DALLAS CONCERN PLANS TO LOCATE WAREHOUSE HERE

A. L. Slaughter and Fred Gantner of San Antonio, representing the Planters Bonded Warehouse Co. a million dollar corporation with headquarters at Dallas, are in Colorado this week and state that their company will no doubt locate a large cotton warehouse here. Plans of the proposed warehouse specify a large building constructed of reinforced concrete and steel, to be absolutely fire and rat proof through.

It was stated Wednesday that negotiations were already pending whereby the Dallas corporation is to form a coalition with the Colorado State Bonded Warehouse Company, who already own and operate a bonded warehouse business in the city. The latter company own the present warehouse here and more than twenty acres of land now being used as yards for storing cotton. Messrs. Slaughter and Gantner stated Wednesday afternoon that their proposition was meeting with encouragement by business and professional men of the city and farmers of the county with whom the matter had been discussed. "We are going to build a warehouse in Colorado, and have it completed within ninety days," Slaughter stated to The Record.

Slaughter stated that his company had extended an invitation to the Mitchell County Farm Bureau to cooperate with them in building the proposed warehouse at Colorado. This will be acted upon by officers and directors of the Bureau at a meeting to be convened Saturday. Should the plan as submitted by the Dallas concern be approved by the Colorado State Bonded Warehouse Company and the local county farm Bureau organization, there is little doubt but that the proposed project will be put over in a short time.

The Planters Bonded Warehouse Company, will, according to statements made by Messrs. Slaughter and Gantner, construct warehouses at many of the leading cotton market towns and cities of the State, and large concentrating warehouses at one or two of the principal seaboard shipping points to which cotton from the smaller warehouses will be concentrated for packing. The proposed warehouse at Colorado is to be under the personal direction of a bonded weigher and cotton classifiers, who will weigh and grade all cotton handled.

Gantner stated that his company decided to locate a cotton warehouse at this city a few months ago when attention of the president was directed to a page of pictures of Colorado, among them being a cotton yard scene, with the notation that Mitchell County produced 32,000 bales of cotton in 1920, which appeared in the Fort Worth Star-Telegram. "Investigation has proven that you did not exaggerate in that statement and that the county will probably increase the production this season," he stated Wednesday.

The proposed warehouse would cost \$12,000 to build, and furnish adequate needs for the farmers of this territory, Slaughter stated.

RIG AT WULFJEN WELL IS UNDER CONSTRUCTION

Derrick at Wulfjen No. 1, seven miles south of Colorado, is in process of construction by the contractors, the Wertzberger Co., and will probably be completed this week. The contractors began work on the rig Sunday but on the following day commenced work on the rig at Conway No. 1, so that the drillers there could spud in without any necessary delay.

SWEETWATER SWATTERS TAKE GAME FROM COLORADO

Sweetwater took the game played at the Colorado ball park Friday afternoon in a game called at 4 o'clock between the Sweetwater Swatters and Colorado Boosters. The score was six to seven and the game went to the visiting team largely through error.

Sweetwater was completely shut out during the first innings of the game and for a time the score was three to nothing, in favor of Colorado. Through an error Sweetwater scored in the fourth and the ratio went to four to one in favor of Colorado. Later during the game Sweetwater scored twice on an error to second base and again on an error at first base.

The Colorado Boosters made their runs on hits and from sheer merit had the visiting team outclassed throughout the contest. With a little practice the Boosters are going to be hard to down, as there a number of good players in this team.

Manager "Pop Boy" Smith of Sweetwater challenged Colorado to another game, to be played at the local ball park within ten days. The exact day will be announced later and the Record predicts a hum-dinger of a game, as the Boosters are on their metal, and Manager Bennett says he is going to have his team in better practice and condition for the next game. Practice and team work is what will win, boys, and the Record is banking on taking the next game by big odds.

FRUIT AND GARDENS ARE DAMAGED BY COLD SNAP

Big damage was done to the fruit and young truck in this section as a result of the heavy frost of Monday night, following on the heels of the norther and freeze Sunday night. Reports from various sections of the county, received up to Wednesday indicate that Indian corn and other early crops were also damaged. Some farmers report their corn as having been bitten off at the ground but expressed the opinion that the young plants would survive and come out.

It was generally believed at Colorado Wednesday that where precautionary measures were not employed the fruit crop has been greatly damaged, at least, if not totally destroyed. In Colorado some citizens used protective measures by wrapping the fruit trees in old blankets and sheets with the hope of shutting out some of the cold from the young fruit. Fruit and truck growers stated that it would require developments of the next one or two days to tell definitely if these crops had been destroyed.

Young beans and potatoes in the family gardens of Colorado received a material set back as a result of the frost Monday night. They had already suffered from the freeze on the previous night and receiving a further set back Monday made the effect doubly disastrous.

