



# Browsing With Bey

Nonfat dry milk is the powdered form of skim milk. It is convenient to store on the pantry shelf, safe to tote on warm weather outings, easy to use at a moment's notice, and usually is a "best buy" for the economy-mind-ed shopper.

ter, it too can be used in place of whole milk. Or, add the powder to a recipe, along with other dry ingredients, and add water with other liquids. Try instant nonfat dry milk in your own Pancake

can prepare ahead of time and keep in a tightly covered container until used. For mix that will make 10 to 12 pancakes, you'll need 1½ cups flour, 3 tablespoons sugar, 2 teaspoons baking powder 1 teaspoon salt and 1/2 cup instant nonfat dry milk. Sift together the flour sugar, baking powder and salt. Then mix in the dry milk and put in tight container until you

To make the pancakes, add 11/2 cups water, 2 eggs and 3 tablespoons melted butter. Combine the water, eggs and butter, add mix and blend well. Pour about one-third cup batter for each pancake onto hot buttered griddle. When bubbles appear, turn and bake other side. Serve with butter, syrup, applesauce, cottage cheese or other toppings.

### PECAN ORCHARD FIELD DAY IS PLANNED FOR SEPTEMBER



Operation Mortocide will be conducted as a special emphasis program to combat carelessness and traffic law violation during the Labor Day weekend from 12:01 a.m., September 4, through 11:59 p. m. September 6th, according to Sergeant Roger Sosebee of the Department of Public Safety of this department.

Sosebee said that he will have 14 men on patrol during the Labor Day holiday. The days will include Friday, Saturday and Sunday. The patrolmen will be on the regular routine partol during the holiday.

According to Sosebee, last year there were 22 accidents in this area. There was one fatal accident which took the lives of two people. There were nine accidents where injuries were reported with 13 people being hurt. There were 12 accidents that were recorded as property loss.

In this immediate area the main factors which cause the majority of the accidents are failing to give right-a-way, driving on the wrong side of the road, speeding, and the driving while intoxicated violation.

On the Texas scene the traffic violations that will contribute to the majority of the 35 traffic deaths over the Labor Day weekend will be what the patrolmen will be watching for. According to Major Leo Gossett, commander of the 49-county Midland Region of the Department of Public Safety, there will be many rest stops for travelers to stop and take brief rests from driving. Gossett reminded that this "coffee stations" has played a big part in saving of many Texas citizens lives.
