Cisco, Texas, Oct. 15, 1920  
Dear Mr. King,

I received your letter and my credits several days ago. Thank you very much for sending them. I like this school fine and am interested in my work. I am taking shorthand, bookkeeping, typewriting, chemistry, and English. I am taking the business course because I expect to follow that line of work when I graduate. I wanted to take fourth-year Latin, but they didn't start teaching it until last week and I had already selected my course.

## RURAL SCHOOLS SHOULD BE GIVEN EQUAL FINANCES

On Nov. 2 the people of Texas will vote upon the better school amendment to the State Constitution, an amendment to section 3 of article 7, which seeks to grant to each school district the power to vote for its schools, such support as it may deem necessary. This privilege is now only enjoyed by about fifty of our larger cities, but is denied to country districts and those of smaller towns. The purpose of this article is to set before you the question of whether your children shall have a better chance at education and preparation for wider usefulness and power in life, or shall lose a large part of the opportunity for education that they now have. Organized labor has demonstrated many times that it is a staunch friend of the schools. When our public schools are closed or when they are taught by half-educated, immature boys and girls, then the rich can send their children to private schools and equip them for leadership, but the children of the great masses of the people of Texas must depend for an opportunity for education upon the public schools. The United States now has an alarming shortage of trained teachers. This is estimated at 100,000 elementary teachers and 20,000 high school teachers. Our children are the most precious asset of the state. The most important question now before the Texas people is this: Shall we retain the trained teachers whom we now have and induce other capable persons to enter the profession, or shall we accept those whom other states will not take? Last session more than 50,000 Texas children did not attend school because no teachers for them could be found. Four hundred thousand children were taught by mere boys and girls, whose preparation was not beyond that of the eighth grade, and who were totally inexperienced. Many teachers with no certificates were employed, in violation of the law. The four million dollar appropriation to increase teachers' salaries is a temporary relief made to tide over the present session until this amendment can pass, and can become effective. If this amendment should fail to pass, it will mean disaster to Texas schools. Even were the citizens of a district to unanimously wish to tax themselves to support their schools, the tax limit now set by the state constitution makes such action impossible. The right of local self-government in the matter of supporting their own schools is denied to every one living in Texas except to those living in about fifty of our largest cities. 50 per cent of the states of the union have no limit placed upon the power of taxation for school purposes, and no disastrous results have followed this freedom. In other states the tax limit varies from 50 cents to \$2.50. In only two states Texas and Virginia, is the tax limit as low as 50 cents. As patriotic citizens who value your children's rights you are urged not only to vote for this amendment yourself on Nov. 2, but to work among your neighbors and friends to win their support for the measure. Please explain to them that this amendment does not raise taxes; it merely empowers those districts which desire to do so to support their schools. It is a local option measure. It does not affect most of our large cities, but it extends to the small towns and rural districts an equality with the city as to the power to have good schools. Our great state of Texas, which ranks first in agricultural products, third in production of oil and seventh in wealth, is rated as thirty-ninth in education. Shall we remain at a standstill while other states move forward?—Voices of the Randall County News.

Plaintiff sues for foreclosure of a judgment lien, alleging that heretofore, to-wit, on Nov. 27, 1917, it recovered a judgment in the District Court of Mitchell County, Texas, in cause No. 3671, styled The City National Bank of Colorado, Texas, vs. E. B. Gamel and I. L. Gamel, against both the said Defendants, for the sum of \$4639.33, with 10 per cent interest from said date, and costs of suit; that on January 17, 1918, execution was duly issued on said judgment and returned by the sheriff of Mitchell County on Jan. 18, 1918, nothing found subject to execution; that the Defendants E. B. Gamel and I. L. Gamel nor either of them have ever paid a cent on said judgment, and that, by reason of the issuance of said execution and such non-payment, it is still a valid, subsisting and unsatisfied judgment and obligation;

That an abstract of judgment was issued on said judgment by the Clerk of the District Court of Mitchell County on Nov. 17, 1917, said abstract complying with all the statutory requirements for a valid abstract of judgment, and being certified to by said Clerk as required by law; that, on the same date, said abstract of judgment was filed for record with the County Clerk of Mitchell County, and immediately recorded by him, said record being in the manner and form required by law, and being indexed, direct and reverse in the names of all the parties thereto, all the statutory requirements to make it a valid record of an abstract of judgment being observed;

