> W. R. Charters, chairman of the committee on entertainment, stated Tuesday that arrangements had been completed for the banquet to be serv ed by prominent club women of the city, comprising members of the Women's Auxiliary, of the American Legion. These ladies had not completed details Wednesday for this feature of the meeting and it was not known definitely where the eats would be served. It is expected, however, that tables will be provided in a room in the Coe building, adjoining the auditorium in which the meeting is to be convened.

J. Lee Jones, director of the Colorado Booster Band, stated Tuesday that the boosters could feel assured of a most interesting concert Tuesday night. Several practice meets have been held recently by the band at which time music especially selected for the Booster Club Concert was used.

Considerable interest will center around reports to be made at this meeting by committees appointed in March to compile data on three projects for the city that are being fostered by the Booster Club. These are the damming of Lone Wolf creek near the city to impound a large lake of water, the laying of sewer mains and an extension of water mains.

Dr. P. C. Coleman, chairman of the committee to furnish an estimate on cost of these proposed projects, stated Wednesday that consulting engineers employed several days ago had practically completed the taking of profiles for the dam site and sewer mains and would commence printing of blue prints at an early date. Just as soon as this work is completed an estimate of the cost to be incurred in financing these two projects will be

Another committee, composed of attorneys of the city and of which Judge C. H. Earnest is chairman, is to report its findings as to legal conditions to be met in financing the proposed projects. Still another committee, one appointed to negotiate with land owners the probable purchase of the proposed lake site, is to report at this meeting. The latter committee is headed by C. M. Adams as chairman.



They are beginning to demand the best and they know that the only way to get the best is to pay for it.

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

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 30

Relating to the amending of Article 17, Section 58, of the Constitution of the State of Texas: abolishing the Board of Prison Commissioners: providing for the supervision and management of the Prison System, under such laws as may be provided for by the Legislature.

State of Texas.
Section 1. That Article 17, Section 58, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, he amended so as to bereafter read as

Section 58. The Legislature shall have Il power and authority to provide by w for the management and control of the Prison System of Texas; and to this end shall have power and authority to place the prison system under the super-vision, management and control of such officer or officers as the Legislature may

vision, management and control of such officer or officers as the Legislature may from time to time provide for by law.

Sec. 2. The above constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a general election to be held on the fourth Saturday in July, 1921, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballot the words: "For the amendment of Article 17, Section 58, of the Constitution, abolishing the Board of Prison Commissioners." All those opposing said amendment shall write or have printed on their ballot the words: "Against the Amendment of Article 17, Section 58, of the Constitution, abolishing the Board of Prison Commissioners."

Sec. 3. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by law Sec. 4. The sum of \$5,000.00 or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of the funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 4

the State of Texas amending Sections of the Constitution of the State of Texas as follows: Sections 5 and 21 and 23 of Article 4, relating to the commensation of executive officers; and Section 24. Article 3, relating to mileage and per diem of Members of the Legislature of said State.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:
Section 1. Sections 5 and 21 and 23 of Article 4, and Section 24 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas shall be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

s follows:
Section 5. He shall, at stated times, receive as compensation for his services an annual salary not to exceed Eight Thousand (\$8.000.00) Dollars and no more, and shall have the use and occupation of the Governor's Mansion, fixtures and furniture.

Thousand (SS.000.00) Dollars and no more and shall have the use and occupation of the Governor's Mansion, fixtures and furniture.

Section 21. There shall be a Secretary of State, who shall be appointed by the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, and who shall continue in office during the term of service of the Governor. He shall authenticate the publication of the laws and keep a fair register of all official acts and proceedings of the Governor, and shall, when required, lay the same, and all papers, minutes and vouchers relative thereto, before the Legislature, or either House thereof, and shall perform such other duties as may be required of him by law. He shall receive for his services an annual salary of Five Thousard (35,000.00) Dollars, and no more.

Section 22 The Attorney General shall hold his office for two years and until his successor is ally qualified. He shall represent the State in all suits and pleas in the Supreme Court of the State in which the State may be a party, and shall especially inquire into the charter rights of all private corporations, and, from time to time, in the name of the State, take such action in the courts as may be proper and necessary to prevent any private corporation from exercising any species of taxes, toll, freight, or wharfage, not authorized by law. He shall, whenever sufficient cause exists, seek a judicial forfeiture of all such charters, unless other duties as may be required by law, and give legal advice in writing to the Governor or other executive officers, when requested by them, and perform such other duties as may be required by law, He shall receive for his services an annual salary not to exceed Seven Thousand Five Hundred (\$7.500.00) Dollars, and no more.

Section 23. The Comptroller of Public Accounts, the Treasurer, and the Commissioner of the General Land Office, shall each hole office for the term of two years, and under register of him by law. They and the Boxolary of State shall not receive to their wan use, any fees. cos



Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:
Section 1. That Section 2, of Article 6 of the Constitution of the State of Texas to be so amended as hereafter to read as follows:

Section 2. Every person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications, who shall have attained the age of twenty-one years and who shall be a citizen of the United States and who shall months within the ditrict or county in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector; provided, that electors living in any unorganized county may vote at any election precinct is the county to which such county is attached for judicial purposes; and provided further, that any voter who is subject to pay a poll-tax under the laws of the State of Texas shall have paid said tax before offering to vote at any election in the State and hold a receipt showing that said poll tax was paid before the first day of February next preceding such election. Or if said voter shall have lost or misplaced said tax receipt, he or she, as the case may be, shall be entitled to vote upon making affidavit before any officer authorized to administer oaths that such tax receipt has been lost. Such affidavit shall be made in writing and left with the judge of the election. The husband may pay the poll tax of his wife and receive the receipt therefor. In like manner the wife may pay the poll tax of her husband and receive the receipt therefor. The Legislature may authorize absentee voting. And this provision of the Constitution shall be self-enacting without the necessity of further legislation.

And all those opposto said amendment shall write have printed on their ballots, the amendment to Section 2 of Article 6 of the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that only native born or naturalized citizens of the United States shall be qualified electors in this State. and providing that either the husband or wife may pay the poll tax of the other and receive the receipt therefor, and per-mitting the Legislature to authorize absentee voting."

Sec 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution, and existing laws of the

(*5.000) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election.
