### FUNERAL OF PRIVATE BIRMINGHAM MONDAY.

The funeral of Private Allen Birmingham, held yesterday afternoon, was a very impressive and solemn affair. No Anderson county soldier was ever laid to rest with more elaborate ceremony, nor with greater respect. It was indeed, Memorial Day for the entire city as well as those participating in the funeral.

The funeral services were held at the First Baptist church, Rev. Dr. Lambly acting as chaplain, and Rev. Clapp preaching the funeral sermon. The talks by these two preachers were excellent and made a deep impression on the audience which completely filled the church. There were flowers in profusion, banked in great masses around the casket and lining the altar rail. Many of the wreaths were in the U. S. colors, and these seemed to act as sentinels, while the other flowers with long stems seemed to bow their heads in tender sympathy over the casket, shedding their last fragrance in honor to him who died for his country. The blanket of flowers with the 90th Division monogram was magnificent, as was the Red Cross emblem. The Ladies Auxiliary of the American Legion placed a beautiful wreath of poppies on the head of the casket.

The long procession to the cemetery was led by the Palestine Band, while playing Longfellow's Funeral March. Next came members of the American Legion, represented by some of Palestine's best business and professional men, paying due honor to a "buddie" notwithstanding the fact that the march was long, the sun hot and the road awfully dusty.

The regulation military burial ceremony was conducted at the ceme-terial home of taps.

Led by the Palestine Band, playing Indiana State March, the American Legion marched to the court house square, where Rev. Dr. Lambly delivered a Memorial Day prayer and address, salutes were fired and taps sounded for all the soldier dead.

The ceremony was one never to be forgotten, and should fill the hearts of ex-soldiers, mothers and fathers with pride, to know that the American Legion and its friends do not forget, being assured that on next Memorial day as well as every other memorial day, Private Birmingham and the comrades who have gone before will be remembered.—Palestine Advance.

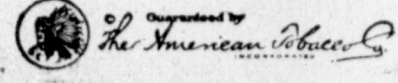

The Young People had a beautiful consecration service, conducted by Mrs. Steele, a pageant "Methodist Womanhood's Great Adventure," and a luncheon given by the Quanah Young People Tuesday was their day and they filled it full. We were taken for a drive over the wheat lands Monday, which proved very restful. Stamford was chosen as the next place of meeting. Most of the officers were reelected. Miss Green of Floydada, becomes recording secretary, and Mrs. Merritt is superintendent of social service. Mrs. Higgins was continued as district secretary.

We are still to cultivate, educate and interest the women in the work, and get the other five. We are to encourage our Y. P. and children's work, study and teach missions. Make our community a Christian community where everyone loves the Lord, and his neighbor as himself, and we are to help those in need. In this every department will be needed and every woman can be used.