That, on Nov. 24th, 1917, said abstract of judgment was filed with the County Clerk of Erath County and recorded by him on Nov. 26th, 1917, being recorded and indexed, direct and reverse in observance of all the statutory requirements for recording an abstract of judgment; that, on Nov. 30, 1917, said abstract of judgment was filed with the County Clerk of Comanche County; and by him recorded on the same date, indexed, direct and reverse, in compliance with every statutory requirement for a valid record of an abstract of judgment; that, by reason of the issuing, recording and indexing of said abstract of judgment, and by reason of said judgment being a valid subsisting and unsatisfied obligation, the same fixed a lien under the statute on all real estate then owned or thereafter acquired by both or either the defendants E. B. Gamel and I. L. Gamel in said respective counties; that, after said judgment was rendered and such liens fixed, as aforesaid, the Defendant I. L. Gamel, acquired, by virtue of the statute of descent and distribution of the State of Texas, as one of the heirs at law of her deceased mother, Emily C. Thomas, wife of the Defendant M. I. Thomas, who died intestate on or about Jan. 1st, 1920, an undivided one-fourth interest in and to the following tracts or parcels of land: in Mitchell County, Texas—The W 1/2 of Sec. No. 9, Block 25, T.

& P. Ry. Co. Surveys, Cert. No. 2-1309, containing 320 acres, more or less; in Erath County, Texas: 27 acres, more or less, out of the Josiah Allen 320-acre survey, described in the deed from S. J. Marshall to M. I. Thomas, dated May 17, 1890, recorded in Vol. 38, p. 238, Deed Records of Erath County, Texas, to which reference is here made; also, a tract of 60 acres, more or less, out of the Josiah Allen 320-acre survey aforesaid, being the tract conveyed by the deed from D. L. Harris et al. to M. I. Thomas, dated Dec. 28, 1910, and recorded in the Deed Records of said county in Vol. 115, page 54, to which reference is here made; also, one-half acre, more or less, out of the Wm. Thomas Survey in said county, being the same land conveyed by Mrs. A. E. Whately to Mrs. E. C. Thomas, by deed dated Sept. 12, 1910, recorded in Vol. III, page 370, of the Deed Records of said county, to which reference is here made; and, in Comanche County, Texas, being 400 acres, more or less, out of the E. Walker Survey, Patent 398, Cert. 489, Abst. No. 987, described in the deed from R. M. Richardson and wife to M. I. Thomas, dated Dec. 17, 1917, and recorded in Vol. 110, page 124 of the Deed Records of said county, to which record reference is here made; that notice of the filing of certified copies of said deeds and of the deed from Iva Lorena Gamel and E. B. Gamel to M. I. Thomas, dated Jan. 5, 1920, recorded in Vol. 40, page 391, Deed Records of Mitchell County, Texas, is hereby given and same will be used in evidence by the Plaintiff on the trial of this cause; That, by reason of said aforesaid premises, the recording and indexing of the aforesaid abstract of judgment fixed a lien against the interest of the said Iva Lorena Gamel in each and every parcel of said land, which lien continues in full force and effect, said judgment being wholly unpaid. That the Defendants M. I. Thomas, J. R. Johnson, H. L. Knight, Charles Denny, Chas. Parks and Henry Wittmer are each claiming some right, title or interest, the nature of which is unknown to Plaintiff, in and to said lands, which Plaintiff avers is junior and inferior to the title which vested in the Defendant Iva Lorena Gamel, who is averred to be the same person as I. L. Gamel, upon the death of her said mother, and to said liens as aforesaid, and present no obstacle to the foreclosure of same.

Plaintiff prays that said liens, as they existed from and after the filing and recording of said abstract of judgment in said respective counties, be established and foreclosed against the Defendants Iva Lorena Gamel or I. L. Gamel and all the other Defendants, and that the claim of such other Defendants be cancelled and held for naught; and that orders of sale issue herein directing the seizure and sale as under execution of the interest of the Defendant Iva Lorena Gamel or I. L. Gamel, on said dates in said lands, and the proceeds of such sale or sales be applied to the satisfaction of the costs of such sales, the costs of this action, which are expressly prayed for, and to the aforesaid judgment, with interest thereon and the costs thereof, and for such writs and other process as may be necessary to give said judgment effect, and for such other and further relief, etc., as Plaintiff may show itself entitled to, as in duty bound it will ever pray.

