COLORADO COTTON MARKET ADVANCES

STAPLE SOLD HERE WEDNESDAY AT 23 CENTS; 1512 BALES ARE RECEIVED

Cotton was selling at 23 cents per pound, middling basis, on the streets of Colorado Wednesday and during the week ending Wednesday night prices had varied 20 cents and upward. Buyers report that under the ideal weather conditions but little stained or damaged cotton is being received. The staple, however, for the most part, is not grading as well as farmers and buyers had anticipated at the opening of the season.

Estimates given the Record Wednesday afternoon by some of the local cotton factors placed the amount of cotton being sold as ginned at seventy-five per cent. The remainder of twenty-five per cent is being held by the producers, pending an advance in market quotations.

At the various gins it was reported that the seed cotton was as a rule clean and making an unusually good turn-out. Seed was quoted at \$30 a ton at the gins and it was stated that most farmers were selling.

A total of 1512 bales had been received at the five gins in Colorado up to Wednesday night, divided as follows: Continental Cotton Oil Co. (Concrete gin) 275; O. Lambeth, 440 at the brick gin and 170 at the steam gin; Williams & Miller, 267, and the Farmers Gin Co., 635.

RED CROSS HAULS 61 LOADS TRASH FROM CITY

City Marshal Dick Hickman stated Monday that a total of sixty-one loads of trash was hauled from the streets and alleys of the city as a result of the clean-up campaign instituted recently by the Red Cross. Because of the inability to secure sufficient wagons and men all trash raked up in the city was not removed, Mr. Hickman stated.

The local chapter, American Red Cross superintended a clean-up campaign here recently and the committee in charge of the work report that the public cooperated to the fullest extent. All expense of removing the trash from the city was paid by the Red Cross.

WOMEN MAY PAY 1919 POLL TAXES

EXTENSION TO OCTOBER 22 IS GRANTED BY ACT OF LEGISLATURE

W. J. Chesney, tax collector, Wednesday stated that he had a supply of poll tax forms in his office for issuing receipts to women of the county who desired to qualify as voters in the general election, November 2.

Under an act passed by the Legislature, in special session at Austin last week, the right of suffrage is extended all women of legal age in the State under provisions of the Federal Suffrage amendment. This act has been held constitutional by the attorney general.

Mr. Chesney stated the act was merely an extension of time in which women may pay their poll taxes and qualify under the Terrell election law. The last day for paying these poll taxes is October 22. The 1919 poll tax forms will be used.

"In order to show our appreciation to the women voters of Mitchell County," stated Mr. Chesney, "we will issue to each of them, who has not previously paid a poll tax for the year 1919, two poll tax receipts at the same time, provided they call at the tax collector's office before the night of October 22. They may pay up these taxes for the past and ensuing year at the same time, thus qualifying their suffrage for elections in 1920 and next year."

Women holding a 1919 poll tax receipt will not be affected by the special provision and may vote, if otherwise qualified, at all elections held during the fiscal year of 1920.

Lumber and building material is being placed on the ground this week for three new residences in Colorado, all of which are to be in the north part of the city. Jno. T. Smith will build a modern home on North Walnut street. Another attractive residence will be constructed by J. C. Pritchett at a desirable Walnut street location. The other residence will be built by Terrell McKinney.

Plans for erection of a number of residences in North and Northeast Colorado are being formulated, according to the Chamber of Commerce. A few of these are contemplated as permanent homes for the owners while the others will be built for sale or lease to tenants in meeting the urgent demand for additional homes in this city.

BURGLARS TAKE SHIRTS AND HAMS

LOOT IS TAKEN FROM LAUNDRY AND THE CITY MARKET FRIDAY NIGHT

Sheriff W. J. Chesney stated Monday that his department had obtained no clue as to the identity of burglars who entered the plant of the Colorado Steam Laundry and the City Meat Market Friday night of last week. It is the belief of the sheriff that the job was done by amateurs and he expects to establish identity of the perpetrators.

Entrance to the laundry was effected by cutting away a screen from a window on the south side of the building. Here the loot appropriated consisted of a few silk shirts and other articles of wearing apparel.

A screen door in the rear of the market was broken in forcing an entrance there. The proprietor states that only 25 cents in cash was obtained from the cash register. One or two hams, several pounds of cheese, and two butcher knives were taken.

This was the first burglary to occur in Colorado since the time the F. M. Burns department store was entered two months ago. The man entering his store was apprehended by night patrolman Hickman and locked up. Later it developed that he was an escaped convict from the State penitentiary and he has since been returned to Huntsville.