E. M. Baldwin, Secretary of the Mitchell County Farm Bureau, was among those to report damage to fruit. Mr. Baldwin stated Wednesday that he had some apricot trees at his home which were literally loaded with fruit and from indications Wednesday morning it had all been destroyed. Mr. Baldwin had twenty acres of corn up to a good stand on his ranch and expressed fear that it had been damaged.

SMALL BOY IS SERIOUSLY INJURED IN AUTO ACCIDENT

Otis, 7-year old son of W. A. House who with his family recently moved to Colorado from Ira, was seriously injured Saturday at noon when run down by an automobile at the Lone Wolf bridge on Second Street. In company with his mother, the child was passing along the street as the automobile passed and just as the machine reached them, Otis attempted to cross to the other side of the street. The car ran over him, knocking the child down, and he suffered concussion of the brain, together with some minor bruises.

Dr. P. C. Coleman, who attended the child, stated Monday that he was doing well and expected to entirely recover. The car was being driven by R. U. Boyd of Carlsbad, New Mexico, and from statements of those who witnessed the accident, it was unavoidable.



REYNOLDS WELL DRILLING IN LIMESTONE AT 2300 FT.

J. H. Keck, manager of the Vincennes Oil Company, was in Colorado Tuesday and discredited the Associated Press report carried Sunday that Reynolds No. 1, being drilled by his company on the holdings 30 miles northwest of Colorado, was in oil sand. This information was carried in the Fort Worth papers Sunday under Snyder date line. Keck also stated that gas pressure was becoming very low in the well.

The well continues to be drilled through hard limestone. Mr. Keck stated. Tuesday he had reached a depth of 2300 feet, the last 400 feet of which had been through this stone, the formation gradually growing harder. He is still using a large stem and is drilling a ten inch hole now. It is not planned to reduce the hole until the limestone has been penetrated. Mr. Keck stated that he expected to reach a depth of 3000 feet by April 15th, unless a producer be brought in at a lesser depth. He is optimistic over prospects for bringing in a good well at this location, as indicated by formations drilled through.

DERRICK BEING STRUNG AT CONAWAY NO. 1

The Wertzberger Company, contractors to string the derrick at Conway No. 1, thirteen miles west of Colorado, commenced work on the rig Monday and are rushing the job to completion in that this test be spudded at the earliest possible date. The new location is only a few hundred yards from Little No. 1, over which the rig burned down a few weeks ago. Material for the rig was received at Westbrook last week and has been hauled out to the location.

Manager D. J. Lewis states that he has tools in transit to be used at this well and expects to spud in sometime next week. This will be the second well to be started in the Mitchell County field by the Renotex Oil and Land Corporation.

TWO SPECIAL SCHOOL ELECTIONS ARE ORDERED.

Special elections to determine whether a tax for school purposes not exceeding \$1.00 on the \$100 valuation of taxable property were ordered this week in County Line common school district and in the Westbrook school district. County Judge Hall stated Wednesday that a petition was being circulated in the Conway district for a similar election.

The election at County Line will be held on April 10th, and that at Westbrook on April 5th.

These elections are to be held under provisions of the amended school law, passed at the last session of the Legislature, permitting rural school districts to increase their school taxes from a maximum of 50c to \$1.00 on the one hundred valuation.

CAR OF FUEL OIL COLEMAN WELL RECEIVED LAST WEEK

The first car of fuel oil for the job at Coleman No. 1 was received at Colorado last week and hauled out to the location, 17 miles northwest of Colorado. Dr. Coleman, on whose ranch this well is to be drilled, stated Monday that the tools were all strung and practically all preliminary arrangements for commencing the well completed. He stated that the well would probably be spudded this week. This well is to be drilled one and one-half miles northwest from the village of Cuthbert by the Hillard Drilling Company of Tulsa. The location was made several weeks ago by Steve Owen, then manager for the Underwriters Company.

WEST TEXAS CHAMBER OF COMMERCE AFFILIATION RENEWED BY COLORADO.

Colorado citizens renewed the affiliation of this city with the West Texas Chamber of Commerce this week through the subscription of annual memberships. H. H. Ellsey of Fort Worth, field representative for the chamber, spent a part of Tuesday and Wednesday at Colorado soliciting the memberships. He left Wednesday night for Merkel. Ellsey stated before leaving Colorado that he had not seen all the business and professional men of Colorado whom he believed were interested in the West Texas Chamber of Commerce and would subscribe to one or more annual memberships. He stated, however, that every citizen of the city would be given an opportunity to become a member of this, the largest commercial organization in the world.

SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT IS "CLEANING HOUSE" HERE.

Sheriff W. J. Chesney announced last week that his department had instituted a "house ceaning" campaign at Colorado and that all idle negroes, Mexicans and others found loafing about the city would be advised to either find employment or move on. An investigation conducted by Mr. Chesney disclosed the fact that the negro population of the city had increased approximately 300 per cent and the complaints of vagrancy became so numerous as to become a nuisance and cause considerable trouble for the local authorities.

