\$9995 STATE AID AWARD SCHOOLS

DISTRICTS IN COUNTY ARE AFFECTED

J. C. Hall, ex-officio county Supt. of public instruction, received confirmation Thursday from the Board of Education at Austin of conditional apportionments to seventeen school districts of Mitchell County under the provisions of the legislative act providing state aid to public schools of the state.

The rural school districts and the amounts available were given as fol-

ver, \$720; Landers, \$720; Looney, \$1,000. Westbrook, an independent district, was awarded \$1,100.

The seventeen appropriations make a total of \$9,995 in state aid to these schools and Judge Hall stated that without this aid many of them would not have been able to conduct their schools at all. Each of them, through this aid, will now have a term of six months and at Westbrook the term will be seven months. State aid to Mitchell County schools last year totaled \$8,530.

In addition to the state aid fund, there is available to the several school districts of the county \$31,392.50 in scholastic apportionment, making a total of \$41,386.50 available for the current year. Of this amount \$13,180.50 is available to the Colorado and Loraine schools.

The Fort Worth Star-Telegram carried an article Sunday in the Oil Section of that publication disseminating further the misleading statements appearing in the press during recent months that the wells in this county are in Howard County. This article, published under a Colorado date line, carried the information that the well of the Colorado-Texas Petroleum Company at Iatan was located in Howard County.

E. Keathley, local representative of the Star-Telegram, stated Monday when his attention was directed to the article that he knew nothing as te its origin.

At frequent intervals in the past attention of the Colorado Chamber of Commerce has been directed to dispatches from Big Spring and other points in this vicinity, in which either the publishers or their correspondents seemed to be possessed with a desire to circulate misleading reports as to locations of Mitchell County wells. Last week an article carried by the Fort Worth Record and forwarded from Big Spring was so constructed as to leave the information that the Underwriters' well was in Howard County. The Correspondent did not so state in as many words, but he did state that this well was in the "Big Spring territory."

In addition to these articles, for warded by special correspondence and at times given the Associated Press. Howard County interests have caused to be published in some of the leading daily papers of the State a purported map of the "Big Spring" field, showing all wells and locations in Mitchell County west of Westbrook as being in the "Big Spring" territory. "The consumption of the present cotton crop will be extended through the next nine months, and it should be marketed throughout this period as the mills need it. Acting alone farmers cannot do this, and they ought not to be expected to do it.

"I do not propose any hard and fast plan, but I do urge that all business men realize their duty and responsibility and without waiting to be begged for loans by farmers they cooperate with their customers and neighbors in marketing their share of the cotton crop throughout the period of consumption.

"I very much fear that if business men fail to recognize their responsibility in this present situation, farmers will be forced to turn towards radical state socialism, as they have done in North Dakota, or into a class conscious marketing organizations comparable with the craft organizations of labor."





RURAL CARRIER EXAMINATION

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced an examination for the County of Mitchell, Texas, to be held at Colorado on Nov. 13, 1920, to fill the position of rural carrier at Colorado and Cuthbert, and vacancies that may later occur or rural routes from other post offices in the above-mentioned county. The sclary of a rural carrier on a standard daily route of 24 miles is \$1,800 pe annum, with an additional \$30 per mile per annum for each mile or major fraction thereof in excess of 24 miles. The examination will be open only to citizens who are actually domiciled in the territory of a post office in the county and who meet the other requirements set forth in Form No. 1977. Both men and women, if qualified, may enter this examination, but appointing officers have the legal right to specify the sex desired in requesting certification of eligibles. Women will not be considered for rural carrier appointments unless they are widows of U. S. soldiers,

sailors or marines, or the wives of U. S. soldiers, sailors or marines who are physically disqualified for examination by reason of injuries received in the line of military duty. Form No. 1977 and application blanks may be obtained from the office mentioned above or from the United States Civil Service Commission at Washington, D. C. Applications should be forwarded to the Commission at Washington at the earliest practicable date.