Herein I fail Not, but have you before said Court, on the first day of the next term thereof, this Writ, with your return thereon, showing how you have executed the same.

**INTERSTATE COMMISSION WILL SUPPLY CARS TO WEST TEXAS**

Through pressure brought by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce and many of the affiliated chambers of West Texas, the Texas Chamber of Commerce of Dallas has won out in its efforts to bring aid to the coal dealers and manufacturing interests of that section of the State, according to a letter received by the Colorado chamber Monday. This is in the confirmation of Service Order No. 20, issued by the Director of Services of the Interstate Commerce Commission, confining coal cars to the coal trade and extending the area previously covered in priority orders to include West Texas.

In a letter to the Texas Chamber of Commerce, F. G. Robbins, director of the Bureau of Service, Interstate Commerce Commission, states:

"As explained in my telegrams to you, this matter was immediately taken up with the Colorado & Southern and with the Car Service Division, American Railroad Association, with the object of bringing about such improvement in the car supply upon the Colorado & Southern as may be necessary to meet the coal needs of West Texas. Meanwhile, the Commission has entered Service Order No. 20, by which railroads east of the eastern boundary of the States of Montana, Wyoming, Colorado and New Mexico are required to furnish coal cars to coal mines in preference to any other use. This should bring about an immediate improvement in the car supply and together with the other efforts that are being made should take care of the coal needs of West Texas."

The Colorado Chamber of Commerce is now directing efforts to the end of having additional sand and gravel cars allocated here. The sand and gravel pits here are among the best in the State and local concerns have contracted hundreds of cars of this material, provided that delivery can be made. Some of the largest engineering projects in West Texas are temporarily tied up because that sand and gravel cannot be shipped them from Colorado.

D. 1920, the same being the 22nd day of November A. D. 1920, then and there to answer a petition filed in said Court on the 16th day of September A. D. 1920, in a suit numbered on the docket of said Court, Number 3752, wherein Annie Bell Culipher is Plaintiff and Jim Culipher is Defendant; the nature of plaintiff's demand being as follows: Suit for divorce, Plaintiff alleging that she and the Defendant were legally married in Van Zandt County, Texas, on May 21, 1918, Plaintiff then being a single woman by the name of Annie Bell Tankersly; that Plaintiff and Defendant lived together as husband and wife until May 25th, 1918, when Defendant abandoned Plaintiff, since which time they have not lived together. That during the time they lived together, Plaintiff at all times conducted herself as a dutiful wife and performed all her obligations as such, and continued to do so until Defendant's conduct made same impossible; that on May 25th, 1918, the Defendant entered the military service representing to her that such separation was temporary and that he would return to her as soon as his term of service expired, but that Defendant immediately commenced a studied course of neglect and treated her with aversion and contempt; represented himself as a single man and tried to deprive her of the allotment and allowance made to dependants by the government; that Defendant made no provision for her support and left her dependent upon the charity of relatives; that during the time the Defendant was in the service he never wrote one word to Plaintiff, and she was compelled to learn where he was from the military authorities; that he was discharged in February, 1919, but did not advise her of this and she had to write the War Department before she could ascertain what had become of him. That she wrote Defendant, asking him to return to her, and, in July 1919, Defendant wrote her that he was without funds and that he would come back and live with her as her husband if she would send him the money to come home; that, at great sacrifice, she did so, and Defendant appropriated the same and never returned to her. That during all this time Plaintiff loved her said husband and was at all times ready, willing and anxious to live with him and be a true wife to him but Defendant callously and cruelly refused to have anything to do with her; that all during the time Defendant was in the Army, he never con-

tributed one cent to her support, except as he was compelled to by the military authorities, and has never done so since. That, on December 26th, 1919, Defendant wrote Plaintiff a letter, stating that he never intended to live with her, that he only wrote her for money to fool her; that said letter further contained insulting reflections on the Plaintiff's character, too vile to repeat here, all of which Plaintiff avers were untrue and known to be so by the Defendant; that such accusations evidenced an utter disregard of the sanctity of marriage and of common decency on the part of Defendant; that Plaintiff has at all times conducted herself as a true wife should. That such treatment and such false and malicious accusations on the part of Defendant constitute such cruelty as to render their further living together insupportable, and that said marriage relations still exist. That Plaintiff has no property nor income and is forced to depend on her father for support that Defendant earns good wages and is able to pay the costs and attorney fees herein; that Plaintiff has employed an attorney to bring this action and has agreed to pay him Fifty Dollars therefor, which she avers reasonable, and that the Defendant bound and obligated to pay the same. Plaintiff prays for judgment dissolving the bonds of matrimony existing between herself and the Defendant, for restoration of her maiden name, for her costs and attorney fees and for such other and further relief, etc., as she may be entitled.