At one time recently 42 negroes were counted congregated at the Texas & Pacific passenger depot at a late hour at night. Upon enquiry by the sheriff, practically all of them admitted they were out of work and had recently come in "frum de country whar we bin wurkin' in de cotton fields." Notice was served on the "colored 'gentlemen'" that the authorities would expect them to cut out the loafing, go to work, or leave town. Apparently, they took the officer at his word, as on the following night at the same time there was not a one of them to be found at the station.

A prominent citizen of the city, in commenting on this matter Monday, stated that Colorado, along with all other towns of West Texas, had no place for the vagrant, especially those who were to be classified as being transient, and that action of the sheriff in this matter would result in much benefit to the best interests of the city.

W. J. Chesney has been sheriff of Mitchell County during the past twenty-seven months and during that time has established an enviable distinction as an officer. He has a record for apprehending fugitives from the courts of the county and only one man under indictment on a felony charge has eluded arrest since he became sheriff. Chesney has apprehended his men in practically every section of Texas and in Oklahoma and has caused the arrest of parties here wanted in various parts of the country.

REVIVAL AT M. E. CHURCH POSTPONED FOR ONE WEEK

The series of revival meetings at the Methodist church, scheduled to commence on Tuesday night, April 5, have been postponed one week according to announcement made Sunday by the pastor, Rev. C. L. Browning. The meetings were postponed at request of Dr. Lee Starke of New York, who will come to Colorado to conduct the services. Dr. Starke is now in a meeting at Cleburne and stated that since unusual interest was being manifested and large results becoming visible from day to day, he would regret very much to close the meeting there and come to Colorado next week.

PROPOSED LONE WOLF DAM PRESTIGE A. & M. LOCATION.

The proposed lake at Lone Wolf is a factor of large prestige in locating the West Texas A. & M. College at Colorado, according to Hon. R. M. Chitwood of Sweetwater, who spent several hours in the city Wednesday afternoon. Chitwood stated that if definite plans for damming Lone Wolf are made at once and if a site adjoining the dam be offered the locating board at a price to be considered reasonable, Colorado will most assuredly have a splendid opportunity to have the institution located here.

Of course the close proximity to a lake of good water is not required, but it would be desired, where practicable, Mr. Chitwood stated. "Even if you are not able to obtain a location for the college near the proposed lake, you should have an adequate water supply from which the institution could use water," Mr. Chitwood continued. "Accepted merits of the plan to move the University of Texas from its present location in the city of Austin to a location near the city, are based on the fact that the new proposed site adjoins the dam above the city by which the water supply for Austin is empounded."

In speaking of the several towns that will offer sites for the college to the locating board, Chitwood stated "Of course I live at Sweetwater and personally desire to see the school come there, but in case it does not come to Sweetwater, I shall hope to see Colorado land the institution." Chitwood admitted that from the merits to be considered, a site to be offered near Colorado would be better than one near Sweetwater, on account of the much better quality of the soil here. "We plan to meet your argument on that score, however," he said, "by boosting the advantages of our railroad facilities."

"I am anxious to see the school located in either Nolan, Mitchell, Scurry or Fisher Counties," Chitwood stated. "San Angelo is entirely too far south, and is, in fact, near the southern boundary of the agricultural area of West Texas. Those towns on the Plains are entirely too far from the center of West Texas and would not serve the best interests of the people as a whole, if located there."

He was accompanied to Colorado by Mrs. Chitwood and Mrs. D. I. Herndon. They returned to Sweetwater late Wednesday afternoon.

INTERSCHOLASTIC LEAGUE.

The Interscholastic League of this county met at Colorado Saturday, March 26. It was an interesting meet and was enjoyed by all who attended.

Interscholastic League conditions are different from former years. Colorado is now a class A school and has no competitor so far as winning points are concerned. Loraine, being a class B school, also wins by default in everything except athletics.

Furthermore, all girl athletics has been eliminated from the League. Junior boys athletics have also been eliminated.

The present interscholastic league committee believes that a mistake was made in eliminating junior boys athletics. We are recommending to the State Chairman that junior boys athletics be replaced, and that a separate division in athletics be had for rural schools.

Attention is called to the fact that all winners of first place in Saturday's meet are entitled to represent this county in the district meet. We urge that all the winners attend the district meet at Abilene, the date of which will soon be announced, but will probably be April 16, or 16.

The following is a statement of winners, points, etc. The result of the spelling contest will be announced later as the papers were sent to Austin to be graded.

In the several athletic entries, including 100 yard dash, one half mile run, fifty yard dash, mile run, 220 yard dash, pole vault, running high jump, shot put, broad jump, 440 yard dash and one mile relay, Loraine was given first place, with Colorado second.

