DEMOCRATIC STATE CONVENTION; DELEGATES ARE SELECTED

JUDGE WATKINS OF ATHENS IS SELECTED PERMANENT CHAIRMAN OF THE CONVENTION.

Dallas, Texas, May 25.—Delegates to the National Democratic Convention at San Francisco, have been selected by the State Democratic Convention as follows:

Four delegates-at-large allotted to the women: Mrs. Minnie F. Cunningham, of Galveston; Mrs. Margie Neal of Carthage; Mrs. Jessie Daniels Ames of Dallas; Mrs. W. E. Spell of Waco.

Dallas, May 25.—The most harmonious State Democratic convention in the recent history of Texas was thrown into a frenzy of vociferous applause at 4:30 o'clock this afternoon when Dwight Lewelling of Dallas withdrew from the race for Governor in the interest of Pat M. Neff of Waco.

Neff was then introduced and the ovation continued.

"Lewelling has always been considered a good speaker, but that's the best speech he ever made," he said.

Opposed to Saloons.
Neff said he hoped to see the time when a saloon will not open its doors anywhere under the American flag.

"If necessary, I want to see every man wear his pants rolled up to his knees to be sure he is not a bootlegger," he said, referring to strict enforcement of prohibition laws.

Neff paid an eloquent tribute to Woodrow Wilson. He urged that "only Democrats be put under guard."

Stewart Smith started the first ovation for McAdoo when he said that he wanted the San Francisco convention to nominate for President "the man whose name is signed to my Liberty bond."

The crowd was slow to connect the allusion with McAdoo's name, but soon there was tremendous applause. The applause increased when he said that he believed the Democrats would name the next President of the United States.

Dallas, May 25.—A. B. Watkins of Athens was made permanent chairman upon recommendation of the committee.

Tom Love was selected as national committeeman without opposition.

Convention Hall, Dallas, May 25.—Judge A. B. Watkins of Athens was named temporary chairman of the State Democratic convention, which convened here today to select delegates to the national convention at San Francisco.

Judge Watkins was named after the honor had been declined by Com. Johnson of Tyler.

At the request of M. H. Wolfe, who called the convention to order, Dr. George W. Truett of Dallas delivered the invocation.

Welcomed by Wozencraft.
Then followed the address of welcome by Frank W. Wozencraft of Dallas. His reference to the "unterrified Democracy of Texas" brought the first volley of cheers from the delegates.

Mention of President Wilson also brought forth a burst of applause, as did the name of Governor Hobby and his administration.

Mayor Wozencraft's reference to women in the State convention for the first time as delegates called forth a burst of cheers.

Stuart R. Smith of Beaumont responded to the Mayor's address. His statement that he was for William G. McAdoo for President was applauded vigorously from every section of the big hall.

Judge Watkins, as temporary chairman, delivered an old-fashioned speech in which he praised Democracy for many of the good things that had come to the United States under a Democratic administration. He endorsed President Wilson, woman suffrage, prohibition and expressed the wish that every Texas woman could vote in the July primary.

"I am in favor of the adoption of the League of Nations covenant," the temporary chairman said. "When this is adopted the supreme effort of the Democratic party will have been accomplished. I am for the League of Nations if not as originally proposed, then under the best terms we can secure."

The recent anti-administration political fight was characterized by Judge Watkins as a "little flurry."

On motion of Clyde Sweeten of Greenville, Chairman Watkins called for the appointment of committees on permanent organization, credentials, platform and resolutions. Each senatorial district was requested to submit names for the committees.

Burelson Defeated.
One of the first districts caucused to report was the Twelfth District, where Albert Sidney Burelson was defeated overwhelmingly.

Burelson was an avowed candidate for district delegate. The women were united in their opposition to him. They said he lobbied in the cloakrooms of the National capitol against the Susan B. Anthony amendment. The caucus named Sam Sparks former State Treasurer, and Lee Beatty, as district delegates.

Several hours before the convention was called to order, Secretary Moody of the State Executive Committee said reports had been received from all delegations excepting twenty-five. He gave the following figures: Total convention vote, 1,400. For the national administration, 1,278.

Condemn Light Wine Plan.
Dallas, May 26.—Thirty-six delegates with one vote each, including three women, and sixteen delegates at large with one-fourth vote each, including four women, were elected by the Democratic State convention in session here.

The delegates are uninstructed as to presidential preference.

The convention endorsed the Wilson and Hobby administrations, called for an "unimpaired league of nations," and voted against light wines and beer.

The delegates were instructed to oppose any platform or candidate favoring "violation of nullification" of constitutional prohibition.

The convention adopted a resolution highly recommending McAdoo as a presidential possibility and condemned the senate for failure to ratify the peace treaty as submitted by the President.

Postmaster General Burelson was elected delegate from the Tenth district. Women delegates were conspicuous. Convention leaders said they acted like old-time politicians. A resolution was adopted recommending that the legislature enact a law to permit women to vote in the coming primaries whether they had paid their poll tax or not, if the thirty-sixth state ratifies the suffrage amendment, or enactment of a statute reopening the polls before the primaries so women can pay their poll tax.

