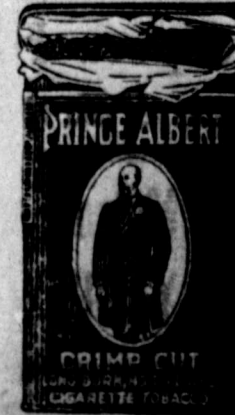

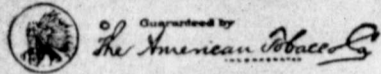

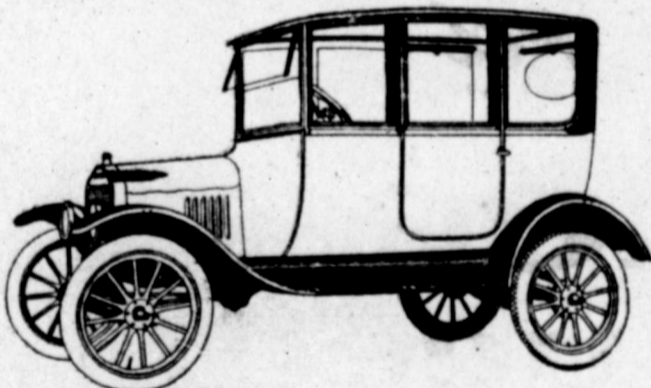

BANKERS ARE OPTIMISTIC.

Though the bankers of the Pan-handle Bankers Association, which convened in Lubbock Tuesday and Wednesday, realize that there is yet a great deal of hard work to be done to tide over the waves of adversity and through the storm of readjustment they with one accord seem to be optimistic, and believe that the "hardest part or the storm is over; with a few exceptions the people will weather the storm, and come out victorious.

The message given to this section through those bankers who spoke on the occasion of the convention, one would gather that greater prosperity is ahead, and that conditions generally are sure to improve in the immediate future. The message of optimism is of unusual importance and carries with it greater weight than the general run of optimistic utterances, because of the fact that it comes from those really in touch with the situation, and who are not given to optimism, unduly, and without good grounds for their contentions.

The cattle industry in this section seems to be in the greater danger, and the bankers are determined to take care of this part of the country's business in a way that will result in helping these men back to a point where they can get back on their feet. They realize that this cannot be done in a few months or even a year or two, but one banker who spoke before the convention said that not a cow man should be forced to sacrifice his stock if there was any possible way for him to help, and this statement was cheered heartily by all the bankers present, and all seemed to be of the same opinion, that it was important that this industry be taken care of, and given immediate relief, which seems to be practically arranged for through the medium of big loans from Federal Reserve sources and other financial institutions, who are willing to take care of the cattleman in these times of distress in prices.

Range conditions are ideal, and all the ranchman needs at the present time is financial backing to prevent having to force his cattle on the market at the present suicidal prices, and it seems from the tone of the bankers in convention Tuesday and Wednesday, that this matter will be taken care of.

This means better times. It means the salvation of the cattle industry.

Press dispatches this week told that boll weevils were making their appearance in the cotton fields of Scurry County, which adjoins our county on the north. This is not good news, in any sense of the word, to the agricultural, business and professional interests of this county, since it is now probable that this pest may swoop down upon the farms of this county at any time.

Things don't turn up in this world until somebody turns them up. A pound of pluck is worth a ton of luck.

Of course, 'tis better to give flowers to the living, and, in this The Record desires to present a bouquet to Messrs. E. M. Baldwin and W. A. Dulin for the wonderful success attained in putting over the Farm Bureau campaign in Mitchell County. These gentlemen have driven jitneys into every community of the county; walked miles and miles across cultivated farms and stood for hours and hours, day after day on the street corner as spokesmen to interested cotton growers, in order to help the farmer help himself. And, by the way, they brought home the bacon.

Colorado is presented with the opportunity of fitting up an ideal tourists camp adjacent to the city at a small expense. The tourists who pass through Colorado every day are continually giving information as to the condition of the roads, camping facilities, etc., to other tourists whom they meet, and the better the impression Colorado makes on those who pass through here, the better the report of us they will pass on to others. We should by all means improve a camp site for the tourist.