In the junior rural boys declamation contest Conaway was awarded first place, Rogers second, and Westbrook third. Spade was awarded the

first place, Westbrook, second, and Letan third place in the junior girls' declamation contest.

In the senior boys classification, Letan took first place and honors for senior girls went to Valley View.

In entries of Class B schools Loraine took all awards in both senior and junior classifications. Colorado was awarded first place in the Class A contest in all events.

OIL NEWS FROM DUNN.

We spent the entire day in the new West Texas shallow oil field at Dunn. As before stated, the said discovery well is located on the Northwest farm, 1 1/4 miles southeast of Dunn. We talked with twenty different men, besides Nich West, and we gave him a good opportunity to put out all the news about the well.

Mr. Harris of Oklahoma, is on the ground all the time and says he means business, and offers Mr. West a reasonably good offer for his 1-8 royalty. Says "You've been rather pessimistic about this well, now name your price and talk. Nich is convinced that there is oil and gas in paying quantities on his farm and refused to sell at any price.

Mr. Harris has had his driller go down 400 feet, and passed through a veritable lake of water, and then into six feet of oil sand. He sent and had Mr. West, Mr. Beakley, Mr. Ford and several others come to the well, and despite the fact of an abundance of water in the well, struck a match and a gas flame jumped half the height of the rig, and continued to burn till smothered out. Mr. Beakley has just returned from a new shallow oil field in East Texas that is the sensation of the southeastern part of the State. He says there is no comparison between the prospects for the two fields. He, with a number of other citizens of Dunn community, really and truly think they have a shallow oil field.

Mr. Harris has stated emphatically that he will drill 3 other shallow wells within 400, or a less number of yards from the discovery well, on the West and Hancock farms.

Mr. Harris has filled in with cement to shut off this lake of water, and is to begin drilling out the well again within the next week, and all it will take to convince any reasonable man that oil and gas have been drilled into, in the new Dunn shallow field is to visit the well and see. You remember the old adage, "Seeing is believing."

FARM BUREAU NEWS.

Fifty-six Texas counties had been organized by the Texas Farm Bureau Federation on March 20th. Membership drives were launched in Jones, Hall, DeWitt, Burleson, Collin, Hays, and Angelina counties on that date; and membership drives were already in progress in Limestone, Panola, Franklin, and Hopkins counties. Farmers' meetings in several counties where organization work was under way voted to continue the drive and attempt to reach a larger portion of the farmers.

Wool meetings of farmer wool growers at Temple, Georgetown, Hillsboro, Waxahachie and other centers signed contracts to market their wool through the Southwestern Farm Bureau Wool and Mohair Co-operative Marketing Association, which is launching a drive for a 2,000,000 pound pool of wool. Wool experts of the Farm Bureau say this will make the association one of the largest wool factors on the world market. The drive will be carried into all wool sections of the State within the next few weeks.

Final adjustment of the cotton marketing contract of the Texas Farm Bureau Cotton Growers Co-operative Marketing Association to meet views of Texas Bankers' Association's Committee was arranged at a conference between C. O. Moser and Walton Petzet of the Texas Farm Bureau Federation and Aaron Sapiro marketing expert, at Little Rock, Mr. Sapiro also approved all of the essential points of the legal form of the cotton contract. Representatives of the Texas Farm Bureau have been invited to meet with delegates from the Oklahoma and Arkansas farm organizations at Oklahoma City in April when the Oklahoma Cotton Growers Association goes into permanent organization, to lay plans for a federation of cotton pools in the three states. Oklahoma has signatures to assure its 300,000 bale cotton pool and Arkansas is planning a state-wide pool of 200,000 bales. A sign-up campaign for 1,000,000 bales of Texas cotton is about to be launched by the Texas Cotton Growers Co-operative Association the cotton marketing division being organized by the Texas Farm Bureau Federation similar to the wool and tomato marketing organizations.

NEGRO "COTTON BROKER" ARRESTED SATURDAY NIGHT.

Will Johnson, alias Will Robertson, negro, was arrested Saturday night and locked up on charges of theft from the Miller & Williams gin warehouse. He is charged with having stolen the cotton at night and selling the staple to his victim on the following morning.

The negro, who was an employee at the Continental Oil-Cotton Company, appeared at the office of the Williams & Miller Gin Co. several days ago with a remnant of cotton to sell. A few days later he came with the second, and then the third remnant, when A. D. Hodges, manager of the gin, became suspicious that the negro was stealing the cotton. When questioned by Mr. Hodges the negro stated he was farming 14 1/2 miles northwest of Colorado, and was bringing the cotton into town from his farm.

Hodges, however, had a different opinion and after purchasing the third remnant from the negro, had the seed cotton in his warehouse so arranged that if disturbed it could easily be detected. He also caused some good grade, some very poor grade and dirty cotton to be placed near the entrance, so that in case the cotton was stolen it could be identified if seen again.

