

Just across the historic Potomac overlooking the capital of the nation from a commanding bluff is the noblest of American cemeteries, and from the midst of its verdant green is reflected in the morning suflight a wonderful edifice of snow-white marble. It Is the new Memorial amphitheater, ite most splendid monument to the heroic dead ever erected by any nation. In eautiful Arlington lie buried more than 26,000 men. Union soldiers and failors of the Civil war, from private and seaman to general and admiral, Confederate soldiers, soldiers of the Spanish war and soldiers and sailors of the regular army, navy and marines who have died in times of peace. It is the highest of honors to be eligible to burial in Arlington and while major generals and second lieutenants, lie side by side near the men they commanded in battle, not one civilian, no matter what his influence, may find burial within its confines. Nor could one wish to lie down to final rest in more beautiful surroundings. Over every foot of the slopes and vales of this magnificent reservation the national government provides for a most perfect care; the grass is kept green and cut and the bushes and shrubs cared for as in a royal park, while near the old Lee mansion the fragrant wistaria climbs over an extensive trellis where the Memorial day exercises have always been held, on all sides flowering shrubs contributing their living beauty and perfume to the impressive ceremonies on this day of nation's remembrance. Every President of the United States since the Civil war, except one, has felt honored by an invitation to speak at Arlington on Memorial day.

Less of the nation's Valhalla. The | place will increase in beauty and majwhite marble edifice, completed at a cost of \$850,000, is the magnificent resuit. It is a great circular amphitheater with a seating capacity of 5,000. The marble is from the famous quarries at Danby, Vt., and is a dazzling snowy white. The location of the amphitheater is on the crest of the same igh ridge occupied by the historic ee mansion with its huge white pilars, but the former is located some distance apart, just outside of the heavily wooded portion of the cemetery which is filled with soldier graves. As years pass and the young trees surrounding the amphitheater grow the



esty, The first national cemetery was established at Gettysburg to make an honored resting place for those who on that great battlefield gave their lives that the nation might live, and then came the inspiration to make at Arlington a cemetery that would be national in its widest sense. To provide this final resting place for the nation's dead, the government paid to the heirs of Gen. Robert E. Lee's wife, \$150,000 for property which had been assessed in 1860 at \$35,000.

The Arlington National cemetery embraces 418 acres and since its establishment the government has spared no expense to make it the most beautiful and attractive city of the dead upon which the sun shines. Over \$1,-000,000 have been thus expended in landscape engineering to enhance the

TRIED AND TRUE RECIPES

Cocoanut Cake.

Two cups sugar; three-fourths cup butter creamed; three cups flour and two teaspoons of baking powder sifted three times together; four egg whites whipped; one cup of milk from the cocoanut, if necessary complete the measure with sweet milk. Bake in layers and put together with uncooked icing and the ggrated cocoanut.

Nut Cake.

One pound raisins and one cup of water. Cook raisins a few minutes. One tablespoon butter; one and one-half cups sugar; two eggs; one level teaspoon soda; one teaspoon cinnamon; one teaspoon cloves; one teaspoon allspice; three cups flour and heaping gteaspoon baking powder and one cup chopped nuts.

Chocolate Cake.

Whites of five eggs; two cups of flour; one cup of sugar; three teaspoons baking powder sifted with the flour; threefourths cup of sweet milk. FILLING :- Two tablespoons chocolate; one cup of sweet milk boiled together; one tablespoon butter. Cook until thick and beat until cold.

Caramel Icing.

Two cups sugar; one-half cup sweet milk; one teaspoon vanilla extract; butter size of walnut. Boil one and one-half cups sugar until it begins to thread; melt and brown onehalfcup sugar. Stir in with the boiled sugar; add butter; let boil a few minutes until it gets firm when dropped in cold water. Add flavoring after taken from fire.

Caramel Filling.

One cup sugar; one-half cup milk. Mix and let boil while you are melting one-half cup suggar to a delicate brown. Mix little of first mixture to the melted sugar; then pour it all into the first mixture, stirring constantly. Cook until it will form a soft ball in cold water; beat until creamy. Spread on cake with thin knife dipped in water.