DROWNED.

Late Tuesday evening on Morgan creek back of the C. P. Gary farm southwest of Colorado, Mrs. S. Young and her eleven year old son, Lloyd C., lost their lives by drowning.

Young, pastor of the M. E. Church at Loraine and leaves the husband with six small children. It was a sad and sudden accident.

KIT DALTON'S DEATH—MEMORIES OF SAM BASS.

Reading the following dispatch by the Associated Press which appeared in a number of newspapers it recalled to my mind several incidents connected with the reconstruction period of the United States following the war between the States as I remember them. The death of Kit Dalton deserted, penniless and alone reiterates the truth of the ages: "The Wages of Sin is Death." The newspaper item reads:

Death of Kit Dalton.
"Memphis, April 5.—Kit Dalton, of the famous Jesse James band and the Quantrell guerrillas, will no longer be seen on the streets of Memphis clad in the uniform of a Confederate officer. He died today with his boots off, penniless and at the age of 78, in a rooming house here. Broken health accomplished what Federal officers were unable to do during his seventeen years of outlawry.

"The story of Dalton's death picturesque life is more thrilling than any work of fiction depicting bold robberies. He started his role under the leadership of the James boys and Cole Younger, taking part in the holdup of thirty-six trains, eight stage coaches and the robbery of twenty-two banks. He applied the same means to a livelihood with the Quantrell guerrillas and the Bass gang of Texas. Five governors pooled issues and offered \$50,000 reward for the body of Dalton, dead or alive.

"Dalton forsook banditry to become a gambler in Memphis when the Federal government granted amnesty to all Civil War raiders. Later he reformed and became an evangelist."

Early History is Recalled.
One night some fifteen years ago I was sitting in my office at Georgetown with Sheriff Henry C. Purl, City Marshal R. Y. Secrest and Cole Younger, of Missouri, who was a member of the James and Dalton gang after the war. Among other things Younger told me that Kit Dalton was born in Logan county, Kentucky, in January, 1848, and as a boy of thirteen he ran away from home and joined Bedford Forrest's Confederate cavalry during the war. After talking with Younger I am sure the fol-

lowing paragraph in the Houston Post of Monday is an error: "At one time he was a member of the Sam Bass gang in Texas and saw Bass killed during a holdup in Franklin, Ky." Sam Bass was killed by Capt. Dick Ware and a company of Texas Rangers in July 1876, in the town of old Round Rock on the I. & G. N. Railway terminus in Williamson county, Texas, when they rode across the Brushy Creek to rob the bank and big mercantile establishments. At that time all the freight for one hundred miles west came to Round Rock. Saloons, gambling and dance halls never closed, day or night and Sunday the year round. Somebody tipped off the proposed robbing of the town to Capt. Dick Ware who was with Texas Rangers in Austin and rode horseback to Round Rock in the night. When Sam Bass and his men led by a big fellow named Barnes, and resembling Jess Willard rode in the north street Ware came around the corner from the south. Dick Ware saw Bass first then the town was a blaze. Barnes fell from his horse and Sam Bass reeled in his saddle. The smoke filled the street and Dick Ware emptied two pistols. Bass' men fled and Bass himself crossed Brushy where the celebrated "Round Rock" stands giving the town its name appears. He died under a big liveoak tree and was taken to a farm house in the woods and was buried in the cemetery. I conducted a W. O. W. funeral service in memory of a dead friend near his tomb some fifteen years ago. A monument had been built by his sister in Indiana and it had been chipped away by tourists until it then stood only four feet high when it was a nine foot white marble statue when put up. 1892 I met Dick Ware in Washington City. He was then Sheriff of Mitchell county, Texas, and was appointed United States marshal of Texas by President Grover Cleveland. Afterward I did some special work for Capt. Ware and talked frequently about early Texas history and the killing of Sam Bass at Round Rock. A citizen of Round Rock told me he saw Dick Ware shoot Sam Bass and one day I asked him if it was true and I shall never forget his answer: "I want to forget that awful day." Blood ran in the streets and several men were killed. I never mentioned the subject to Captain

Ware again. He was one of the bravest, coolest men I ever saw and never boasted of what he had done as captain of the Texas Rangers to rid Texas of the desperadoes and robbers in the 70's. But in 1893 I told President Cleveland what he had done and Capt. Ware served as United States marshal until he died. Peace to his ashes.

Another Version of the Round Bank Robbery.

