## BANKS FINANCE COTTON PROGRAM

HIGH GRADE COTTON SEED TO BE SUPPLIED FARMERS OF MITCHELL COUNTY

Two cars of Lone Star cotton seed were booked last week for distribution among the cotton growers of Mitchell County for 1921 planting, according to E. H. Rogers, of Austin, representative of the Gage Seed Company, who was in Colorado and Loraine to negotiate sale of the seed.

One car of these seed will be distributed by the Colorado National Bank of this city and the other car by the First State Bank of Loraine. Delivery of the car to Colorado is to be made in November, while the shipment to Loraine is booked for delivery in December.

According to data compiled by the Department of Agriculture at Washington, Lone Star Cotton produced a better quality of staple cotton than did any other upland cotton grown in West Texas in 1919. This cotton, grown in the same field with other varieties and under similar conditions by G. M. Millsap, of McCaulley, Fisher last year, produced a staple 1 1/4 inches long, as compared with grades from the other varieties from one inch to 1 1/16 inches long. Statistics further show that Lone Star is equally as drought resistant as any variety of cotton grown in this section.

W. A. Dulin, County Farm Agent, and the Colorado Chamber of Commerce will cooperate in an educational campaign to create a more universal demand for pure bred cotton seed for the farms of this county. This section is not adapted to growing the long staple variety, but will produce any of the upland cottons just as prolifically as will any recognized cotton growing belt of the state, and the purer bred cotton, the longer will be the staple and the better the price to be offered upon the market.

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## SIX GINS WILL BE OPERATED IN CITY

COTTON CROP ESTIMATED AT 40,000 BALES; RAIN REPORTED IN SOME COMMUNITIES

At least five of the six gins in Colorado will be operated throughout the next season, according to information obtained from the managers of the gins by the Chamber of Commerce. The Continental Oil & Cotton Company own two gin plants in the city and both these will be operated should crop conditions continue favorable, according to a statement made by the management Wednesday. One of the plants will be run, anyway, it was stated.

The new gin of O. Lambeth in the old J. M. Radford Grocer Company building will be among the best plants in the country, according to Mr. Lambeth. The plant, a 5-gin, 80-saw Munger Special, will in most respects be a duplication of the other gin owned by Mr. Lambeth in Colorado, with the exception of the packer, which is to be an automatic improved self-feeder. The plant will be operated by a 150 H.P. Fairbanks-Morse distillate engine.

Mr. Lambeth expects to have his new plant ready for ginning at the opening of the season and stated that both his gins here would be operated steadily.

The other two gins to be run here are the plants of the Williams & Miller Gin Company, and the Farmers' Gin Company.

The plant of O. Lambeth established an enviable record for the season of 1919-20 in the number of bales of cotton ginned. A total of 6512 bales were handled, and according to official statistics compiled by the Government, only one gin in the state turned out a larger number.

Recent rains over many communities of the territory contiguous to Colorado, together with the large acreage planted to cotton and the excellent condition of the crop, give promise that the record of 32,000 bales produced in Mitchell County last year will be materially increased this year.

## OIL WELL READY FOR TEST MORRISON GIVES BARBECUE

Earl Morrison was host at a barbecue celebration Sunday near the Underwriters' Producing and Refining Company's T. & P. No. 1 well, at which the drilling crew at the well were guests of honor. Several others from Colorado and other points in Mitchell County were guests of Mr. Morrison for the occasion, and it is estimated that 150 people were in attendance.

An abundance of beef, which the visitors state was barbecued by an expert, together with all the "fixin's" that go to make up a good typical dinner of the old Western style, was served. The celebration was held in an attractive grove about one mile from the well.

Driller Lewis of the Underwriters well stated Tuesday that every indication that a good find had been made continued very evident and that officials of the company still had every reason for believing that a territory with a wonderful future had been proven.