VARIOUS CHURCHES OF CITY

ADVISORY BOARD

Rev. Guy B. Duff, chairman of arrangements for speakers in the drive to raise Mitchell County quota of \$1,000 for the Home Service work of the Salvation Army, stated Tuesday that various churches of the city would cooperate with the advisory board in the rally Sunday evening at the Tabernacle, when a stereopticon lecture will be delivered by Commandant John J. Shearer of Dallas.

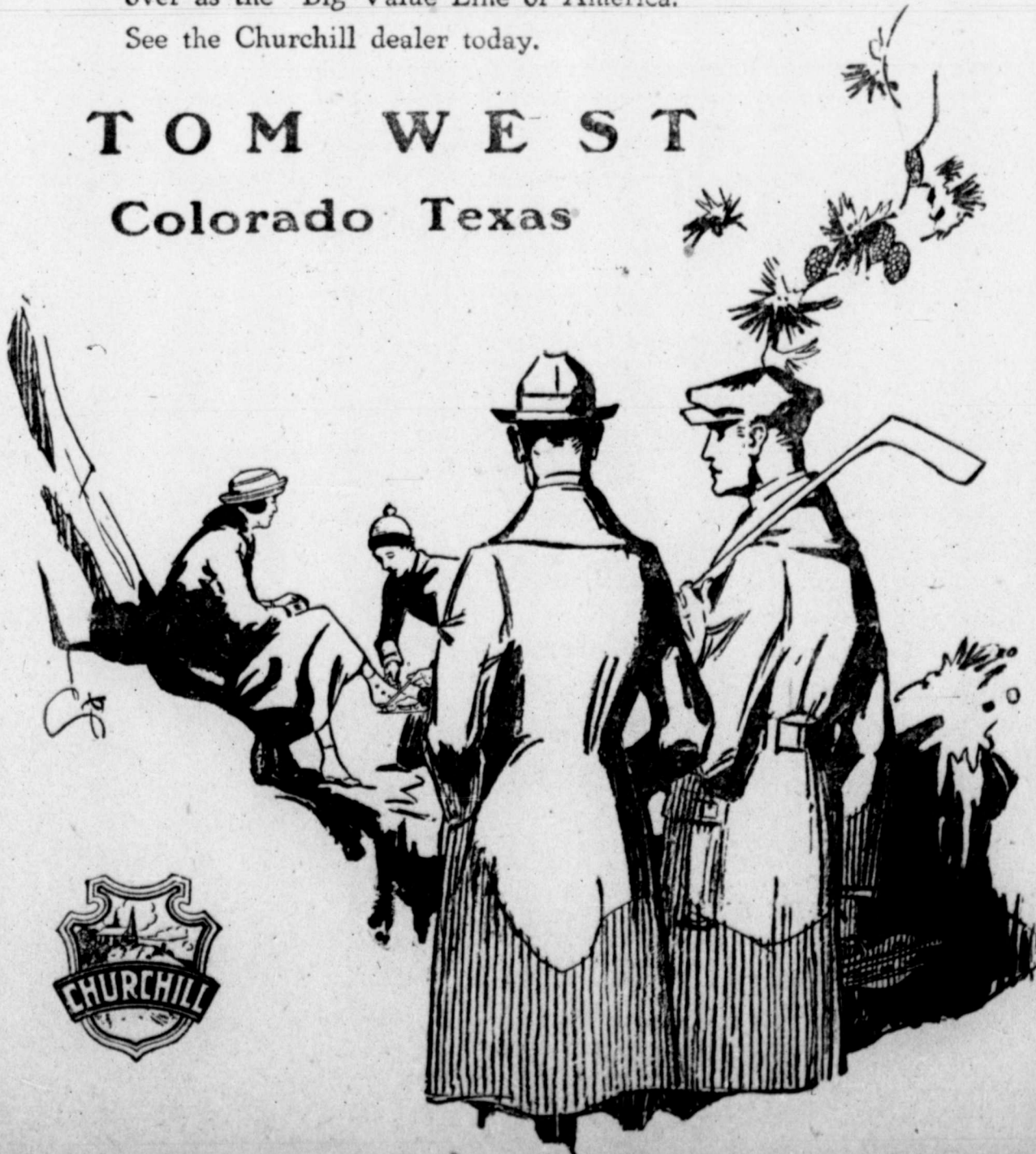

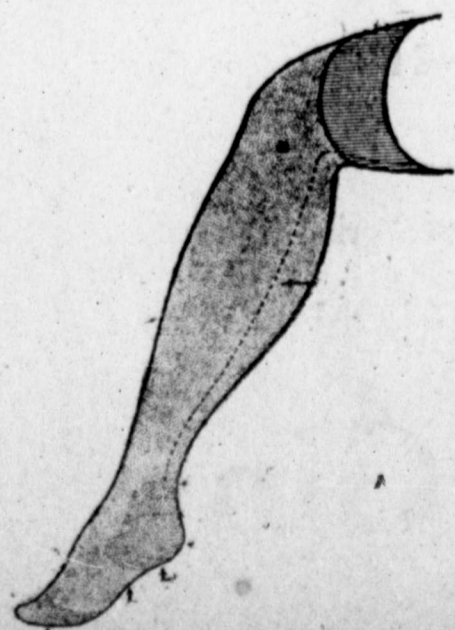

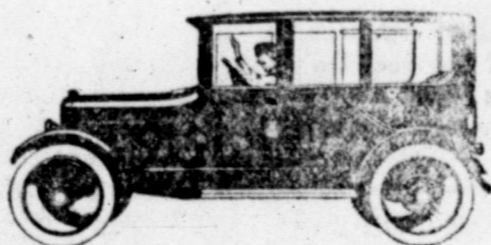
MISSION STUDY

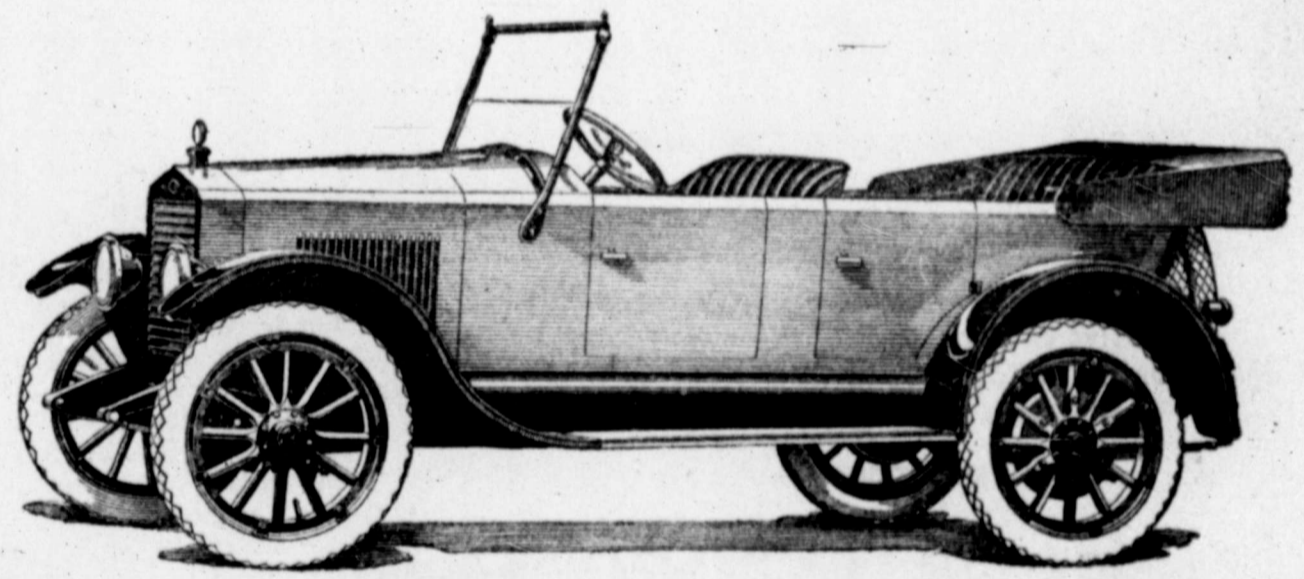

AN IMPORTANT CAMPAIGN

"No more important campaign for promoting the welfare of the people residing in the rural districts of Texas was ever undertaken in this State," declared Speaker R. E. Thomason of El Paso, at Austin recently, referring to the proposed educational amendment to the State Constitution to be voted on November 2nd, next.

"School legislation, since the first law was enacted in 1876 by the 13th legislature," Mr. Thomason said, "has been of so haphazard a nature that a most unjust and unexpected condition is the result. To put the matter bluntly, we have, during the past forty-four years, unwittingly, to be sure, but nevertheless effectively, garbled the Constitution of the State of Texas to the extent that special privileges are now accorded the residents of large cities incorporated under the general laws, that are positively forbidden the residents of small towns and rural districts.

"Here in Austin, for instance, a free citizenry can go to the polls and decide upon what they consider a tax sufficient to furnish their children educational opportunities that will somewhat fit them to meet the unusual problems and responsibilities that are bound to be theirs in our present fierce, post war struggles for the survival of the fittest.

"But is it left to the citizens of rural communities to decide for themselves what advantages are necessary for their children, whose struggles in life will be equally as great? No; the law steps in with, 'thus far and no farther,' for the country child.