Friday morning when Mr. Hodges came down to his office he found several hundred pounds of seed cotton in sack containers piled on the scales. An investigation of the warehouse showed that cotton had been removed during the night and an investigation of that in the sacks served to identify it as his property.

No one came to claim the cotton, Friday, and late Saturday afternoon someone called up the Williams & Miller office to make inquiry about it, stating he was D. J. Fuller, and would send a colored boy around to receive the check. Hodges detected however, during the conversation over the telephone, that the party at the other end of the line talked with the dialect of a negro, and expecting his man to soon show up, awaited results.

The negro was soon at the office and stated he had been sent for the check. He was informed that he was under arrest and immediately broke for liberty. Employees at the gin

grappled with him and a scuffle ensued in which the negro gained his freedom and ran. As he fled into the cotton warehouse near the gin, Hodges opened fire with a shot gun, with no effect as the negro continued to run. He was overtaken in the Texas & Pacific yards and escorted to the county jail, where he made another dash for liberty and for thirty minutes eluded his pursuers. He was placed under arrest by Sheriff Chesney just after going to bed at a negro rooming house on the South Side.

At the Williams & Miller gin the negro represented himself as "Will Johnson." He sold remnant cotton to O. Lambeth under the name of "Will Robertson." Remnants were also sold by him to the Continental Oil-Cotton Co. gin.

AN ORDINANCE

To Amend an Ordinance of the City of Colorado, Texas, providing that the keeping of chickens or other fowls within the corporate limits of the City of Colorado, other than in pens, coops, or inclosures, shall be a nuisance, making such keeping of chickens or other fowls an offense, and providing for the taking up of such chickens or other fowls.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Colorado, Texas:

That the chicken and fowl ordinance passed and approved on the 15th day of February A. D. 1921, and recorded in Vol. 2, pp. 352-353 of the minutes of the City Council of the City of Colorado, Texas, be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 1. The keeping of chickens or other fowls within the following described territory, to-wit:

Beginning at a point in the center of Lone Wolf creek where the Texas and Pacific Railroad bridge crosses said creek; thence N. E. along the center of said Lone Wolf Creek to the east boundary line of the city of Colorado; thence North along the boundary line of the City to Tenth Street; thence West along the South line of Tenth Street to a point One Hundred and Fifty Feet (150 ft.) West of Walnut Street; thence South One Hundred and Fifty Feet (150 ft.) West of and parallel to Walnut Street to the center of the main track of the Texas and Pacific Railway; thence East along the center of said Railway track to the place of beginning; other than in pens, coops or other inclosures sufficient to keep said chickens or other fowls upon the premises owned or controlled by the owner or keeper of such chickens or other fowls, is hereby declared to constitute a nuisance, and is hereby prohibited.

Section 2. The terms "pens, coops, or other inclosures" as used in the preceding section are intended to include any contrivance intended for the purpose of keeping chickens or other fowls upon the premises where they may be lawfully kept by the owner or keeper.

Section 3. If chickens or other fowls be allowed to run at large or escape from the premises where they are to be kept by their owner or keeper, and go upon the streets, alleys or other public grounds or upon the premises of any one, other than the owner or keeper of such chickens or other fowls, within the limits of the territory as set out and described in section one hereof, and is hereby prohibited.

Section 4. If chickens or other fowls are kept within the limits of the territory as set out and described in Section One hereof, in such manner that they constitute a nuisance within the limits of the territory as set out and described in Section One hereof, then such owner or keeper of such chickens or other fowls shall be guilty of an offense hereunder, and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of \$5.00 for each day that chickens or other fowls are kept in violation of this ordinance shall constitute a separate offense.

Section 5. The City Marshal of the City of Colorado, shall take up and safely keep any chickens or other fowls found running at large upon the streets, alleys or in any other place in the territory as set out and described in Section One hereof; and the City Marshal shall, if requested by any person in possession of the premises upon which chickens or other fowls are found, take up and keep the chickens or other fowls so found; and any citizen within

the territory as set out and defined in Section One, shall have the right to take up the chickens or other fowls of another which may unlawfully be on his or her premises, notify the City Marshal that such chickens or other fowls have been taken up, and keep such chickens or other fowls until the City Marshal shall call for the same.

Section 6. The City Marshal shall provide a pen or other inclosure for which to keep the chickens or other fowls taken up under the provisions of the preceding section. The City Marshal shall notify the owners of said chickens or other fowls that may be taken up by him, if the owner is known to him, and shall keep and care for said chickens or other fowls until the same are disposed of as provided in Section Seven hereof.