They have finished cleaning out the well, and everything is now ready to install the pumping equipment as soon as it arrives, upon which they are waiting at this time. The tubing and pumping outfit is expected at an early day. It is stated that the oil in the hole continues to rise slowly, day by day.

A survey of the oil development in Mitchell County made Monday afternoon indicated that no material changes were to be noted since the middle of last week.

The Underwriters' T. & P. No. 1 near Westrook was still being cleaned out preparatory for giving the well a thorough test under the pump. It was stated that several days would very probably pass before the pump arrived and could be installed.

At Iatan, the well of the Colorado-Texas Company was drilling at a depth of 13,000 feet. A double tower crew is now steadily employed here and the test is being lowered satisfactorily. Driller Reese, in charge of this well, authorizes the statement that he is confident of a good well being brought in.

## HEAVY VOTE CAST IN MITCHELL CO. SLIGHT CHANGE IN BAILEY-NEFF VOTE

561 VOTES POLLED AT COLORADO; 1191 VOTE FOR GOVERNOR IN COUNTY

Returns from the election in Mitchell County were incomplete Wednesday on account of one box having not reported and the absence of the County Chairman, J. A. Buchanan, who left the city Monday night for New Mexico. Returns from all other boxes in the county, however, show conclusively the result of the election.

A total of 561 votes were polled at Colorado. From the incomplete returns a total of 1191 votes is shown to have been polled in the county for governor. The voting is reported to have been heavy at the several boxes and considerable interest was manifested by supporters of some of the aspirants for county office, as well as the gubernatorial candidates.

County Judge J. C. Hall, Tax Assessor J. B. Holt, County Attorney Thos. R. Smith and J. W. Nunn, Justice of the Peace at Colorado were all elected without opposition. Hon. W. P. Leslie of this city, District Judge and Hon. E. I. Hill of Sweetwater, District Attorney, were also re-elected without opposition.

In the campaign for County and District Clerk, W. S. Stoneham received a total of 547 votes, J. T. Smith 131 votes, N. T. Smith 157 votes and E. O. Green 281 votes. This gave Mr. Stoneham a majority of 2 votes over his three opponents.

Charlie C. Thompson of Loraine, received 212 votes in the county for Representative, as against 347 votes polled for his two opponents, R. M. Chitwood of Nolan County, who received 205 votes, and W. C. Holden of Fisher County, who received 66 votes. Thompson received 398 of the 534 votes polled for Representative at Colorado and carried every box in the county. He also carried two small boxes in Nolan County. Thompson lost only 57 votes at Loraine, his home.

W. J. Chesney was re-elected to the office of Sheriff and Tax Collector by a majority of 129 votes over his opponent, J. W. Kay. The vote cast for Chesney was 637, while Kay received 508 votes.

No candidate offered for the place of County Treasurer and the name

## MITCHELL COUNTY EXHIBIT FOR ILLINOIS STATE FAIR

Specimens of Mitchell County Agricultural Products to Be Shown at Springfield Illinois

An exhibit of Mitchell County agricultural products will be exhibited at the Illinois Fair, to be held at Springfield during the latter part of August, according to information made public Friday by W. A. Dulin, County Farm Agent.

Mr. Dulin will arrange for collecting and shipping of exhibit from Colorado direct to Springfield and expects to make shipment about August 19. The exhibit will be in charge of J. C. Wells, of Stamford, Exhibit Manager for the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, who plans to leave the State on August 1st for a visit to State Fairs at Sedalia, Mo., Springfield, Ill., and others of the Central Western States.

Announcement that this exhibit would be made was given out Friday morning following a conference between Mr. Dulin and the secretary of the Chamber of Commerce of Commerce. The full cooperation in this work will be given the County Farm Agent by the Chamber, according to the secretary.

Mr. Dulin is anxious that the exhibit to be shown at Springfield be representative of what Mitchell County is capable of producing in the various staple crops. Farmers and land owners are urged to cooperate with him, in the way of preserving fine specimens of agricultural products and placing them at the disposal of Mr. Dulin.

