## TRIED AND TRUE RECIPES

#### HOW TO COOK A HUSBAND.

. A good many husbands are eventually spoiled by mismanagement in cooking, and so are not tender and good. Some women keep them too constantly in hot water; others freeze them. Others put them in a stew; others roast them and others keep them constantly in a pickle. It cannot be supposed that any husband will be good and tender managed in this way, but they are really delicious when properly treated. In selecting your husband you should not be guided by the silvery appearance, as in buying mackerel, nor by the golden tint, as if you wanted salmon. Be sure to select him yourself as tastes differ. Do not go to the market for him, as those brought to the door are best. It is far better to have none than not to learn how to cook them properly. It does not make so much difference what you cook him in as how you cook him. See that the linen in which he is wrapped is white and nicely mended, with the required number of strings and buttons. Don't keep him in the kettle by force, as he will stay there himself if proper care is taken. If he should sputter or fizz do not be anxious; some husbands do this. Add a little sugar in the form of what confectioners call "kisses," but no vinegar or pepper on any account. A little spice improves them, but it must be used with judgment. Do not try him with anything sharp to see if he is tender. Stir him gently the while, lest he stay too long in the kettle and thus become flat and tasteless. If thus treated you will find him very digestable, agreeing nicely with you, and he will keep as long as you want.

#### SOUPS. Vegetable Soup.

Small beef bone in one-half gallon of water; let boil slow until beef is tender; take out of the water and pick the meat to very small pieces; then have one medium size onion; two Irish potatoes; small bit of chopped cabbage; small can of tomatoes; salt and pepper (red or black) to taste. If the beef did not have enough fat on it to make soup rich, add butter. Put all this in the beef water and cook until vegetables are tender; then add water (boiling) to make as much soup as wanted. I sometimes add one cup of sweet milk with pinch of soda. This is very good for sick people with cabbage left out, and well strained.

#### Soup for Invalids.

Take the white meat of cold chicken; minec fine; add teaspoonful of fine flour together with broth. Season with salt, pepper and a pinch of parsley leaves is fine. If broth is not at hand, use new milk. Serve hot on toast. Garnish with lettuce.

#### ------

#### FISH AND FOWLS

#### Salmon Loaf With Rice

One can salmon; two cups rice; two eggs, beaten; juice of half a lemon; salt and pepper to taste. Mix lightly with fork; bake in covered dish one hour; serve with tomato sauce, made by stirring and slightly thickening a cup of cooked tomatoes, seasoned well. Peas may be used instead of rice, in which case serve with a cream sauce.

#### Chicken Pie

Cook chicken until it falls from bones; remove the bones and place meat in baking dish and pour in sauce made of three teaspoons melted butter; three tablespoons flour; five cups broth; one cup milk. Over this spead a batter made of two cups flour; two teaspoons baking powder; two tablespoons shortening; one egg; one cup milk, and a pinch of salt. Bake until golden brown.

#### MEATS AND GRAVIES Pot Roast With Prunes

Three-pound rump roast; one pound prunes; one-half eup Karo; one-fourth eup vinegar; one-half teaspoon of alspice; one tablespoon salt. Have pot well heated, sear roast on each side, soak prunes over night, then put prunes and liquid in bottom of vessel over which roast is placed on wire frame and steam until done.

#### Pork Roast With Irish Potatoes


Any size roast placed in pan after it has been rolled in flour and sprinkled with black pepper and salt; then slice raw Irish potatoes around roast and put pan in a larger vessel in which water is put. Let cook until steam tenders the roast.


#### VEGETABLES Potatoes and Green Peppers

Line the bottom of a baking pan with Irish potatoes sliced thin, then a layer of onions, and a layer of green pepper, and so on until the pan is filled. To this add one or two cupfuls of sweet milk; piece of butter; black pepper and salt to taste. Bake until tender.

#### Sweetpotato Cones.

Mix three cupfuls of mashed sweet potatoes, yolks of three eggs; one heaping tablespoonful of butter and a pinch of salt; beat until smooth. When cool form into cones; roll in the beaten whites of two eggs, then in cracker crumbs; put into a well-greased pan and set in hot oven to brown. Before removing from oven place a heaping teaspoonful of meringue made from the white of one egg and one rounded teaspoonful of sugar on each and brown.

Be it resolver by the Legislature of the State of Texat Section 1. That Section 2. of Article 6 of the Constitution of the State of Texas to be so amended as hereafter to read as

follows: Section 2. Every person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications, who shall have attained the age of twenty-one years and who shall be a citi-zen of the United States and who shall have resided in this state one year next preceding an election and the last six months within the ditrict or county in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector; provided, that electors living in any unorganized county may vote at any election precinet in the county to which such county in attached for judicial purposes; and pro.ided fur-ther, that any vote who is subject to pay a poll tax under the laws of the State of follows ther, that any voter who is subject to pay a poll tax under the laws of the State of Texas shall have paid said tax before of-fering to vote at any election in this State and hold a receipt showing that said poll tax was paid before the first day of February next preceding such election. Or if said voter shall have lost or mis-placed said tax receipt, he or she, as the case may be, shall be entitled to vote upon making affidavit before any officer authorized to administer oaths that such tax receipt has been lost. Such affidavit shall be made in writing and left with

tax receipt has been lost. Such affidavit shall be made in writing and left with the judge of the election. The husband may pay the poll tax of his wife and re-ceive the receipt therefor. In like manner the wife may pay the poll tax of her husband and receive the receipt threfor. The Legislature may authorize absentee voting. And this provision of the Con-stitution shall be self-enacting without the necessity of further legislation. Sec. 2. 