Marshmallow Filling.

Two cups sugar; one-half cup water; one level teaspoon cream of tartar. Stir together and boil until syrup threads. then stir in one box marshmallows. Stir until marshmallows are entirely dissolved. When partially cooled stir in a cup of nuts and put between layers.

Sponge Cake.

Six egg yolks; one cup sugar; one teaspoon lemon juice; grated rind of one-half lemon; six egg whites; one-half teaspoon salt; one cup flour. Beat the yolks until thick and lemon colored; add sugar and continue beating; then add flavoring and any other liquid that the recipe calls for. Beat the mixture well; add salt to egg whites and beat until whites are stiff. Sift flour; add part of dry ingredients to the yolk mixture; add egg whites. Repeat until all ingredients have been added. Mix by lifting wire egg beater up and down through mixture. Turn at once into an unoiled pan. Bake in moderate oven for 50 to 60 minutes.

World Holds Nothing Like It.

The amphitheater is a majestic addition which constitutes Arlington the most magnificent of cemeteries. There is nothing like it in the whole world. Other nations have erected monuments to successful generals, admirals and statesmen. They have provided famous places of sepulture, as Westminster abbey, Pere La Chaise, the Pantheon, and the Pyramids of Egypt. But Westminster abbey is reserved for men of the highest distinction in any walk of life - statesmanship, invention, science, letters, philanthropy, as well as war. It is the same with Pere La Chaise, while the Pyramids were tombs for kings and queens only. But not so with Arlington cemetery. Here equality of service and sacrifice dominates. Commanding general and humble private are on the same level; the simple rule of eligibility for burial is the same; yet it is iron-clad. Wealth, birth, social station and political eminence, without military service, try for admission in vain.

At Arlington have gathered during the past generation the greatest of the nation's military heroes to listen to and to participate in eulogies and tributes to their silent comrades all encamped about, and here each year in ever-increasing number are laid to their final rest many of these same heroes of the wars. Every year sees a multitude of new graves in Arlington and every Memorial day witnesses the thinned ranks of the participants in the tremendous conflict of half a century ago which has contributed the great majority of the members of this Silent City.

Strawberry Short Cake.

One quart strawberries; one-half cup butter; two tablespoons sugar; two cups flour; two teaspoons baking powder; one-half teaspoon salt; milk enough for soft dough. Mix flour, sugar salt and baking powder together; rub in butter; add milk; mix. Form into three equal sized cakes; bake in hot oven; take out just as soon as done; spread with butter while hot. Wash berries, mash slightly, add one cup sugar; dip out fruit and spread between short cakes; leave juice for the sauce. SAUCE :-- One cup sugar, one cup hot water, two heaping tablespoons butter, one tablespoon corn starch, one tablespoon lemon juice. Boil a few minutes and add juice left from berries.

Cranberry Sherbet

One quart cranberries (stewed and rubbed through sieve) two lemons juiced; one quart sugar; one envelope of Knox's gelatine and enough water to make the amount. Serve with meat course. (Freeze). This will make three pints of sherbet

Banana Sherbet

Boil one pint each of sugar and water ten minutes. Stir hot into them beaten whites of two eggs; add half a cup of lemon jjuice and mashed pulp of six bananas. Strain and freeze.

Charlotte Russe.

One pint of cream ; one-half cup sour milk ; one-fourth box of Knox's gelatine; whites of two eggs; one-half cup of pulverized sugar; pinch of salt; one teaspoonful vanilla. Soak the gelatine in one-half cup of milk twenty minutes. When dissolved set the cup in hot water. Whip the cream and to it add the salt, sugar, whites of eggs and vanilla. Strain the gelatin into mixture and stir till thick. Turn into mold or bowl lined with lady fingers. Let stand in cold place till ready to serve.

Apple Snow.

Take five or six large ripe apples and grate or scrape them and sprinkle very lightly with sugar; take a cup or half a cup of cream and whip until stiff and mix this with the apples very gently until it is all used. This is very good served with cake. This is very nourishing for sick with the white of egg beaten very stiff instead of the cream.