"We are constantly bewailing the influx of country people to the already overcrowded larger cities," Mr. Thomason continued. "Can you imagine a better reason for a self-respecting, ambitious family leaving the rural districts than for them to encounter—wherever they dream of longer terms, better teachers, better school houses, a fighting chance for the children—a hated verboten sign staring them in the face from over the doorway of their dilapidated little school house?

"I cannot conceive of the amendment failing," Mr. Thomason concluded, "when the voters become acquainted with the true facts, and realize that its adoption will result simply in adjusting our school laws to conform with the principle of our government for which men have fought and died. 'Equal rights to all and special privileges to none.'"

Dr. Barber had not leased an office Monday but stated that he expected to close lease for offices on 2nd St. during the week.

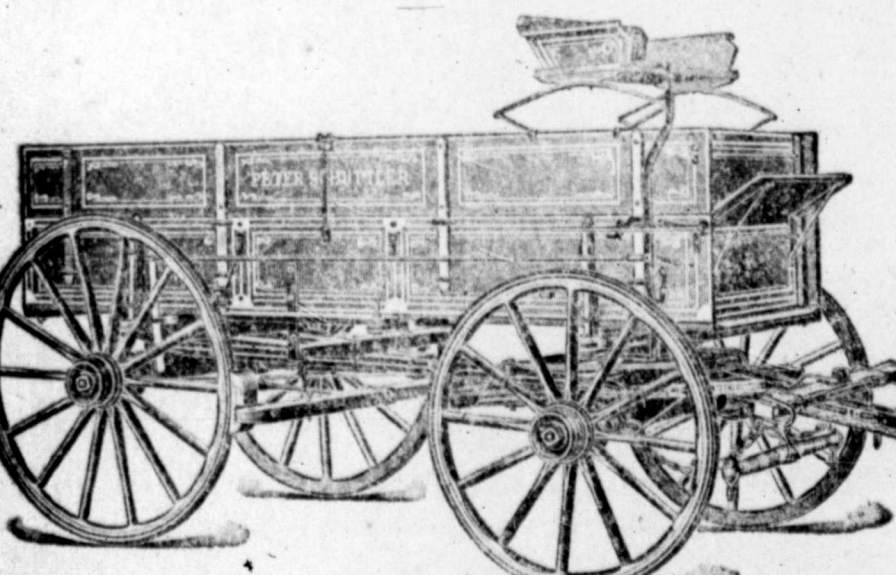

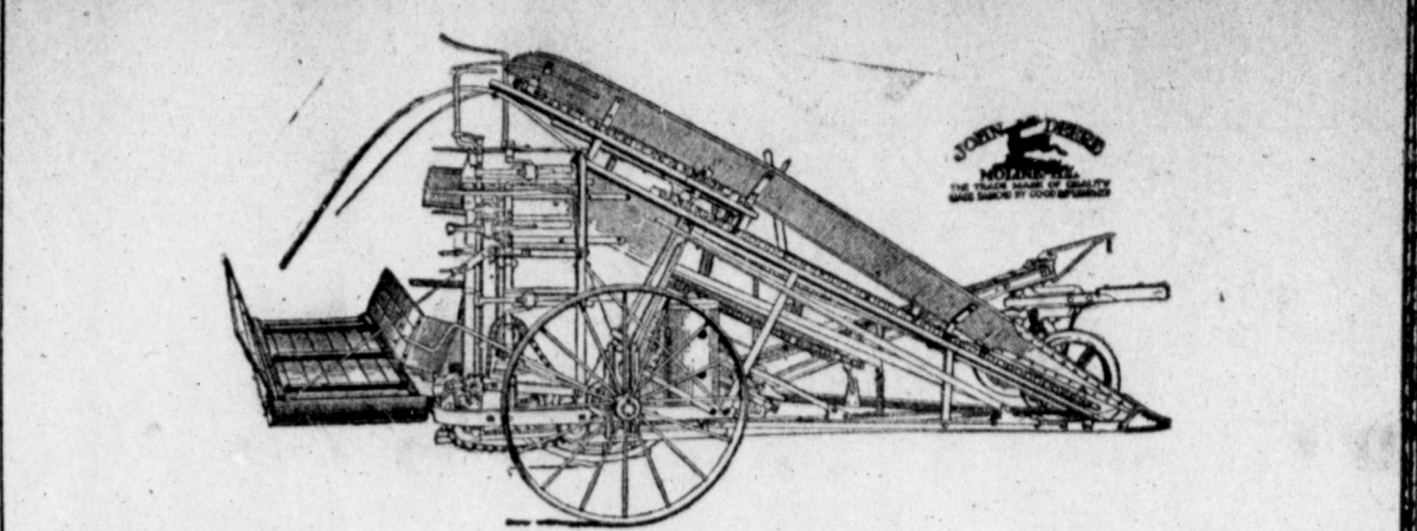