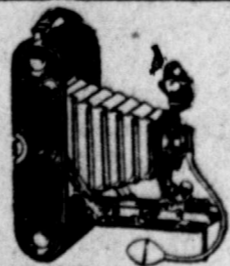

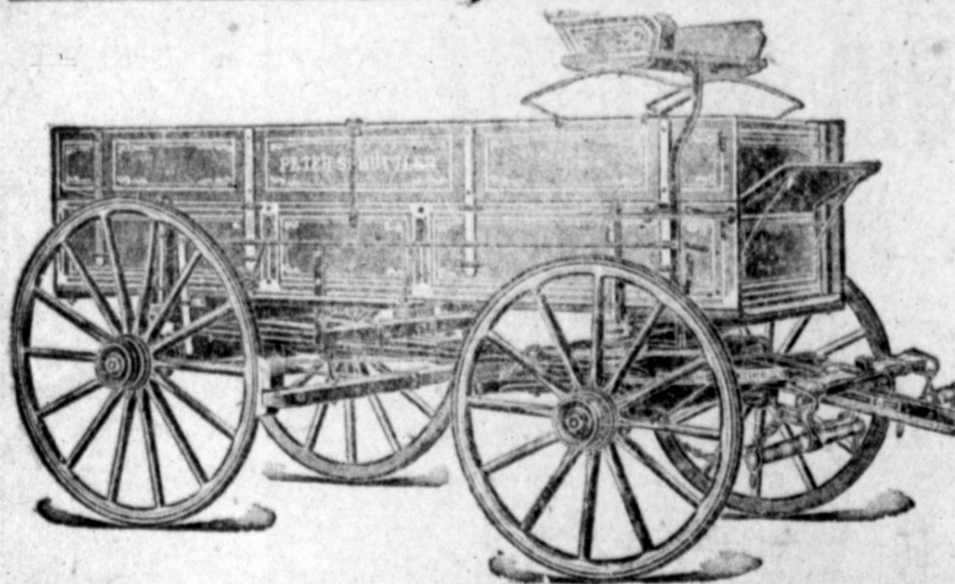

### TEXAS FARMERS PAY MILLIONS FOR GINNING 1920 COTTON CROP

Dallas, Texas, Oct. 21.—"Texas farmers alone will pay \$135,000,000 for the privilege of ginning to the world this year's cotton crop," says Walter Peteet, agricultural manager of the Texas Chamber of Commerce, who has made a close study of the cotton situation of today. For the past two decades probably no man in Texas nor the South has followed the cotton market more closely than Mr. Peteet, and he declares that the farmers are today faced by the most trying situation and threatened with the greatest loss in the history of the cotton industry in the Lone Star State.

"I have no patience with appeals to the business men to come to the rescue of the farmers by financing and orderly marketing of his crops," continues Mr. Peteet, "it is the business man's fair share of the job of feeding and clothing the world, himself included."

James Z. George, vice president and general manager of the Texas Chamber of Commerce, has addressed a referendum upon the cotton situation to all members of the State chamber, all chambers of Commerce, and all banks of the State, asking for concerted action and requesting suggestions.

With regard to the situation and the necessity of every citizen of Texas and the South becoming interested Mr. Peteet says: "Cotton has been selling in primary markets in Texas recently at 20 cents and less, which is fifteen cents a pound, or \$75.00 a bale below the most conservative estimate of the cost of production that has come to my attention. Estimating the unsold portion of the crop at 60 per cent, this means that Texas farmers alone will pay \$135,000,000 for the privilege of ginning to the world this year's cotton crop.

"If we take as the basis of our calculation the 'bulk line cost of production' by which is meant the price at which 80 per cent of the growers can continue to grow cotton at profit and which a competent authority sets at 40 cents, this year's Texas crop at present prices will fall \$180,000,000 short of returning to the growers the actual cost of production plus a reasonable profit.

