



MURDERERS OF LUBBOCK MAN AT SWEETWATER.

C. Connally and Hulitt Connally, who received a 99 year sentence each for the murder of telegraph operator J. Edgar Craft, at Lubbock, and Jesse Bond, their accomplice in the murder, who received 50 years, were brought to Sweetwater Monday by Sheriff Holcomb of Lubbock and placed in the county jail there for safe keeping.

Feeling against the young men ran high in Lubbock before the trial and it was necessary to take them to Amarillo for safe keeping until their trial should come up.

While there was no surface indications of mob violence toward the prisoners in Lubbock, yet it was considered best to remove them from the scene of their crime, resulting in their transfer to Sweetwater where they were placed in the hands of Sheriff Bardwell of Nolan county.

It is not known just how long the prisoners will remain in the Nolan courty jail, as the sheriff's department has instructions to hold them pending the arrival of the state penitentiary transfer agent.







The National Organization has made a wonderful record in its first nine months of existence. The first big piece of work was the repeal of the "Daylight Saving Law" through Colorado, beginning on the South boundary line of said lot three (3) aforesaid at a point eighteen feet of the strongest State Farm Bureau organizations.

The next great achievement was the defeat of the "Nolan Bill," providing a tax of one per cent on all state land valuation above \$10,000. A referendum to the membership showed that the Farm Bureau was unanimously opposed to this bill and congress took heed of the men back home and refused to enact it into a law Millions of dollars were saved to the farmers of the United States by the defeat of the Nolan bill, although its proponents are attempting to bring it up again before the next session of congress.

More than \$100,000,000 annually was saved the American public by the work of Clifford Thorne who was employed by the American Farm Bureau Federation to study the freight rate increase demand by the railroads. The farmer's part of this saving was \$30.00 per man, enough to pay for membership dues for three years. The railroads were asking a six per cent rate on a valuation of \$20,000,000,000, Clifford Thorne showed that the entire railroad system of the United States could be bought for between twelve and thirteen billion dollars and that the railroads were asking for \$480,000,000 annually, more than they were entitled to. In other words they were expecting more than a million dollars a day above what they were actually entitled to on the real valuation of their properties.

The Farm Bureau maintains at Washington at all times a representative whose business it is to keep in touch with all legislation introduced so that the farmers may know whether it is for or against their interests, to enable them to get behind those things which they desire to have enacted into law, and to work or the defeat of those would bring harm to their business.

Gray Silver is the present legislative representative of the American Farm Bureau Federation at Washing-

The purposes of the Farm Bureau have been defined as threefold, educational, legislative and marketing. The Texas Farm Bureau is taking active steps to acquaint the general public with the needs of Texas farmers, and is spreading information regarding Farm Business throughout the length and breadth of the state. This is done through the newspapers, daily and weekly, the agricultural press, booklets, folders, circulars and through its own official organ, the Farm Bureau News.

Perhaps the most outstanding achievement of the Texas Farm Bureau in a legislative way, is the securing of the passage of the Marketing Act, permitting Texas farmers to co-operate in the same manner that the California farmers have done in the last few years. Texas farmers were quick to see that California's rural prosperity came thru cooperation rather than climate and the new Marketing Act passed by the

Texas Legislature was the result. There are three great marketing organizations that are being planned by the Texas Farm Bureau Federation this sping. The Tomato Growers' Association of the State is about 75 per cent completed and will handle nearly a thousand cars of tomatoes valued at about a million dollars in its first years work. The Wool Growers' organization is planned for the handling of 2,000,000 pounds of wool at least.

The third and largest of these cooperative marketing organizations is the Texas Farm Bureau Cotton Marketing Association which plans to handle a million bales of cotton of the 1921 cotton crop. The value of this immense pool of cotton is ex-pected to be in the neighborhood of one hundred million dollars, and the loan value alone should be in the neighborhood of fifty million dol-

This project when completed will be the biggest single cotton factor in the whole world and should play an immense part in the great export trade of the South's greatest crop. Arrangements are being made to cooperate with similar organizations being formed in Oklahoma and Arkansas and it is expected that Georin line right away.

The states mentioned have been at work on the problem and are in va-rious stages of development of their own State cotton pools. The biggest pool of all is the one being formed by the Texas Farm Bureau Federa-