The public should give the benefit fete arranged by prominent club women of the city for the Colorado Booster Band an unselfish support. The occasion will be held on the court house lawn Friday evening. Help these ladies help the band, as a good band is among the best assets a city can have.

CONTEST ANNOUNCED.

The county farm agent, the secretary of the Mitchell County Farm Bureau, the secretary of the Chamber of Commerce and B. S. Van Tuijl (who by the way offices in the Farmer building) have announced the pooling together of a five dollar reward for the best watermelon grown in Mitchell county this year. The conditions are that the grower of the melon must deliver same to the Chamber of Commerce office, where it will be sampled by the four experts who are to pass on its merits or demerits. They expect to have at least one fine melon delivered each day during the summer, the reward to be paid on September 1st. Unless fifty melons are delivered under the terms of this contest, the offer of a reward is void. For further particulars see W. A. Dulin, the county farm agent.

(Note: The aforesaid judges of watermelons request that farmers of Mitchell county get together and arrange schedule in that not more than one melon will be received on the same day.)

RECENT ACT OF LEGISLATURE

A recent act of the State Legislature provides that all businesses running or desiring to run or conduct a business under an assumed name (any name other than the name of the party actually owning the business) shall make a report showing the owners of the business. The act further provides that the report shall be acknowledged and filed with the county clerk of the county in which the business is located.

The county clerk of Mitchell county now has sufficient forms for each and every business in this county. This act must be complied with by July 12th. Make your report before it is too late, and save that fine.

BANDSTAND NEAR COURT HOUSE BEING REPAIRED.

Workmen made repairs to the band stand on the court house lawn this week and within the near future the Colorado Booster Band will give regular concerts there. The repairs were made by the city in response to representations of the Colorado Civic League.

ELECTION NOTICE.

Whereas, the City Council of the City of Colorado, Texas, be authorized to issue bonds of said city for the purposes hereinafter mentioned.

Therefore, it is hereby ordered by the city council of said city that an election be held on the 2nd day of August, 1921, at which election the following propositions shall be submitted:

1. "Shall the City Council of the City of Colorado, Texas, be authorized to issue bonds of said city in the sum of Eighty-five Thousand Dollars, (\$85,000.00) payable in Forty (40) years after date, with option of redeeming same at any time after ten years from date, bearing interest at the rate of six per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, and to levy a tax sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and create a sinking fund sufficient to redeem them at maturity, for the purpose of constructing a reservoir and extension of the waterworks of said city, as authorized by Chapter 1, Title 18, R. S. 1911, and Chapter 9, Acts of the 37th Legislature, Regular Session, 1921, Arts. 769 and 770, R. S. 1911, and the constitution and laws of the State of Texas."

2. "Shall the City Council of the City of Colorado, Texas, be authorized to issue bonds of said city in the sum of Thirty-five Thousand Dollars, (\$35,000.00) payable in Forty (40) years after date, with option of redeeming same at any time after ten years from date, bearing interest at the rate of 6 per cent per annum payable semi-annually and to levy a tax sufficient to redeem them at maturity for the purpose of constructing sewers within the limits of said city, as authorized by Chapter 1, Title 18, R. S. 1911, and Chapter 9, Acts of the 37th Legislature, Regular Session, 1921, and the constitution and laws of the State of Texas."

The said election shall be held at the City hall in the City of Colorado, Texas, and the following named persons are hereby appointed managers of said election, to-wit:

- F. A. Winn, Presiding Judge,
A. A. Dorn, Assistant Judge,
E. M. Baldwin, Clerk,
Oscar B. Price, Clerk.

Said election shall be held under the provisions of Chapter 1, Title 18, R. S. 1911, and Chapter 9, Acts of the 37th Legislature, Regular Session, 1921, and the constitution and laws of the State of Texas, and only qualified voters, who are property taxpayers of said city shall be allowed to vote.

All voters who favor either proposition to issue the bonds, shall have written or printed upon their ballots, for each proposition, the words: "FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS"

And those opposed shall have written or printed upon their ballots for each proposition, the words: "AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS."

The manner of holding said election shall be governed by the laws of the State regulating general elections.

A copy of this order, signed by the Mayor of Colorado, Texas, attested by the City Secretary shall serve as a proper notice of said election.