"When to this direct loss to farmers is added the losses that will accrue to all lines of business by reason of decreased debt-paying and purchasing power of farmers, the total grows to staggering proportions.

"The financing and marketing of the cotton crop in such manner as to avoid these losses is not the task of farmers alone, but of all interests that handle and consume agricultural products, for unless farmers can sell their crops at a profit they will soon quit raising crops and dealers will have nothing to handle and consumers nothing to consume.

"I have no patience with appeals to business men to come to the rescue of the farmer by financing an orderly marketing of his crops. That is the business man's fair share of the job of feeding and clothing the world, himself included. If farmers could and did finance and market the things they produce, millions of business men would find themselves out of business.

"My purpose in stating the case in this way is to bring to all the great non-producing classes, bankers, merchants, lawyers, doctors, laborers, and all others, the truth that it is their duty to cooperate with the farmer in maintaining agricultural production and that when they contribute towards making it possible for farmers to sell their products at profitable prices, they are not merely helping the farmers, but helping society and themselves as well.

"The consumption of the present cotton crop will be extended through the next nine months, and it should be marketed throughout this period as the mills need it. Acting alone farmers cannot do this, and they ought not to be expected to do it. But with the cooperation of bankers and other business men, whose duty it is to perform this part of the joint task, it can easily be done.

"I do not propose any hard and fast plan, but I do urge that all business men realize their duty and responsibility and without waiting to be begged for loans by farmers they cooperate with their customers and neighbors in marketing their share of the cotton crop throughout the period of consumption.

Mr. and Mrs. Saunders will make their home in Washington.

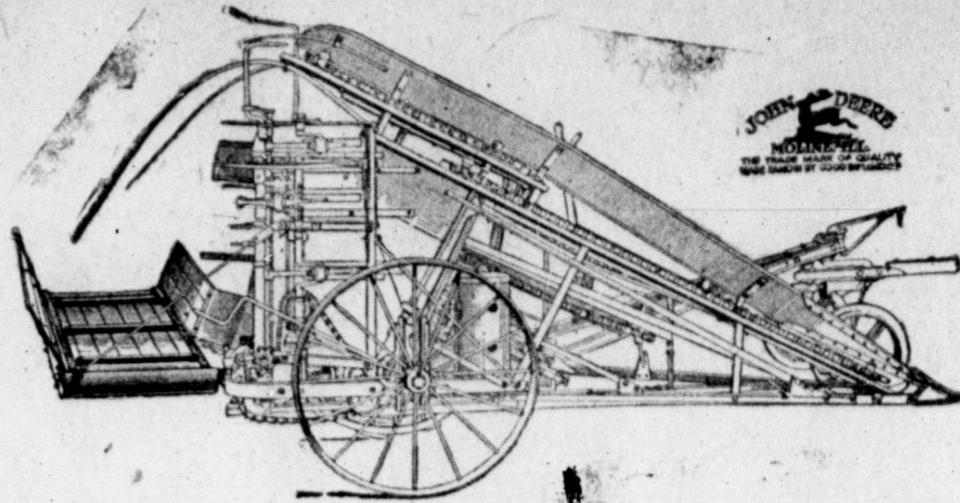

RURAL CARRIER EXAMINATION

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced an examination for the County of Mitchell, Texas, to be held at Colorado on Nov. 13, 1920, to fill the position of rural carrier at Colorado and Cuthbert, and vacancies that may later occur on rural routes from other post offices in the above-mentioned county. The salary of a rural carrier on a standard daily route of 24 miles is \$1,800 per annum, with an additional \$30 per mile per annum for each mile or major fraction thereof in excess of 24 miles. The examination will be open only to citizens who are actually domiciled in the territory of a post office in the county and who meet the other requirements set forth in Form No. 1977. Both men and women, if qualified, may enter this examination, but appointing officers have the legal right to specify the sex desired in requesting certification of eligibles. Women will not be considered for rural carrier appointments unless they are widows of U. S. soldiers, sailors or marines, or the wives of U. S. soldiers, sailors or marines who are physically disqualified for examination by reason of injuries received in the line of military duty. Form No. 1977 and application blanks may be obtained from the office mentioned above or from the United States Civil Service Commission at Washington, D. C. Applications should be forwarded to the Commission at Washington at the earliest practicable date.