In those cases where practical, pictures showing good specimens of farm products, live stock, fruits, vegetable, etc., may be included in the exhibit. The use of such pictures for purely advertising purposes, however, will be prohibited by the fair management. The space reserved for the Mitchell County exhibit is ten feet square and ample room will thus be provided for displaying a few good pictures to advantage.

Mitchell County is one of the most reliable farming communities of the whole of West Texas, and an exhibit of some of the staple crops in out-of-state affairs will serve to give this county some of the publicity to which it is entitled.

## 2 RUNAWAY BOYS PICKED UP HERE

RIFLED LOCAL TICKET OFFICE FOR TRANSPORTATION; ONE CARRIED PISTOL

Tempted by the wiles of adventure, whether suggested by the movies or from reading the tales of Diamond Dick, two youthful offenders, who gave their names as Billie Wendall, 12, and George Jones, 10, and their homes as being at a Denver street address in El Paso, were apprehended in Colorado Monday morning on the charge of rifling tickets at the Texas & Pacific passenger station and with having in their possession a pistol.

According to the story told by the youthful adventurers, they left their homes in El Paso the first of last week, with Ranger and the oil fields as their destination. Conditions there were not so promising to them and a return trip to the West was planned. They left Ranger Sunday night on Train 25, but for some reason which they did not explain to a representative of the Record, stopped at Loraine. Remaining there a few minutes the trip west was again taken up and the two came into Colorado on foot.

Arriving in this city they considered their plight as being desperate and determined to "make a raise" from some source. While loafing about the passenger station, the agent W. B. Ralph, was noticed to leave the ticket office and Billy immediately received an incentive. He rushed into the office and appropriated a number of blank forms on which transportation tickets are filled out, but luck was against him and someone in passing detected what was going on. Mr. Ralph was notified and gave chase to the youth, who by this time had left the station and was running through the yards. Seeing that he was being overtaken, the boy threw his supply of tickets under a box car and surrendered.

The sheriff's office was notified and the two were taken before Judge Hall for investigation. The larger boy was found to have a pistol in his possession, the barrel of which had been sawed off. The gun was of .22 calibre and single shot. Billie contended that his gun was only for exploding blank cartridges and that he was guilty of no offence by having in his possession a "toy." Ammunition for the gun, however, was taken from one of his pockets, and the authorities were of the opinion that the contraption was a dangerous weapon. At least, none of them would agree to submit themselves as a target for a try-out as to the effectiveness of the "shooting iron."

Following a statement from the boys to Judge Hall that they had not been eating regularly during the past few days and were then hungry, the two were taken to a local cafe by the sheriff and served luncheon.

Judge Hall stated Monday afternoon that very frequently boys who had run away from their homes in various parts of the State and in some instances from places outside the State, came before him for investigation. In practically every instance he has adhered to the policy of giving the boys another chance, and with the advice that they return home and conduct themselves properly, ordered their release.

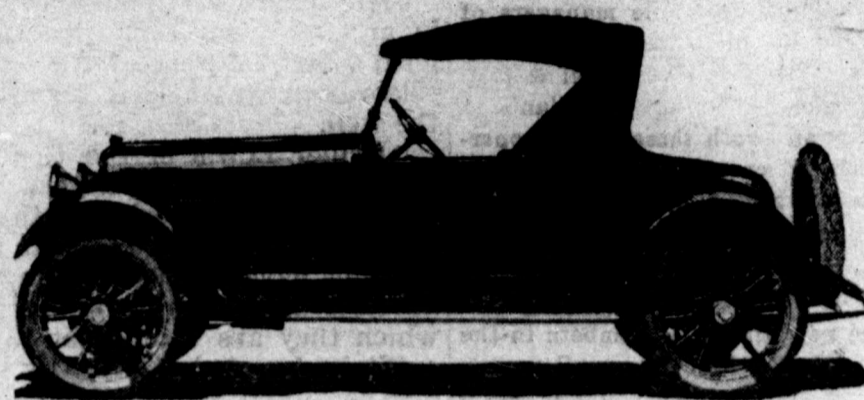

**\$14.50 PER CAPITA FOR SCHOOLS OF TEXAS**

Austin Texas, July 20—The State Board of Education today fixed the apportionment for the next term of the free schools of Texas at \$14.50 per capita, the highest school apportionment in the history of the State, it being an increase of \$6.00 over last year's apportionment which was \$8.50 per capita which up to that time was the highest amount ever apportioned for the public schools.