The Mayor is authorized and directed to cause said notice of said election to be posted up at the city hall and at the place designated for holding said election, at least thirty days prior to the date of said election.

The Mayor is further authorized and directed to have said notice of election published in some newspaper of general circulation published in said city, and which notice shall be published once each week for not less than thirty days prior to the date of said election.

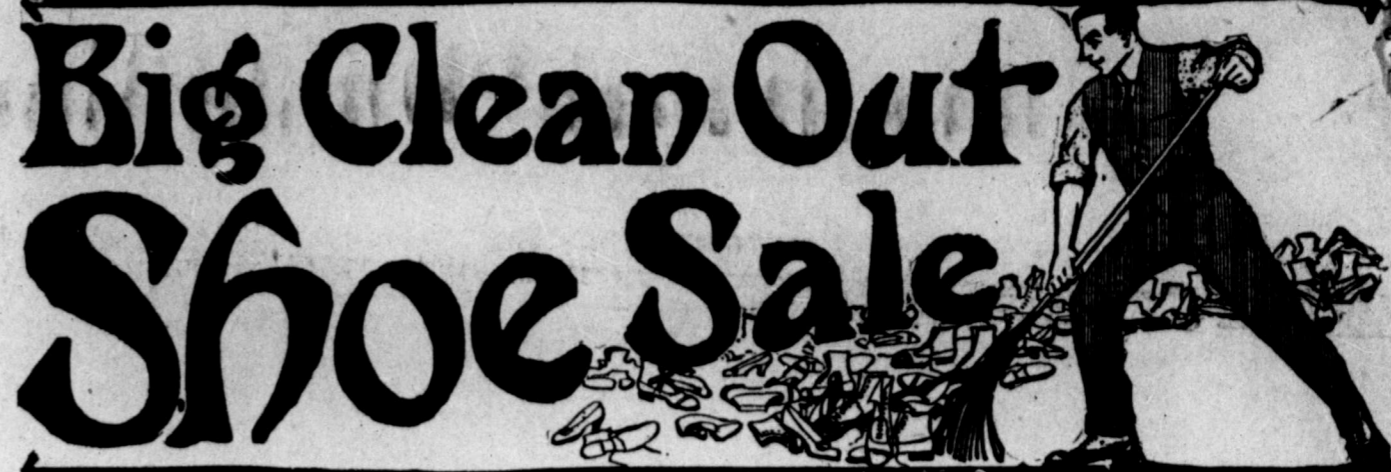

**JUDGE LOONEY HAS GOOD CROPS ON HIS FARMS.**

Tuesday afternoon a representative of The Record accepted an invitation from Judge R. H. Looney to visit his farms seven miles southeast of Colorado, and in company with him we drove out there in his Cadillac.

We found crops on these farms above the average that we have noticed recently. There is approximately 500 acres in cultivation on the Looney lands and the Judge estimates that two thirds of this area is planted to cotton. Some of his cotton is knee high and is fruiting nicely. Indian corn and maize and kafir corn varieties of the sorghums, especially the acreage of early planting, were in fine condition.

From the Looney farms we drove to Loraine and then north into the Lone Wolf community. We noticed that many farmers in these communities were cultivating late crops, in some instances the cotton and feed not being more than one week old. In other fields it was to be noticed that rank growths of weeds were spreading and the interests of the farmers and in these the crops were not thriving very satisfactorily.

We drove by a few fields of Indian corn, where the stalks were loaded with tempting roasting ears. We also located a fine watermelon patch and it is the plan of the Judge and this writer to make another visit later during the year when the melons are ripe.

The crops of that section of Mitchell county are not as far advanced as was the case this time last year, but since an abundance of moisture is in the ground and the crops are growing off rapidly, the promise of normal production is assuring. It is estimated that the cotton acreage is reduced twenty per cent from last year in those communities visited.

**A RUNAWAY.**

One of the horses managed some way to get the bit out of his mouth, otherwise the plucky little fellow would have controlled the team and kept them in the road, but being unable to guide the runaways they ran into a telegraph pole and broke loose. The boy was not seriously hurt, but one ankle was sprained. —Lorraine Leader.

**FARM BUREAU MEETING.**
