In discussing the results of their terials and construction, engineering work on these projects, Mr. Willard among other things, stated:

"We have made surveys and have estimated the practicability of a dam on Lone Wolf to impound water for domestic use, and have located a site for such a dam, where the creek runs near the easterly edge of the city.

"There is an excellent location for a dam at this site, a good sandstone foundation being at the surface of the creek bed, and the drainage area, which is of sand, being approximately 50 square miles. This location has been surveyed and a number of borings taken to determine the cross section and character of the foundation.

"A dam constructed at this point, having a spillway elevation of 2085 feet will impound approximately 142,000,000 gallons of water. This should furnish sufficient supply for domestic use, on a basis of 60 gallons per capita per day, for 700 days.'

The estimate of cost for constructing the dam, installing the pumping plant, etc., is placed at \$51,050. The cost of water lines as proposed in the project is placed at \$24.135 and of the sewer system and disposal plant, \$38,300, making a total estimated cost of \$113,484 for the three







TRIED AND TRUE RECIPES

Chocolate Icing.

One cup sugar; one square bitter chocolate; whites of three eggs, well beaten. Mix well and cook in double boiler until whites are done.

Three eggs, one and one-half cups sugar; two cups flour; one-half cup butter; one-fourth cake of Baker's chocolate; one teaspoon soda; one cup of sweet milk. Dissolve soda in one-half of the milk and cook chocolate in other half until it becomes smooth; then add it to the batter.

Filling for Devels Food Cake:-Three cups sugar; one seant cup boiling water; pinch of cream of tartar. Boil until it breaks. Beat whites of three eggs to a stiff froth; add boiling syrup and stir until cold. Flavor with vanilla.

Blackberry Jam Cake.

One-half cup butter; two cups sugar; three cups flour; three eggs; one cup citron; one cup blackberry jam; one cup raisins; one-half cup sour milk; one teaspoon each kind of spices; one teaspoon soda in milk. Pecans chopped fine. Mix in regular cake order.

Angel Food Cake

One pound sugar; ten ounces flour; one pint egg whites; two light round teaspoons cream of tartar. Sift sugar, flour and cream of tartar several times together and fold lightly into well beaten whites. Turn lightly into wet pans free from grease and bake in moderate oven. Lean up to cool before cutting from the pan.

Devils Food Cake.

Custard Part: -One cup sugar; one cup sweet milk; two eggs well beaten. Use three pounds cocoa mixed with the sugar or one-fourth large cake bitter chocolate. Cook in double boiler until of consistency of custard. Set aside to cool. Batter:-Three-fourths cup shortening; one cup sugar; two eggs; two cups flour; three-fourths teaspoon soda. Mix and add the custard part; add teaspoon vanilla. Bake in two layers or loaf.

Devils Food Cake.

Part One :- One cup brown sugar; one-half cup butter; one-half cup sweet milk; yolks of three eggs; two cups flour; one teaspoon soda. Part Two: -One-half cup cocoa; one cup brown sugar; one-half cup sweet milk; one teaspoon vapilla. Boil and when cool mix with part one. Bake in slow oven.

Devils Food Cake.

Two cups sugar; one-half cup butter; two eggs; one-half cake bitter chocolate dissolved in one-half cup of boiling water; a little salt; two spoons baking powder; one cup of sweet milk and three cups flour. Bake in layers.

Filling: -One-half cup of cream or rich milk; one-half cup butter; two cups sugar and one teaspoon vanilla. Mix these together with two tablespoons of chocolate and cook until it becomes waxy, then cool and spread quickly on layers.

Ben Cake Filling.

One cup milk to boil; three-fourths cup sugar; volks of four to six eggs; one tablespoon flour. Stir all this in boiling milk; add lump of butter and flavoring and cook until thick as mush. Remove from fire, cool and stir in one cup of cocoanut; one cup pecans; one-half cup raisins; one-half cup dates. This is fine with any white layer cake.

Orange Icing.

Two and one-half cups powdered sugar; one heaping teaspoon butter; three tablespoons orange juice; grated rind of one orange; one egg yolk. Cream sugar and butter; mix other ingredients and add to sugar.

Chocolate Icing.

Three cups powdered sugar; two tablespoons corn starch; one-half cup butter. (Cream these together); one-half cup cocoa; five tablespoons hot coffee; one egg (beaten well); one teaspoon vanilla. Cream all these together until very smooth then spread on cake.

Pineapple Cake Filling.

One and one-half cup sugar; three-fourths cup water boiled until threads hard from spoon. Drain all juice from grated pineapple and add pineapple to syrup, and stir until cool before putting between cake.

Snowball Biscuits

Make a rather rich biscuit dough. Shape into small balls; roll in thick cream and bake in quick oven.

Sponge Cake.

Three eggs beaten very light; one cup sugar; one scant teaspoon salt; one heaping teaspoon baking powder; one cup flour; nine tablespoons milk heated to boiling point; flavor as desired. Sift flour, salt and baking powder together and add eggs and sugar; add milk and flavoring last. Bake in loaf

Old Time Pound Cake.

One pound of butter; one pound of flour. Cream butter and flour together; one pound of sugar; one dozen eggs, mix volks and sugar together; beat well; mix with flour and butter; beat whites of eggs well and add to other ingredients.

Prince of Wales Cake.

For White Layers :- White of four eggs, well beaten; one and one-half cups of sugar; one cup of sweet milk; two teaspoons of baking powder; three-fourths cup of butter or onehalf cup of cottolene; flour enough to make a moderately thin dough