Section 7. The City Marshal shall keep chickens or other fowls that are taken up by him in accordance with Section Five hereof, for a period of ten days after same have been taken up, if any one shall claim such chickens or other fowls within the period of ten days, then the City Marshal shall deliver such chickens or other fowls to such claimants. Provided, however, that the City Marshal shall be entitled to a reasonable compensation for taking up and caring for such chickens or other fowls, not to exceed twenty-five cents for each and every chicken or other fowl so taken up, and every chicken or other fowl so taken up shall be a charge against such chickens or other fowls, and the claimant shall not be entitled to possession of such chickens or other fowls until such compensation to the City Marshal is paid.

Section 8. If such chickens or other fowls are not claimed by the owner or other keepers thereof before the expiration of ten days from the time that they are taken up by the City Marshal, then the City Marshal shall sell such chickens or other fowls. The City Marshal shall retain the sum of twenty-five cents for each and every chicken or other fowl so sold, and the balance, if any, after the expenses of such sale are paid, shall be paid into the City Treasury of the City of Colorado, to the credit of the General Fund.

Section 9. The owner of the chickens or other fowls sold under this ordinance may, at any time within six months from date of such sale, appear before the Mayor of the City and upon his making satisfactory proof before him by affidavit or otherwise, that he was the owner of such chickens or other fowls at the time of sale, the Mayor shall pay to the City Treasurer the amount of such sale, less the amount of the sum of twenty-five cents for each and every chicken or other fowl so sold, and making sale of such chickens or other fowls.

Section 10. Section Five, Six, Seven and Eight hereof shall not be construed as in any manner limiting or modifying the provisions of Sections One, Two, Three and Four hereof; and the fact that chickens or other fowls may be taken up under the provisions of Sections Five, Six, Seven and Eight hereof shall not relieve the owner or keeper of such chickens or other fowls from the penalty provided in Section Four hereof.

Section 11. In event that any part or parts of this ordinance may be held void, it is intended that the part or parts not so held to be void shall remain in full force and effect.

Section 12. This Ordinance shall become effective from and after its passage and publication.

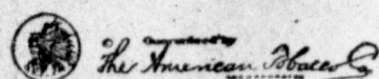

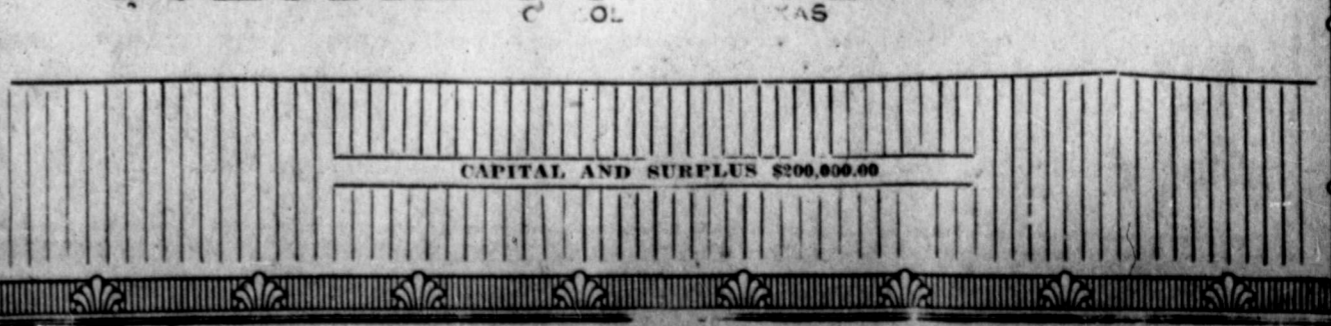

He stated Monday, however, that while he believed the cat would be the more desirable species for the Colorado river at this point, he also believed that perch would thrive exceptionally well in the waters of the stream.

"IMPOSSIBLE FOR COLORADO TO LEAD ABILENE"

Recently a statistician at Abilene desiring to obtain information as to the number of gins operating at Colorado and a report on cotton yard receipts here, wrote a local attorney for the information.

To this enquiry the attorney replied: "There are six cotton gins in Colorado, but one of them did not operate this season. Cotton yard receipts to date are 22,000 bales."

The Abilene statistician became anxious upon receiving such information and calling the attorney over the telephone, saying: "I have just received your reply to my enquiry for number of gins and cotton receipt report at Colorado, and wish to state that I am actually in earnest in desiring that you furnish me with the information. I want it for an official record and request that you cut out that boomerang stuff and give me the actual figures."

The attorney informed the Abilene gentleman that the report was correct to which the statistician replied: "My God, man, cotton yard receipts at Abilene are only 14,000 bales and I can't see how that your town could be expected to beat Abilene doing anything."

RURAL CARRIER CIVIL SERVICE EXAMINATION.

