot at the same time, or the irrecoverable loss of the sight of both eyes at the same time, caused by disease sickness or accident shall be considered as total permanent disability under the terms of this Certificate.

PERMANENT PARTIAL DISABILITY BENEFIT

Second. In the event the insured shall at any time subsequent to the date of this Certificate while in good standing in this Association, become permanently partially disabled, this Association shall pay to the insured the sum of ONE HALF of ONE FULL Assessment of ONE DOLLAR levied on each member in good standing at the time such disability occurs, and which is paid into the Association as a result of that particular assessment levy to the amount of one half of policy in force at that date.

The loss of the use of one hand, or one foot or the irrecoverable loss of the sight of one eye, caused by disease, sickness or accident, shall be considered as permanent partial disability under the terms of this Certificate.

ACCIDENT DISABILITY BENEFIT

Third. In the event insured shall at any time subsequent to the date of this Certificate while in good standing in this Association, break an arm or leg, this Association shall pay to the insured the sum of ONE

TENTH OF ONE FULL assessment of ONE DOLLAR levied on each member in good standing at the time such accident occurs, and which is paid into the Association as a result of that particular assessment levy to the amount of ONE HUNDRED DOLLARS on \$1000.00 policy and ONE HUNDRED and FIFTY DOLLARS on \$2000.00.

OLD AGE DISABILITY BENEFIT

Fourth. In event the Insured, if a member in Class A, while in good standing in this Association shall attain the age of Seventy years old, or in event the Insured, if a member of Class B, while in good standing in this Association shall attain the age of Eighty years old, if he or she so elects, upon surrender of this certificate to the Association, this Association shall pay to the Insured the sum of ONE FULL assessment of ONE DOLLAR levied on each member in good standing at that time, and which is paid into the Association as a result of that particular assessment levy not to exceed amount of policy in force at that date.

All persons between the ages of Sixteen and Forty years old, nearest birthday, shall be written in Class A. All persons between the ages of Forty-one and Sixty years old, nearest birthday, shall be written in Class B. Class A matures at Seventy years of age; Class B at Eighty years of age.

LIABILITY OF MEMBER

Fifth. The liability to the member Insured under the terms of this Certificate shall be for assessments ONLY, which shall be regularly and lawfully levied by the Board of Trustees for DEATH and DISABILITY claims, and ANNUAL DUES as stipulated in this Certificate.

MAXIMUM LIABILITY OF ASSOCIATION

Sixth. The Maximum liability of this Association to the insured, or to his or her beneficiary, heirs, or assigns for any disability whatsoever, or because of death, or because of both disability and death, under the terms of this Certificate shall be ONE DOLLAR for each member in good standing at such time, regardless of any past benefits received as stipulated in the contract and so provided therein, and which is paid into the Association as a result of one assessment levy, to the amount of ONE THOUSAND DOLLARS or amount of policy in force at that date and whenever as much as amount of policy in force at that date has been paid out by the Association to any person or persons whomsoever because of this particular Certificate at one time, said payment shall at once automatically, whether this Certificate is surrendered to the Association or not, operate as a cancellation and settlement in full of this Certificate under all of its terms and provisions.

pro and con, since the new rates have been put in the W. O. W., I feel like I might make some matters clear, as I have given the matter considerable study.

In the first place, you older ones know when a raise was made in our rates some years ago. Sovereign Frazer assured the fraternity that it was on solid basis and no more raises would be made in the future; and at that time his salary was raised from \$6000.00 to \$1200.00 and all went well for a few years. Then at the last Sovereign Camp Convention a raise was made that virtually robs the older members of their protection and makes the young members rate as high as old line policies. And you will note that careful pains were taken to raise Sovereign Boss' salary to \$25,000.00 per year and he now proclaims to us that the W. O. W. is 100 per cent solvent—so is his salary. How long it will last is more than any of us can tell, for it is said by Holy writ "that the dog will return to his vomit and the hog to his wallowing in the mire." And I am justified in assuming that as soon as they want more salary the W. O. W. will again become insolvent and have to be made solvent again.

When I joined the W. O. W. my head was as black as yours, as well as thousands of others, and since we have borne the heat and burden of the day, and met all claims, we are almost denied the privilege of remaining in the order by prohibitive rates being imposed upon us.

You remember our Sovereign Commander was called by the Government to fix war risk insurance, and how proud we were that our fraternity was so honored, and he with the rest of the Committee gave it as their opinion that the Government could assume the risk on our brave and beloved boys at 65 cents per \$1000.00 per month, or about \$7.80 a year to reach \$1000.00 insurance at the age of 22 or 23 years. These boys were exposed to all the diseases the flesh is heir to besides the dangers of submarines in crossing the ocean and then the exposure to shot and shell on the battle fields of Europe. And then immediately after this they tell us the W. O. W. can't carry the same class of risk for twice that insured remain at home and have all that medical skill can offer and besides a mother's tender care and nursing, in place of hospital tents with no friend near to attend them. Bosh; it is all bosh and tommyrot. We are not complaining at our Government. We use it as a comparison and not a complaint.

Now, the facts are: We have in Scurry county about 500 Woodmen with an average policy of about \$1500.00 and under the old rate, mind you, we paid an average annual premium of \$15.00 each for our protection. Was that sufficient for the risk? Let us see: 500 members, average policy \$1500.00—\$75,000.00 500 members, average premium \$15.00—\$7,500.00 sent to Omaha each year for Woodmen insurance.

Our death rate from 16 years of age to the grave in this county, according to record in the county clerk's office, is two and one-seventh deaths to the one thousand population, but for this once we will use three deaths to the 1000 population. Then if our membership is 500 we would have one and one-half death per year. At \$1500.00 each would be \$2,250.00 paid back by the W. O. W. into this county each year. This leaving a net profit of \$5,250.00 each year to the W. O. W. treasury at Omaha. And the same conditions exist throughout all of West Texas; at least five counties that I have investigated, Comanche being one.

So for the last ten years we could have carried here in Scurry county the same amount of insurance that we have had and during the ten years accumulated the sum of \$52,500.00 in our banks here at home, after all claims. Do you see the point? Do not sign any card that may be sent or handed you, thereby forfeiting rights you might retain under your policy. For bear in mind the policy provides for a raise in rates, but not for any lien against same.

Now, we have an insurance here that is as good, sane and sound as the citizenship of a

hundred circle, and we know they are a good as can be found.

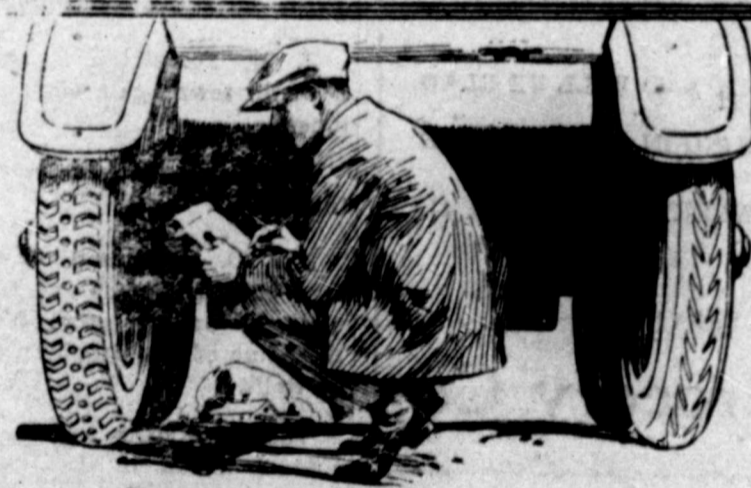
