#### OF C. WILL FINANCE LAKE COLORADO SURVEY

An appropriation of \$1,400.00 was assed by directors of the Chamber of Commerce Monday night to meet the Lake Colorado, proposed in a project to dam Lone Wolf Creek immediately north of the city, and to survey a pipe line from the proposed lake to the city waterworks plant east of Colorado. Dr. P. C. Coleman, president of the Chamber, will negotiate these surveys and left Tuesday night for Dallas confer with waterworks engineers.

Dr. Coleman, who is chairman of a ommittee appointed at a recent meeting of the Colorado Boosters Club to work out specifications of the project to dam Lone Wolf stated Monday that the committee would probably recommend construction of a reinforced concrete dam 30 feet high to se located a few hundred yards above Second street bridge. At this point the creek bed passes between two protruding rock bluffs only 100 feet apart, making possible the construction of the dam at a minimum cost.

T. W. Stoneroad states that results of his conferences with property owners along the site of the proposed lake lead him to believe they are anxious to cooperate with the city in a spirit of equity to all concerned by selling acreage to be included in the lake property at prices not to be considered unreasonable. It is evident the committee on this work will recommend purchase of a considerable body of land adjacent to the lake in that the city may control desirable

Officers of the Chamber of Commerce present at the meeting were optimistic over the project and unanimously pledged the moral and financial support of the Chamber in putting over the entire program of constructing the dam to supply an adequate water supply, of extending the water mains and constructing a municipal sewer system. "The Chamber of Commerce cannot possibly use its more worthy cause in behalf of the est interests of the city," R. P. Price member of the board of directors,

stated in commenitng on the subject. The Chamber of Commerce also pledged its full endorsement of the Booster Band," directed by J. Lee Jones, and passed an order to continue payment of the director's salary. In offering the motion that this payment be continued, Joe H. Smoot rated that the band was an essential asset to a progressive city and entitled to every consideration.

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



#### NITRO FOR MEDOWELL WELL PASSES THROUGH COLORADO

A truck load of nttro glycerine to be used in shooting McDowell No. 1 the first well drilled by S. E. J. Cox on his West Texas holdings, passed through Colorado the latter part of last week. The McDowell well is 25 miles south of Big Spring and for a time last summer was the source of considerable excitement as to the commercial possibilities of the field in that vicinity.

The well was shot Saturday and, according to reports received in Colorado, responded with a flow for a short time. Reports received later during this week indicate that oil is being bailed from the well, but an estimate on the production could not be verified.

Special correspondence to the Dallas News from Big Spring stated that oil continued to shoot over the derrick for several hours following the shot, but this was not confirmed by information received by The Record direct from Big Spring. The driver of the truck that handled the shipment of nitro, who was in Colorado late Saturday on his return to Cisco, knew nothing of the source of the reports that the well had blown in a gusher.

Cox, who controls considerable acreage in the Big Spring territory, has recently acquired large holdings ir. Mitchell County, but he has-made no announcement for pubilcation as to what his plans here may be. He has stated however, that a stock company is to be promoted and that shares of the capital stock of his company are being offered on the mar-