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced an examination for the County of Mitchell, Texas, to be held at Colorado on April 23, 1921, to fill the position of rural carrier at Colorado and Cuthbert and vacancies that may later occur on rural routes from other post offices in the above mentioned county. The salary of a rural carrier on a standard daily route of 24 miles is \$1800 per annum, with an additional \$30 per mile per annum for each mile or major fraction thereof in excess of 24 miles. The examination will be open only to citizens who are actually domiciled in the territory of a post office in the county and who meet the other requirements set forth in Form No. 1977. Both men and women, if qualified, may enter this examination, but appointing officers have the legal right to specify the sex desired in requesting certificates of eligibles. Women will not be considered for rural carrier appointment unless they are the widows of U. S. soldiers, sailors, or marines, or the wives of U. S. soldiers, sailors or marines who are physically disqualified for examination by reason of injuries received in the line of military duty. From No. 1977 and application blanks may be obtained from the offices mentioned above or from the United States Civil Service Commission at Washington, D. C. Applications should be forwarded to the Commission at Washington, D. C., at the earliest practicable date.

31,666 BALES GINNED IN MITCHELL CO. MARCH 21

A total of 31,666 bales of cotton were ginned in Mitchell county prior to March 21, according to a report received from Director Sam L. Rogers of the census bureau at Washington. The report shows that 24,885 bales were ginned in the county during the same period one year ago. In Nolan county 24,972 bales were reported ginned, and ginners receipts in Howard county totaled 16,129 bales.

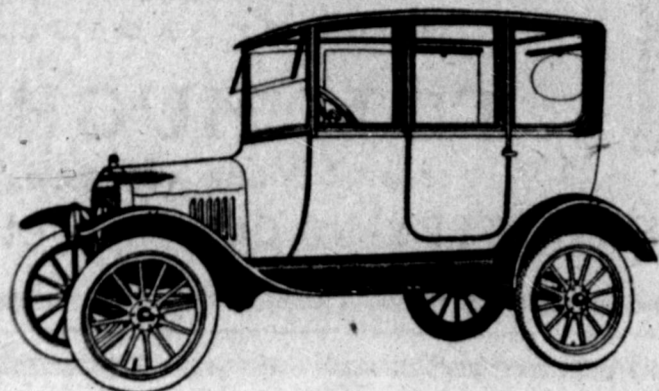

ROAD BOND ELECTION TO BE HELD SATURDAY.

Pecos will have an opportunity to fall in line with the other counties along the Bankhead Highway in the construction of roads and incidentally bring what is estimated as three dollars to every one expended into this country this year at the road bond issue election at the court house Saturday.

Balmorhea and Toyah have fallen in line and as a result \$70,000 will be spent in the Balmorhea district for the construction of a road from Saragosa to the Head Springs, and \$275,000 will be spent in constructing a road from Hermosa to the county line through Toyah. It is up to Pecos to connect with these roads and gain the benefits of these other expenditures. This can be done by voting "yes" at the election Saturday.

Seventy-one representative business men, land owners and voters signed the petition asking for the election, seeing the business sense of obtaining good roads and avoiding a big annual maintenance tax mostly at the expense of the State and Federal governments. The cost of the \$100,000 issue to the local voters is calculated by county Judge James F. Ross to amount to twenty-five cents on the \$100 valuation the first year and at twenty cents the second year, and to gradually grow lower. If the bond issue is not voted a maintenance tax of about fifteen cents will need to be voted according to Judge Ross in order to keep up the present dirt roads.

Therefore it appears to be the use of good judgment to get the roads when aid can be obtained in building them, have a good roads system that will prove a constant feeder to the Pecos business interests, save money on auto and tire up-keep, and have a good roads system that will last for years.

In order to participate in these State and Federal funds it will be necessary to start work on the roads before July 1. The appropriation to the state required that work be started before the expiration of two years, and this period will be up on July 1. This can be done if the bonds are voted.

In addition to the necessity of doing the work this year, the sending of this big sum here, will turn a great deal of ready cash loose in this community, and this will serve to help local business interests.

It is believed that the State Road Commission will duplicate their record in the Toyah and other cases and give three dollars for roads for the one expended by the district. As the district bond issue calls for \$100,000 this would call for an appropriation of \$300,000 from the State and Federal funds, and would make \$400,000 to be expended in this district. This with the money to be spent in Toyah and Balmorhea would make a total of \$700,000 spent on roads in the county at an expense to the county of \$203,000.

Gravel roads will probably be constructed for the greater part of the district, with the low spots being cared for by the means of concrete sluiceways. The roads must be con-

structed according to Federal specifications, although the type of road would be selected by the district.—Pecos Enterprise.

We wonder what Mitchell county plans to do along these lines. Mitchell county can do what any other county along the route is doing, but the question is, will we do it?

Pecos voted the bonds Saturday at the ratio of 93 to 11.

FOES OF W. T. A. & M. BILL RENEW FIGHT.