With an apportionment of \$14.50 per capita, the public schools of the State will receive during the next scholastic term \$18,170,095, based on 1,253,110 scholastics. The heavy increase in the apportionment is due to the \$4,000,000 appropriation made by the recent special session of the Legislature, funds received by the schools from oil and gas taxes and also because of increased valuation of property in the State, which will bring in more taxes. Commenting on the apportionment fixed by the State Board of Education today, Governor Hoby said:

"The apportionment for each child in Texas for education was \$7.50 for the year I went into the Governor's office. To increase that apportionment to \$14.50 for the next scholastic year is the proudest act of my administration."

The new model 14 Linotype for the Record office is now installed, making the second of these wonderful machines in use in the mechanical department of this plant. The new machine represents the initial success of many years experience by the manufacturers, and in addition to setting straight matter for the news sections of the paper, casts type slugs for commercial and newspaper work of every character, including the larger display lines in the advertising sections. The machine works with almost human ingenuity, performing every task to which set to do, with neatness and speed. Among the many improvements on this machine is an electric melting pot, which keeps the molten metal at the same temperature automatically. Mr. A. L. Whipkey has charge of the new machine, while Mr. Skinner manipulates the old "Model 5" which is doing its regular service in the way of news and book composition.

Another recent addition to the mechanical department is our Miller automatic press feeder. This machine, which is attached

to a 10x15 job press, takes the place of a printer in feeding the press and handles any job from a visiting card to a sheet 10x15 in. Its speed is limited only by the speed of the press, it being not unusual to print from 2500 to 3000 sheets per hour. It is not only faster but much more accurate than would be possible in hand feeding.

WILL ATTEND OLD SETTLERS  
REUNION AT GEORGETOWN

Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Cross of a few miles west of Colorado, left this week for Georgetown where they will attend the Old Settlers' Reunion and spend a visit with friends and acquaintances in their former Williamson County home, and will also visit relatives in Austin. Mr. Cross has a fine farm, comprising three or four hundred acres, and stated while in the city Friday that prospects were good for another profitable crop this year. His early feed was beginning to need rain, the cotton and feed of late planting were doing the best possible.

NEW ROAD BEING OPENED  
TO UNDERWRITERS' WELL

Workers began the work Tuesday morning of clearing right of way for the new road running from an intersection of the highway one mile north of Westbrook west to the vicinity of the Underwriters' well, according to County Judge Hall. This road was ordered established recently by Commissioners' Court, and for the present will not be improved into a road of the first class. Stock gaps for the passage of automobiles and gates for wagons are to be placed at cross fences, of which there are three to be crossed. Judge Hall stated that it was the plan of Commissioners' Court to grade and macadamize the new road later, provided the territory served developed a proven oil field, which every indication now assures. The present plan of improvement will make the new road just as good as the one leading northwest from Westbrook out to the well, and shorten the distance considerably.

A macadam highway from Colorado direct to the field will mean that this city will easily become designated as the distributing point for supplies to meet the demand of the extensive development program soon to be under way in the western and northwestern sections of the county.