After I had written the story of the killing of Sam Bass as I had heard it, I read the following story written by Colonel Chas. L. Martin, a Texas historian, and the article appeared in the Dalals News, disproving the Press report that Bass was killed in Kentucky:

"Captain Peak received notice from Murphy that Bass planned to hold up a bank in Waco, so the captain hurried in that direction, but at Waco he received further notice from Murphy that, it being inopportune, Bass had abandoned his bank robbery scheme at Waco, substituting Round Rock, where he was proceeding to rob the bank there. His horses being too jaded to reach Round Rock in time, Captain Peak wired Major Jones at Austin of the situation. Major Jones gathered up a few rangers who happened to be in Austin and some peace officers and proceeded post haste to Round Rock, arriving there in time to arrange with the men, hidden in the bank and some others at points of vantage near by, he awaited for what might happen. The men proceeding calmly at business. About 3 o'clock in the afternoon Bass and his men rode leisurely into town, dismounted, leaving their horses in care of Seabe Barnes, one of the later recruits, and proceeded into the bank. After they had well entered they were confronted with cocked pistols thrust into their faces with the command, "Hold up your hands." Their reply was a volley of pistol shots. One ranger was killed. As they fired they fled for their horses under a rain of bullets from the rangers and peace officers. Sebe Barnes was killed and Sam Bass wounded. Bass reached his horse, mounted and fled away at full speed with Underwood and Jackson. Riding some five miles, Bass could go no farther, so dismounted, tied his

horse and laid down under a live oak tree to await the rapidly approaching officers. When they came up Bass formally surrendered, and, being removed to a nearby farm house, died next morning. Turning to Captain Dick Ware of the Rangers, Bass said: "Dick, you are the man who shot me, and I knew your bullet had hit the right spot when it struck me. But it is all over now. I bear no malice and let the past be past." He then presented Captain Ware his bowie knife, which Captain Peak, who has it as a souvenir of the arduous and bloody campaign he had conducted in hunting down the robbers whom he had dispersed with the capture and imprisonment of some and the death of others, without the loss or even wounding of a man of his company."

The above is reproduced because of the mention of a Mitchell county Ex-Sheriff and as it recalls early days to many old timers here.

Birmingham, Ala., May 25.—Mr. J. A. Rountree, director general of the Bankhead Highway and Field Director of the Motor Transport Corps of the United States Army, has been informed that the El Paso Herald has published a statement that the convoy would be in charge of Dr. S. M. Johnson and that the route of the convoy would be diverted at Sweetwater via Roswell, Al Magorda and on to El Paso. Director General Rountree has written Judge J. M. DeArmond of Midland, Texas, a letter corercting these two conflicting statements.

The convoy will be in charge of J. A. Rountree who has been officially appointed by the War Department to conduct the same. The route from Texarkana to El Paso will be over the direct line of the Bankhead Highway which was first adopted by the Bankhead National Highway Association in convention at Mineral Wells, Texas, April, 1919 and adopted by the Texas State Highway Commission, and is known as State Highway No. 1 and more recently the Bankhead National Highway.

The convoy will reach Texarkana on July 24 and will reach El Paso August 23. It will require thirty days to make the trip across the State making stops at principal points along the Highway. The average daily mileage is forty four miles—some days it will be as high as sixty three miles.

The convoy will consist approxi-

mately of 170 soldiers, 30 officers and 20 distinguished citizens. There will be between thirty and forty trucks and twenty automobiles in the convoy.

Director General Rountree is now arranging the many details in regard to the convoy which will require three months travel from Washington to its destination, Los Angeles, Calif.




OIL.

(Reported by the Big Springs Herald)
 Officers of the company and drillers are enthusiastic about the McDowell well and believe a big well is going to be secured there, and hence their going ahead with all plans looking to the development of a big field here. Drilling is being continued in the McDowell well the work going forward bravely and with an expectation of hitting big pay. This well is now down to a depth of 2000 feet with the formation, a grayish shale, showing oil and gas. This oil showing does not come from the twenty five foot stratum of sand at 1900 feet as the oil from this was completely shut off by lowering the eight inch casing. The drillers have high

hopes of hitting a gusher before long and will allow nothing to interfere with their successful bringing in a real oil well.

Interest in the Sand Hill test is again growing since work was resumed and drilling is now going forward night and day. An especially hard formation is now being drilled thru with the use of a hugh roller bit and only fifteen feet of hole can be made each day. It is thought this hard formation will not continue much longer and fast time will be made when a softer formation will permit the use of fishtail bits. This well is now 925 feet deep and showings of gas continue to be encountered. In order to avoid delays due to water shortage, one mile and a half of two inch piping has been laid down to the big tank at Pete Johnson's farm where an ample supply is available.

At the Read Well No. 1 the drillers were successful in setting the twelve inch casing below the 15 inch casing which collapsed at the bottom of this well and they are now drilling day and night. This well at 525 feet is drilling in stratas of bluish shale intermixed with the red beds. The water shortage at this well was overcome by the big rains.

Progress at McCarty Well.
 Work is now going forward steadily at the Dought well of the McCarty Oil Association and this test is being watched with interest.

After penetrating a strata of brown and blue shale to a depth of two hundred feet a limestone formation was encountered at 920 feet. These two hundred feet of shale showed a strong saturation of oil and the driller is of the opinion that when the porous structure is encountered oil in paying quantities is going to be found. This saturation of the closely packed shale indicates that a strong pressure forced the oil upward and the belief is that a real pool lies underneath.

The driller states that the log of this indicates a structure similar to the Burk Burnett field.