Austin, March 26.—Legislators who opposed the West Texas A. & M. bill have by no means given up the fight on the measure.

Just because the bill was passed in the last few minutes of the legislative session has not caused them to cease activities against the bill. In fact this has been the basis of their counter-attack.

Governor Neff said during the week that he had received a number of letters from representatives who opposed the bill pointing out a detail in passing of the bill they claim is unconstitutional.

At 12 o'clock noon on March 12, the day the legislature adjourned sine die the A. & M. bill was on the calendar together with several other equally important measures. To save these bills from lying on the calendar the house clock was turned back several times and with the house adjourned, although the house clock showed 12 o'clock it was really 3:25 p. m. The opponents of the bill now claim as this measure was passed after the hour for sine die adjournment that it is dead and void. Adoption of the free conference report passed the bill finally.

The bill is now before Governor Neff for his final action. He refused to give the names of the representatives who are waging the final stand against the bill.

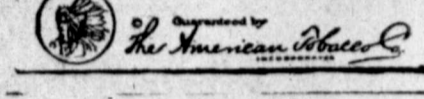

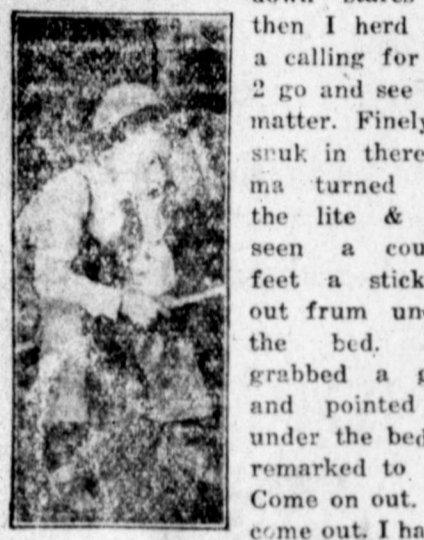

MERCHANTS BANQUET AT BARCROFT THURSDAY

A number of merchants of the city who have affiliated with the Colorado Retail Merchants Association attended the banquet Thursday night at the Barcroft Hotel dining room. In the absence of the President, H. L. Hutchinson, who was confined to his room on account of illness, J. H. Greene, presided as toastmaster.

Among the out of town guests were A. B. Hillan of San Antonio, State organizer for the organization; S. H. Garrison, secretary of the Retail Merchants Association of Abilene; John F. Oliver, J. P. Wooten, G. W. Murphy, Guy McCarty, R. L. Oliver and E. Wright, dealers of Abilene, and Sam Swann, cashier of the Guaranty State Bank of Abilene.

Addresses were made by all the visitors and several local men at the banquet, all of which dealt with the benefits to be derived to affiliated members from the merchants association. Mr. Swann stated that the banks of Abilene had found the Retail Merchants Association of great worth to them and for some time had actively cooperated with the merchants of the city in making the organization there a success. In speaking of the bogus check evil, Mr. Swann advised the merchants to employ the same methods as those used by the bankers in cashing checks—that when a check was presented, either for cash or in exchange for purchases, that the merchant satisfy himself beyond a reasonable doubt that the instrument was bonafide and would be protected when presented at the bank for payment.

Mr. Hillan appealed for a more universal recognition of the local papers as an effective advertising medium for the local merchants. "The local paper is 100 per cent more effective for reaching the trade of the local merchant than any other medium, because it circulates throughout your trade territory and usually has a personality of local interest to the buyer not attained by other papers and periodicals," he stated.

Mr. Hillan explained the advantages to come to the local association thru affiliation with the State and National Associations, and a motion that the Colorado Association become affiliated was adopted without a dissenting vote.

The speaker outlined methods for combatting the bogus check evil, for meeting the competition of mail order concerns, collecting bad accounts and other subjects of which the Association contemplates having to deal.

Resolutions expressing sympathy for the president, H. L. Hutchinson, who was at home sick, were passed and W. S. Cooper and O. Lambeth were instructed to represent the Association in presenting to Mr. Hutchinson this token, to be represented in flowers.

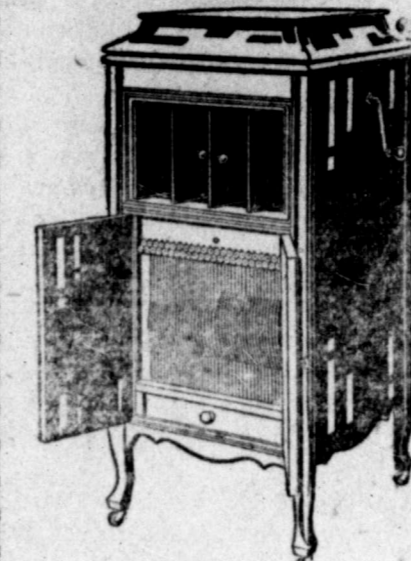