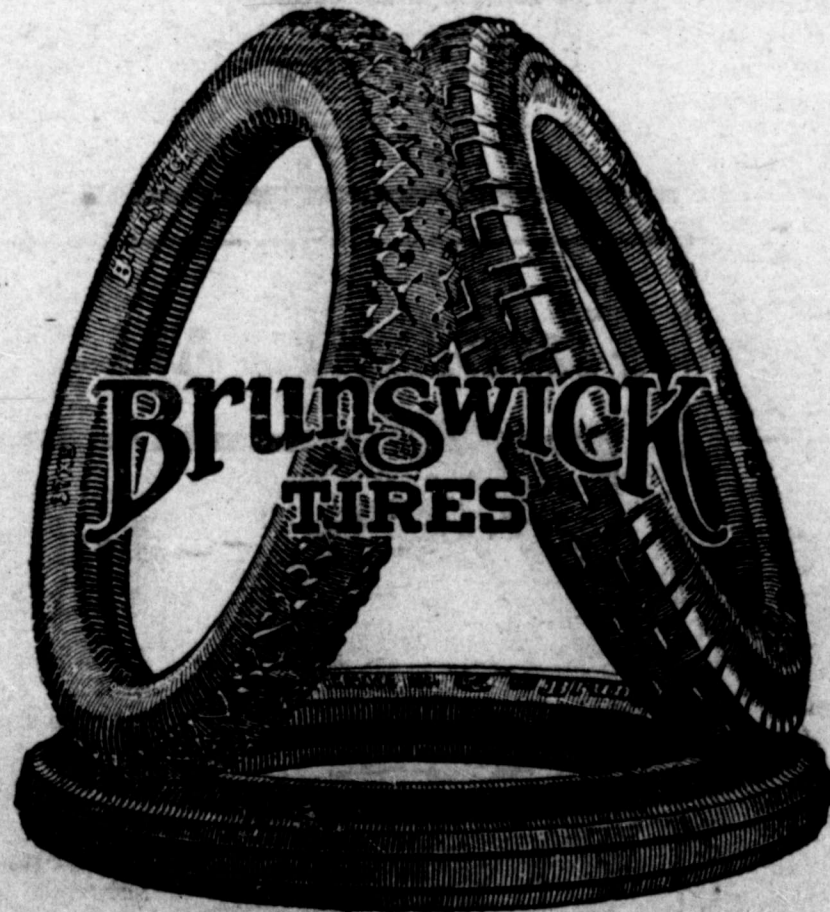

And while we are waging war on the motor car speedster, we should not overlook the need of attention to some small boys who persist in racing along the sidewalks on their wheels.

Farmers of Mitchell County are to be supplied with pure bred cotton seed for planting next spring. This insures the production of a better staple and a resultant better price for the staple.

Mitchell County produced 32,000 bales of cotton last year and present prospects make conservative an estimated production of 40,000 for the present year. You just can't keep a good country down.

William Jennings Bryan established a precedent in declining the nomination tendered the Comconer by the Prohibition party recently. This is the first instance on record in which he acted with such apparent ungrateful appreciation.

There is absolutely no denial to the need for extending the sewerage system of this city as to include the residence sections. It is in keeping with a program for better sanitation, better living conditions, better conveniences—and a better city.

Now that the election is over and the people have spoken their wishes as to who shall fill the various offices of the precinct, county, district and state, we can more fully devote our attention to other material things of life.

The Colorado Chamber of Commerce is being organized into one of the strongest commercial bodies affiliated with the West Texas Chamber of Commerce. It should be entitled to the support, moral as well as financial, of every citizen of the city. Keep in mind the slogan, "Get Behind the Chamber of Commerce."

The Democrats of Texas have again repudiated the principles of Joseph Weldon Bailey, this time by the secret ballot and a majority of two to one. Bailey was turned down on May 1; he was turned down on July 24, and he will again be relegated in the run-off August 28. Neff, Thomason and Looney were Democrats of the Woodrow Wilson type—Bailey was the opposite. The people chose as between one issue and the other, and they have spoken in favor of those principles which declare for a progressive and untrammelled Democracy.

