## OIL DEVELOPMENT IN THE **BIG SPRING TERRITORY**

45,000 Acres of H. S. Ranch Leased for Oil Development-Boston Cap. italists Will Arrive Saturday.

General Oil Co. Operations. The work of cleaning out McDowell well No. 1, is going steadily forward and it is thought that this well will be in shape to be given a shot by next Monday. The work of drilling around the lost fishing tools at about 2490 feet has been necessarily slow because it was necessary to use care in getting the drill past this obstruc-

At Neel well No. 1 progress has also been slow and considerable underreaming necessary. Due to the formation caving below eight inch casing it was necessary to underream and lower this about one hundred and fifty feet.

At Roberts No. 1 they are fishing for lost tools at about 2500 feet. Inability to catch a hold on the tools is making this quite a difficult fish-

At Read No. 1 they are running six and five-eighths inch casing to cut off the water, so drilling can be resumed at about 3250 feet. The standard tools to be used on