The overwhelming defeat of R. N. Griesham, of Eastland, by Congressman Blanton, of Abilene, who is returned to Congress for the third consecutive term, apparently adds weight to the argument that Blanton promises to take his place with those representatives at Washington who have for these many years spent from 20 to thirty years in the Lower House. The first campaign of Blanton was against the Hon. W. E. Smith, formerly of this city. The Congressional District has since been changed, however, and Thomas L. is not the re-

presentative of Mitchell County. The campaign between Blanton and Griesham was a bitter one, the aspirants on some occasions while in joint debate almost reaching the point of personal encounter.

An industry that is sorely needed and the operation of which would be a dividend producer for the owners, is an Ice and Cold Storage Plant for Colorado. There are very few cities to be found in the State, the size of Colorado, in which is consumed a like amount of ice and wherein there is to be found a comparative demand for cold storage facilities, but that a plant of this nature is being operated with success. We can find no visible reasons for lending discouragement to such an enterprise here. Colorado is a thriving town of 4,000 people who would liberally support such an enterprise and the supply of pure water is sufficient for meeting the needs of a city many times larger in population. Why not keep Colorado money in Colorado?

The statement given out by the Thomason campaign manager at El Paso that he would support Joseph W. Bailey for governor in the run-off on August 28, was not a surprise to those of us who have kept in touch with the situation, politic, at El Paso during the past few years. It was merely a matter of form and in keeping with the policy in which some citizens of that Texas City are accustomed to act.

In the first place, there are those who live at El Paso who are disgruntled and sore on the Democratic administration because Wilson would not accede to their demands for a change in the Mexican policy. Had this country entered Mexico and taken over control, if not the ownership of these states of the Mexican Republic lying across the Rio Grande and south of the American border, a new territory rich in possibilities and large in area would have been opened at the door of El Paso, giving to that city the promise of becoming within a few years the commercial center of the great Southwest. But the President did not see things as some of those El Pasoans did. And, as a consequence, there are those there who are sore on the administration.

The statement from the El Paso citizen that he would now support Bailey, does not, in the opinion of the Record, carry any more weight than would a like statement from any other citizen. The bet of the Record is that at heart he was a Bailey supporter even before the primary.

Thomason and Looney have both declared their intention to combat the evils of Bailey in the run off campaign. These men are Democrats of that type represented by Woodrow Wilson and James Cox, and are big enough to dismiss any thought of personalities and lend encouragement to a campaign for an untrammelled Democracy in Texas and in the United States.

It is to be acknowledged that there are those voters who do not endorse Pat Neff, but rather voted for and would prefer to support now the candidacy of Looney or that of Thomason. However, the issue in Texas is "Shall the seven years administration of the Democratic Party in which more constructive legislation, including the Federal Bank System, the Child Labor Law, the Eight Hour Law, National Prohibition, and others which were passed by the Congress be repudiated and the principles advocated by a disgruntled former citizen of the State, who was against the Government in the sale of Liberty Bonds during the war, who is not on record as having made a patriotic speech during the conflict, and more previously of Standard Oil fame, be endorsed?"

The issues of the present campaign are identical with the issues previous to the May Day conventions, when the genius from the banks of the Potomac was relegated among the undestables in Texas.

### RELATING TO TAXATION BY SCHOOL DISTRICTS

Senate Joint Resolution No. 17  
Proposing an amendment to Section 3, of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas by exempting independent and common school districts from the limitation of a total tax of one dollar on the one hundred dollars valuation for any one year, and making an appropriation therefor.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1.—That Section 3 of Article VII of the Constitution be so amended as hereafter to read as follows: (Creating a new Section 3.)

Section 3.—One-fourth of the revenue derived from the State occupation taxes and a poll tax of one (\$1.00) dollar on every inhabitant of this state, between the ages of twenty-one and sixty years, shall be set apart annually for the benefit of the public free schools; and in addition thereto there shall be levied and collected an annual ad valorem state tax of such an amount not to exceed thirty-five cents on the one hundred (\$100.00) dollars valuation, as with the available school fund arising from all other sources, will be sufficient to maintain and support the public schools of this State, for a period of not less than six months in each year, and it shall be the duty of the State Board of Education to make such appropriation out of the said tax to provide free text books for the use of children attending the public free schools of this State; provided, however, that should the limit of taxation herein named be insufficient the deficit may be met by appropriation from the general funds of the state and the Legislature may also provide for the formation of school districts by general or special law without the local notice required in other cases of special legislation; and all such school districts, whether created by general or special law, may embrace parts of two or more counties. And the Legislature shall be authorized to pass laws for the assessment and collection of taxes in all said districts and the management and control of the public school or schools of such districts, whether such districts are composed of territory wholly within a county or in parts of two or more counties. And the Legislature may incorporate cities or towns having a population of five thousand or less into school districts heretofore formed or hereafter to be formed, and the maintenance of public free schools, and the erection and equipment of school buildings therefor, provided, that a majority of the qualified property-tax-paying voters of any school district voting at an election to be held for the purpose, shall vote such tax not to exceed in any year one dollar on the hundred dollars valuation of the property subject to taxation in such district, but the limitation upon the amount of school district tax herein authorized shall not apply to incorporated cities or towns having a population of five thousand or less.

The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at an election to be held throughout the state on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1920, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words, "For the Amendment to Section 3 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing that the limitation upon the amount of school district tax of one dollar on the one hundred dollars valuation shall not apply to independent or common school districts created by general or special law."

Section 2.—The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have the same published as required by the Constitution and existing laws of the State.

Section 3.—That the sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

### RELATING TO THE MANNER OF COMPENSATION OF PUBLIC OFFICIALS

House Joint Resolution No. 7  
A Joint resolution of the Legislature of the State of Texas, proposing an amendment to the constitution of the State by adding to Article 16 thereof a new Section, to be known as Section 60; providing for the compensation of public officials.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That there is hereby added to Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, a new section to be known as Section 60, which shall read as follows:

Section 60.—Compensation of Public Officials: All State, district, county and precinct officers within this State shall receive as compensation for their services a salary, the amount of which, the terms and methods of payment and the fund out of which such payments shall be made, shall be ascertained, declared and fixed by the Legislature from time to time; provided that the Legislature may make such exceptions as may seem advisable.

This section shall supersede all other provisions of this constitution fixing and declaring the compensation of officers by salary, fees or otherwise and all provisions for salaries or other compensation for public officials, executive, legislative or judicial.

Section 2. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to cause to be issued his necessary proclamation for an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1920, at which election this amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of this State for adoption or rejection and shall make the publication required by the constitution and laws of the State. Said election shall be held under and in accordance with the General Election Laws of the State, and the ballots for said election shall have printed or written thereon in plain letters the following words:

"Official Ballot" for the amendment to Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, adding thereto Section 60, providing for compensation of public officials." "Against the amendment to Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, adding thereto Section 60, providing for compensation of public officials."

Those voters who favor such amendment shall erase by marking a line through the word "Against" the amendment to Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, adding thereto Section 60, providing for compensation of public officials. And the result of the election shall be published and declared according to the majority of the vote cast in such election.

Section 3. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated for the purpose of paying the necessary expenses of the proclamation and publication of this amendment and the election to be held hereunder.

### AUTHORIZING ONE AND ONE-HALF PER CENT AD VALOREM TAX, BY CITIES AND TOWNS OF FIVE THOUSAND OR LESS POPULATION.

Senate Joint Resolution No. 12.  
Proposing an amendment to Section 4, Article XI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by increasing the total tax rate that may be levied by cities and towns having a population of five thousand or less than one-fourth of one per cent to not exceeding one and one-half per cent, and making appropriation therefor.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 4, Article XI of the Constitution be so amended as hereafter to read as follows:

Section 4. Cities and towns having a population of five thousand or less may be chartered alone by general law. They may levy, assess and collect such taxes as may be authorized by law, but no tax for any purpose shall ever be lawful for any one year which shall exceed one and one-half per cent of the taxable property of such city; and all taxes shall be collectible in current money, and all licenses and occupation taxes levied, and all fines, forfeitures and penalties accruing to said cities and towns shall be collectible only in current money.

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at an election to be held throughout the state on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1920, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words, "For the amendment of Section 4, Article XI of the Constitution increasing the total tax rate that may be levied by towns and cities having a population of five thousand or less from one-fourth of one per cent to not exceeding one and one-half per cent of any one year."

Section 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and to have the same published as required by the Constitution and existing laws of the State.

Section 4. That the sum of Five Thousand Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

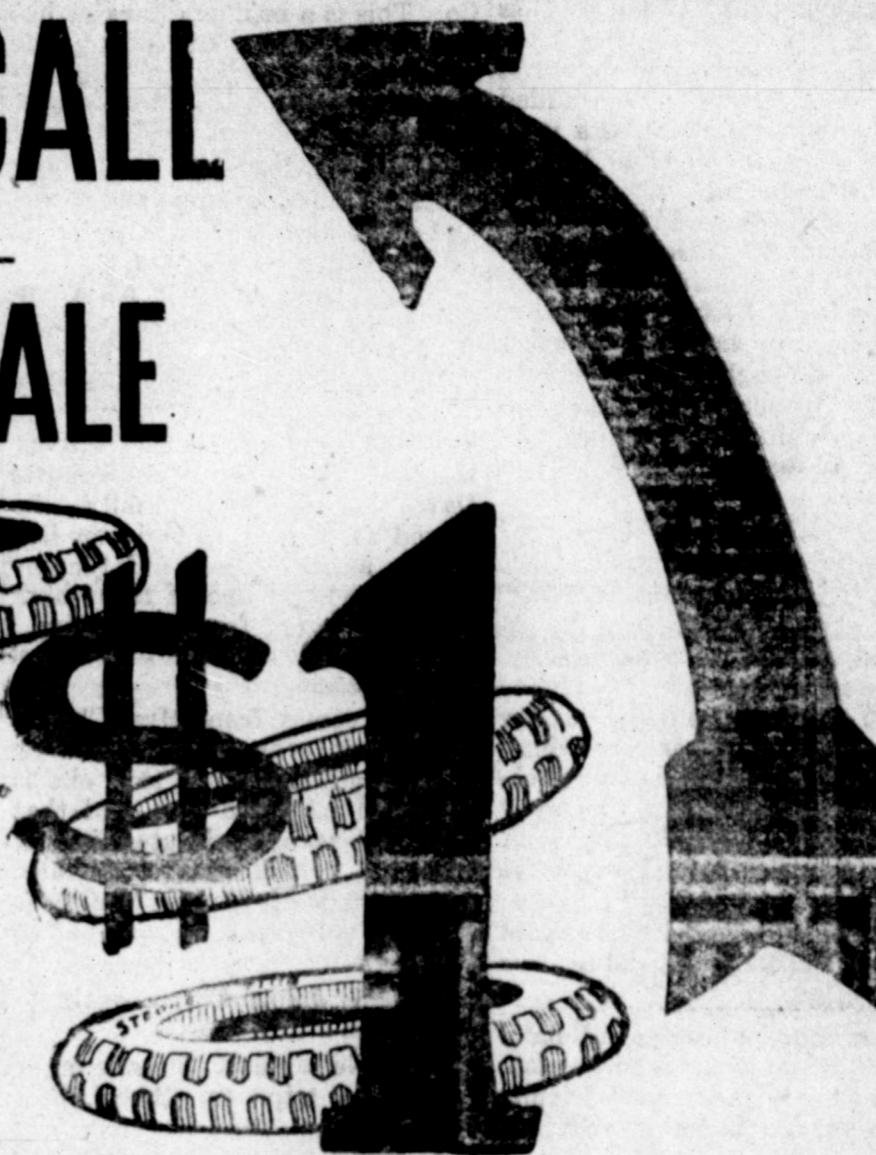
